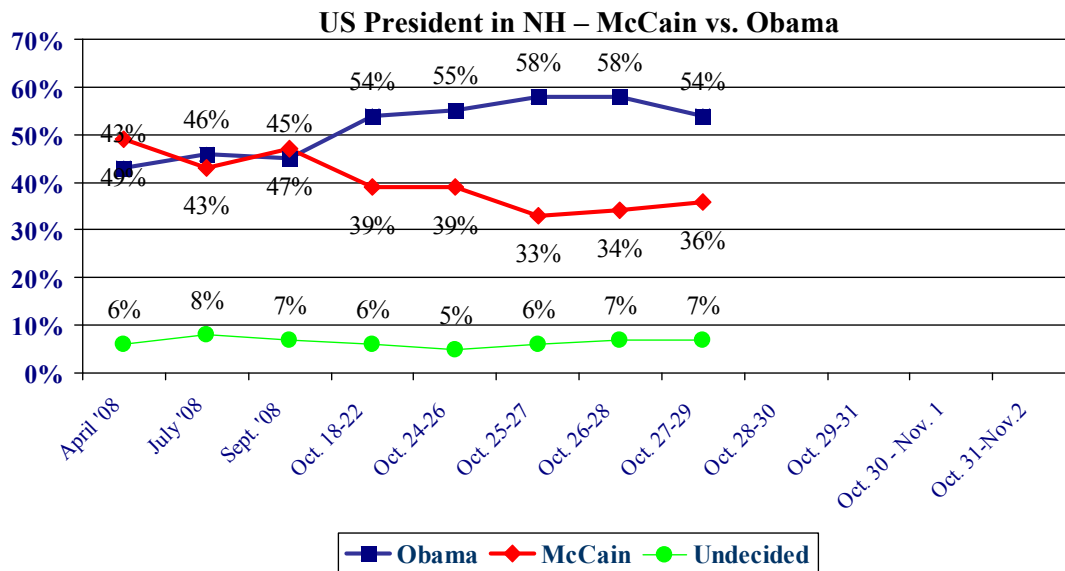
PRESIDENTIAL RACE GROWS CLOSER IN NEW HAMPSHIRE BUT OBAMA STILL HOLDS WIDE LEAD

Durham, NH – The presidential race in New Hampshire has tightened, but Barack Obama still maintains a wide lead over John McCain. The race for U.S. Senate in New Hampshire continues to narrow, and the contest in the First Congressional remains a near dead heat.

These findings are based on the 2008 WMUR / UNH New Hampshire Tracking Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. This survey is sponsored by WMUR-TV Manchester and the University of New Hampshire.* Six hundred nineteen (619) likely New Hampshire voters were interviewed between October 27 and October 29, 2008. The potential sampling error for the statewide survey is +/-3.9%. Three-hundred fifteen (315) likely 1st District voters were surveyed (margin of sampling error of +/- 5.5%) and 304 likely 2nd District voters were interviewed (margin of sampling error +/-5.6%). 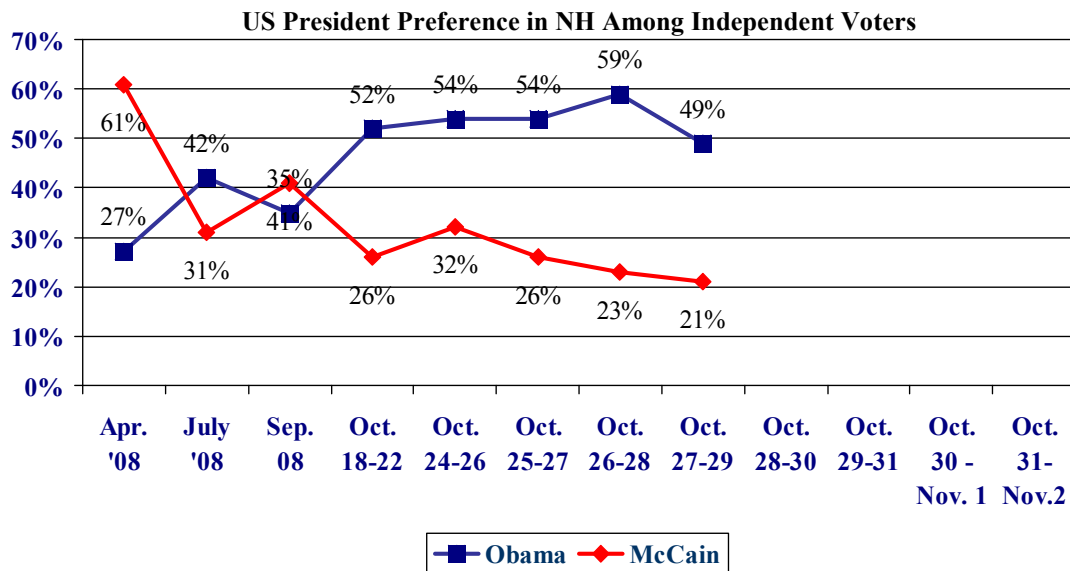
President

The race for President in New Hampshire grew somewhat closer in recent days, but Democrat Barack Obama continues to hold a solid lead over Republican John McCain. More than half of likely voters, 54%, say they plan to vote for Obama, 36% favor McCain, 2% prefer some other candidate, and 7% are undecided.

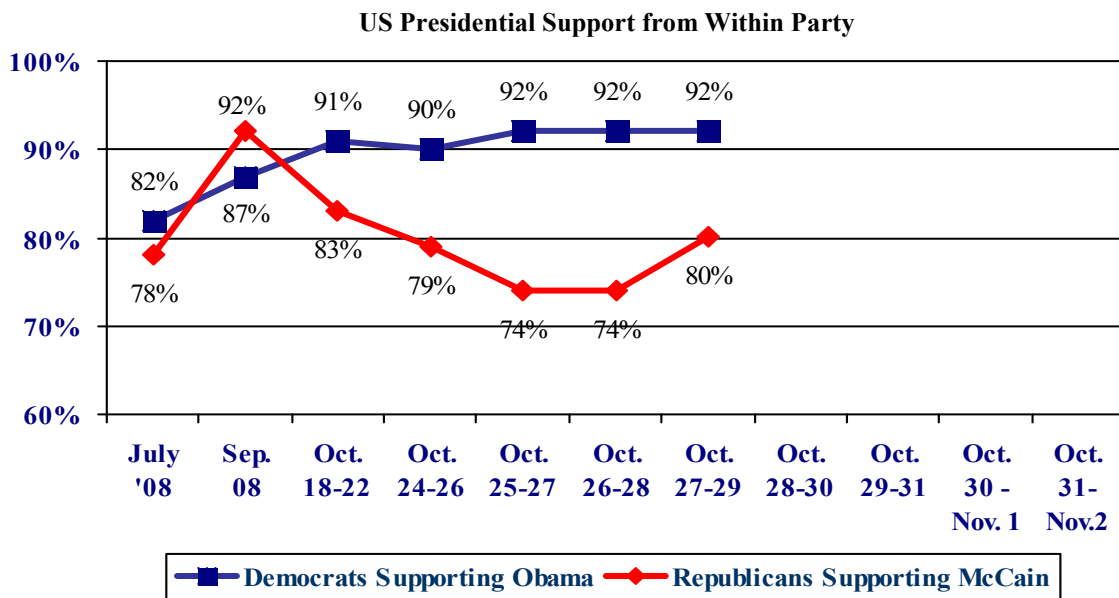


Obama continues to hold his lead among independent voters in New Hampshire – 49% of political independents say they favor Obama, 21% favor McCain, 5% prefer some other candidate, and 25% are undecided.

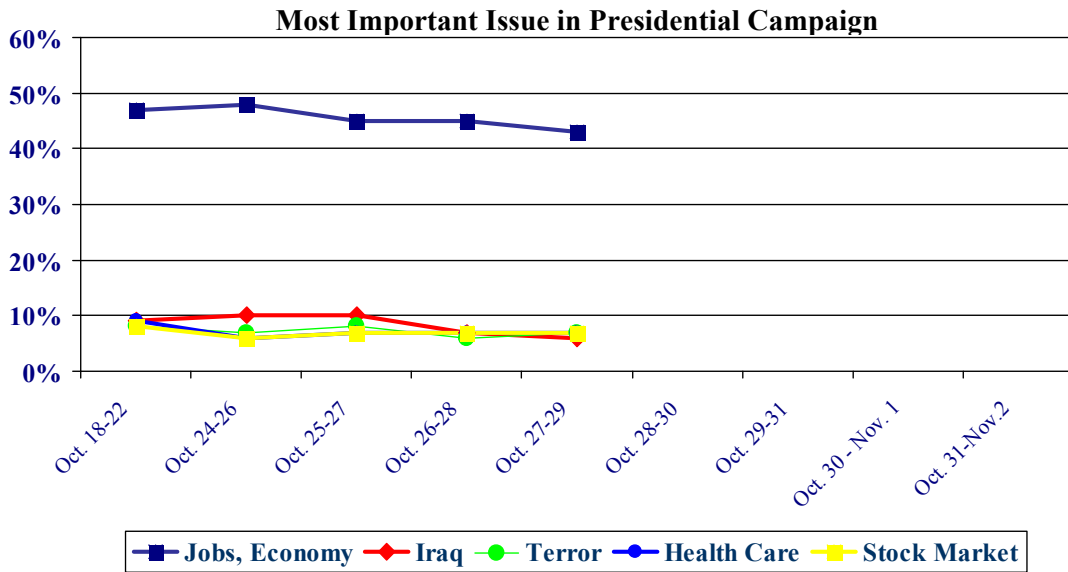

An area of particular concern for McCain is that he still has not solidified his Republican base. While more than 90% of self-identified Democrats say they plan to vote for Obama, only 75% to 80% of self-identified Republicans say they plan to vote for McCain. Currently, 92% of self-identified Democrats support Obama and 80% of self-identified Republicans support McCain.

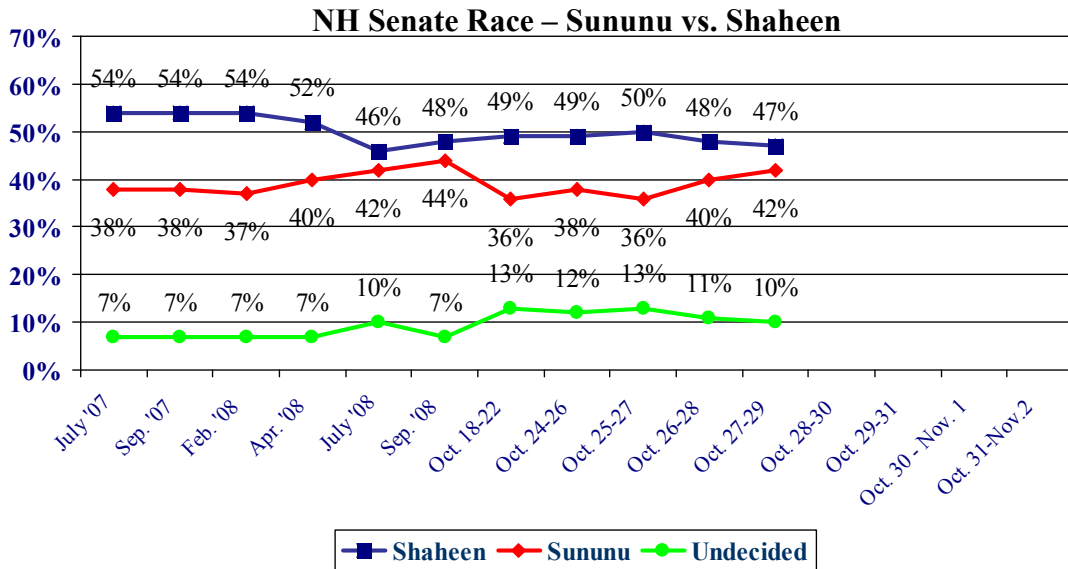


The most important issue in the presidential campaign to New Hampshire voters continues to be jobs and the economy (43%), followed by the campaign against terrorism (7%), the recent stock market crash (7%), health care (7%) and the war in Iraq (6%). Economic concerns have topped the list of important issues to New Hampshire voters since mid-summer.



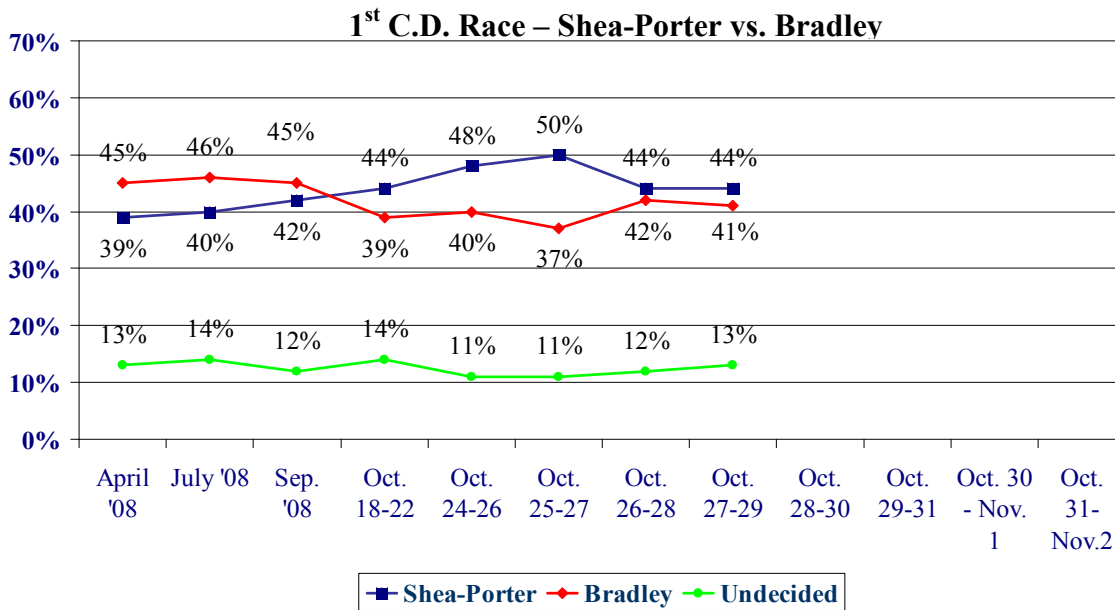
US Senate

The race for the U.S. Senate continues to tighten and Republican incumbent John Sununu now trails his 2002 challenger Jeanne Shaheen by only 5 percentage points. Currently, 47% of likely New Hampshire voters say they will vote for Shaheen, 42% will vote for Sununu, 1% prefer some other candidate, and 10% are undecided.



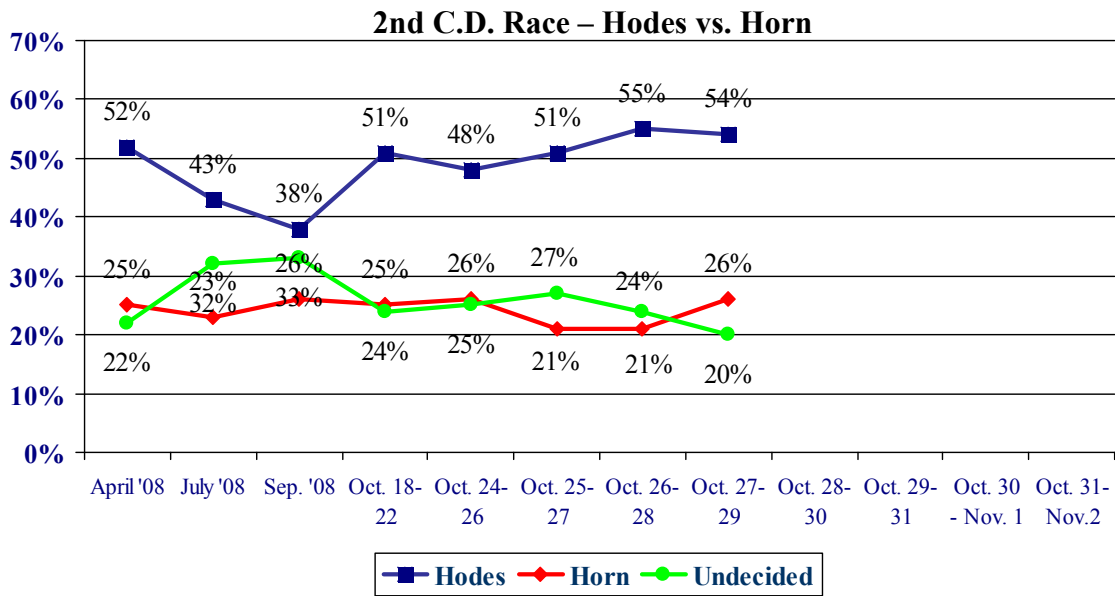
NH First District

The race in New Hampshire's First Congressional District continues to be neck-and-neck, as incumbent Democrat Carol Shea-Porter faces former incumbent Republican Jeb Bradley in a rematch of their 2006 contest. In the latest WMUR / UNH Tracking Poll, 44% of likely 1st District voters say they will vote for Shea-Porter, 41% favor Bradley, 1% prefer some other candidate, and 13% remain undecided.



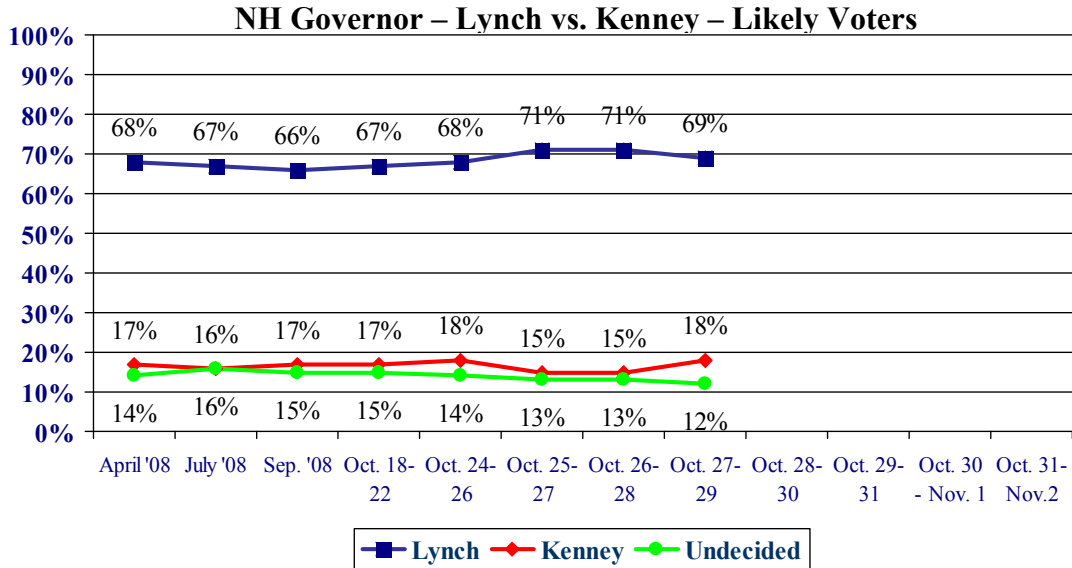
NH Second District

In the 2nd District, Democratic incumbent Paul Hodes maintains a solid lead over Republican newcomer Jennifer Horn -- 54% of likely voters in the 2nd District say they will vote for Hodes, 26% say they will vote for Horn, and 20% remain undecided.

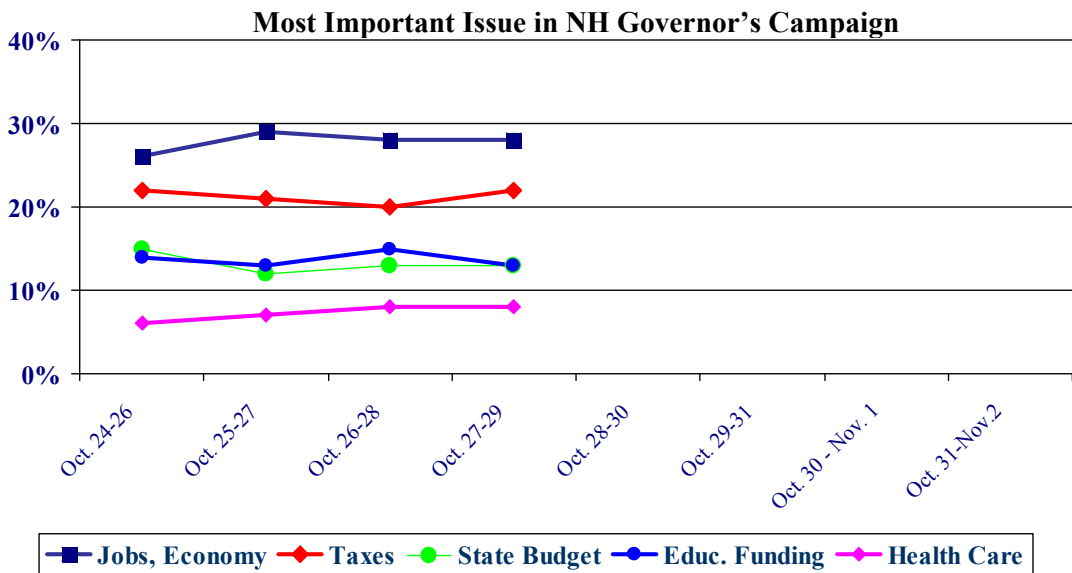


NH Governor

Incumbent John Lynch maintains a wide lead over Republican Joe Kenney in the race for New Hampshire Governor. Lynch currently leads Kenney by a 69% to 18% margin with 1% favoring some other candidate, and 12% undecided. The dynamics of this race closely resemble Lynch's 2006 victory over Jim Coburn.

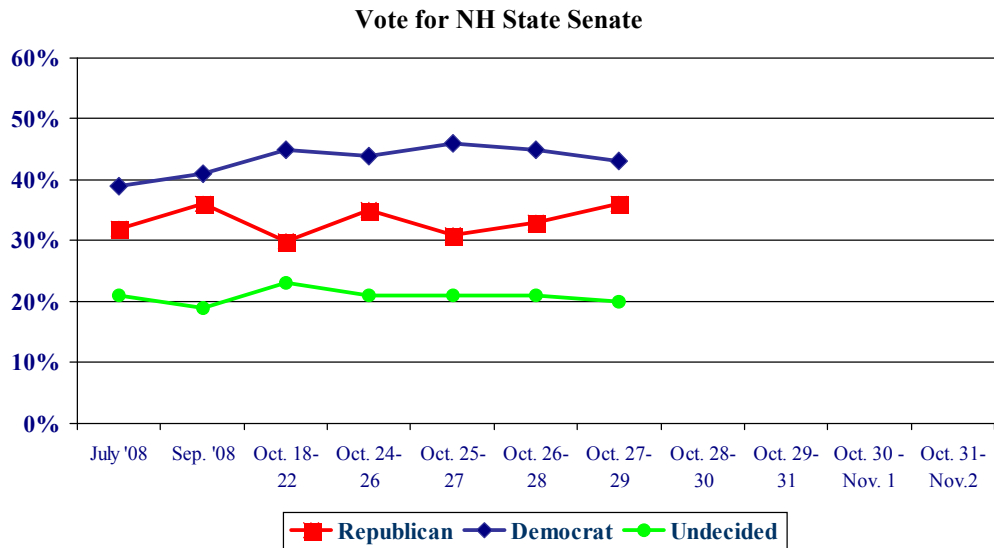


The most important issue in the governor's race are jobs and the economy (28%), taxes (22%), the state budget (13%), education funding (13%) and health care (8%).



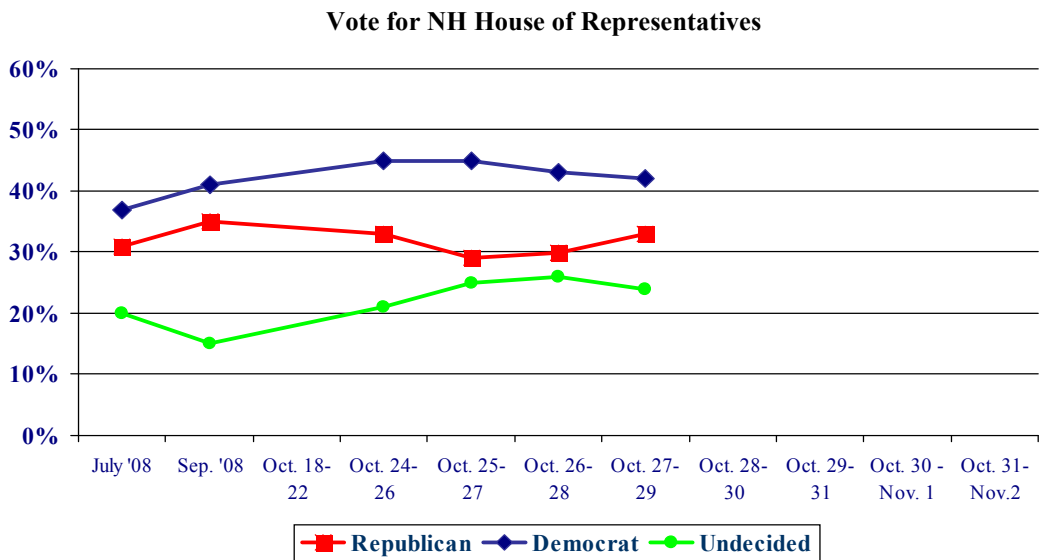
NH Senate

Democrats continue to lead in generic ballots for the New Hampshire Senate -- 43% of likely voters say they plan to vote for the Democrat in their State Senate district, 36% plan to vote for the Republican, and 20% are undecided.



NH House

Democrats also lead in generic ballots for the New Hampshire House -- 42% of likely voters say they plan to vote for the Democrat in their State House district, 33% plan to vote for the Republican, and 24% are undecided.
