LYNCH MAINTAINS HIGH APPROVAL, PUBLIC SUPPORTS EXTENDING TERM OF OFFICE

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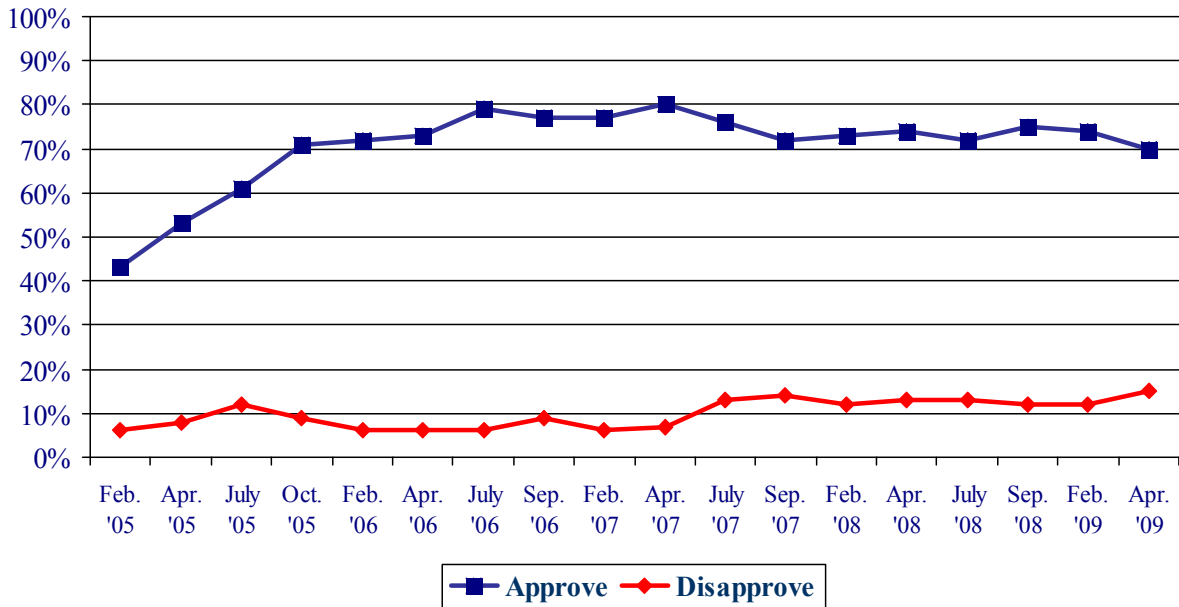
DURHAM, NH – Governor John Lynch continues to receive high approval ratings from New Hampshire adults and a slim majority support the idea of extending the term of the governor’s office from two to four years. The economy remains the most important problem facing the state.

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll**,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and three (503) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by telephone between April 13 and April 22, 2009. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-4.4 percent.

Gubernatorial Approval

Governor John Lynch has maintained the high approval numbers he has received from the public for the past three and a half years. Currently, 70% of NH adults approve of how he is handling his job as governor, 15% disapprove, and 15% are neutral or don’t know. Lynch has also continued to garner support from across the political spectrum, as he receives the approval of 62% of Republicans, 85% of Democrats, and 67% of political independents. Lynch’s approval ratings have not fallen below 70% since fall of 2005.

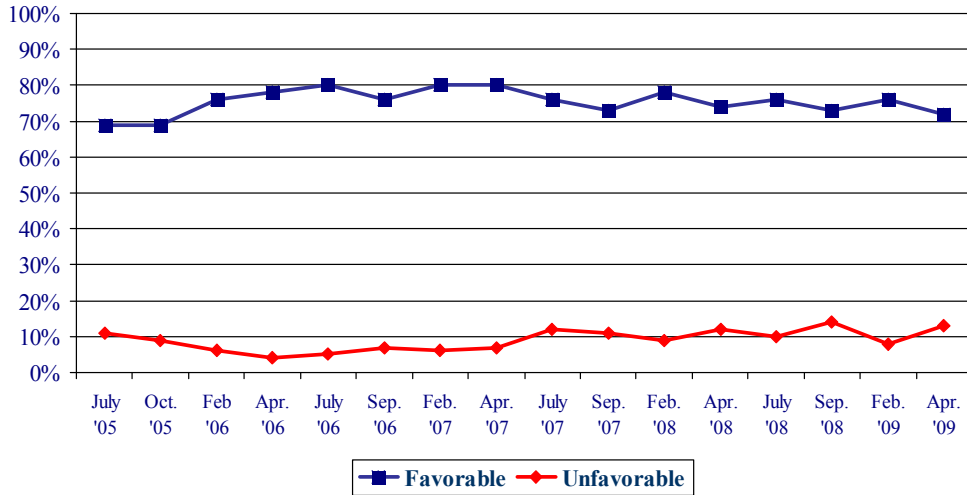
NH Gubernatorial Approval – John Lynch

Lynch's personal favorability rating also remains high. In the latest Granite State Poll, 72% of New Hampshire adults say they have a favorable opinion of Lynch, 13% have an unfavorable opinion, 7% are neutral, and 8% say they don't know enough about him to say. Lynch's net favorability rating, the percentage having a favorable opinion minus the percentage having an unfavorable opinion, has fallen back to pre-election levels, but remains at a high +59%.

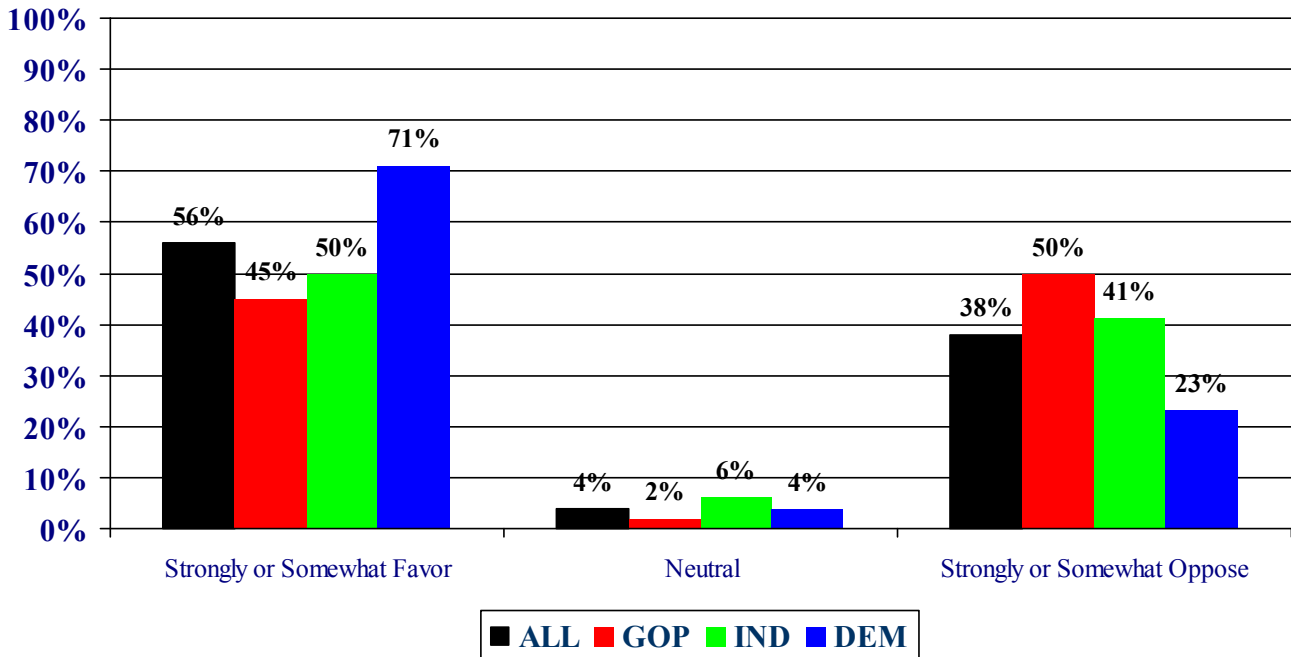
Favorability Ratings – NH Governor John Lynch



Extending the Governor's Term of Office to Four Years

Last month, the New Hampshire Senate passed a bill that would amend the state constitution to extend the term of office for the Governor to four years, up from the current two year term. In the most recent Granite State Poll, 56% of New Hampshire adults say they would either strongly or somewhat favor such a change, 38% said they would strongly or somewhat oppose it, 4% were neutral, and 2% don't know.

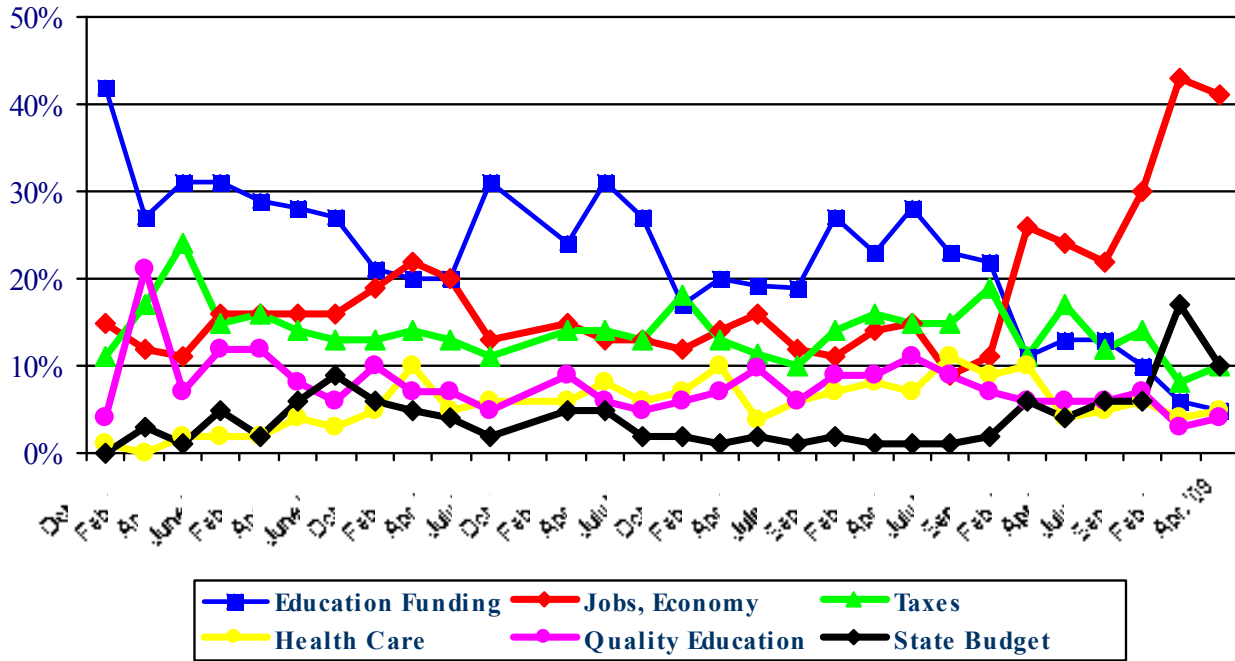
Extending the Governor's Term of Office to Four Years



Most Important Problem Facing New Hampshire

New Hampshire residents continue to be worried about the condition of the state's economy. In the latest Granite State Poll, 41% of New Hampshire adults view the economy and jobs as the most important issue facing the state, followed by the state budget crises (10%), high taxes (10%), how to fund primary and secondary education (5%), health care issues (5%), and the quality of education (4%).

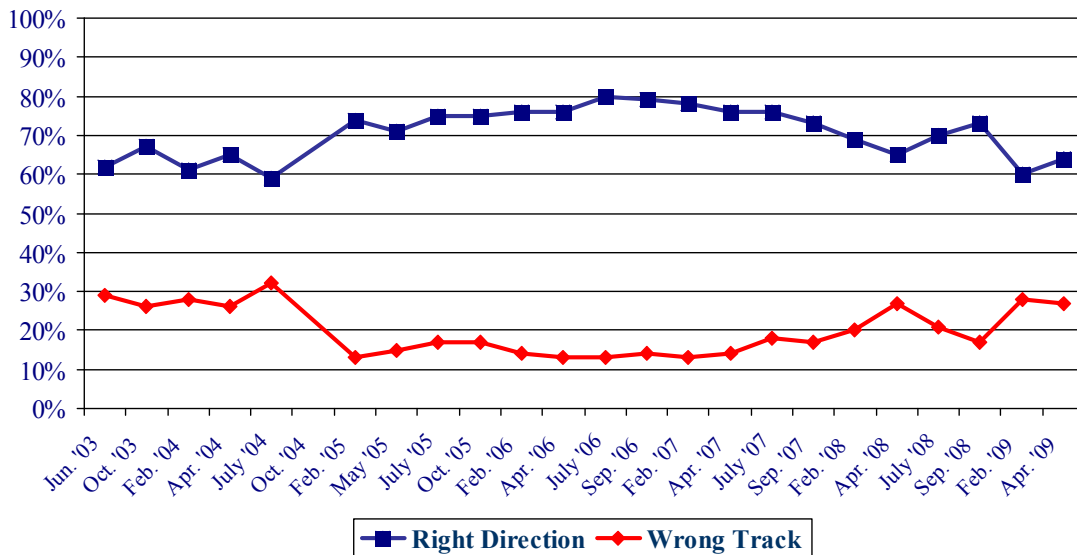
Most Important Problem Facing NH



Right Direction or Wrong Track?

Despite the economic recession, New Hampshire residents maintain a positive attitude about the direction the state is heading. Currently, 64% of New Hampshire adults feel the state is heading in the right direction, 27% think the state is seriously off on the wrong track, and 9% don't know.

Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll** conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and three (503) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by telephone between April 13 and April 22, 2009. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-4.4 percent.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.
