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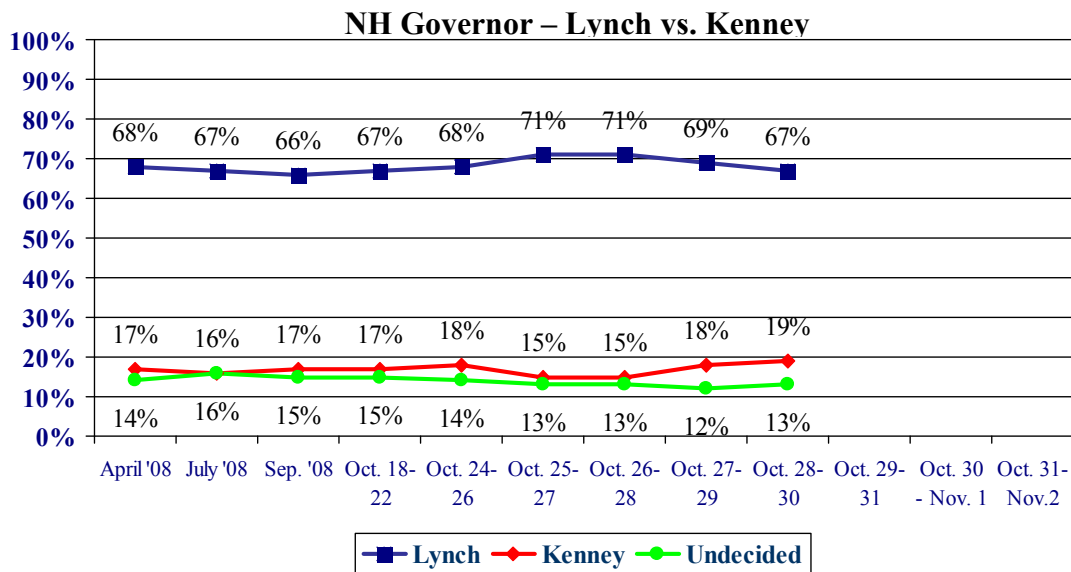
## LYNCH LEADS KENNEY BY WIDE MARGIN IN NEW HAMPSHIRE GOVERNOR'S RACE

Durham, NH – Incumbent Democrat John Lynch continues to hold a wide lead over Republican Joe Kenney in the final days of the campaign. The presidential race in New Hampshire continues to tighten as Republicans come home to John McCain, but Barack Obama still maintains a wide lead.

These findings are based on the 2008 WMUR / UNH New Hampshire Tracking Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. This survey is sponsored by WMUR-TV Manchester and the University of New Hampshire.\* Six hundred seventeen (617) likely New Hampshire voters were interviewed between October 28 and October 30, 2008. The potential sampling error for the statewide survey is +/-3.9%. Three-hundred thirteen (313) likely 1<sup>st</sup> District voters were surveyed (margin of sampling error of +/- 5.5%) and 304 likely 2<sup>nd</sup> District voters were interviewed (margin of sampling error +/-5.6%). 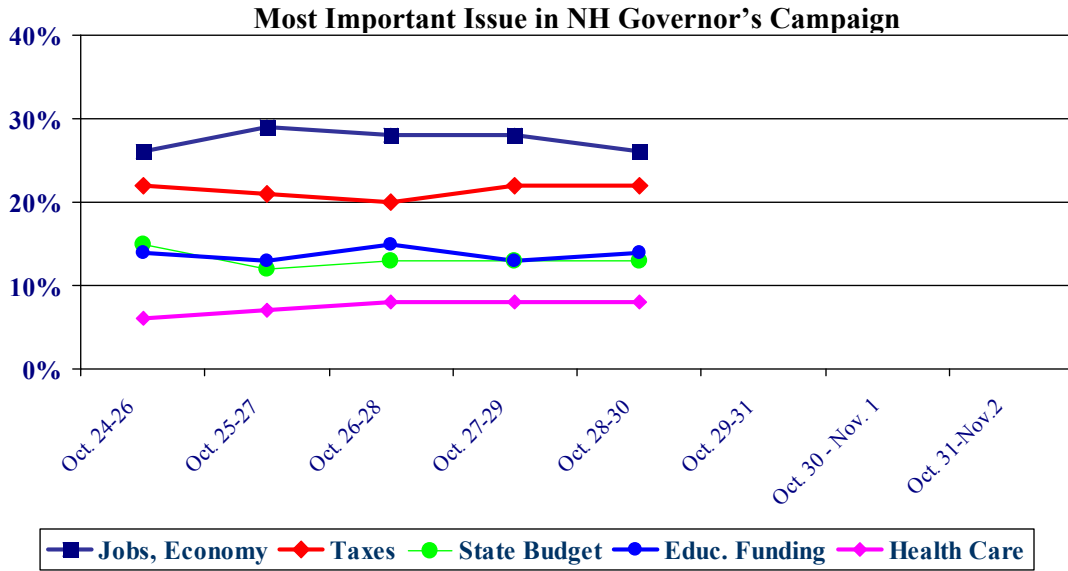
### NH Governor

Incumbent John Lynch maintains a wide lead over Republican Joe Kenney in the race for New Hampshire Governor. Lynch currently leads Kenney by a 67% to 19% margin with 1% favoring some other candidate, and 13% undecided. The dynamics of this race closely resemble Lynch's 2006 victory over Jim Coburn which Lynch won with a record 74% of the vote.



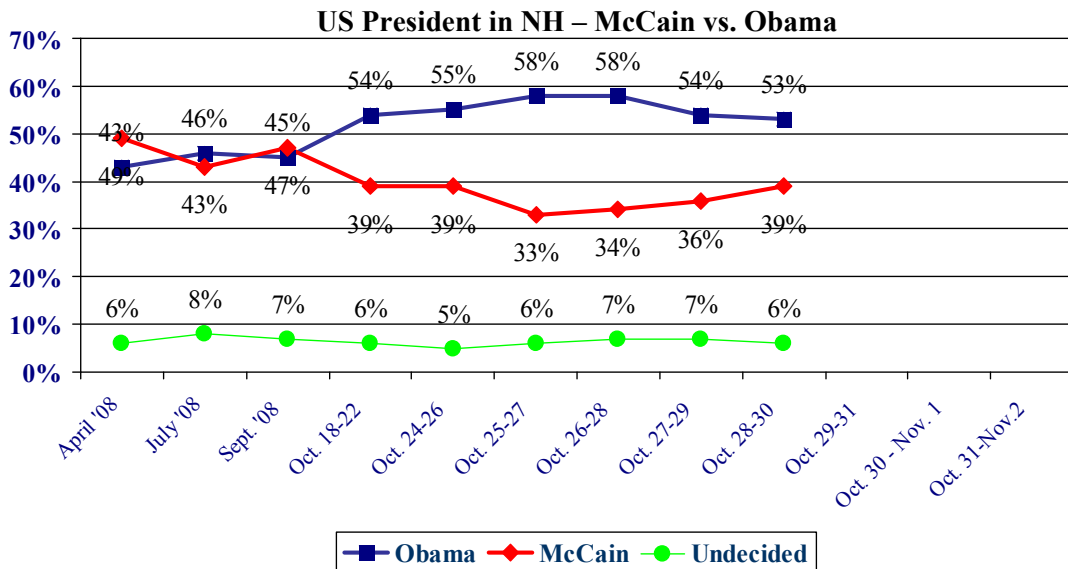

The most important issue in the governor's race are jobs and the economy (26%), taxes (22%), the state budget (13%), education funding (14%) and health care (8%).

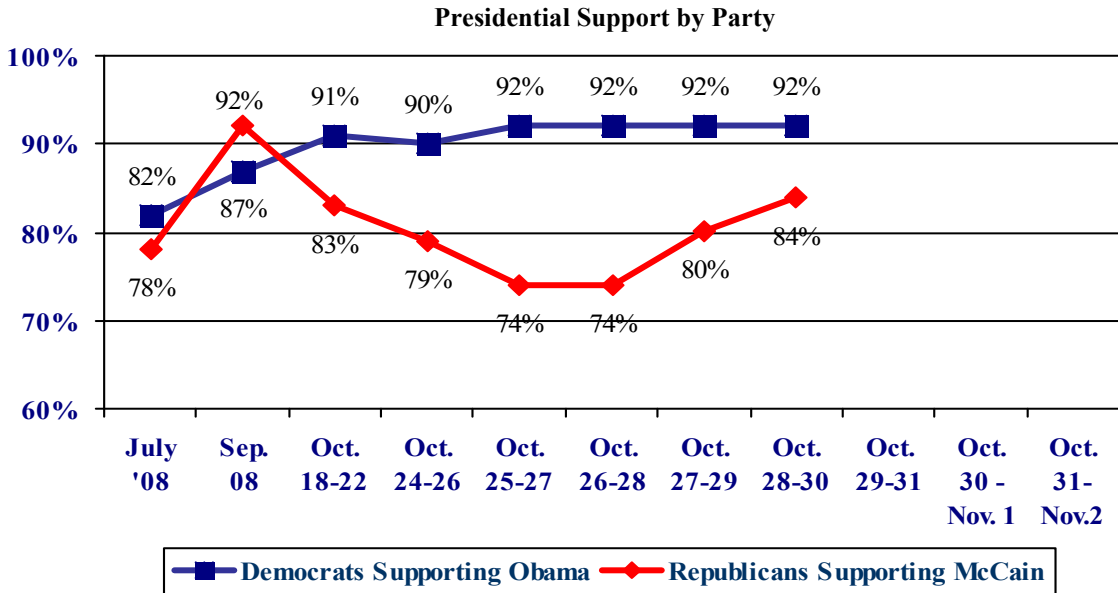


### President

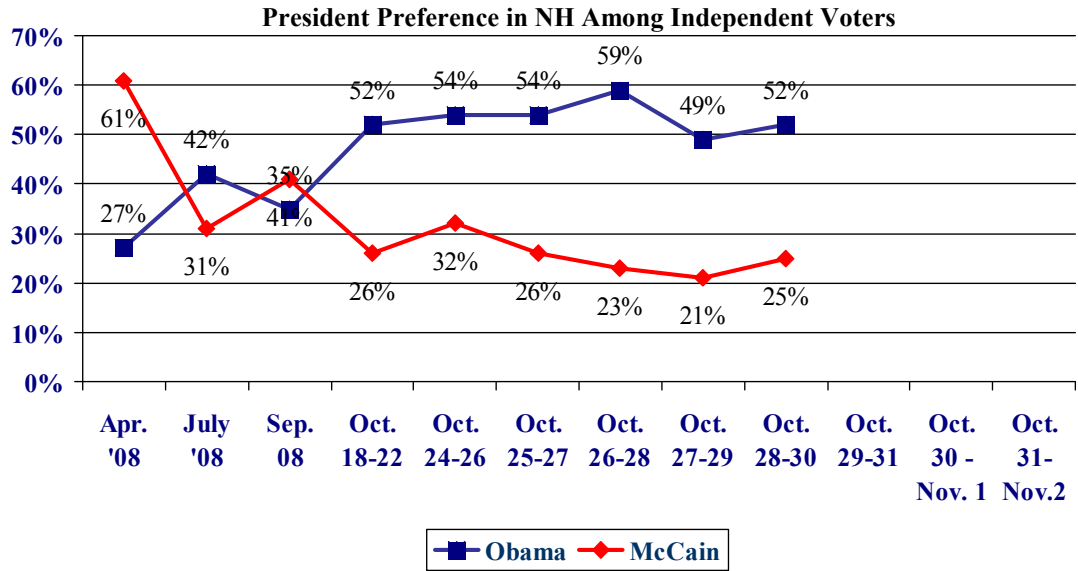
The race for President in New Hampshire has grown somewhat closer in recent days, but Democrat Barack Obama continues to hold a solid lead over Republican John McCain. More than half of likely voters, 53%, say they plan to vote for Obama, 39% favor McCain, 2% prefer some other candidate, and 6% are undecided.



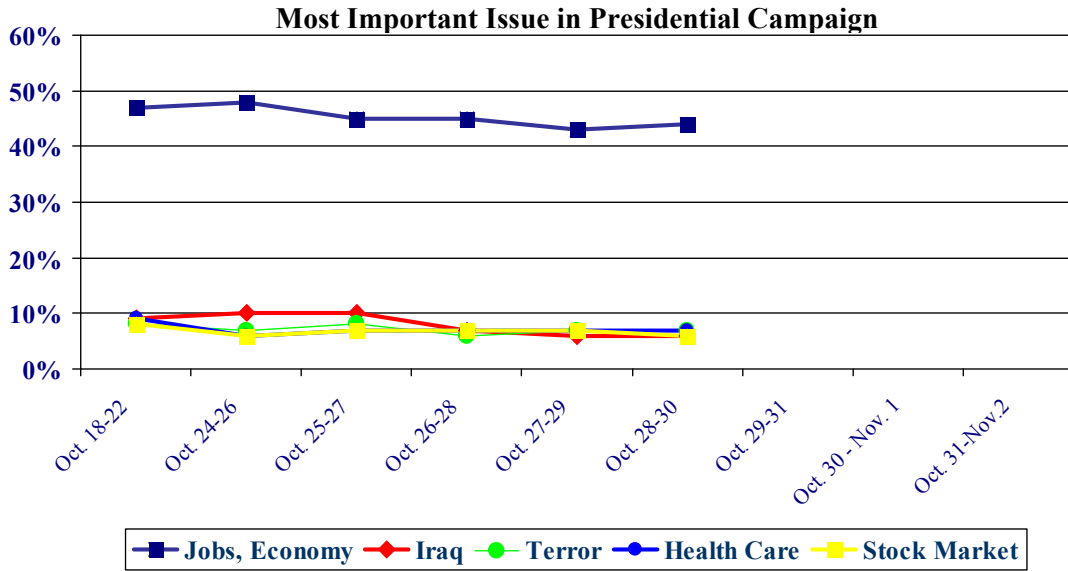
McCain has seen his support among self-identified Republicans grow stronger in recent days, where it is now similar to Republicans support for other Republican candidates. Currently, McCain receives support from 84% of self-identified Republicans but Obama has consistently received support from 90% of self-identified Democrats.



Obama continues to hold his lead among independent voters in New Hampshire – 52% of political independents say they favor Obama, 25% favor McCain, 5% prefer some other candidate, and 18% are undecided.

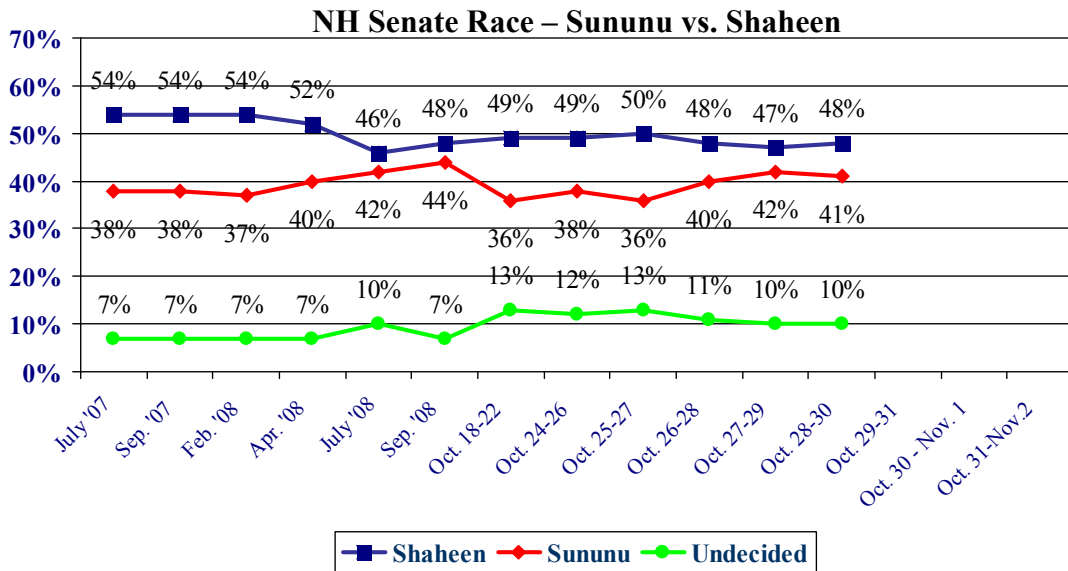


The most important issue in the presidential campaign to New Hampshire voters continues to be jobs and the economy (44%), followed by the campaign against terrorism (7%), health care (7%), the war in Iraq (6%), and the recent stock market crash (6%). Economic concerns have topped the list of important issues to New Hampshire voters since mid-summer.



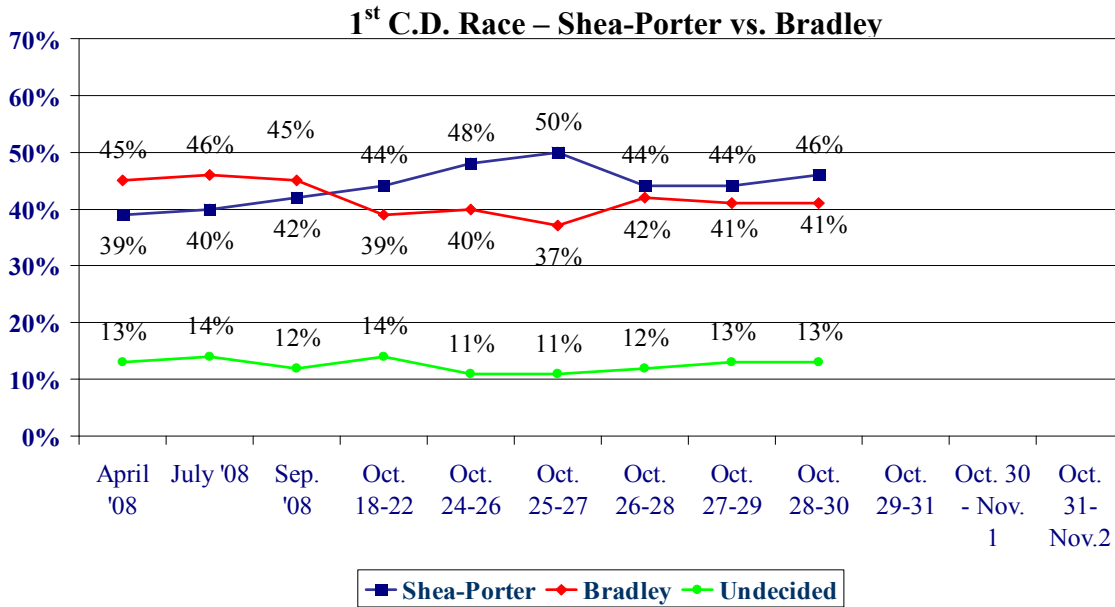
#### US Senate

The race for the U.S. Senate has loosened up slightly and Republican incumbent John Sununu now trails his 2002 challenger Jeanne Shaheen by 7 percentage points. Currently, 48% of likely New Hampshire voters say they will vote for Shaheen, 41% will vote for Sununu, 1% prefer some other candidate, and 10% are undecided.



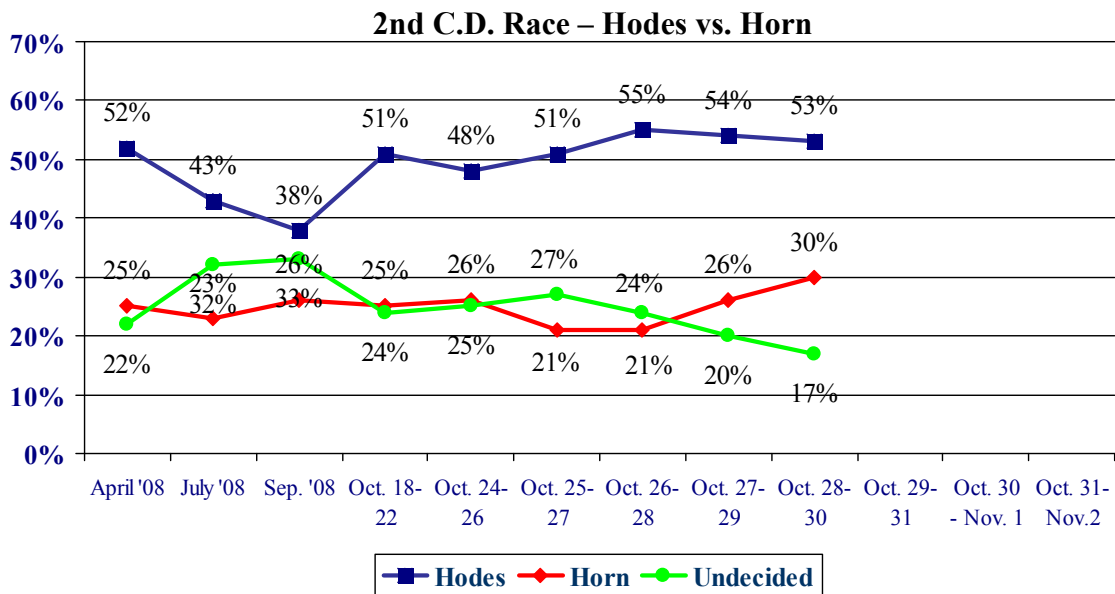
**NH First District**

The race in New Hampshire's First Congressional District continues to be the closest race in New Hampshire, as incumbent Democrat Carol Shea-Porter faces former incumbent Republican Jeb Bradley in a rematch of their 2006 contest. In the latest WMUR / UNH Tracking Poll, 46% of likely 1<sup>st</sup> District voters say they will vote for Shea-Porter, 41% favor Bradley, 1% prefer some other candidate, and 13% remain undecided.



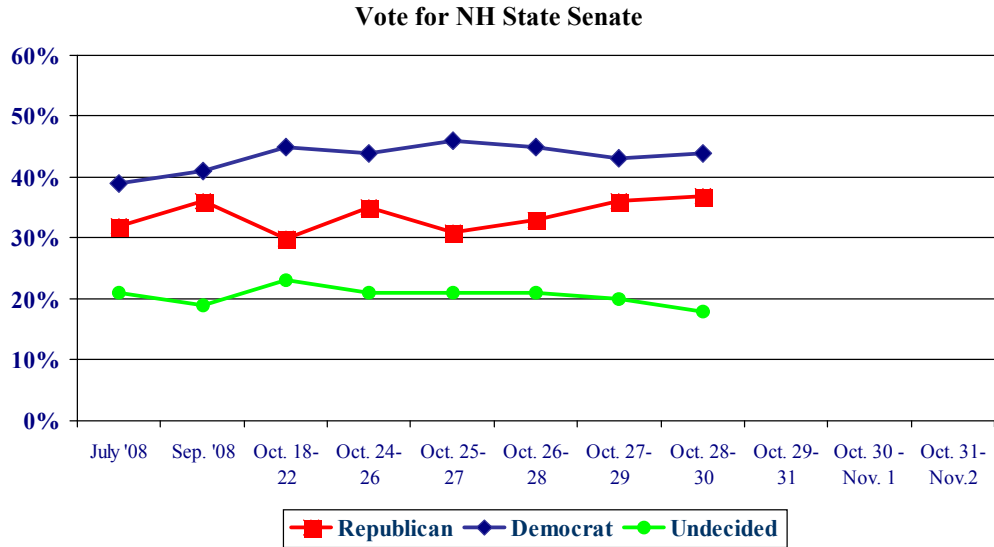
**NH Second District**

In the 2<sup>nd</sup> District, while Republican newcomer Jennifer Horn has gained support in recent days, mainly from Republicans, Democratic incumbent Paul Hodes maintains a solid lead over Horn -- 53% of likely voters in the 2<sup>nd</sup> District say they will vote for Hodes, 30% say they will vote for Horn, and 17% remain undecided.



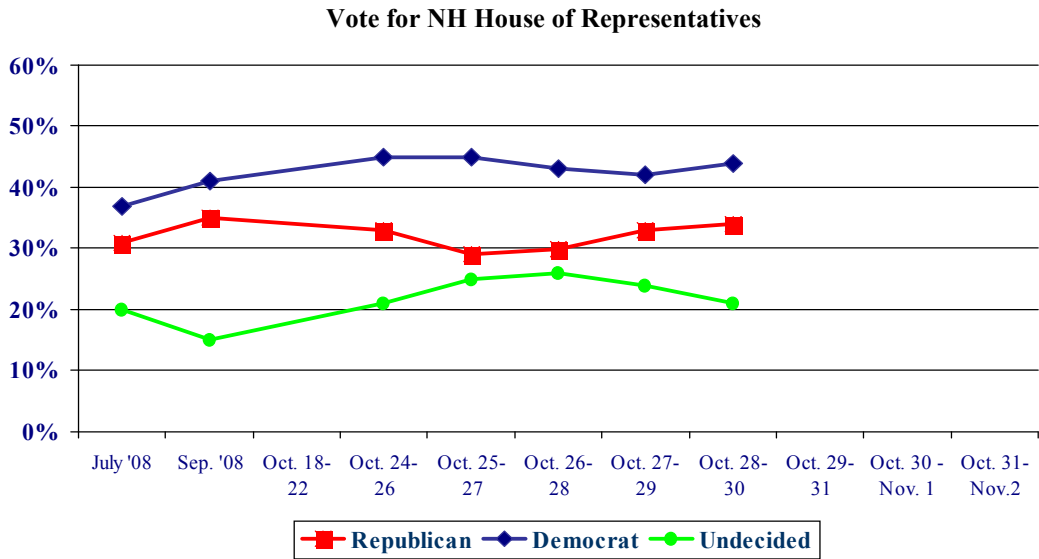
**NH Senate**

Democrats continue to lead in generic ballots for the New Hampshire Senate, but at a closer margin -- 44% of likely voters say they plan to vote for the Democrat in their State Senate district, 37% plan to vote for the Republican, and 18% are undecided.



**NH House**

Democrats also lead in generic ballots for the New Hampshire House -- 44% of likely voters say they plan to vote for the Democrat in their State House district, 34% plan to vote for the Republican, and 21% are undecided.
