CONCERNS ABOUT NH BUDGET INCREASE

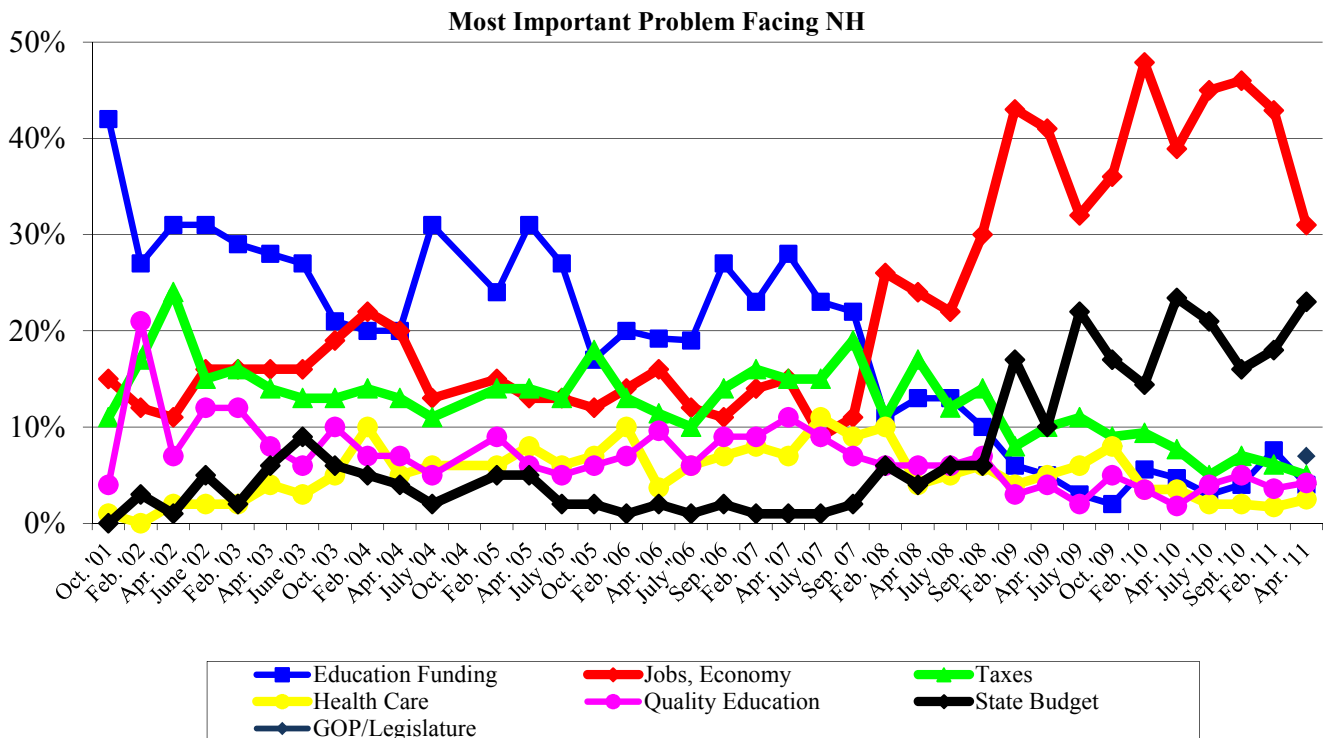
DURHAM, NH – New Hampshire is becoming increasingly concerned over the state budget. However, residents are split on the causes of the budget shortfall, as well as the best way to balance the budget.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR Granite State Poll**,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred four (504) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by telephone between April 15 and April 26, 2011. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.4 percent.

Most Important Problem Facing New Hampshire

As the economy recovers, New Hampshire residents remained concerned about the state’s economy and unemployment, but at a lower level than in recent months. A lack of jobs and a weak economy is still seen as the most important problem (31%), but concerns about the state budget have increased to 23% from 18% in February. A significant change is that 7% say that the newly elected Republican legislature is the most important problem facing the state. Other concerns are high taxes (5%), education funding (4%), and the quality of education (4%).

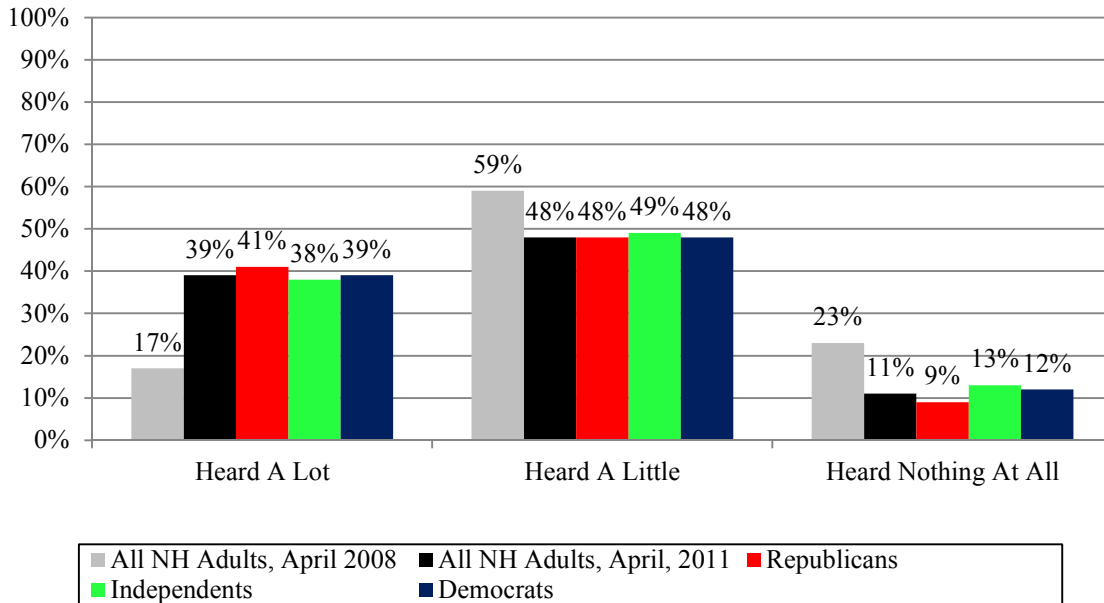
13% of Democrats and 4% of Independents said the GOP legislature is the most important problem facing the state.

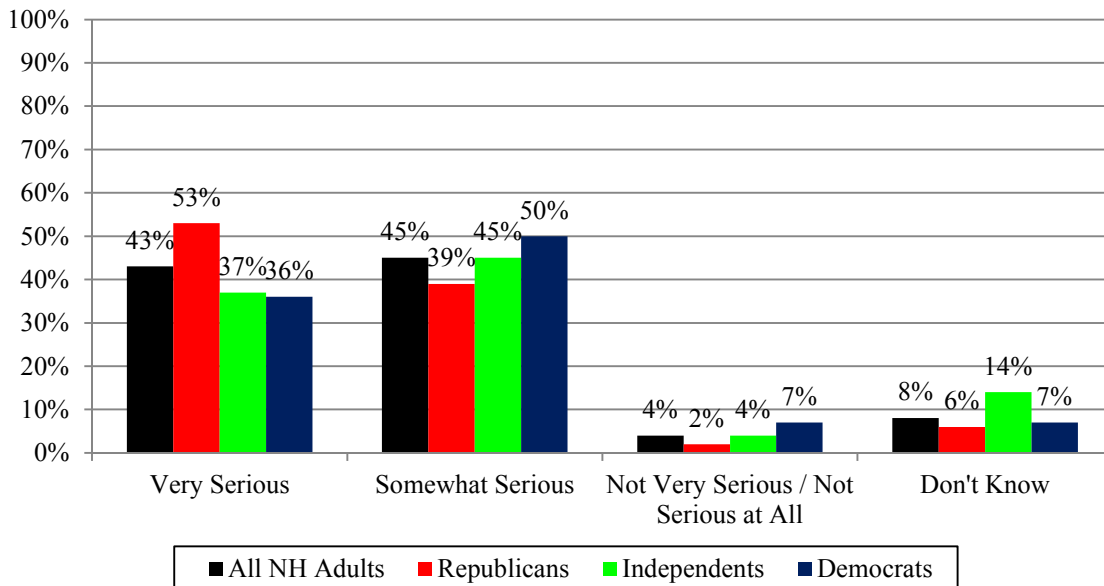
NH residents are significantly more informed about the budget problems facing the state, 39% say they have heard a lot about the state budget, 48% have heard a little, 11% have heard nothing at all, and 2% don't know. In April 2008, only 17% of state residents said they had heard a lot about problems with the state budget. Awareness of the state's budget problems is bi-partisan.

Heard About State Budget Issues



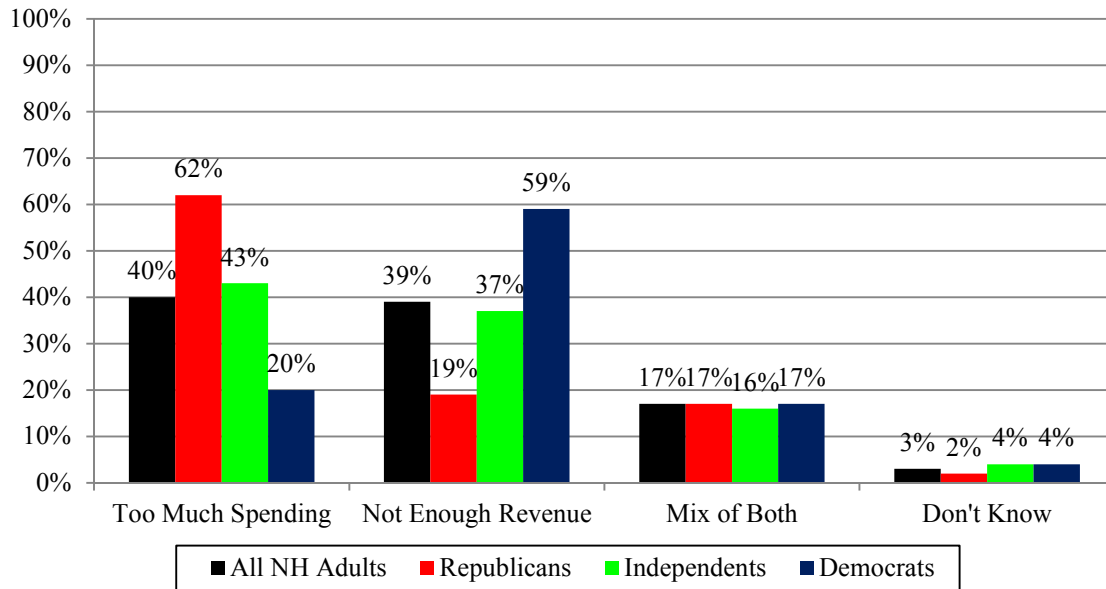
The budget problem facing the state is seen as very serious by 43% of New Hampshire adults, 45% think it is somewhat serious, and only 4% think it is not very serious or not serious at all, and 8% are unsure. Republicans, Manchester area residents, and readers of the Union Leader are most likely to think the budget problems are very serious.

The New Hampshire is split as to the main cause of the state's budget problems, 40% think it is because of too much spending, 39% think it is due to a lack of revenue, 17% think it is a mix of both, and 3% are unsure. Republicans are most likely to think it is due to too much spending (62%) while Democrats are most likely to blame a lack of revenues (59%).

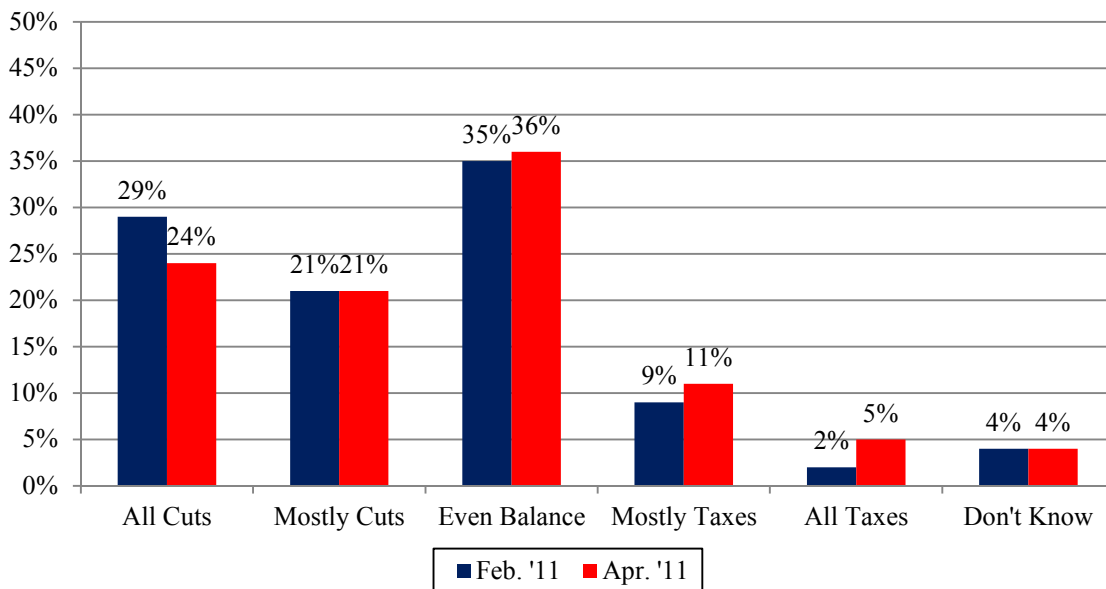
Main Cause of Budget Issues



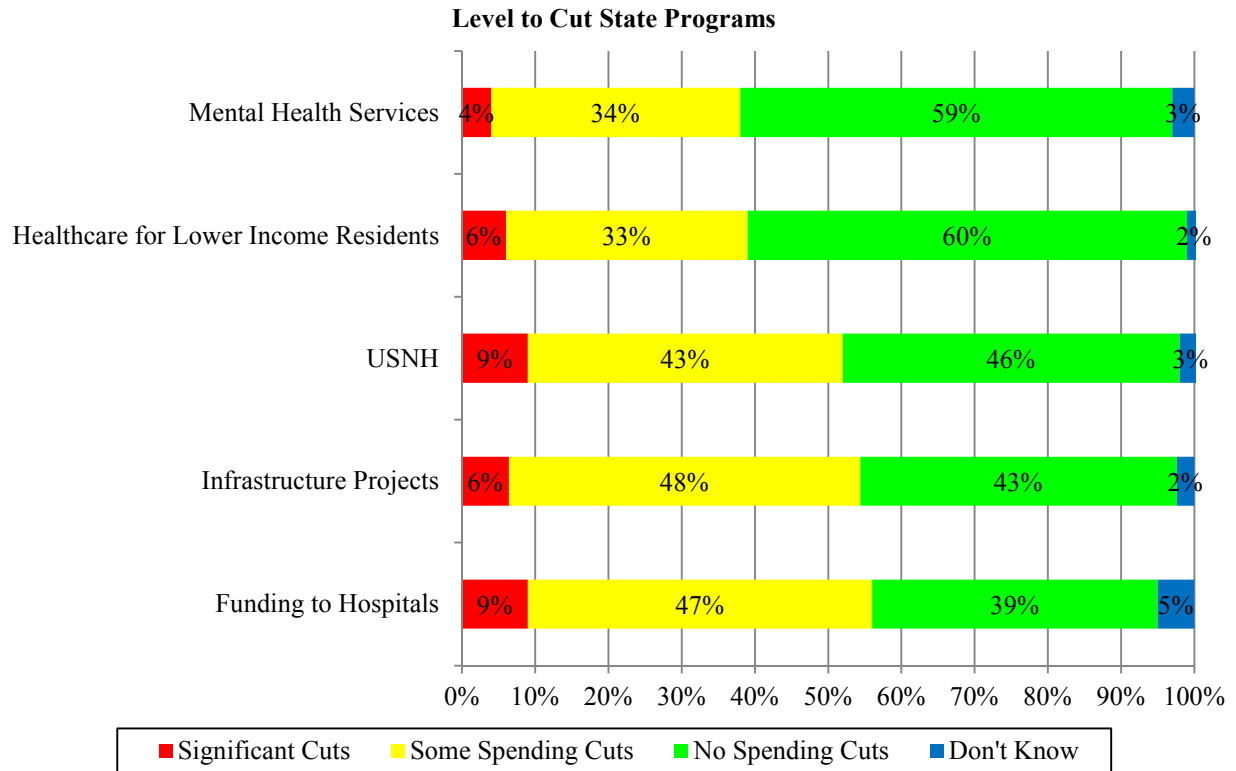
In order to balance the state's budget, most New Hampshire residents prefer cutting state spending than increasing taxes. Twenty-four percent of New Hampshire adults favor balancing the state's budget entirely through cuts in spending, 21% want mainly spending cuts with some tax increases, 36% favor an even balance between spending cuts and tax increases, 11% want mainly tax increases with some spending cuts, only 5% want to balance the budget with only tax increases and 4% are unsure.

Republicans are most likely to say that the budget should be balanced by budget cuts, 39% think it should be balanced exclusively by budget cuts and 28% think it should be balanced mostly by budget cuts. Democrats (47%) are most likely to say there should be an even balance between spending cuts and tax increases and 28% of Democrats think that it should be balanced mostly or exclusively through more taxes.

Best Way to Deal With Budget Shortfall

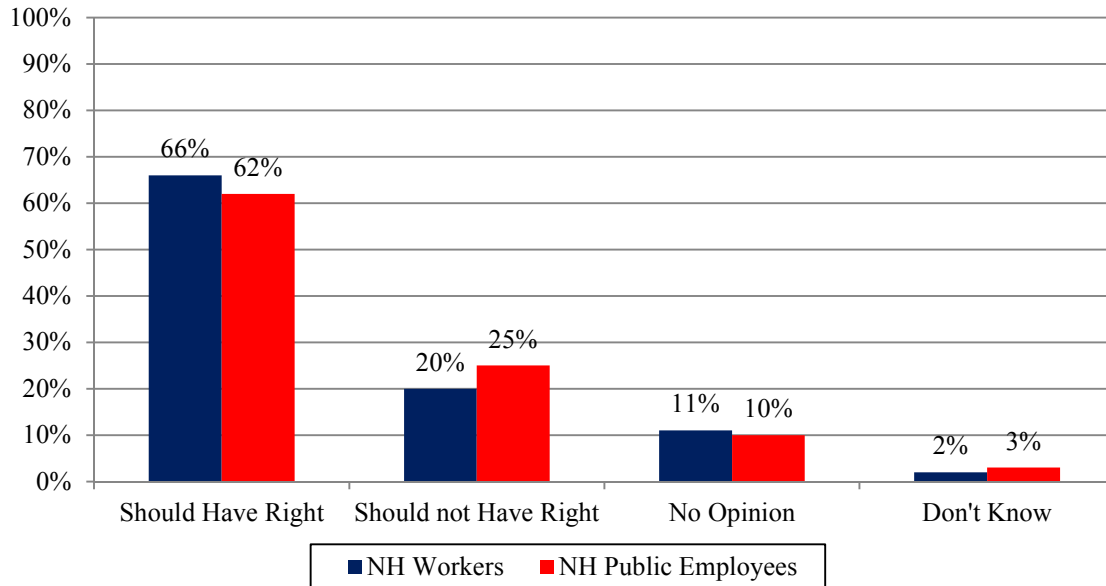


But despite wanting to see the budget balanced primarily through spending cuts, state residents have difficulty agreeing on where those cuts should be. When asked about five major areas facing significant cuts in the current budget discussions, 60% think there should be no spending cuts in providing health care services for low income residents, and 59% think there should be no spending cuts to mental health services. There is majority support for at least some spending cuts for infrastructure projects, such as roads and bridge building and repair (54%), for cutting funding for hospitals (56%), and for reducing budgets for state universities and community colleges (52%).



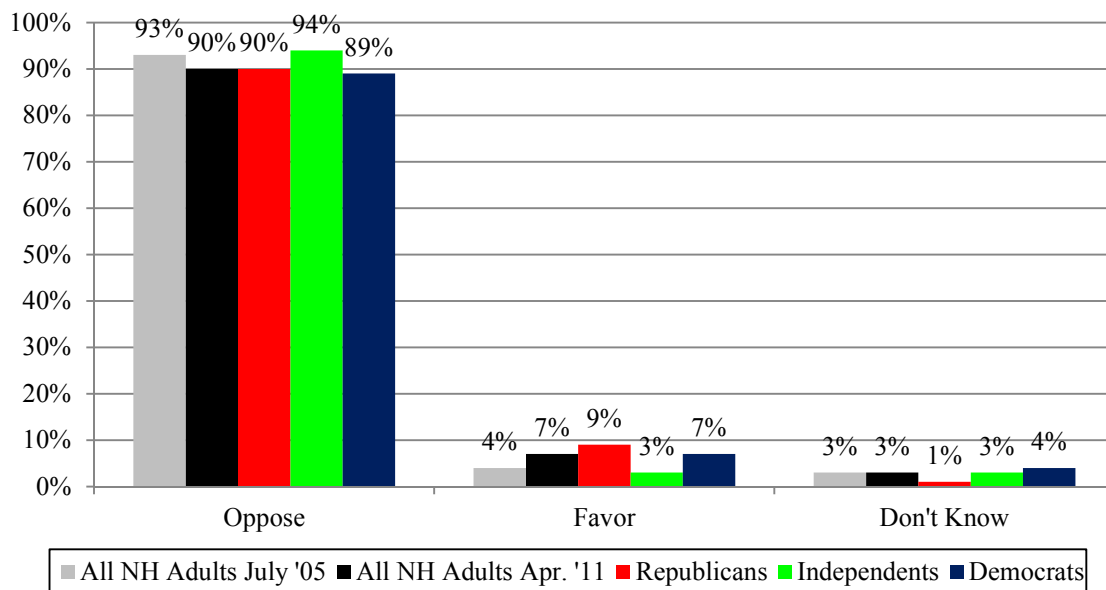
Several states, from Wisconsin to Massachusetts, have sought to curb state spending by limiting the ability of public employees to collectively bargain for benefits. There is little support for this proposal in New Hampshire. Most state residents (66%) think that private sector workers should have the right to form unions and collectively bargain and 62% think that public employees, should have that right.

On a separate issue, there has recently been significant discussion about the use of eminent domain to acquire private land for the construction of power transmission from Canada to Deerfield, New Hampshire. There is extremely strong, bi-partisan opposition to the use of eminent domain for private use – 90% oppose this idea while only 7% favor it. There has been little change in this measure since 2005.

Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest WMUR Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred four (504) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by telephone between April 15 and April 26, 2011. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.4 percent.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.

Eminent Domain
