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REPUBLICANS LEAD IN GENERIC BALLOTS FOR NH HOUSE AND SENATE

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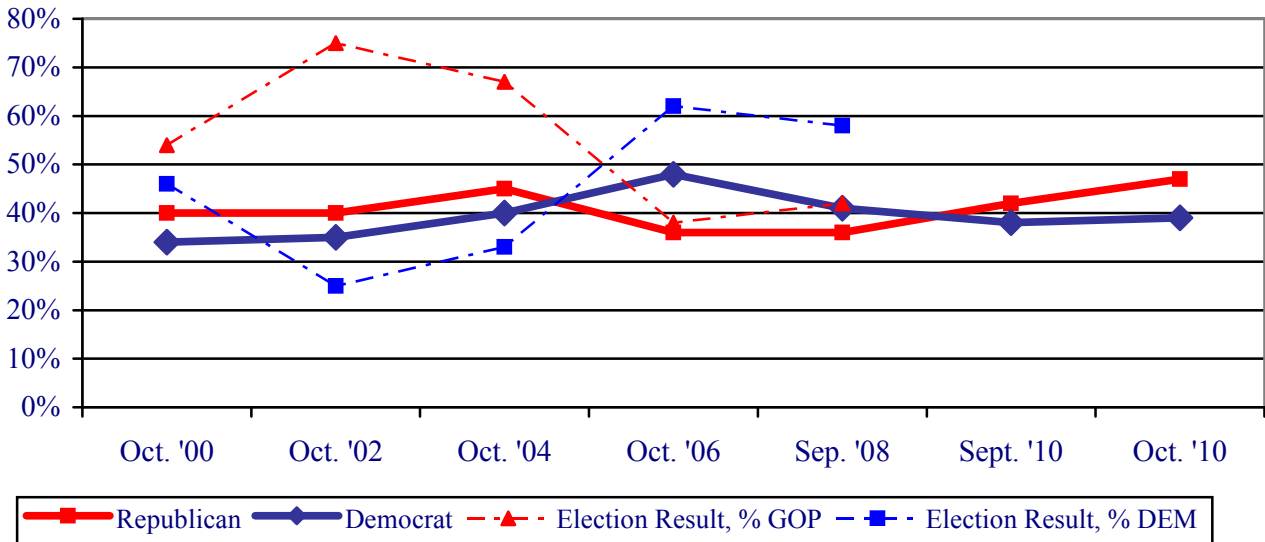
DURHAM, NH – Republicans are poised to regain control of both the New Hampshire House of Representatives and Senate in November.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR / UNH New Hampshire Election Poll**,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Seven hundred nine (709) randomly selected New Hampshire likely voters were interviewed by telephone between October 7 and October 12, 2010. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.7%

New Hampshire State Senate

Democrats took control of the New Hampshire State Senate in 2006 and have held it since, although the gap narrowed slightly after the 2008 elections. Democrats now hold 14 of the 24 seats in the Senate. But Republicans are in position to take control of the Senate in 2010 based on a generic ballot question. When asked if they would vote for the Republican or Democratic candidate for State Senate from their district, 47% of New Hampshire likely voters say they will vote for the Republican candidate, 39% say they will vote for the Democratic candidate, 2% prefer a candidate from another party, and 12% are undecided. Republicans have increased their lead on this measure since September when 42% of New Hampshire likely voters said they would vote for the Republican and 38% for the Democrat. In recent elections, this indicator has been accurate in predicting which party would gain the Senate majority, but less accurate in predicting the size of the majority. However, the current Republican advantage on this indicator is the largest it has held in the 10 years it has been measured.

Vote in NH State Senate District and State Senate Composition

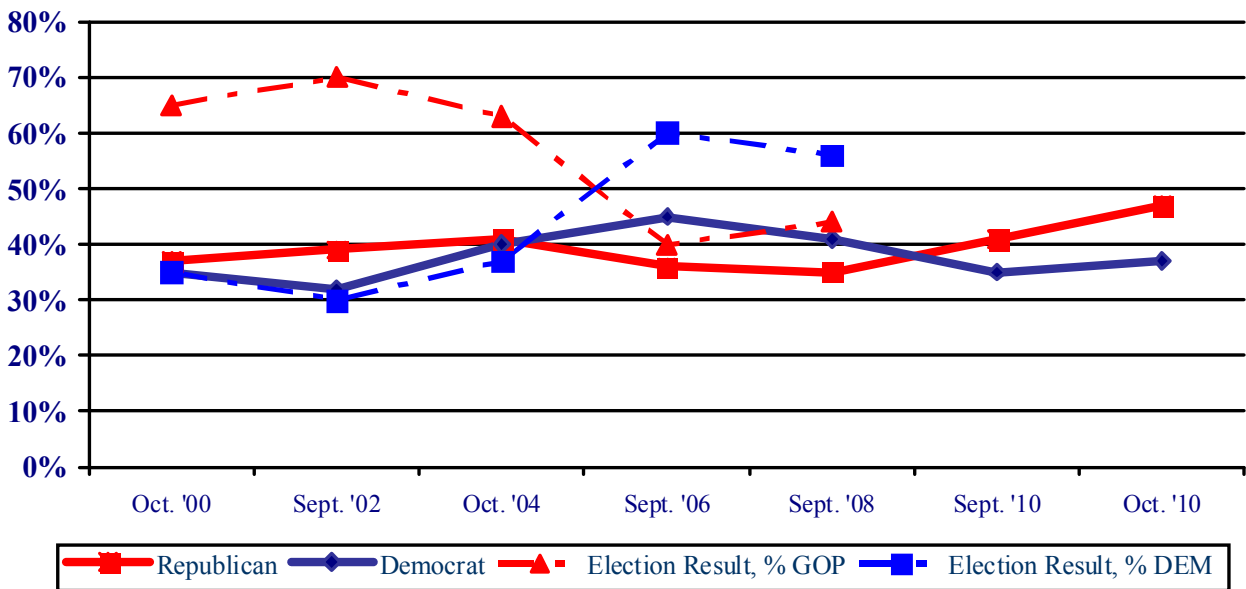

NH State House of Representatives

Democrats also took control of the New Hampshire House of Representatives in 2006 and retained the majority in 2008. But Republicans now hold a sizable lead in a generic ballot question with 47% of likely New Hampshire voters saying they will vote for Republicans in their district, 37% support Democrats, 5% will cast a split ballot, 3% will vote for a third party candidate, and 8% are undecided. Republicans have also widened the gap on this measure since September when they held a 41% to 35% lead. This indicator has accurately predicted which party will gain the majority in the state house, but is less accurate about the size of the majority. Multi-member House districts often result in greater swings than are seen in the state Senate. But the current 10 percentage point Republican advantage is the largest since the UNH Survey Center began asking this question in 2000.

Spend Time with a Politician?

On a lighter note, likely voters were asked which of the major politicians running for election this year they would like to “hang out” with. While no one politician leaps out as a political rock star, it is clear that Democrats want to spend time with Democratic candidates and Republicans with Republican candidates, but the plurality of voters have no preference or don’t want to spend time with any candidate. Overall, 20% of likely voters say they would like to hang out with Kelly Ayotte, 19% with John Lynch, 9% with John Stephen, 7% with Carol Shea-Porter, 7% with Paul Hodes, 6% with Ann McLane Kuster, 4% with Frank Guinta, 3% with Charlie Bass, 1% with some other candidate, 15% with none of these candidates, and 11% have no preference or don’t know.

Among Democrats, Lynch (27%) is most popular, followed by Hodes (13%), Shea-Porter (13%) and Kuster (12%). Among Republicans, Ayotte (32%) is most popular, followed by Stephen (18%), Lynch (11%), Guinta (6%), and Bass (4%).
