### LYNCH MAINTAINS HIGH APPROVAL RATINGS, ECONOMY TOP ISSUE

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DURHAM, NH – Governor John Lynch continues to enjoy very high job approval ratings in New Hampshire. The state's economy continues to be seen as the most important issue facing New Hampshire.

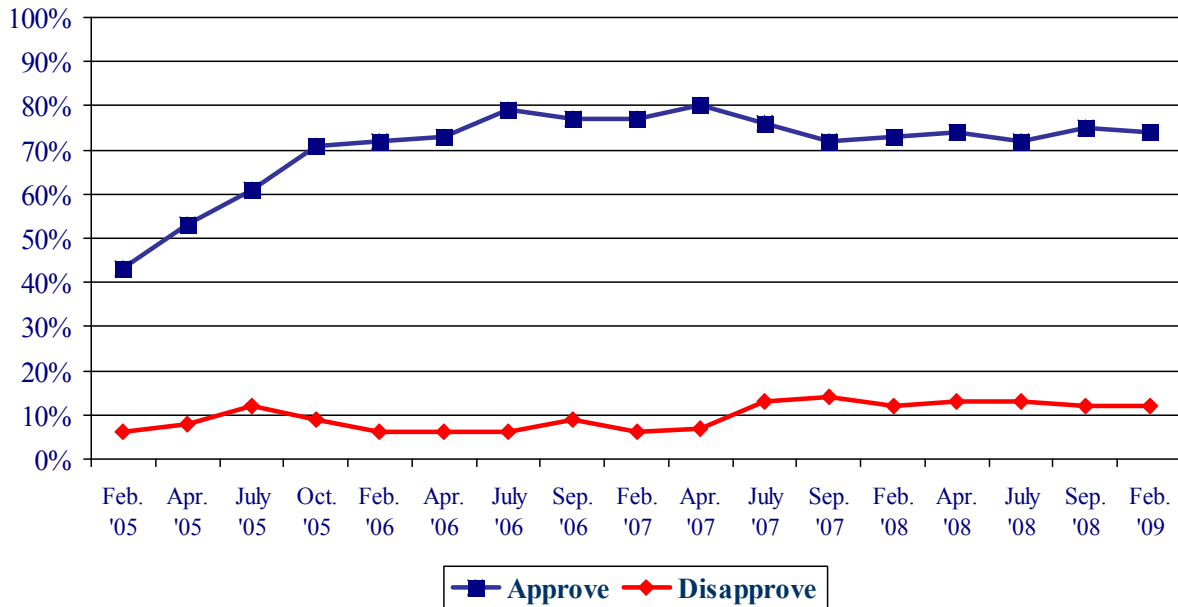
These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll**,\* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Six hundred nineteen (619) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by telephone between February 5 and February 9, 2009. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-3.9 percent.

### Gubernatorial Approval

In the first Granite State Poll conducted since his reelection to a third term, Governor John Lynch has maintained the high approval levels he has received for the past three years. Currently, 74% of NH adults approve of how he is handling his job as governor, 12% disapprove, and 14% are neutral or don't know. Lynch has also maintained his broad-spectrum support, as he receives the approval of 66% of Republicans, 85% of Democrats, and 69% of political independents.

Lynch's approval ratings have not fallen below 70% since fall of 2005.

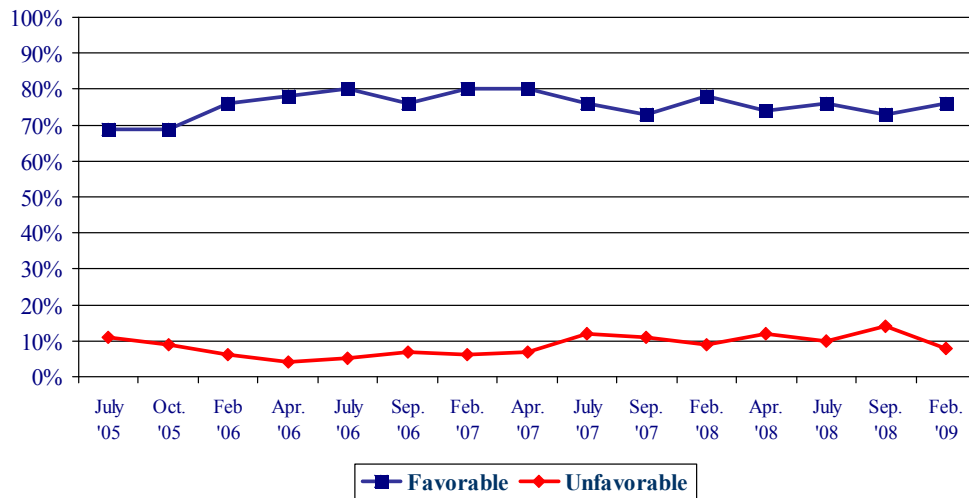
NH Gubernatorial Approval – John Lynch

Lynch's personal favorability rating also remains high. In the latest Granite State Poll, 76% of New Hampshire adults say they have a favorable opinion of Lynch, only 8% have an unfavorable opinion, 10% are neutral, and 7% say they don't know enough about him to say. Since prior to his reelection, Lynch's net favorability rating, the percentage having a favorable opinion minus the percentage having an unfavorable opinion, has jumped nearly 10 percentage points to a very high +68 percent.

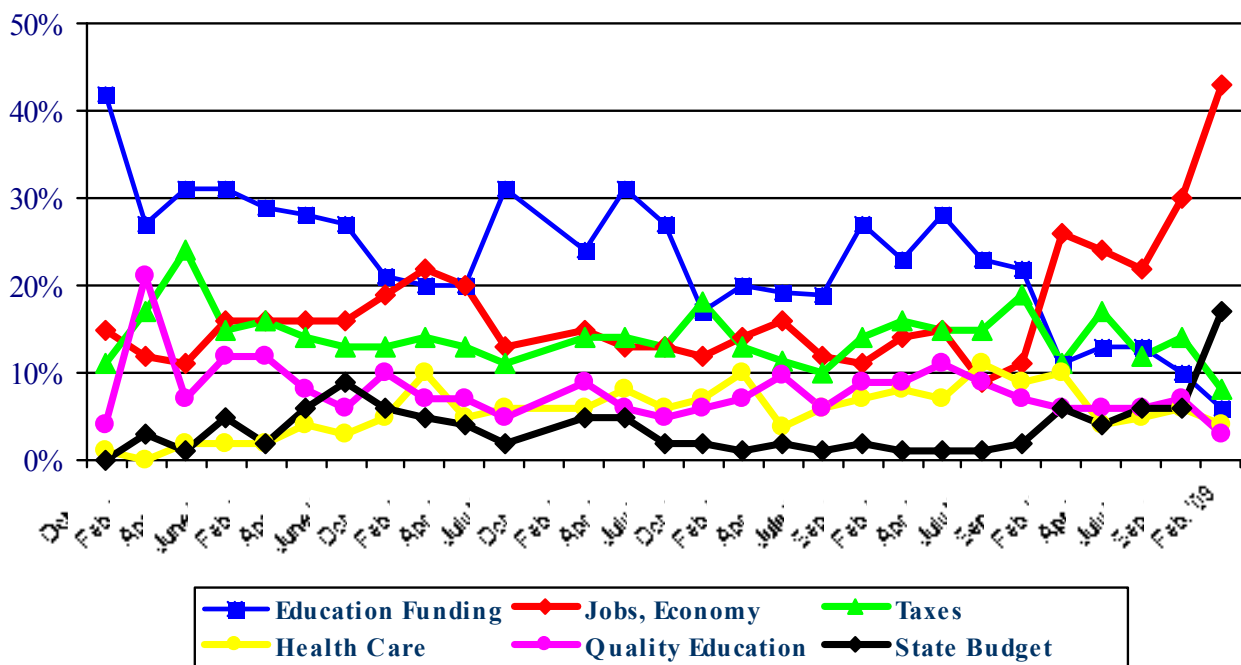
**Favorability Ratings – NH Governor John Lynch**



**Most Important Problem Facing New Hampshire**

New Hampshire's focus, like the rest of the country, continues to be on the state of the economy. In the latest Granite State Poll, 43% of New Hampshire adults view the economy and jobs as the most important issue facing the state, followed by the looming state budget crises (17%), high taxes (8%), how to fund primary and secondary education (6%), health care issues (4%), and the quality of education (3%).

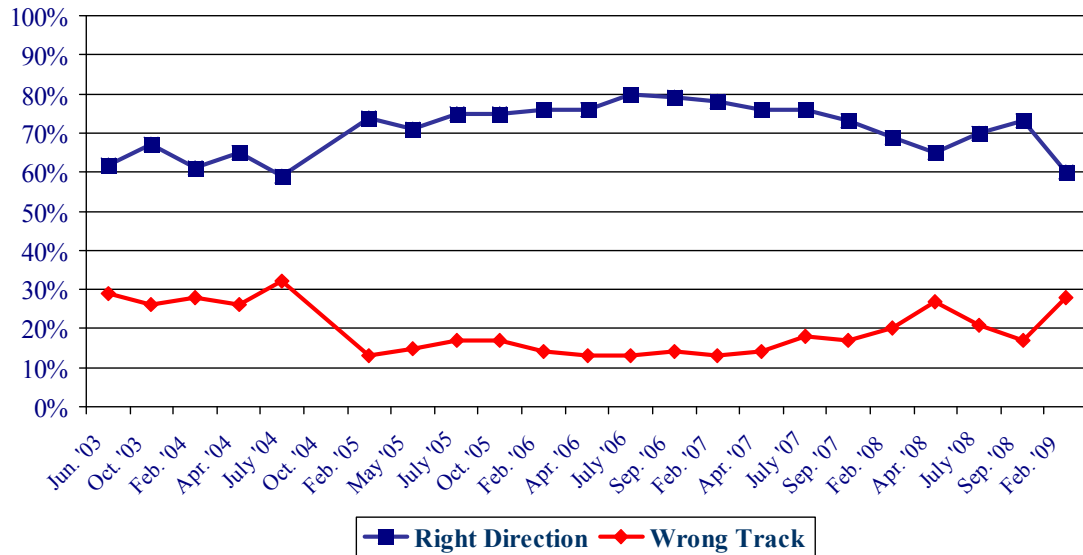
**Most Important Problem Facing NH**



## Right Direction or Wrong Track?

While New Hampshire residents continue to be optimistic in regards to the direction the state is going in, the percentage of those believing NH is on the right track has fallen to levels not seen in five years. Currently, 60% of New Hampshire adults feel the state is going in the right direction, 28% think the state is seriously off the wrong track, and 12% don't know.

## Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll** conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Six hundred nineteen (619) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by telephone between February 5 and February 9, 2009. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-3.9 percent.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.
