NH APPROVES OF AFGHANISTAN SURGE

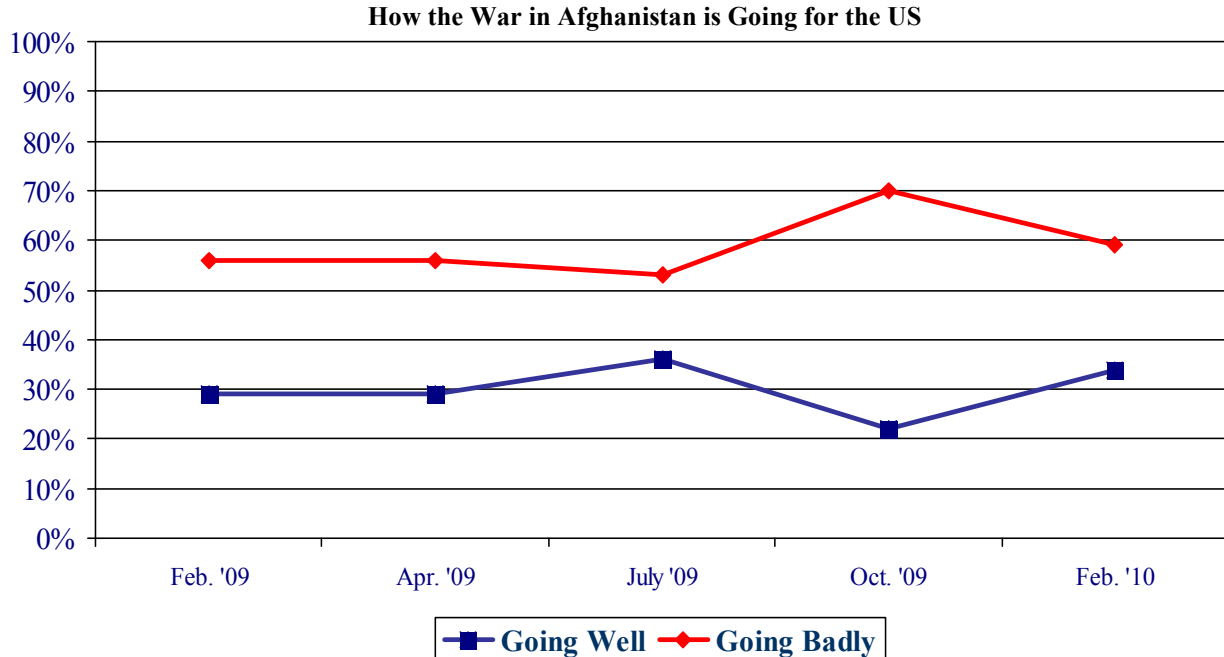

DURHAM, NH – New Hampshire adults believe the war in Afghanistan is going badly for the United States, but 3 in 5 support the recent troop increases.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR Granite State Poll**,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred (500) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by telephone between January 27 and February 3, 2010. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-4.4 percent.

The War in Afghanistan

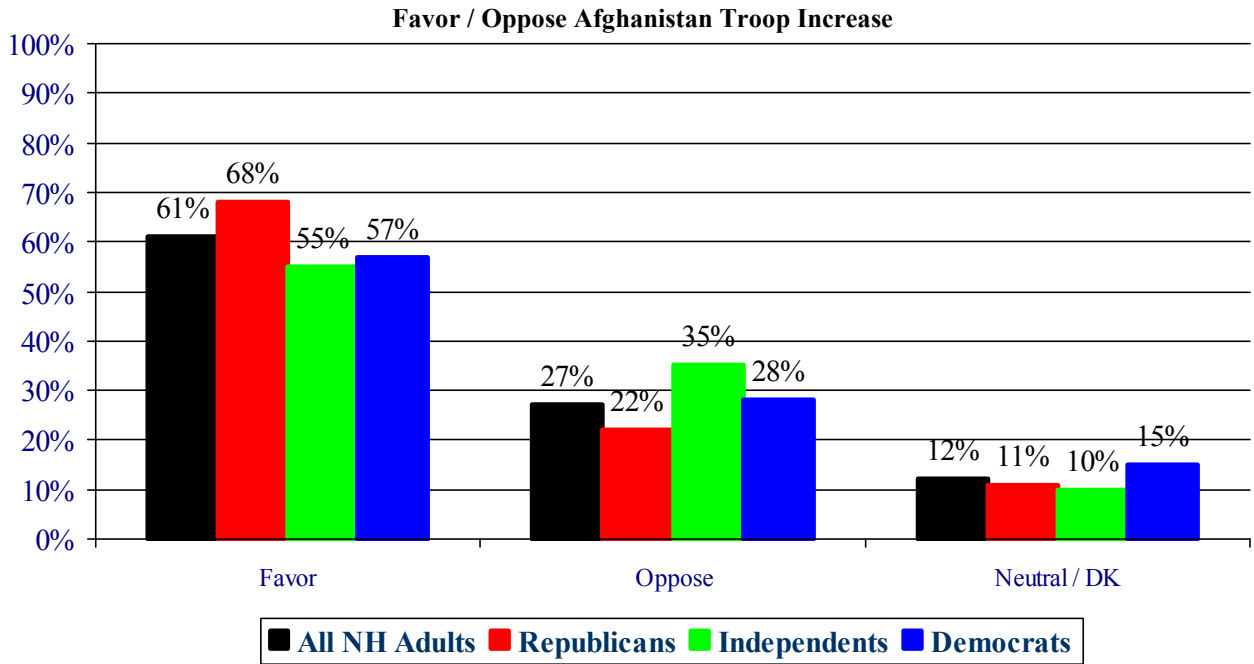
The Obama Administration has been ramping up the number of American troops in Afghanistan in response to deteriorating security conditions there. This action appears to have somewhat reduced the concerns of New Hampshire residents about the direction the war in Afghanistan is taking, but a majority still believe the war is going badly for the US. Currently, 59% of New Hampshire adults think the war in Afghanistan is going badly for the US, 34% think it is going well, and 7% don't know. The percentage of Granite Staters who think the war in Afghanistan is going badly for the US reached a peak in October when 70% thought it was going badly. The pessimism is bipartisan – 59% of Democrats, 57% of Independents, and 60% of Republicans think the war in Afghanistan is going badly for the US.

Increase US Troops in Afghanistan

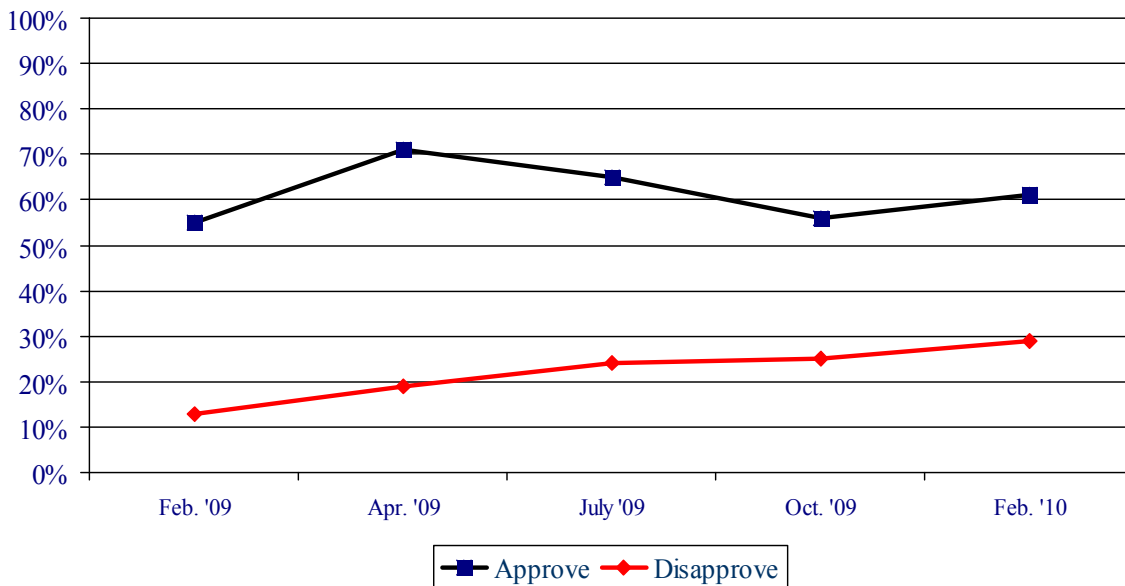
The Obama administration announced in early December that it was increasing US troop levels in Afghanistan by 30,000 and applying tactics similar to the surge used in Iraq to improve the security situation there. Most Granite Staters support this policy – 61% favor the recent troop increase, 27% oppose, and 12% are unsure. Republicans are most likely to support the troop increase (68% favor the increase) but Democrats (57%) and Independents (55%) approve as well.



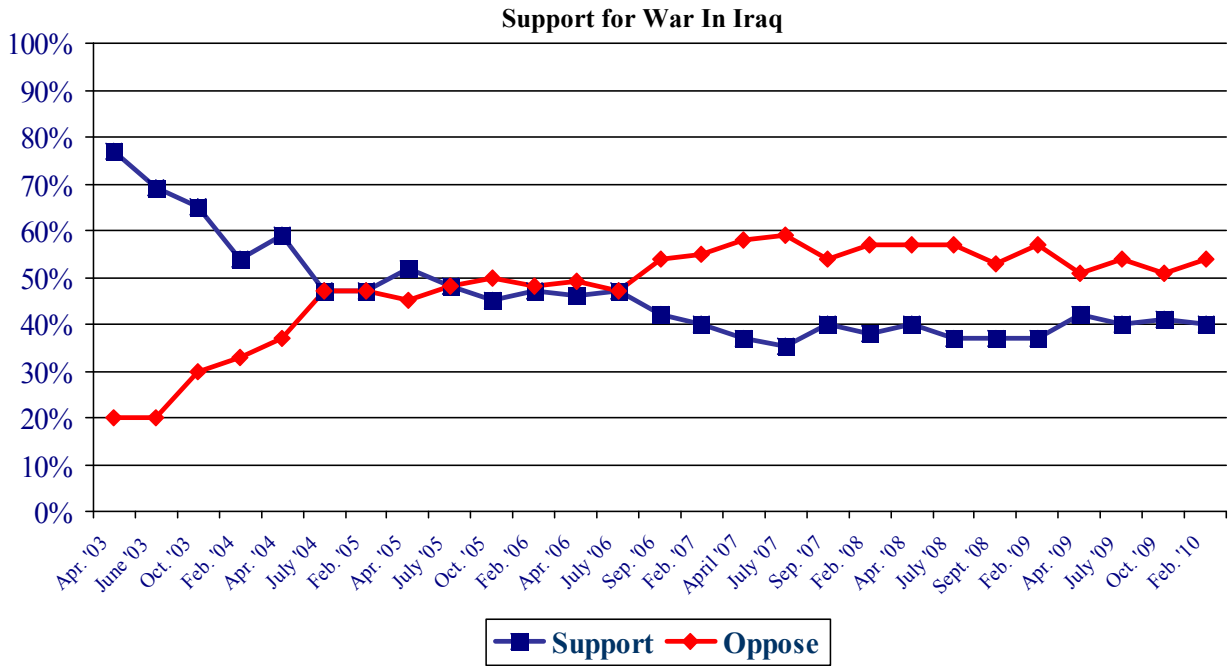
Presidential Approval on Iraq

Approval for President Obama’s handling of the situation in Iraq has stabilized. In the most recent Granite State Poll, 61% of New Hampshire adults approve of his handling of Iraq, 29% disapprove, and 9% are neutral. Obama continues hold onto majority support from Democrats and political independents – 78% and 66%, respectively – but Republicans tend to disapprove of his actions in Iraq, with 40% approving and 45% disapproving.

Obama Approval: Handling Situation in Iraq

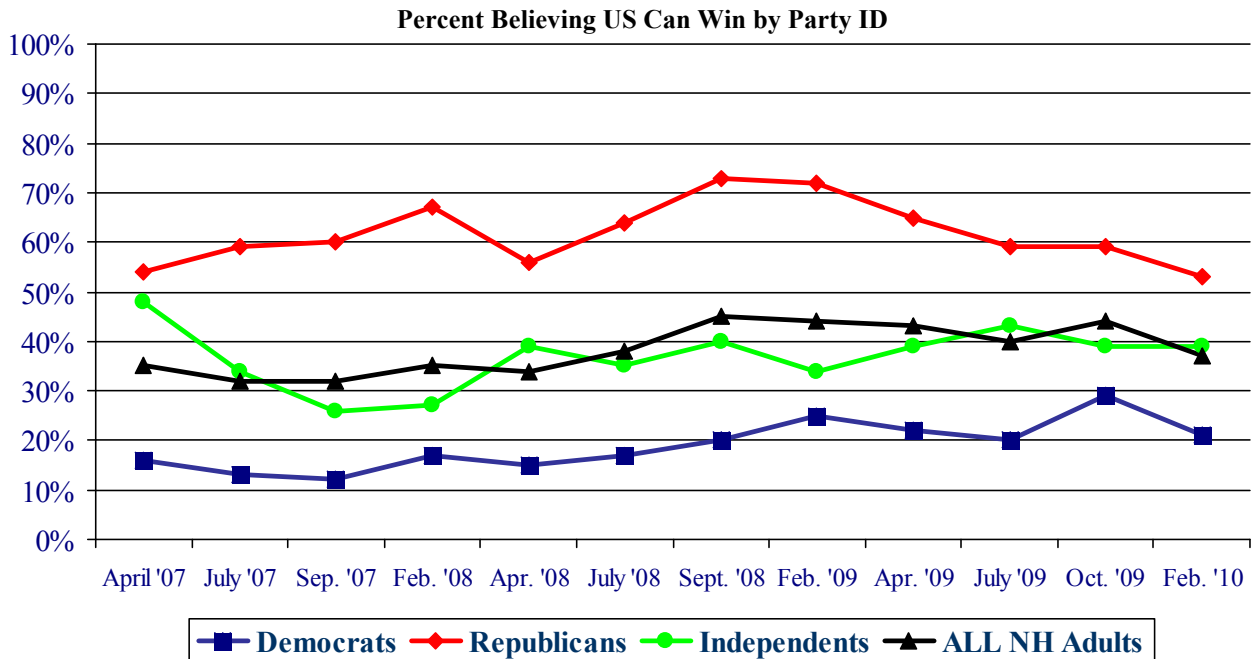


Most New Hampshire residents continue to believe that going to war in Iraq was a bad idea. Currently, 40% of Granite Staters support having gone to war with Iraq, 54% oppose it, and 6% are neutral. The percentage of New Hampshire adults who support or oppose the US having gone to war in Iraq has remained relatively stable for the past 3 years.



Can the US Win?

Most New Hampshire residents do not believe the US can win the war in Iraq. Currently, 37% of New Hampshire adults think the US can win the Iraq War, 49% think we cannot win, and 14% don't know. Republicans continue to be the most optimistic about the US prospects of victory in Iraq, with 53% believing the US can win, although Republican optimism has been declining since Obama took office. Democrats continue to be the least optimistic with only 21% thinking winning the Iraq war is possible.



Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest WMUR Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred (500) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by telephone between January 27 and February 4, 2010. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-4.4 percent.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.
