LYNCH JOB APPROVAL STAYS HIGH

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DURHAM, NH – New Hampshire Governor John Lynch continues to enjoy extremely high job approval. Education funding continues to top the list of concerns.

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll**,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. The Granite State Poll is sponsored by CNN and WMUR-TV, Manchester. Five hundred twenty-four (524) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by telephone between July 9 and July 17, 2007. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-4.3 percent.

Gubernatorial Approval

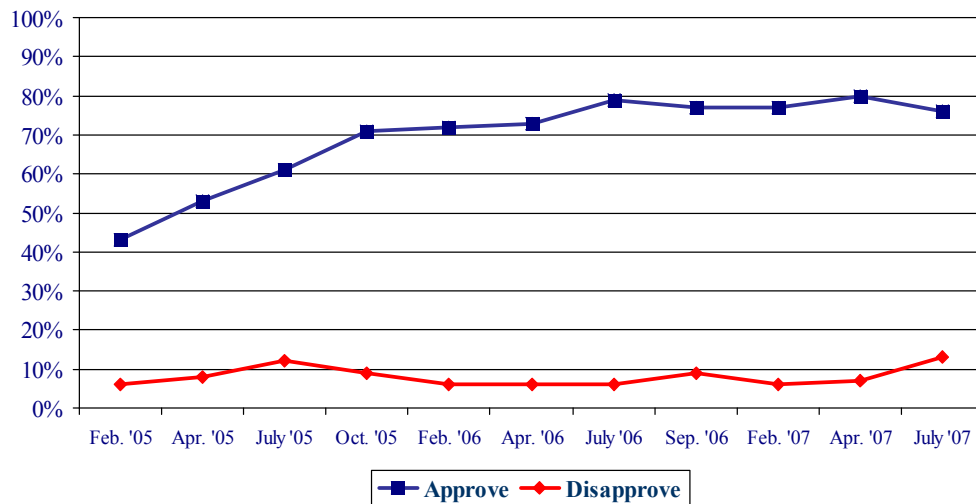
John Lynch's approval rating as New Hampshire Governor, which reached a record high in the April Granite State Poll, dropped slightly but remains at extremely high levels. In the most recent Granite State Poll, 76 percent of New Hampshire adults say they approve of the job Lynch has done as governor, 13 percent disapprove, and 11 percent are neutral.

"The Republican Party will have to work very hard to try to reduce support for Lynch," said Andrew Smith, Director of the UNH Survey Center. "If approval for Lynch stays above 60 percent, it means that he will most likely be reelected in 2008 and if it stays over 70 percent, it will be very difficult for Republicans to retake the State House and Senate."

"The Governor still gets high marks from the public for governing in a bipartisan way, despite the fact that he now leads a Democratic majority in the legislature," said Dante Scala of the University of New Hampshire's Political Science department. "It's tough for the opposing party to make political inroads against a personally popular leader who governs during good economic times."

Lynch gets high job approval ratings Democrats (90%) and Independents (77%), but his support among Republicans has declined somewhat to 56 percent. In April, 74 percent of Republicans said they approved of the job Lynch was doing as Governor.

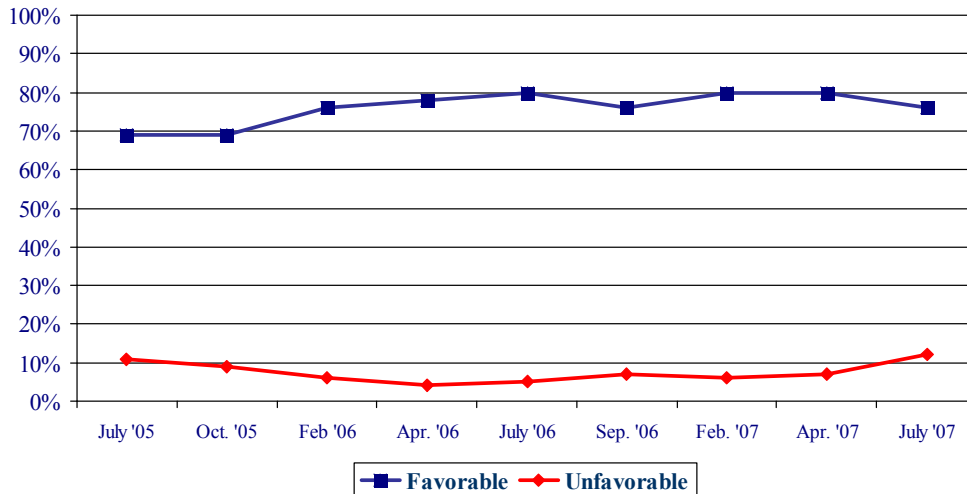
NH Gubernatorial Approval – John Lynch

Lynch's personal favorability rating is also very high. In the latest Granite State Poll, 76 percent of New Hampshire residents say they have a favorable opinion of Lynch, 12 percent have an unfavorable opinion, 8 percent are neutral, and 5 percent say they don't know enough about him to say. Lynch's net favorability rating, the percentage having a favorable opinion minus the percentage having an unfavorable opinion, remains extremely high at +64 percent.

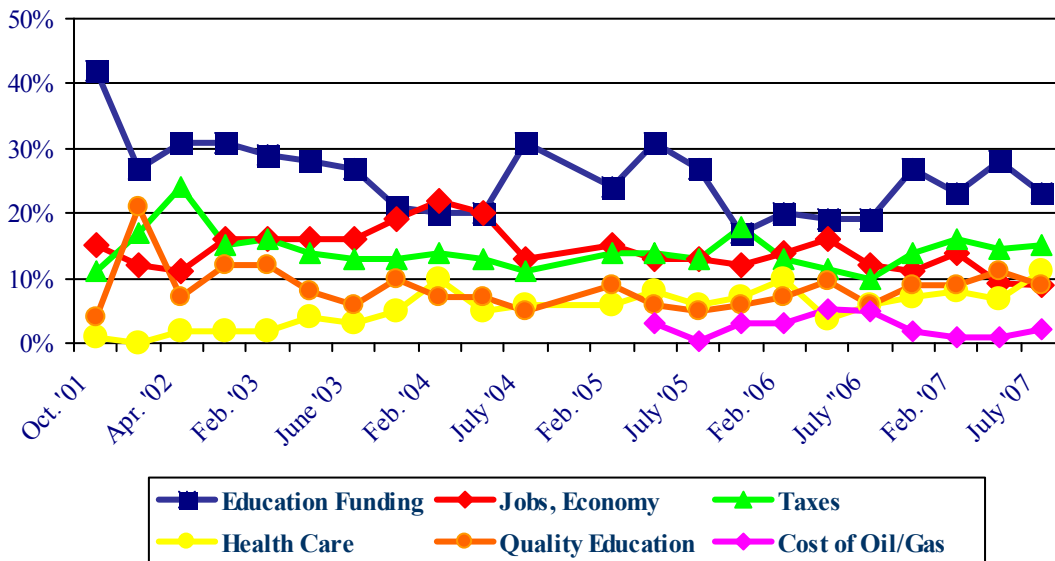
Favorability Ratings – NH Governor John Lynch



Most Important Problem Facing New Hampshire

As the Legislature and the Governor try to cope with the recent NH Supreme Court decision throwing out the latest plan to deal with education funding, this problem will continue to dominate the legislative calendar in Concord. How to fund primary and secondary education is also seen as the most important problem facing the state of New Hampshire, cited by 23 percent of New Hampshire adults, followed by high taxes and desires to change the tax system (15%), health care issues (11%), jobs and the economy (9%), and the quality of education (9%).

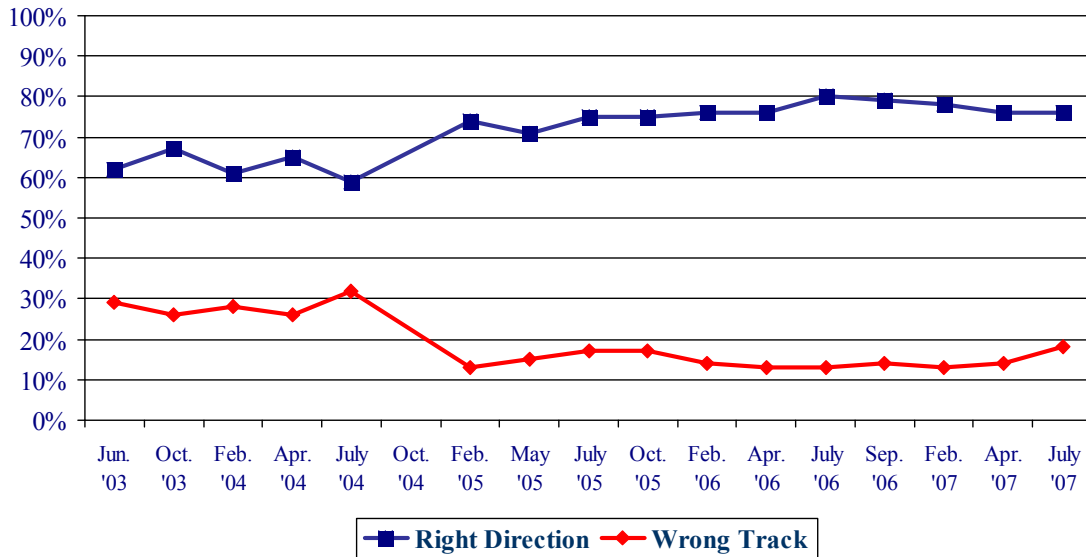
Most Important Problem Facing NH



Right Direction or Wrong Track?

Granite Staters are extremely optimistic about the future of New Hampshire. Seventy-six percent think things in New Hampshire are generally going in the right direction, 18 percent think things are seriously off on the wrong track, and 6 percent say they don't know. This indicator of optimism about the state has remained at very high levels over the past two years. By comparison, only 34% of New Hampshire adults believe the United States is headed in the right direction.

Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll** conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. The Granite State Poll is sponsored by CNN and WMUR-TV, Manchester. Five hundred twenty-four (524) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by telephone between July 9 and July 17, 2007. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-4.3 percent.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.
