OBAMA SURGES

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DURHAM, NH – Barack Obama has surged ahead of Hillary Clinton in New Hampshire. Voters now see Obama as the candidate best able to defeat the Republicans in November.

These findings are based on the latest **CNN / WMUR New Hampshire Primary Tracking Poll*** conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Three hundred forty-one-nine (341) randomly selected likely New Hampshire Democratic primary voters were interviewed by telephone between January 5 and 3 p.m. January 6, 2008. The margin of sampling error is +/- 5%.

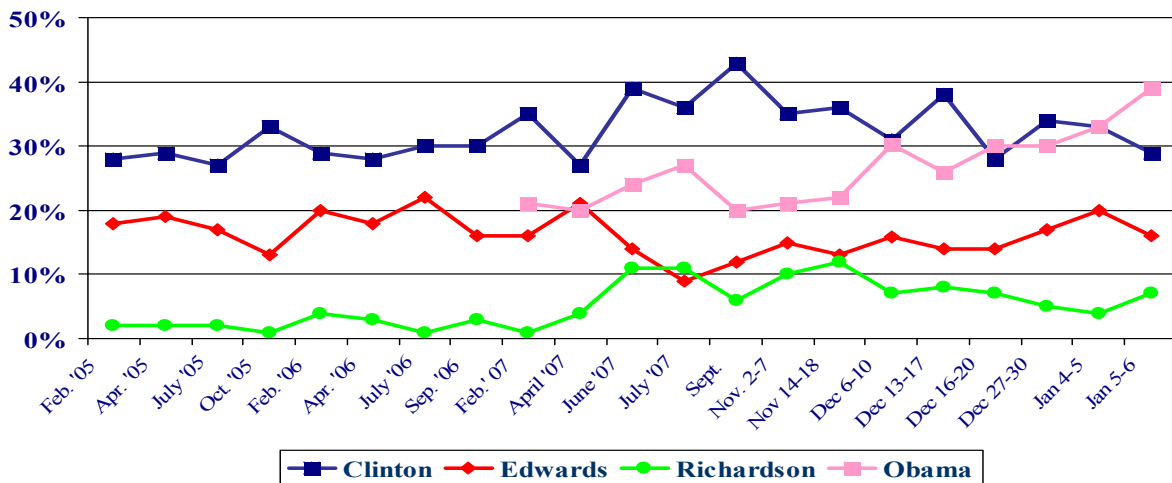
Illinois Senator Barack Obama has surged ahead in New Hampshire and now holds a double digit lead over New York Senator Hillary Clinton. In the latest CNN/WMUR poll, Obama 39% of likely Democratic primary voters, 29% favor Clinton, 16% favor former North Carolina Senator John Edwards, 7% prefer New Mexico Governor Bill Richardson, 2% favor Ohio Congressman Dennis Kucinich, 1% want some other candidate, and 5% say they are still undecided.

Obama's strongest support comes from younger voters and highly educated Democrats. Clinton gets her strongest support from older voters and those with lower levels education.

New Hampshire Democrats, like those in Iowa, believe "change" is more important than experience in 2008. Sixty-seven percent said change is more important this year, 24% think experience is more important, and 9% don't know. Among those voters who think change is more important, 50% support Obama, only 22% favor Clinton, and 20% favor Edwards.

"In Democratic nominations, there is typically an establishment candidate and an outsider candidate. Clinton and Obama are filling those roles in 2008," said Andy Smith, UNH political Science professor and Director of the UNH Survey Center. "The establishment candidate usually has more money, more endorsements, and high national support. But when the outsider can match up on campaign resources, and when they are perceived to be as electable as the establishment candidate, they can pull of an upset, like Jimmie Carter did in 1976,"

NH Democratic Presidential Primary – Likely Democratic Primary Voters

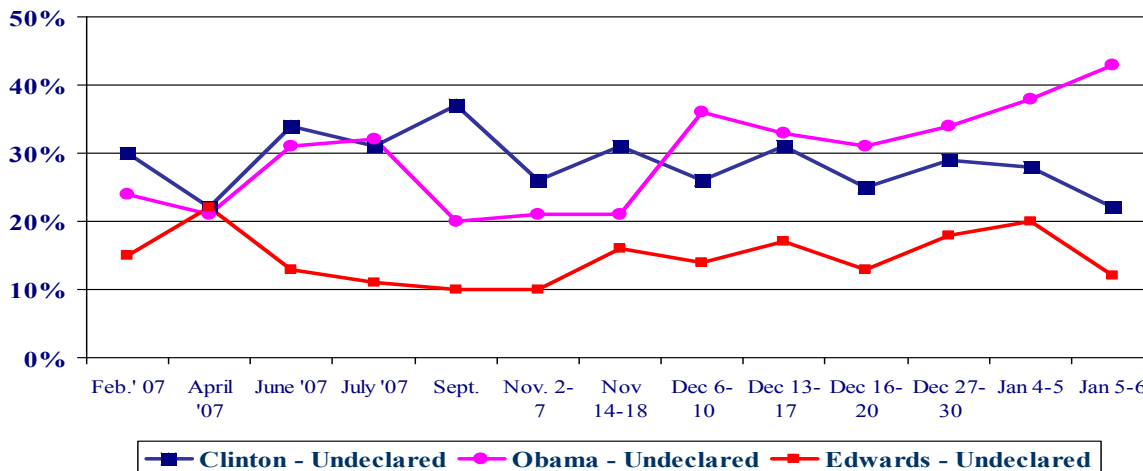

Undeclared Voters

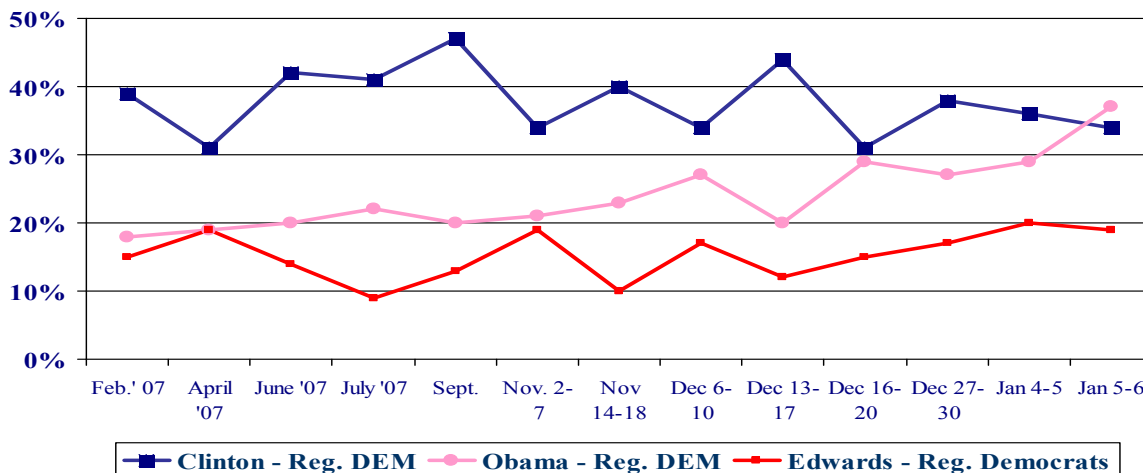
Undeclared voters, often referred to as Independents, can vote in either the Democratic or Republican primary. Currently, 51% of undeclared voters say they plan to vote in the Democratic primary. Among those undeclared voters who say they will vote in the Democratic primary, Obama holds a narrow lead over Clinton by 43% to 22% with 12% favoring Edwards, and 12% supporting Richardson. Obama has led among undeclareds for the past month.

But according to this latest poll, registered Democrats make up 63% of likely voters. Clinton had led among this group but now trails Obama 37% to 34% with 19% favoring Edwards and 4% preferring Richardson.

Still Making Up Their Minds

Even though there are only 2 days until the election, only 55% of likely Democratic primary voters say they have definitely decided who they will vote for, 25% say they are leaning toward a candidate and 20% said they are still trying to decide. Among voters who say they have definitely decided who they will vote for 46% support Obama, 32% support Clinton, and 15% name Edwards.

Candidate Qualities

Likely Democratic primary voters were asked several questions about characteristics of the Democratic candidates. Obama's victory in Iowa, and Clinton's loss, have made him the more electable candidate in the eyes of Democratic voters. Forty-two percent of likely Democratic primary voters believe Obama has the best chance of defeating the GOP candidate in November, only 31% think Clinton has the best chance, and 12% think Edwards has the best chance. Earlier this week, Clinton held a 45% to 22% advantage over Obama on this measure.

Clinton is still seen as the candidate with the right experience to be President – 41% name Clinton, only 16% name Obama, 13% name Richardson, and 11% name Edwards.

On the important issue of change, Obama is clearly seen as the candidate best able to bring needed change to the U.S. – Obama is named by 45% followed by Clinton (25%) and Edwards (14%).

Obama is also seen as the candidate who best represents the voter's values – 34% think Obama best represents their values, 26% think Clinton does, 18% name Edwards, and 7% name Richardson.

But perhaps Obama's greatest strength is his ability to inspire voters – 59% say Obama the most inspiring candidate, 18% name Clinton, and 14% name Edwards.

Historic Candidates

Most Democrats think the country is ready to elect a black candidate – 79% think the country is ready, 14% think the country is not ready, and 7% are not sure. Similarly, 76% think the country is ready to elect a woman president, 16% think the country is not ready, and 8% are not sure.

CNN / WMUR NH Primary Tracking Poll Methodology

The **CNN / WMUR New Hampshire Primary Tracking Poll** is conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Three hundred forty-one (341) randomly selected likely New Hampshire Democratic primary voters were interviewed by telephone between January 5 and 3 p.m. January 6, 2008. The margin of sampling error is +/- 5%. Results reported for other subgroups have potential for somewhat larger variation than those for the entire population.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of voters and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.
