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NH CONGRESSIONAL RACES CLOSE IN FINAL DAYS

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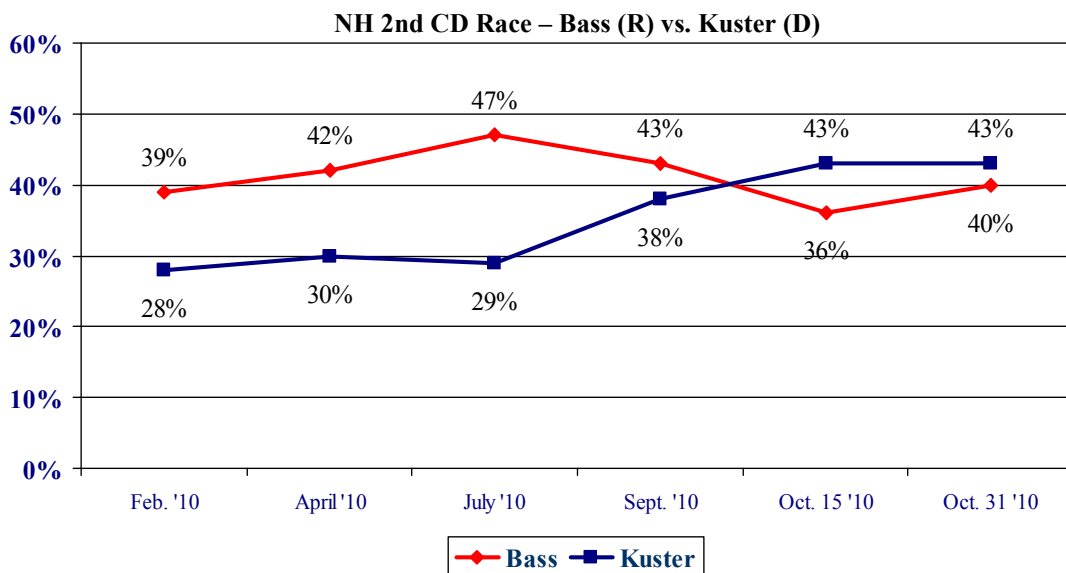
DURHAM, NH – Democrat Ann McLane Kuster and Republican Charlie Bass are locked in a very tight race for New Hampshire’s Second Congressional District seat. The First C.D. race has also tightened with Republican Frank Guinta holding a modest, but not insurmountable, lead over incumbent Carol Shea-Porter.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR / UNH New Hampshire Election Poll**,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Eight hundred eighty-five (885) randomly selected New Hampshire likely voters were interviewed by telephone between October 27 and October 31, 2010. The margin of sampling error for the state-wide likely voter sample is +/- 3.3%. Included was a subsample of 434 likely voters in the NH First Congressional District (margin of sampling error +/-4.7%), and a subsample of 451 Second Congressional District likely voters (margin of sampling error +/-4.6%).

2nd Congressional District

Democrat Ann McLane Kuster holds a narrow lead over Republican Charlie Bass in the Second Congressional District. Bass, the better known candidate, had led throughout much of the past year, but was overtaken by Kuster in October. The race has narrowed since then with 43% of likely Second C.D. voters saying they will vote for Kuster, 40% for Bass, 3% prefer Libertarian Howard Wilson, 2% favor independent Tim Van Blommestejn, 1% prefer some other candidate, and 11% remain undecided.

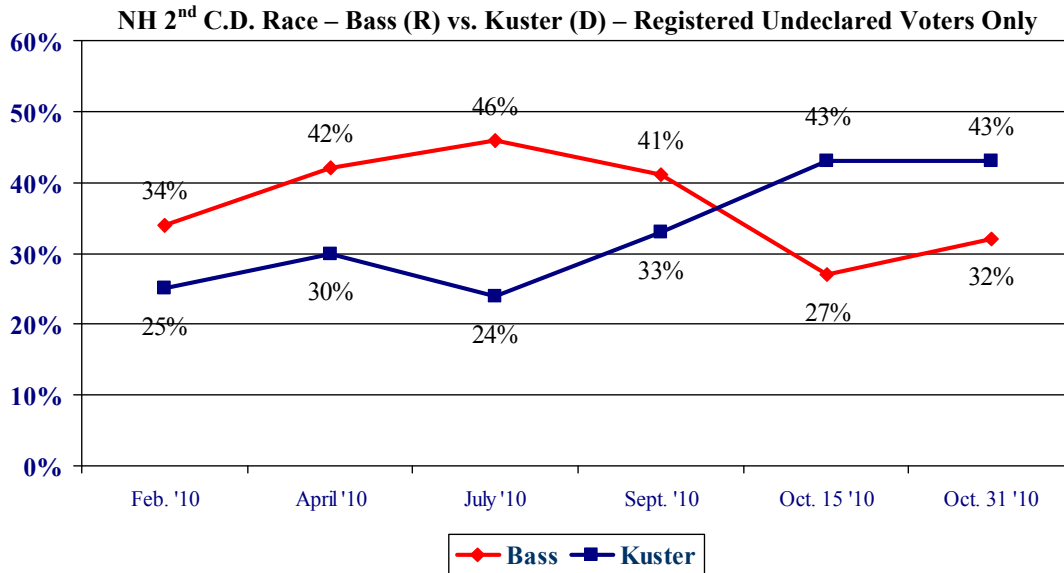
When undecided voters are allocated to the candidate they are most likely to vote for, support for Kuster increases to 47%, Bass gets 46%, and other candidates get 7%. “This race is too close to call and the vote that ends up going to third party candidates could be the deciding factor in who wins the Second C.D.,” said Andrew E. Smith, Director of the UNH Survey Center.

Kuster gets her strongest support from Democrats women, voters with post-graduate educations, and voters from Merrimack County and the Connecticut River valley. Bass receives his strongest support from Republicans, voters who are excited about the election outcomes, voters who are extremely interested in the election, and voters living in towns along the Massachusetts border.

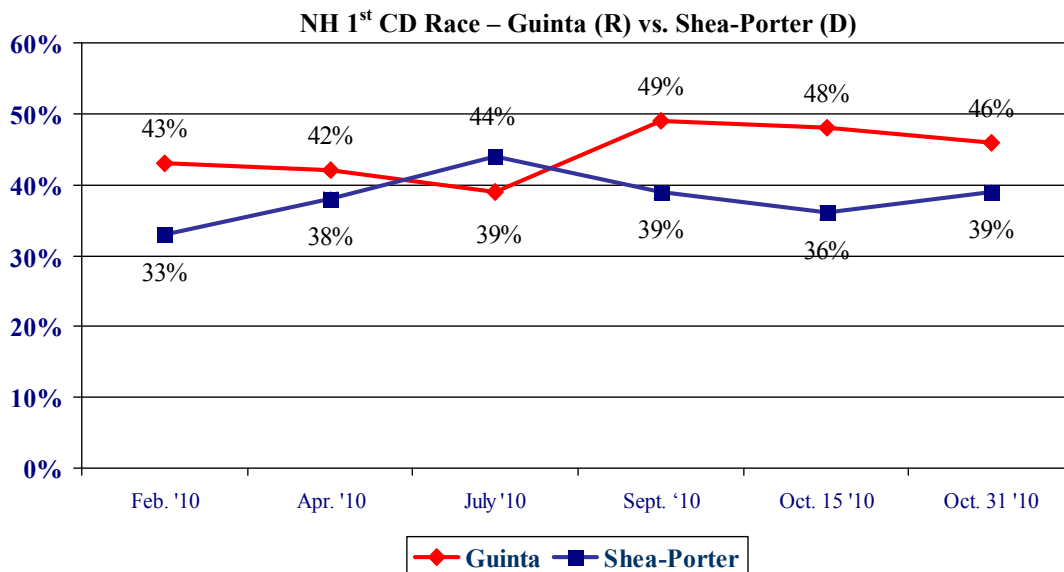
Kuster continues to lead among voters who are registered Undeclared, often referred to as Independents. Currently, 43% of Undeclared voters support Kuster, 32% prefer Bass, 12% support some other candidate, and 13% are undecided.



1st Congressional District

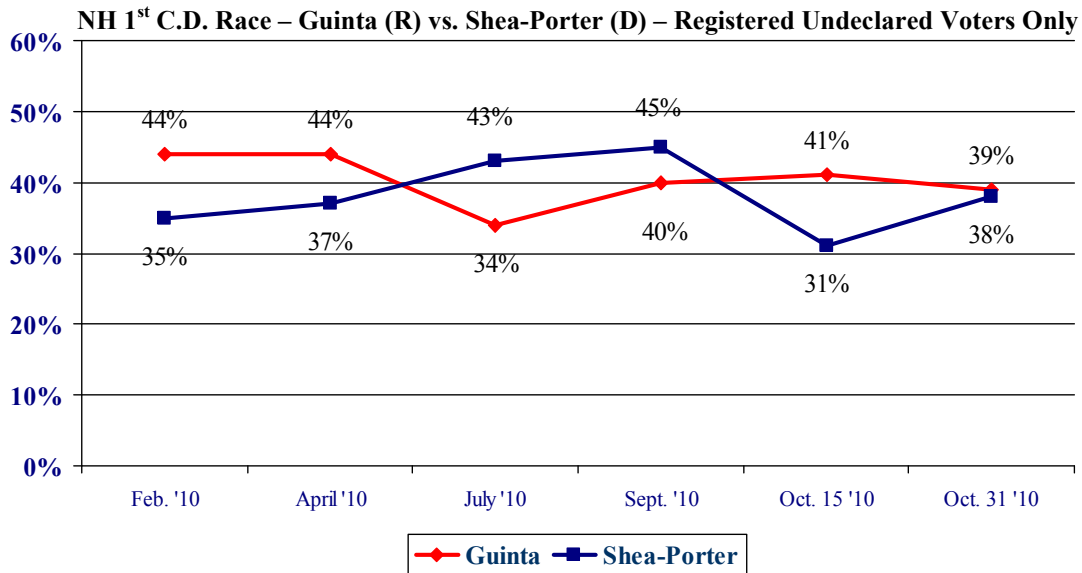
In New Hampshire’s First Congressional District, incumbent Democrat Carol Shea-Porter has narrowed the race during the past two weeks, but still trails former Manchester Mayor Frank Guinta. Currently, 46% of likely First C.D. voters say they will vote for Guinta, 39% say they will vote for Shea-Porter, 2% support Libertarian Philip Hodson, 2% prefer independent Mark Whitman, Jr., less than 1% prefer some other candidate, and 12% are undecided.

When undecided voters are allocated to the candidate they are most likely to vote for, support for Guinta moves up to 53%, Shea-Porter gets 43%, and other candidates get the remaining 4%. “Research has shown that undecided voters typically break to the challenger in races where there is an incumbent,” said Smith.



Republicans continue to be more enthusiastic about this election than are Democrats. Among voters who say they are extremely interested in the election, Guinta holds a 51% to 37% lead. Guinta holds a whopping 63% to 23% lead among voters who say they are excited about the outcome of the elections, a further indication that Republicans are very optimistic going into Tuesday's election. And among voters who say they will definitely vote in the election Guinta holds a 49% to 38% lead over Shea-Porter.

Undeclared voters have shifted their support several times during the campaign, and currently split their support between Guinta and Shea-Porter. Currently, 39% of voters registered undeclared say they will vote for Guinta, 38% support Shea-Porter, 7% prefer some other candidate, and 21% are undecided.



Guinta gets his strongest support from Republicans, voters who are excited about the prospects of the November election, men, and residents of the Manchester area. Shea-Porter gets her strongest support from Democrats, voters who are depressed about the November elections, voters with post-graduate educations, and residents of the northern parts of the District.
