

WMUR / GRANITE STATE POLL THE UNIVERSITY OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

MCCAIN WITH SLIGHT NH EDGE, MANY VOTERS UNDECIDED

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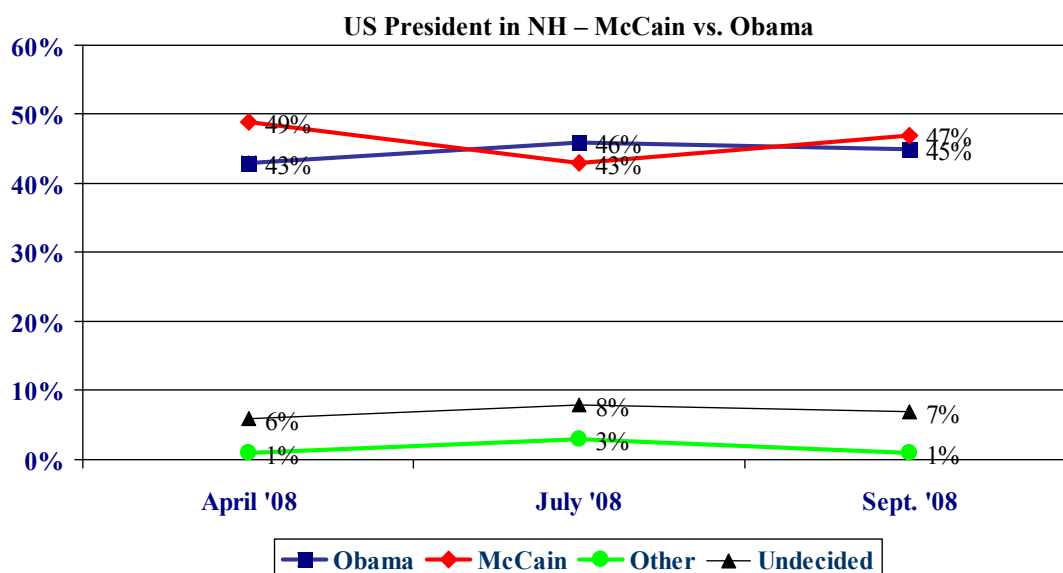
DURHAM, NH – John McCain has regained a slight lead over Barack Obama in the race for President in the swing state of New Hampshire. But many voters remain undecided and many more say they could change their minds between now and the election. The most important issue to voters continues to be jobs and the economy.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR / Granite State Poll**,* sponsored by WMUR-TV and conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred fifty (550) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by telephone between September 14 and September 21, 2008. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.2%. Included was a subsample of 523 likely November voters (margin of sampling error, +/-4.3%).

U.S. President

Although New Hampshire has only 4 votes in the Electoral College it will be a battleground state in the November election. Currently, Arizona Senator John McCain holds a small lead over Illinois Senator Barack Obama.

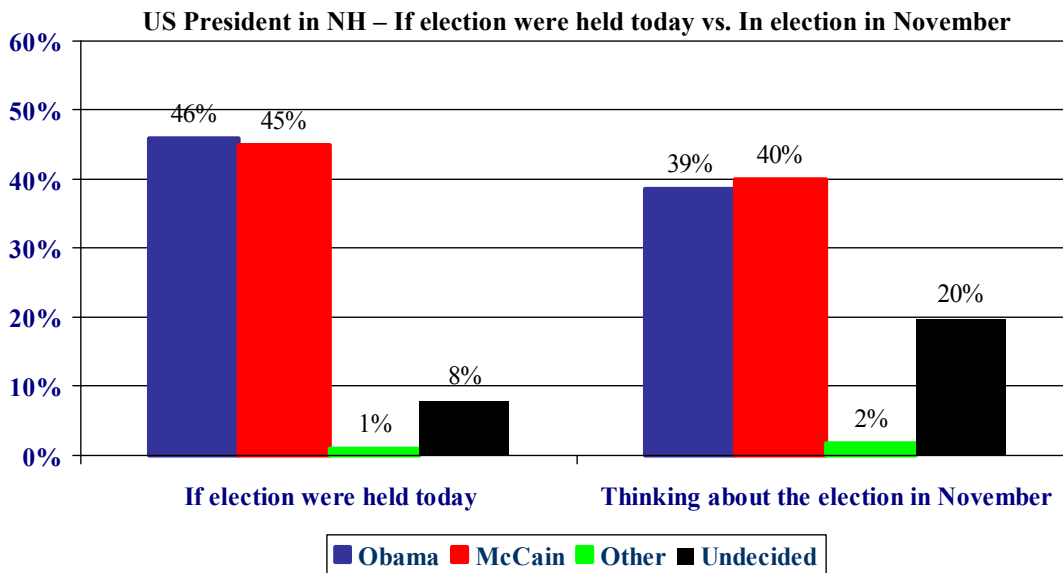
In the most recent Granite State Poll, 47% of likely voters say they plan to vote for McCain, 45% say they will vote for Obama, 1% prefer some other candidate and 7% are undecided. (These percentages include undecided voters who say they lean toward a candidate.) The race between Obama and McCain has swung back and forth over the summer and promises to stay close until the election.



But concentrating on the “horse race” provides a misleading depiction of the New Hampshire electorate. It is crucial to point out that many New Hampshire voters have not firmly decided who they will actually vote for in November. In order to investigate this, the Granite State Poll conducted an experiment in which half the sample of respondents were asked “Suppose the 2008 presidential election was being held today and the candidates were John McCain and Sarah Palin, the Republicans and Barack Obama and Joe Biden, the Democrats, who would you vote for?” and half were asked “Thinking about the presidential election in November, would you vote for Republicans John McCain and Sarah Palin ... Democrats Barack Obama and Joe Biden ... someone else ... or haven’t you decided yet?”

While the closeness of the race is similar under both question wordings, a significantly higher percentage say they are undecided when asked about voting in November (20%) than they are if asked if the election were held today (8%).

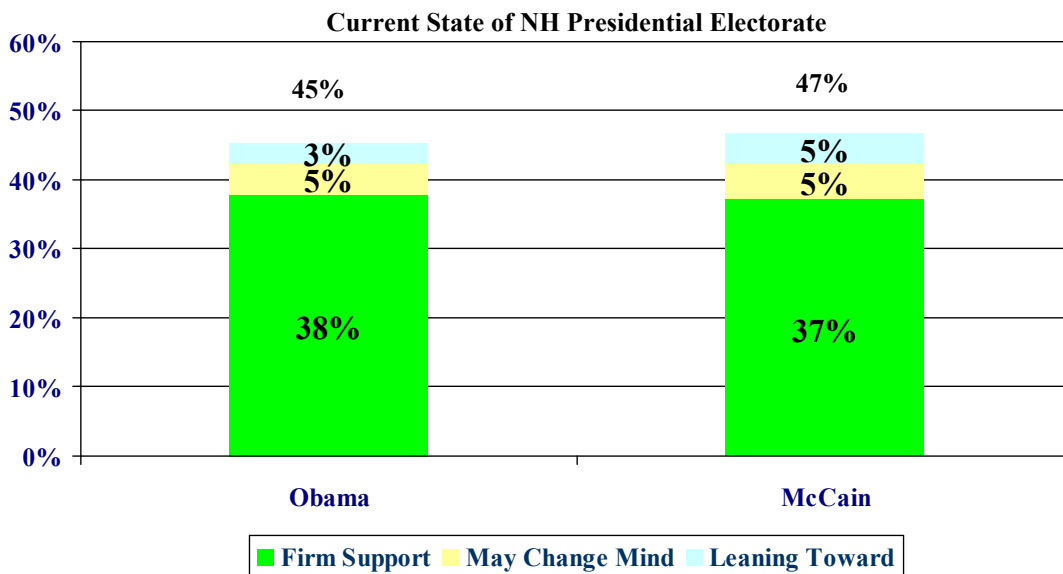

Among voters who are initially undecided, 32% say they lean toward McCain, 21% lean toward Obama and 47% are still undecided.

Voters who were decided in their preference for President were asked a follow-up question which probed for how firm their choice was. Overall, 88% percent said they were firm in their choice and 12% said they could change their minds.

When combined, these questions reveal a more nuanced electorate. Currently, 38% of New Hampshire voters firmly support Obama, 5% support Obama but may change their minds, 3% are undecided but lean toward Obama. A similar pattern is seen for McCain – 37% of New Hampshire voters firmly support McCain, 5% support McCain, but may change their minds, and 5% are undecided but lean toward McCain.



“The race in New Hampshire is very close, but about 1 in 4 voters are not firm in supporting either candidate,” said Andrew Smith, Director of the UNH Survey Center. “New Hampshire is definitely a state that is up for grabs and will remain so until election day.”

Subgroup Analysis

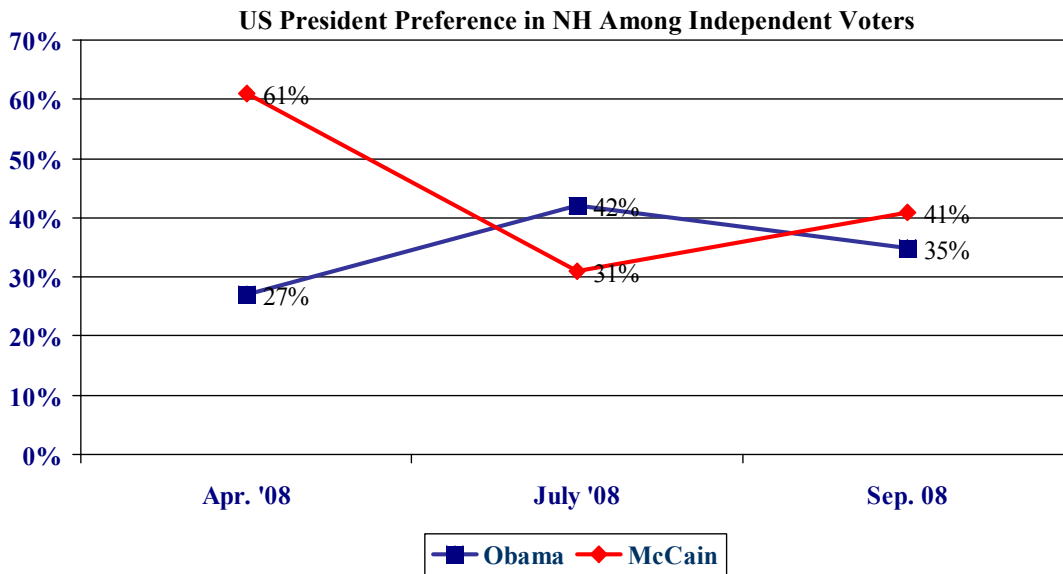
McCain runs strongest among Republicans, conservatives, upper income voters, and voters with high school degrees. Obama does best among Democrats, liberals, younger voters, union households, those who have never been married, and those who do not attend church.

McCain has a ten percentage point or greater advantage over Obama in the North Country, the greater Manchester area, and in Massachusetts border towns. Obama has a 10 percentage point or greater lead over McCain in the Connecticut valley.

There is a gender gap in New Hampshire with McCain holding a 53% to 40% lead over Obama among men and Obama holding a 50% to 42% lead over McCain among women.

The nomination battle between Obama and Hillary Clinton was long and bitter had some hard feelings remain. Among voters who said they voted for Clinton in the New Hampshire Democratic primary, 14% say they plan to vote for McCain in November and another 10% are undecided.

McCain currently leads Obama among independent voters by a slim 41% to 35% margin.



Favorability Ratings

Both Obama and McCain enjoy positive favorability ratings among New Hampshire voters. Fifty-three percent of likely voters say they have a favorable opinion of Obama, 36% have an unfavorable opinion of him, 9% are neutral and 2% say they don't know enough about him to say. Obama's net favorability rating – the percentage having a favorable opinion minus the percentage having an unfavorable opinion – is +17%, down from +27% in July. Among Independents, Obama's net favorability rating is +30%, essentially unchanged since July when it was +29%.

McCain is viewed favorably by 55% of likely voters, 35% have an unfavorable opinion of him, 9% are neutral and 2% don't know enough about him to say. McCain's net favorability rating is +20%, down from +25% in July. Among Independents, McCain's net favorability rating is +36%, up slightly from +30% in July.

Turning to the candidates for Vice President, both Delaware Senator Joe Biden and Alaska Governor Sarah Palin are only slightly less well known than the top of the ticket. Forty-five percent of likely New Hampshire voters have a favorable opinion of Biden, 32% have an unfavorable opinion of him, 9% are neutral, and 14% don't know enough about him to say. Biden's net favorability rating is +13%.

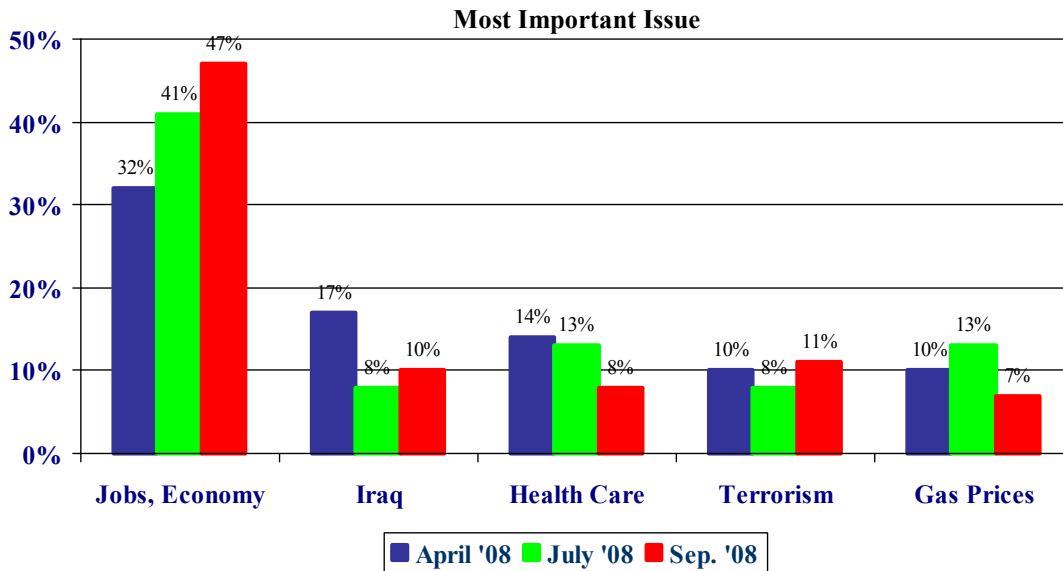
Palin is viewed favorably by 48% of likely New Hampshire voters, 35% have an unfavorable opinion of her, 8% are neutral, and 9% don't know enough about her to say. Palin's net favorability rating is also +13%.

McCain's selection of Palin has energized Republicans to a greater degree than has Obama's choice of Biden. Among Republicans, Palin's net favorability rating is +78% while Biden's is +61% among Democrats.

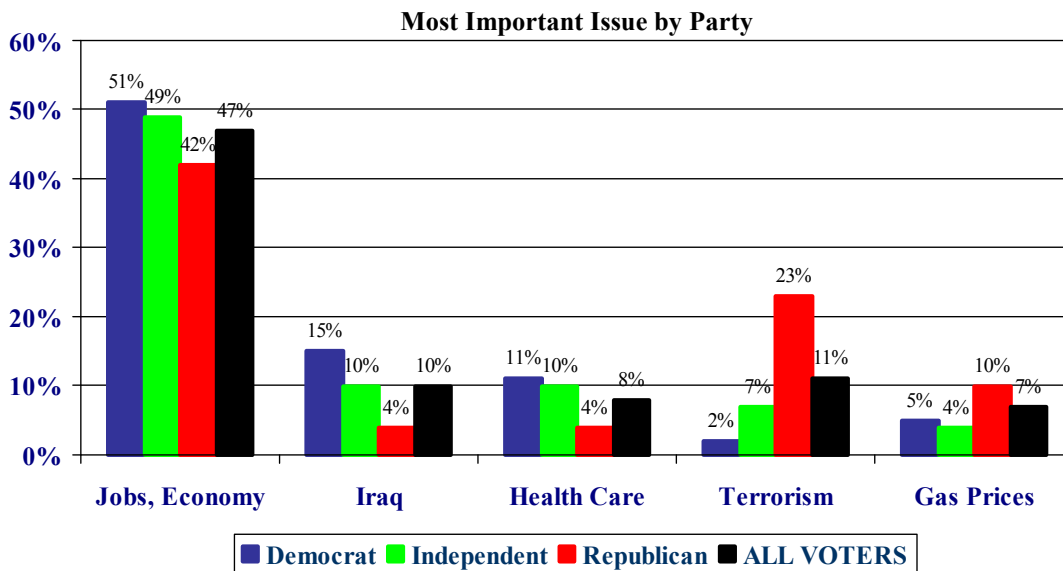
When asked how the selection of Palin has impacted their choice for President, 28% of likely New Hampshire voters say she has made them more likely to vote for McCain, 26% say they are less likely to vote for McCain, 45% say she has made no difference in their choice and 1% don't know.

Issues

Economic concerns continue to be the top issue for New Hampshire voters. Forty-seven percent of likely New Hampshire voters said jobs and the economy is the most important issue in determining their vote for the election in November, followed by the war on terrorism (11%), the war in Iraq (10%), health care (8%), and gas prices (7%). Concerns about the economy have risen from 41% in July as financial markets remain in turmoil. But concerns about gas prices have dropped from 13% in July as the price of gasoline has dropped from its summer highs.



There are few significant differences between Republicans and Democrats about which issues are most important. Democrats are more concerned about the economy and health care than Republicans while Republicans are more concerned about terrorism than Democrats.



Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR / Granite State Poll**, sponsored by WMUR-TV and conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred fifty (550) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by telephone between September 14 and September 21, 2008. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-4.2 percent. Included was a subsample of 523 likely November voters (margin of sampling error, +/- 4.3%). Results reported for other subgroups have potential for somewhat larger variation than those for the entire population.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.
