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### AYOTTE MAINTAINS LEAD OVER HODES FOR NH SENATE SEAT

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DURHAM, NH – Republican Kelly Ayotte continues to lead Democrat Paul Hodes in the race for U.S. Senate in New Hampshire. Half of voters say they have definitely decided who they will vote for.

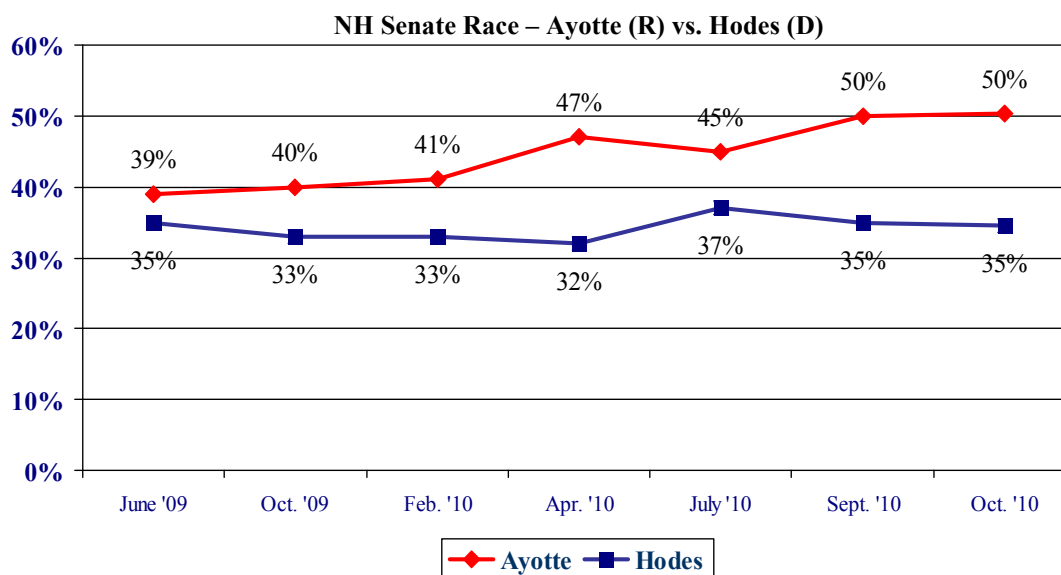
These findings are based on the latest **WMUR / UNH New Hampshire Election Poll**,\* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Seven hundred nine (709) randomly selected New Hampshire likely voters were interviewed by telephone between October 7 and October 12, 2010. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.7 percent.

#### 2010 U.S. Senate Race

With less than three weeks remaining in the campaign for the U.S. Senate seat in New Hampshire, former Attorney General Kelly Ayotte continues to hold a sizeable lead over her Democratic challenger, Congressman Paul Hodes. This is a closely watched race for the open seat currently held by Judd Gregg, who is retiring. Currently, 50% of New Hampshire likely voters say they will vote for Ayotte, 35% back Hodes, 1% say they will vote for Libertarian candidate Ken Blevens, 1% will vote for Independent Chris Booth, 1% prefer some other candidate and 12% are undecided. Ayotte's lead over Hodes is unchanged since late September.

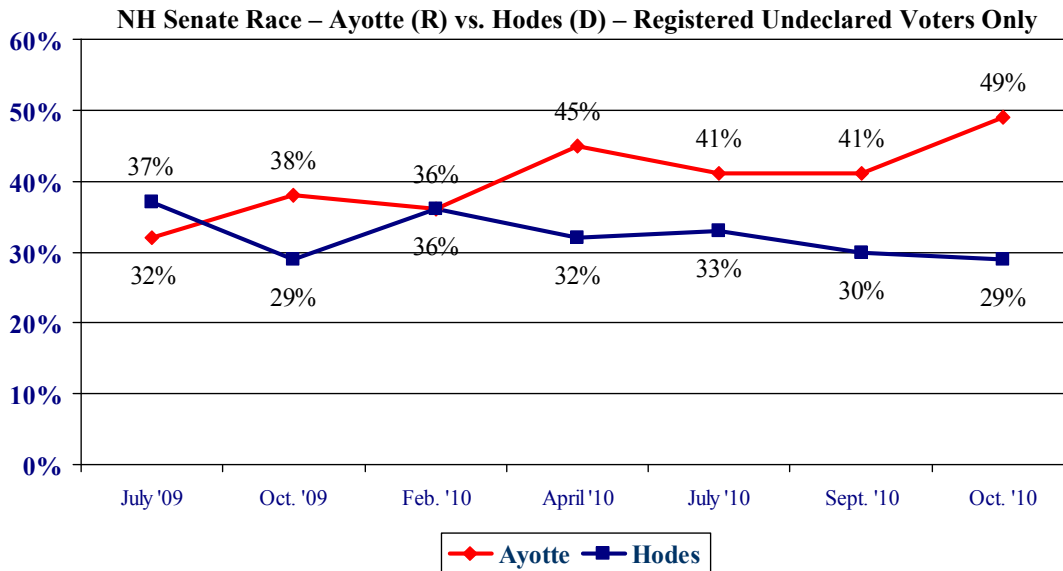
Ayotte gets her strongest support among Republicans, voters who disapprove of Obama's job as President, Tea Party supporters, and regular church goers while Hodes' strongest support comes from Democrats, voters who approve of Obama, Tea Party opponents, and voters with post graduate educations. Ayotte leads Hodes in all regions of the state except for the North Country.

Ayotte also benefits from greater enthusiasm among Republicans. Among voters who say they are extremely interested in the election, Ayotte holds a 59% to 33% lead over Hodes. And among voters who say they are excited about the elections in November, Ayotte holds an even larger lead, 63% to 25%



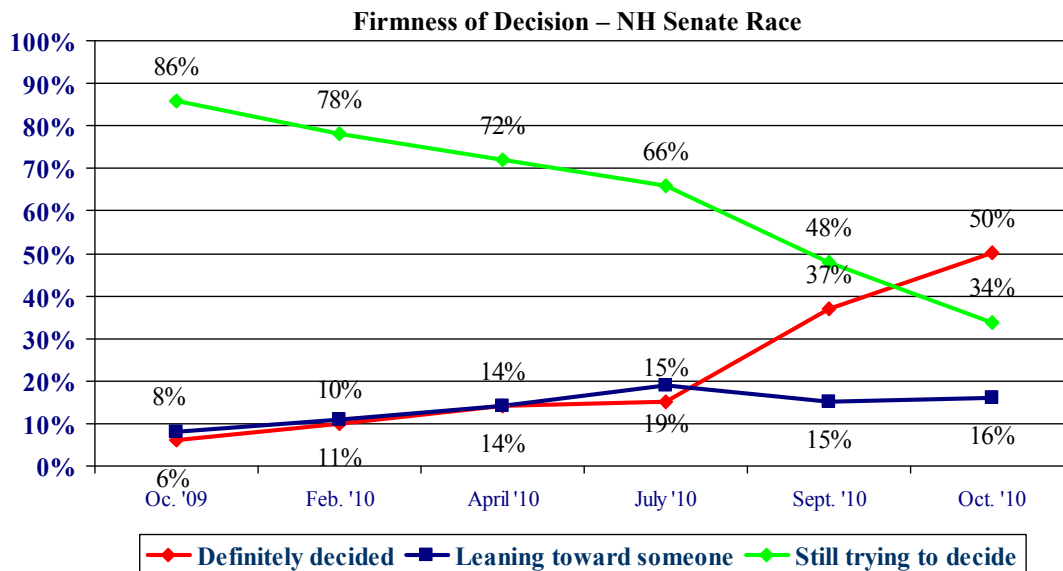

Ayotte has expanded her lead among Undeclared voters, often referred to as Independents. She currently leads Hodes by 49% to 29% among this group. Ayotte also has stronger support among her partisans than does Hodes – 85% of registered Republicans say they will vote for Ayotte while only 75% of registered Democrats say they will vote for Hodes.



**Decisions Being Made**

As the election approaches, a higher percentage of voters have definitely decided on who they will vote for. Currently, 50% of likely voters say they have definitely decided who they will vote for, 16% are leaning to a candidate, and 34% are still trying to decide. Ayotte leads Hodes by 58% to 39% among voters who have definitely decided who they will support.



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The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.
