
Dear Editor:

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AS I SEE IT

O UR ATTENTION THIS MONTH focuses on our northern square dance cousins, the Canadians who, on the 16, 17 and 18th in the city of Edmonton, the province of Alberta, will produce that country's first National Square Dance Convention. The initial venture of anything in square dancing is always exciting, but having been ardent admirers of the Canadians and their square dancing for many years, we predict that this Convention will be a gala occasion in every sense of the word.

Ever since the then Princess Elizabeth traveled through the Provinces some quarter century ago and took part in a square dance that created headlines throughout the world, Canada has been very much in the thick of the contemporary square dance scene.

But even long before that Canadians were involved, much as we were on the south side of the border, in the traditional forms of the activity. Frequently someone will write in to tell us of a visit to Quebec in the late forties where they "discovered" that square dancing was being danced by sizeable groups but that the calls were all in French. Those of you who are traveling to Edmonton this month to take part in the fun have no need for concern. You'll find the Canadian callers easy to understand and the calls familiar. sonal recollections going back to the early 50's would have to include the Totemland institutes, first held on the University campus in Vancouver and then for a number of years at Shawnigan Lake on Vancouver Island. The annual Banff Institute, which we helped to develop in 1956, is a leader among institutes today, with every session filled to capacity and with many of its original members still a part of its executive committee.

How well we remember the visits to Saskatchewan, the three-week tour through the Province of Alberta where names such as Wetaskiwin, Red Deer and Coronation materialized into towns with sizeable square dance populations. There was the calling in a large hall in Winnipeg to live music featuring a very pregnant fiddle player, who managed to retain control throughout the evening but gave birth to a young son three hours after the dance had ended. And of course there was the great experience at the Canadian Pairs and Squares camp-and so many others. One recollection brings on another and we're guessing that a visit to the Convention in Edmonton later this month will kindle many more-such as a visit to Calgary which we'll always remember.

The time was the early 1950's and we were conducting one of the first callers' schools in Canada's Province of Alberta. Twenty callers comprising two ten-caller units were meeting on alternate days in the basement work room of the Bud Fobe's home in Calgary. It was about midway through one of the evening sessions when the phone rang with a message that sent the callers and their wives scrambling into their cars and heading full-blast for the railway station. A troop train loaded with returning military personnel from the Korean War would be stopping briefly and the square dancers were called in to provide some light diversion. In less time that it takes to read this, dozens of dancers recruited by phone calls had gathered

Over the years our travels have taken us into Canada many times where we have always been impressed, not only by the enthusiasm of the dancers and the pride they show for their square dancing, but also for their warm and generous hospitality. If any group is able to retain these feelings and inject them into a major convention, it will be these people.

At almost the same time that square dancers in the U.S. were starting to set up square dance vacation institutes across the country, the Canadians were creating their own. Our per-

at the station, and by the time the train pulled in the squares, which stretched the full length of the boarding platform, were dancing up a storm.

As the train stopped and the soldiers disembarked, the dancing took the form of a military one-night stand with the experienced dancers shepherding the soldiers into the squares. Half a dozen callers took their turn at the mike, including his honor Mayor McKay, the calling Mayor of Calgary. Somewhere along the line someone discovered that many of these eastern bound troops spoke only French and in a few seconds a French speaking caller was ushered to the microphone. In just a short time the train's whistle announced that it was time to go. The calls were ended. The troops re-boarded the train. The dancers waved and it was over. The dance had lasted only minutes but the memory of it has remained for these many years.

Perhaps you experienced some of these events with us. If you did and if you're up in Edmonton later this month, why not look us up and let's reminisce.

Planning Time

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E XCEPT FOR THOSE countries down under where August happens to be mid-winter and square dancing is in full swing, this month for most of us is a planning time for the fall and winter seasons that lie ahead. Just as June has become known as the end of one square dance year, September is the beginning of another and summer is a perfect time to prepare for the future.

This is also preparation time for us on the magazine. We usually do our year's projection during July and August, shooting the photographs for our covers, dancer shots for our Style Labs and the new dancer "Discovery" series in one or two full-day sessions in Santa Barbara, some 100 miles up the coast. Our Fashion Feature portraits are already completed for the coming months and our cartoonists and artists are well into planning the winter issues. Whether or not you are aware of it, there is a great deal happening in square dancing these days. When something like a new convention (Canada) comes along, and when a representative group of caller-leaders (CALLERLAB) is beginning to develop a concept of a lessthan-Mainstream plateau of square dancing which involves some 75 basics and requires perhaps a total of 30, 1/2 hour lessons, we get very enthusiastic and editorially involved.

As we see it, the big news in the coming months will center around such topics as the growing concern of square dancing money matters, a close look at escalating caller's fees and the rising cost to callers of travel, equipment, records, etc. We're bound to cover, from different angles, the price of hall rentals and the reasons so many clubs are considering building their own facilities. Teen dancing, ideas for conducting the big dances, festivals and conventions are all subjects now in the planning stages of our coming issues.

And what about the basic books? Now that the CALLERLAB committees have worked out a PLUS program for the two plateaus beyond Mainstream, where there are to be no changes in the list for the next three years, it's time for us to plan a special illustrated PLUS handbook for release some time later this winter. The Experimentals which fall immediately after the Mainstream groupings are a different matter, inasmuch as they will be changing in April every year. As far as the two existing Basic Movements Handbooks are concerned we've already indicated earlier that, with only two additions to the list, we'll hold off an update issue, at least for the time being.

These are just some of the projects that should keep us out of mischief during these hot summer months. For us, just as for you who are club and association leaders who are planning your schedules for the coming months, and you callers and teachers busily involved in preparations for the new classes and club programs, we're busy too, planning for what appears to be a great season ahead.

The Folk Dance of America

I was unfortunate that the dance stamps were issued such a short time before the postal rates were changed. However, with the U.S. Postal Service's recognition of Square Dancing as the Folk Dance of America, we should see some increased interest in governmental approval of a Bill that would make all of this official. a bit of friendly advice

Don't Just Stand There!

DERHAPS YOU'VE HEARD people say, "You **L** know, square dancing could be great fun if we didn't have to stand around and wait for a left allemande in order to get back into the action." Those who have danced for some time have learned that there's nothing unusual about goofing in a square. The more you dance and the longer you are a part of square dancing, the fewer mistakes you'll make, but the person who has never erred simply isn't human.

There are many reasons for making a mistake. You may become confused. The call may be unfamiliar to you - perhaps the caller introduced it to the club last week when you were entertaining Aunt Mable. At any rate you goofed. Now, what do you do about it?

First of all, don't panic. The new dancer can be spotted in a situation like this because he or she may go completely to pieces. Intense embarrassment sets in. "My goodness, I'm the first one ever to cause a square to break down! I'll never be able to face my friends again. I'll go out and shoot myself."

The more experienced dancer makes a point of not just standing around, or, worse yet, trying to explain to the square what went wrong. And milling around in the center will never result in catching up with the others.

There are a number of suggestions for

each tip, you will be surprised how much you dance. It works a whole lot better than standing and watching the rest of the floor watch you.

The movement "recovery" goes like this. When your square breaks down, quickly reassemble at home and watch the rest for a moment. If the caller is working ocean waves, turn and face your corner and step into a wave and take up from there. If the caller is working lines, the heads just slide over to the right, make a line of four and dance some more. If the caller is working thars, the boys back into a thar, girls hang on and there you are. If he is calling circle, join hands and circle. For alamo style, join hands, make a ring and girls turn back. You will find you are standing less and enjoying it more when you become an expert at recovery.

Don't worry if you don't have your right corner or partner until the end of the tip. Just dance and enjoy it.

There you have it. It's a good suggestion and you might try it out if you don't already have a method of your own. There are more complicated systems and there are ways for the caller to resolve a mixed up square, but the prime advice for the dancer is (1) keep cool, (2) get back home, (3) look for an opportunity to get back into the action.

getting back into the action without trying to reconstruct the minor disaster or waiting idly for something familiar to be called. (We're noticing that more and more time elapses between allemande lefts these days.) Anyway, here's something that appeared in News Notes, the official publication of the New Mexico Square Dance Association. It's titled RE-COVERY (a new basic?).

The name of the game is "Keep dancing, baby." You can't do it by yourself, but if you all decide you are going to dance all you can

And then there is some absolutely useless advice that you might take at face value. "If you make a mistake, smile. Everyone else will think it's his fault."

WHEN IN ROME - Different areas and even different clubs within each area often have ways of doing things that may be new to you. The wisest suggestion is to watch and see how your hosts act, then fit in. Remember - you are the guest.

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for those collecting unusuals here are some more GIMMICKS & Stunts

LAST MONTH we initiated a revival of sorts when we introduced many of you to two of the "unusuals" or gimmicks which, at one time, were used to spice up an evening of square dancing. More than that, these little games or mixers were often used as *pressure regulators*. If, during a particularly strenuous class session or workshop where the squares were beginning to fall apart and it was apparent that the dancers had had about all the serious instruction they could handle, the caller might reach for one of these. Almost immediately the tensions would diminish. Smiles would return to the faces and an obvious calm would return to the group.

The need for this sort of thing still exists. However, the caller must dole out the gimmick material carefully. For it to be effective, it must not be overdone. Except in the special instance of a party that might be built around the "unusuals," you will find that one of these during an evening is enough.

Here are two more "oldies" which are still crowd pleasers. One is a mixer. The other is a novelty square where the dancers have nothing new to assimilate, but where the formation is different. Give them a try. moving around, as the ladies leave them, move to another square independently and join with another man in the star, and continue on. If the ladies were in a right hand star in a promenade with the men, on the word "scoot" the men would leave the ladies, who would continue in their forward star motion and the men would join in another square, with another lady. Individual interpretations of this can work out beautifully.

Double Square. There are several ways to work this out. It simply means that two squares are combined as one, with two couples taking the position of couple one, two couples for position two, etc. This can be worked with two men together with their arm around each other's waist and each with one hand free to take the part of one man. Two ladies can do the same thing to take the part of one lady.

It can also be worked where a man and lady put their arms around each other and take the part of a man, while the other couple can represent the lady. (We prefer the two men together, two ladies together arrangement.)

Try simple things and give plenty of time for the execution of the calls. An allemande left and a right and left grand can be exceptionally challenging in this, but the caller should think out well in advance what he is going to do.

Scoot and Scat. This is simply a mixer where the word "scoot" indicates that the men in the square leave what they were doing and move to another square while the ladies who were dancing continue what they were doing until they get new partners. The word "scat" means the same thing for ladies. They are to leave the square they were dancing with, move to another square, leaving the men they were with, continuing the motion they were in.

For instance, in a star promenade with the men in the center in a left hand star, call "scat." The men retain their star and keep

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You old timers may remember other gimmicks of this type. Why not send them in to us so that we can, in turn, share them with the readers. T HE SQUARE DANCE WORLD is peopled with wondrous individuals, folks we'd all like to know better – if we just had the time. There's the former Governor of a state, the man who collects snakes, the Major General in the Chinese Army, the former chief scientist for the U.S. Air Force, the couple who have "adopted" ten Korean orphans – all are square dancers and all have great stories to tell.

Among the many friends we've made through square dancing over the years is one Ralph Piper, formerly from Minnesota, now a resident of Leisure World, Laguna Hills, California. Ralph's career in education, his contributions to the world of sports, and the role he's played as a caller and leader in square dancing could fill several volumes, Let's take a look.

Another side of Ralph Piper. Active with the International Olympics and in many phases of the world of sports, we see him here as gymnastics coach at the University of Minnesota.



You might question how the man who, for one minute, is visiting coach for the Egyptian gymnastics team could, the next minute, be producing 16 mm sound and color film on "Tribal Dances of West Africa." But, obviously Ralph Piper is a very unusual person.

Ralph did his first square dancing prior to 1920, while still in his teens, and began his calling career fifty years ago in St. Paul "... where the dancers paid 10ϕ each to go to the pianist." After calling for almost three years without pay "... I figured that I should pay them for letting me practice on them," Ralph switched over to records (there weren't many available in those days) and started charging \$5.00 for an evening's calling.

Since those early days, he has run the full scale of square dancing. At one time calling seven nights a week, he appeared on staff at many festivals, attended Lloyd Shaw's early callers' schools, staffed on some of the first square dance camps, was active in the Minnesota Folk and Square Dance Federation and was on the editorial staff of American Squares (now American Squaredance) magazine. You name it, Ralph did it. Today Piper has closed his chapter on square dancing and lives a busy life with his wife, Lucille, at a retirement community in Southern California. Through his years devoted to square dancing, Ralph Piper has watched the activity grow from a fragmented traditional recreation to one of the nation's major pastimes. Doubtless there are hundreds, perhaps thousands of men and women out there in square dancing today who learned to square dance with Ralph and who, for that reason, might like to join us in passing along a hearty "Well done. Thank you, Ralph."

You might wonder how a busy college gymnastics coach who was chairman of the National Collegiate Athletic Association's Rules Committee, a member of the National Sports Hall of Fame, National Coach of the Year (1962), and member of the U.S. Olympic Committee from 1948 to 1956, would find time for square dancing. Evidently those who are the busiest in this world always find time to be busier still.

review, a greal deal of association news is included in GRAND SQUARE, not the least of which is to outline the minutes of the three yearly NNJSDA Delegate meetings. Anyone responsible for presenting the news of such a meeting could do well to pattern themselves after this concise and informative wrapup. In addition to subscriptions and advertising, GRAND SQUARE operates in the black through the sale of GRAND SQUARE Booster Tags. These tags, sold annually for a six-week period (last half of January through February), are a miniature replica of the GRAND SQUARE logo. Any square dancer contributing \$1.00 (50¢ for teens) receives one.

In addition to association and club news, each issue includes a Square Dance Date Book. Here any club meeting semi-monthly or less frequently may list two special activities a season; clubs meeting more often may list up to five specials. A monthly sewing column entitled "The Square Pincusion," written by Rose Ericson, is widely reprinted in other publications. GRAND SQUARE

T HE MAJORITY OF AREA publications seem to represent dancer or caller associations and thus are organs for the associations and are underwritten by them. An example of such a magazine, which does an outstanding job of presenting information about its parent group, is GRAND SQUARE, official publication of the Northern New Jersey Square Dancer's Association.

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LADUAGES ISSUE

This trim, 8½"x5½" magazine is printed bi-monthly, five times a year, September through May. Typewritten, it alternates script face and elite type in a readable and attractive manner. Copy is obviously carefully proofread. While its pages are "crammed" with news, the information is laid out so that ads and dance information appear on almost every page, thus making the copy easy to read. Photographs submitted for use are made into half tones and reproductions are clear. The editors, Doc and Peg Tirrell, augment their staff with an adver-

Reading the many square dance publications every month is an education in itself. No two are alike and each tends to reflect the personality of square dancing in the area it covers. To become aware of the great number of area publications that exist today, see the listings in the 1978-79 Directory that starts on page 13. tion round out the format.

Good use is made of the lower portion of many pages where information has been highlighted by ruling it off from the balance of copy on the page. Occasionally a paragraph with a small photo is included in this way; more often two or three lines are run calling attention to some particular item.

The March/April issue reviewed welcomed new graduates to the world of square dancing and most impressively listed more than 1,000 names of newcomers to the northern New Jersey area!

friends-meet Sam Stead's Caller's Helpers


You know who you are with at all times. Play with them for a while. Easy to resolve any situation.


COME DAY we're going to erect a display of the caller's **N** "dolls" or checkers that have been developed over the years. These are the tools callers use to work out a new call or basic. Variations range from eight bits of paper with penciled markings to designate the eight persons in a square, to the elaborate commercial versions that you see advertised in square dance publications. All of them, from the humblest to the most sophisticated, are designed to be ready at a minute's notice to lend credibility to some new formation or gimmick.

Sam Stead, an enthusiastic veteran Canadian caller from Fernie, British Columbia, has come up with a concept that is different from the others and which he offers to you free.

Simply cut out the eight "dancers" you see here (or you may trace them or make a photostat copy of the page) and then, by matching the markings, you can tell at a glance where your dancers are and whether or not they are in sequence.

We think you'll be intrigued with these helpers, so go ahead and give them a try.



A BAGFUL OF IDEAS

T HE LENGTH OF SQUARE DANCE dresses is coming down. This is the word we have recently received from two large manufacturers of square dance attire. They say that repeat orders from customers are requesting that skirt lengths be at least one inch longer than in the past. Whether this follows the current fashion trend of street clothes or whether square dance ladies have discovered that thighs and knees may not be their prettiest physical attributes, we do not know; but we do echo the comment heard in many locales of hurray!

Renewing Polyester and Double Knits

Here is a very simple way to put vigor back into these fabrics which may have lost their crease (including men's double knit trousers). Mix half a cup of vinegar with a quart of water. Using a pressing cloth dipped in this solution and a hot iron, press until the cloth is dry. Be careful not to get the hot iron on the polyester or double knit as you can char it. Hang up the clothing to dry and air out the vinegar smell. (The vinegar and water combined with heat can make quite an odor, so use a well-ventilated area to do your pressing.) – THE DANCER, Virginia

Styles to Alter Appearances

If you want to look taller and thinner, accent the center front of your dress with buttons, trim or jewelry. Long sleeves and a V-neck can also be used to achieve this effect.

A gored skirt will minimize hips while the full-gathered skirt flatters narrow hips.

If you have a lovely long neck, the stand-up collar is for you.

Puff sleeves give an illusion of wider shoulders, while long full sleeves flatter thin arms.

To remove crayon stains from fabric, scrape off the excess with a dull blade. Wash as usual in water as hot as is safe for the fabric with detergent and ½ cup baking soda. – PROMENADE, Ohio

To remove ink stains (even ball point pen) spray hair spray on the stain. The unscented kind is safest for most fabrics. Wait at least an hour; then wash the garment as usual. – WISCONSIN SQUARES AND ROUNDS Storage Problems?





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
CONTRA CORMER IXIXIXIXIXI


• This month the Style Lab and the Contra Corner are combined into a single feature. We're finding that as more dancers become interested in contra dances, they are being made aware of certain concepts of timing and styling that may have eluded them up to this point.


As one enthusiastic square dancer recently put it, "I'm finding that since doing a few contras now and then I'm more aware of not rushing my timing. Consequently, our caller has slowed down his pace considerably." We say, great! If all of square dancing's different phases are enjoyed, the good found in each form is bound to rub off on the others.




The Contra **YUCCA JIG**









REQUIREMENT for NECESSARY any A contra, traditional or contemporary, to be successful, is variety. This particular contra, written in the last ten years by Don Armstrong, has the comfortable attributes of a traditional dance, coupled with the contemporary necessities of keeping everyone busy.

This is a duple and duples often have this characteristic of keeping most of the dancers busy, most of the time. The first couple (the one nearest the caller), the third, fifth and every other couple is active and the actives have exchanged places with each other (1).

In this duple, or double, each active couple works with its nearest inactive couple (those who did not cross over), the ones nearest the foot of the hall.


Yucca Jig starts by having the actives star left with the couple below (2). After 8 steps they switch to a right hand star (3) and return

to their starting places. While the inactives have returned to their place in the line, the active couples promenade down the center (4), past two inactive couples (5). Those near the foot of the hall will have to imagine that they are going around two couples.

The couples separate (6) and move to the outside. To compensate, the inactives take a step forward to allow room for them on the outside. Facing up (7), the actives return, single file, to their original place in the line (8). Then, moving to the phrase of the music the actives only do a do sa do in the center of the contra set (9). Returning to their lines once again, the men face to their left and the ladies to their right and each person swings with his corner (10).

Remember that in a contra, as you swing with a new corner (11), you retain the person you swing (12) and each man will put his lady








on his right side when the swing is completed. Facing across the set, the couples half promenade across from one line to the other (13). This is accomplished by the dancers retaining standard promenade handholds and, with the men closely passing left shoulders, each couple moves to the right around the other until they have reached the other line where they wheel to face across (14).


There's another interesting style note that comes into play at this point. Because so many of the contras are executed with two men together and two ladies together, a right and left thru is frequently done without the dancers taking hands. You see it starting here (15) as the dancers pass thru and then the man (or the person on the left in each couple) holds the pivot and backs up slightly (16). This is the same movement that you would get from a courtesy turn, but with no hands. The dancers are once again in their lines (17). Because of the


corner swing (10) all the active dancers have progressed toward the foot of the hall and all the inactives have moved up one position toward the head.

At this point, 64 beats of music have gone by and the complete routine has been covered one time. The dancers are ready to start a second time. Now the actives will work with the next couple below them and they start as before with the left hand star (18). In this particular dance those inactives who have reached the head of the hall, and those actives who have reached the foot, will remain out of the action (dead at the head and foot) through one sequence of the dance. Then they will cross at the head (becoming active) and at the foot (becoming inactive).

Yucca Jig is a good contra. While it's not difficult and can be used with new contra dancers, it still provides pleasure for the veteran. Try it. You'll like it.

THE EXTENDED BASICS PROGRAM

By Jack Lasry, Hollywood, Florida

T HE PROMOTION of your annual beginners' class must be given thought and preparation. The usual where, when, what and who type of information is very necessary, but what about the hall? Is it clean? Are the bathrooms spotless? Does the hall have a square dance atmosphere? Have you and your club properly planned for this most important night? Remember, all the "other places" couples go for an evening out – restaurants, theaters, bowling alleys, night clubs, and country clubs – all work hard at creating the right ambience, the right climate for a successful evening.

A welcome committee to meet and greet all class dancers, a registration desk, some candy on the table, coffee and cookies ready for refreshment time, are all a part of the preparation.

Now, above and beyond the "frills," what about you, the caller? Are you prepared for this most important evening's program or do you do it off the top of your head? Light and lively should be the theme of the party — easy dances with a minimum of teaching, enough to have fun and to whet the appetite for more fun the next week, which will encourage the dancers to bring their friends. The formation of a class that will become a new club will have different aims than the class that is being taught to "feed" into an existing club. If you are teaching the class with the idea in mind of starting a new club, you have a golden opportunity to shorten the learning time by forming an Extended Basics club. The shorter number of weeks will enable you to teach your class without being under the gun to graduate them in time to meet the needs of the club.

Make each class a *dance and club night* right from the start. Progress each week through your basics list but allow at least 50% or more of the time to be used for dancing, not drilling and teaching but dancing what they know and can enjoy. This may be a little difficult through the first few weeks, but after they have learned 30 to 35 calls you should be creative enough to provide an interesting dance program. The shorter class time will allow you to teach a second class to feed into the first one and you should find it easier to build up the club size.

What happens to the dancers who wish to continue into Mainstream dancing? You will need to provide this opportunity in the future. The ideal is a plan that makes possible an Extended Basics club program and an eventual workshop or class to teach the remaining Mainstream calls and to prepare the dancers for entry into the Mainstream club.

It would be a good idea to have the dancers dance in the Extended club level for at least six months to a year before moving up to Mainstream and the plus levels. Many dancers will want to stay at the Extended level due to the amount of time they have and the extent of their involvement in the activity. Callers using this "intermediate" program will be providing the dancers with a very important link between class and Mainstream dancing.

STROLL AND CYCLE

The Quarterly Movement selected by the CALLERLAB Committee for the months of July, August and September, 1978, was reported, described and diagrammed in the July issue of SQUARE DANCING. Jack Lasry gives us the following additional examples of the movement. He suggests that callers and dancers be sure that the centers of the two-faced line in the center have their hands joined when the two-faced line is formed. It is also suggested that callers say "hook four in line," as the girls in the center must trade and if the hands are not joined the tendency is to move ahead without first doing the trade.

Heads slide thru, swing thru Boys run, stroll and cycle Bend the line, right and left thru Slide thru, left allemande

Heads lead right, circle to a line Pass thru, wheel and deal Centers swing thru, boys run Stroll and cycle Couples circulate, wheel and deal Square thru three quarters Left allemande

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
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THE BIBLE SAYS, "The meek shall inherit the earth." If ever a caller falls into that category, it is Alan Margerison. This quiet, unassuming man has made an outstanding contribution to square dancing in the Montreal (Canada) area and seems completely unaware of his accomplishments and his talents.

Alan and his wife, Mary, began square dancing some 25 years ago on the West Coast of Canada. When he was moved to Montreal to work 17 years ago, he began to teach with the aid of records and tapes. He eventually picked up the mike and began to teach on his own. In his teaching, his concern for the new dancer is very evident. With Mary's help, with patience, humor, kindliness and encouragement, with free extra workshops in the basement of his home, none of his dancers has failed to graduate.

As a caller Alan maintains a very professional attitude. He has attended schools and clinics for callers and was awarded an SIOASDS Scholarship in 1972. He is one of the original Canadian members of the international Champlain Valley Callers Association which serves portions of New York State and Quebec

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and Ontario, along the St. Lawrence River. He believes that callers must help one another rather than compete with each other, and has had at least two aspiring callers apprentice with him in his classes and club.

Money has not been a motivating force. His own club, the Smiling Squares, is too small to afford the standard caller's fees for the area but Alan settles for whatever they can afford when the books are balanced at the end of the year. His fee for teaching the classes for the Circles and Squares is lower than most. His attitude has been that the caller's task is to provide the example that square dancing is, in truth, "fun and friendship set to music."

It is difficult to list accomplishments which lie more in the abstract rather than in the concrete and it is in this area of feelings and attitudes toward people that Alan excels. The Margerison's home has been called "The Square Dance Capital of the World" by their son. The title is merited not only for all of the workshops and impromptu dances held there, but because of those intangibles which have moved us to nominate Alan as Caller of the Month. – Irene and Randy West




Dear Editor:



CAL GOLDEN'S SQUARE DANCE TOURS







Pete and Carmel Murbach - Montebello, Ca.

THEN PETE AND CARMEL MURBACH "dis-V covered" square dancing in 1957 and joined a local class for beginners, they were also introduced to round dancing through the simple rounds and mixers that were presented as a part of square dancing.

With a background of ballroom dancing, it wasn't long before their square dance club drafted them to teach the rounds at the club. Pete and Carmel insisted that this was to be a temporary arrangement, since both held fulltime, demanding jobs. Their "temporary" round dance teaching has now continued for over 20 years – beginning with basic classes sponsored by the City of Montebello and square dance clubs and continuing over the years until, presently, the Murbachs teach three weekly groups and host two monthly round dance parties. Their clubs are known as "The Continentals."

The Murbachs became members of Round Dance Teachers Association of Southern California in 1963, where they have held elective and appointive offices. They have served as Round Dance Directors of the National Square Dance Convention (Long Beach, 1964) and the International Square and Round Dance

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
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Festival. Nationally, they have been featured round dance leaders at the Amarillo Round Dance Festival, Canada-Cade, Round-A-Cade and Star Rounds Festival. Locally, their assignments have included the San Diego Festival and the Palmquist Riviera Roundup. Their out-ofstate activities have been curtailed for the present since Pete underwent bypass heart surgery last March.

Because the Murbachs believe in quality rather than quantity, they have written fewer than 25 dance routines during their years in the round dance activity. Among the most popular of their routines are "A Continental Goodnight" (currently on the Classics List and Round of the Year in 1972), "Almost Persuaded," "Spanish Gypsy," and "Never-Ending Quickstep."

Carmel's family was in "show biz," and owned dance studios which Pete and Carmel helped to operate. They love all dance styles, but admit being partial to rhythm and Latin dances. Pete has retired from his job as Quality Assurance Manager and they hope to start

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
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Pete and Carmel's hobby is playing golf together. They have been married for 32 years and have two sons, Jerry and John. They live up to their motto: "Keep busy . . . always have something pending."

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These callers have demonstrated proficiency over the years and are now setting up the mechanics of accreditation for other caller-

HOW TO USE THE RECORD REPORT

To get the best possible analysis all singing calls are checked and rated by two sources. First, a rating is made by a square of dancers that actually dances to each record. The records are then sent to another reviewer who rates them on recording quality, instrumentation, clarity of commands, and body mechanics. The final "star" rating is based on a consensus of the reports from both. In all cases and unless otherwise noted, it may be assumed that singing calls are recorded in a medium range. In the case of hoedowns the key will be included.

______ Each report gives an analysis of the record


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and the dance. The shaded area in the chart indicates the voice range used by most recording companies. By comparing the voice range letters in each analysis with those on the chart, you should be able to determine the record's suitability to your voice. Occasionally a report will be starred (*) in which case you will find the call reproduced in the Workshop section of the same issue.

Some of the square dance records reported will have rating symbols at the end of the "Comment" section. These represent the opinion of the reviewing committee. Symbols used indicate as follows: 公Average, 公公Above Average, 公公公Exceptional, 公公公Outstanding.

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

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



• Chapter fifty-three

Variety in Setup and Getout Modules (continued)

By Calvin Campbell, Alameda, New Mexico

This month we continue the chapter on setups and getouts with a short wrap-up on the former and an informative section on the latter. As we've indicated previously, not all callers will want to become involved in all of the different concepts of choreography, but they should have this material available when, and if, needed.

• Quadrant rotation of setups opens up a whole new world of variety for the dancer. It is particularly useful in teaching square dance classes. Whenever you teach a new basic you need to be sure that the student can dance it from all positions and directions. At the same time you want to provide a certain level of repetition to give the dancers a chance to practice the new moves. This usually means building several zero modules featuring the new basic in a variety of ways. By also rotating the setups, you can direct the dancers through several of these routines and quickly have them dancing the basic from all directions as well as all positions. Variety is maintained because approaching the same routine from a different direction changes the feel of the routine for the dancers. The caller can blend together the right mixture of variety, repetition, and position and still remain comfortably in control of the dance.

Variety in Getouts

Getouts in square dancing are modules of calls used to move the dancers from a known reference point (FRA) back to a normal static square (zero square). Usually the getout will be to a left allemande or to a right and left grand, however, they need not be limited to just these two commands. These two have become convenient end points where the dancer can recognize that he is back into a static square and can resume dancing if the set has broken down. You can easily imagine how the term getout could have originated. The first hash or sight callers probably found themselves recognizing certain dancer arrangements and then said, "How do I get out of this mess?" In recent years square dance choreographers have evolved names for many recognized formations. In 1975 CALLERLAB recommended uniform names for 46 of these formations. Getout examples could be written for any boy-girl combination of any of these formations (FRA). This would be a formidable task and the memorization of all of these getouts would be out of the question for the average square dance caller. From a practical viewpoint most callers pick out a few easily recognizable FRA arrangements and use these as reference points for building getouts. Even the accomplished

sight caller uses memorized getout modules and limits the number of FRA arrangements used for these modules.

The two most commonly used reference points (FRA arrangements) used for getouts are the 1P2P (zero) line and the Box 1-4 (zero box). As a quick review, a 1P2P line can be set up by having the head couples lead right and circle to a line; a Box 1-4 can be set up by having the head couples square thru four hands (review the sections on Setups earlier in this Chapter).

The shortest getout from these two reference points is simply left allemande and promenade. However, depending on the choreography of the preceding module, this may or may not be a convenient place to interject a left handed movement. If you will check the hand flow in your setups and zeros you will find the large number of modules end with a left hand. The getout module is used to move the dancers to a position where the left allemande can be done smoothly and comfortably. Table 6 illustrates two examples.



Variety in Formations for Getouts


A left allemande can also be called from a variety of other formations. If you call star thru, square thru three quarters from a 1P2P line (ZL), you will end up in a trade by formation. The people facing in the center of the set will have their corner directly in front of them. The people facing away from the center of the set will have their corner beside them. For these two outside couples, the corner will be on the man's right. (See Figure A.)

If you call star thru, square thru three quarters from a Box 1-4 (ZB) you will end up with the dancers in two lines of four facing out. The corner is in the correct position in the square, but since everyone is facing out all the corners will be on the man's right. (See Figure B.)

Notice that in both cases the left hand is the next free hand so the smoothness of hand flow is maintained. However, in both cases some of the dancers must turn toward each other in order to do the left allemande. This requires a compensating movement on the part of the dancers which, nonetheless, becomes smooth and flowing with experience. Notice also that in this case the same getout works from both a Box 1-4 (ZB) and a 1P2P line (ZL). By substituting clever equivalents you should be able to come up with many getouts built around this idea.

Surprise Getouts

The surprise getout may be one of the above, depending on the experience of the dancers and the expertise of your calling. The surprise comes as a result of calling a routine which presents each dancer to his corner when least expected. The calling of surprise getouts must be timed well to be effective and they must be used with discretion. Don't overuse them. You will get a much bigger response when you use them at the right time and the right place. Table 7 gives four examples which illustrate the idea but by no means exhaust the supply.

Getouts Without An Allemande Left

Getouts do not always have to include a left allemande. In fact, it is a good idea to occasionally eliminate the left allemande. You can easily design

getouts which end with a swing and promenade with the original partner. Just replace the usual left allemande with a corner do sa do and back to the partner and swing. Either promenade from here or, if the dancers happen to be in their home positions, just take off with the next setup module.

Getouts to a right and left grand offer another fun way to interject variety into getouts. The first time you try this you will normally find that the dancers have to almost stop and think before they can do a right and left grand without a preceding left allemande. Table 8 illustrates four examples.

Any time you choose to use an unusual getout, keep in mind that the dancers need to have frequent points where they can feel a sense of accomplishment. This point is usually achieved when everyone in the square recognizes that fact that they are back in normal sequence with their original partner. This is why the left allemande has become the traditional point where the dancers let out that whoop of joy. They came to enjoy dancing and don't ever let your choreographic imagination get in the way of that basic fact.





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
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


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
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
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
