Squares." Scotty's work with an oil company in Indonesia allows him to occasionally fly into Singapore, where the club is located. Anytime he hits town the club members quickly band together and have a dance. This reminds us of two clubs, one in Peru, South America, and the other in Valdez, Alaska. Each boasted of three couples who were always eager for an opportunity to dance anytime an extra couple showed up which, incidentally, was not too often.

The Plimptons of Sarasota, Florida, plan to set out next year and visit all 50 states. So what's unusual about that you ask? Well, Charlie and Phyllis will be doing it all in a 1930 Model A Ford. They'll leave home some time in the early spring, head west across the Great Plains States, ship the car by boat to Hawaii, then back to the mainland and up to the Pacific Northwest where they and the "A" will board a coastal steamer for Alaska. The project will take the better part of a year but the Plimptons are in no hurry and hope to square dance in every state they visit. We'll be following them with picture coverage once their venture gets underway.

Another Idea

Now that Legacy — the International Square Dance Leadership coordinating group — has taken over the sponsorship of Square Dance Week (September 21-27, 1981) we get wind of another idea. This one comes from veteran caller, Vaughn Parrish, Boulder, Colorado,

According to Vaughn, if most new-dancer classes start about the same time, in the early fall each year, under the new Callerlab program they're all going to be completing their 29 weeks about the same time — somewhere in mid-April or early May. Or, if you want to be more specific, an every-Tuesday group of new dancers that starts on October 6, 1981 and goes "dark" two Tuesdays in December and for one reason or another skips at least one other session during the seven and a half months, should reach night 29 on or about May 12.

Picking up on the Parrish Plan, why not set aside the first part of May as New Dancer Days highlighted by "Coming Out" parties, club "Open House" dances and even festivals and jamborees — with all the dancing geared to the new Callerlab 48 Basic Program? This could end up by being the local dance-event-of-the-year with the spotlight being focused on the newly trained dancer, with all

dancers in the area joining in.

Under the new concept of a Basic Square Dance Program that reaches its destination point in less than 30 weeks, it is a present possibility with everyone, dancers, callers and teachers working together, for this fresh 1981-'82 crop of dancers to be ushered into a program they can enjoy for as long as they wish or until they become adept at this plateau and choose to move on to more lessons, to reach further out into Mainstream and other levels beyond.

The idea sounds worthy of serious consideration. We can see such a program catching on, with local associations coordinating the parties and sponsoring the *commencement* festivals and jamborees. It's one way of making the new dancers feel welcome and, by establishing a time frame for the celebrations, the attention of the community is more likely

to be attracted to the activity.

Those of you on the distaff side have discovered that a built-in problem for some ladies who call is the sad fact that singing call accompaniment discs are all too often recorded in a key that is anything but comfortable for the girls. Working with Mickey McFar-

land, Norm plans to issue a number of records pitched more comfortably to the ladies' voices. This should be a much needed innovation. No release date at the minute.

Just received a delightful package from the people at the Lloyd Shaw Foundation — a set of two marvelous L.P. recordings with the title: "Songs of the Southwest" by Pancho and Marie Baird. The Bairds, as some of you may recall, are legends in the world of calling and folk singing. Pancho still does the old favorites like "Smoke on the Water" which he put together back in the 78 rpm recording days. Over the past 30 years or so the Bairds, who live in New Mexico, have been faithfully researching the cowboy songs of the Western United States and this set of records beautifully tells much in song and story. The familiar "Cool Water" and "Red River Valley" numbers are interspersed with the less familiar (to us) "I'd Like to be in Texas" and "Little Joe the Wrangler" which sounds for all the world like the tune of the quadrille, "Little Old Log Cabin in the Lane.

It's a great set if you're into good folk songs of America's past and we think you'll enjoy

We had nothing to talk about — nothing in common. We were actually getting sick and tired of each other until a visit to our doctor and the suggestion we try square dancing changed our lives and saved our marriage."

Of course the *change* came with finding new interests, with sharing an activity that husband and wife could enjoy *together* and with it came new friends, new topics of conversation and, consequently, a new zest for living. Does this sound familiar to you?

It is a familiar topic to Dr. Dale Van Wormer who, in addition to being an enthusiastic square dancer and an accomplished caller, has many times suggested square dancing to his patients. We asked Dale to put his thoughts down on paper so they could be shared with you. If you like them, you may wish to share them with your doctor.

With the new recruiting season almost upon us you might like to give photostat copies of the article to some of your non-dancing friends, to the pastor of your church or to the members of the local service group or P.T.A.

A Doctor Looks at Square Dancing

Dale E. VanWormer, M.D., Tulsa, Oklahoma

You would never believe I was pronounced dead from a heart attack two years ago." Rich, a stocky grey-haired man of 50 stood on the polished floor grinning at his fellow square dancers. They stared and shook their heads in disbelief for he looked the perfect picture of health. But Rich was not exaggerating. He had suffered not one, but two devastating heart attacks. Rich had held a tension-filled job that presented him with many problems. Early one morning he awoke with crushing chest pains. Doctors pronounced him dead on arrival in the emergency room, but vigorous resuscitation

brought back a faint heart beat.

Many weeks later Rich left the hospital. Frightened and depressed, he sat at home anticipating the next attack. It came. Following his recovery, his doctor advised him to get busy doing something. He took an early retirement and decided to follow the doctor's

advice about an exercise program.

Shortly thereafter, Rich and his wife joined the beginner's square dance class I was teaching for the Double Ring Square Dance Club in Tulsa, Oklahoma. He explained his problem to me. I told him square dancing was just the thing he needed. They completed the lessons and joined the club. They now dance three nights a week. Rich has taken a different job. He is a relaxed, smiling, enthusiastic human being. Even his doctor is amazed at his recovery.

I'm not. Like thousands of other doctors in the nation, I appreciate the importance of a controlled and progressive exercise program for patients recovering from a heart attack. I also recognize square dancing can be the ideal solution for those needing such a program. The American Medical Association Council on Scientific Affairs recommends regular exercise for the post-heart attack individual. These medical experts suggest the chosen exercise program is critical. Exercise testing is important, as some types of heart disease are made worse by vigorous activity. Those with a need for less vigorous exercise can be advised and taught to dance easily, comfortably and without strain.

Square dancing can fulfill all the criteria for

the exercise program recommended by the council. Active dancing burns more calories than bicycle riding for the same length of time. In addition, it provides other healthful benefits.

Now, consider the case of my good friend, Joe. Joe could never stand up and speak before a group. He was literally speechless. Three years ago Joe took up square dancing. Today, he takes the microphone during intermissions and makes the announcements. His palms still sweat but he speaks with authority. He almost refused to serve as club president because of that one responsibility. He still doesn't look forward to it, nor does he enjoy it, but he can do it.

Where did he get the confidence to risk ridicule, criticism and whatever else he thought might happen? His confidence came with success as a dancer. He learned it was almost painless to make a mistake when he was supported by his fellow students. Everyone shared their successes and their errors.

Importance of Self Confidence

Self confidence is healthy. He feels better about himself, and everything else as well. He tells me his job performance has improved. "My boss tells me its my attitude," Joe says. "I'm a lot more sure of myself these days." Those of us who know him agree.

Square dancing can serve as the catalyst for many quiet, talented reserved couples who never allowed themselves to participate in the activities around them. Jake and Ellen are good examples of this. They attended the married couples' group at their Tulsa church for years. They sat quietly and rarely said more than a few words. They helped when asked, and always went to the special parties and events.

They were serving the barbecue at a western theme party when we first met. He had a hearty handshake and a grin, but was obviously embarassed when my wife spoke to him. When I picked up the microphone and asked everyone to join hands in a big circle, I wasn't surprised to see them hesitate, anxiously look around, and finally join the others. Ellen was graceful. Jake was not, but he tried. When we left he mumbled something, his eyes fixed on my feet.

That group asked me to give them a set of beginning square dance lessons and formed a

club. One of the many obstacles Jake eventually conquered was holding a woman's hand. At the end of a year, he would put both arms around his corner on the command "yellowrock." It was almost another year before he could return the gentle hug.

What Was I Missing?

Several years have passed. Their church friends are amazed. They lead the class, plan and organize the activities and serve as greeters at the door. Jake looks you in the eye and his cheerful voice can easily be heard as he walks around the square dance hall greeting friends and making visitors welcome. "I was only half alive," he confides to me, "I didn't know what I was missing." Ellen beams as she sees the talents she always knew were there, finally being used.

Jake and Ellen are not isolated examples. I have seen square dancing bring other shy individuals out of their shell. Like Jake's minister, who told me he was as amazed at the change, other non-square dancers wonder what has happened to their once timid

friends.

Square dancing provides an activity where it is acceptable to "let the child out." Persons can express themselves in a boisterous but socially acceptable manner, and can dress in what to some might appear to be outlandish costumes. They have learned that touching another human is a pleasant and non-threatening experience. Psychologists know normal human development does not occur without touch. Touching is part of square dancing.

Square dancing also allows the participant the healthful experience of instant success. We all know how we feel when we have been successful, no matter what the endeavor. The experience feels good. As each new dancer learns something he feels a sense of accomplishment. Success breeds confidence in his or her ability.

Self acceptance is another healthful aspect of square dancing. Each day most of us don a uniform, a disguise or a mask that portrays what we believe the rest of the world thinks

our appearance should be.

We wear labels. Most of our labels are dependent upon our occupation: accountant, secretary, farmer, housewife. Each label carries an aura with it. An entirely different re-

sponse occurs when someone is introduced to you as the janitor of Brown and Company than when one is introduced as Mr. Brown of Brown and Company. Our label not only creates a response in those who see it, it usually assigns us to a particular level in the work world in which we perform. This stratification, which we know exists in large corpora-

tions, exists everywhere.

Square dancing, however, allows each of us to be ourselves. Tensions disappear along with the label. My experience has been that not one of the dancers in the set I join cares what my label is in the business world. It is replaced by "square dancer" when I walk through the door of the square dance hall. I'm not concerned about having my appearance, behavior and attitude prejudged. I'll never forget the little lady who discovered my occupation after she had danced with me for more than a year. "But you don't act like a doctor," she told me in just a bit of a concerned tone. "Thank you," I replied with gratitude and sincerity.

Don't misunderstand me. Organization does exist in square dancing, just as it must in any activity in which there are many participants. The pleasant aspect, however, is that it is voluntary. Your particular business related expertise may be needed and gratefully ac-

cepted if you volunteer it.

Opportunity to be a Leader

In many instances square dancing affords leadership opportunities to those who might never have such an opportunity, nor desire it, in their occupation. The club president may well be the janitor and the president of a large company an enthusiastic member of the entertainment committee. Both are happy square dancers, successful in the jobs for which they were chosen by their fellow dancers, and reaping the recognition they deserve for a job well done. The recognition is just as important to the successful executive as it is to the successful janitor.

More than two thirds of patients seen in doctor's offices with physical complaints have non-physical problems. Headaches, backaches, excessive tiredness and stomach upsets are only a few of the illnesses we physicians hear about every day. Most are related to

tension and conflict.

The mind is powerful; witness the Indian Fakir who walks on hot coals and pushes nails



through his flesh without pain or bleeding. One can and does become physically ill as a result of the constant mental stress to which many of us are exposed. Too often the physical symptoms are dominant and the need for relief from the mental bombardment is not recognized. Just as often the tension is noted and treated with temporary measures. Improvement occurs. Too often the temporary solution becomes chronic. The result is that a phenomenal number of tension relieving drugs and sedatives are swallowed by Americans month after month. Alcoholism is a serious problem. Too often it begins with a search for quick relief of tensions developed during 'a bad day at the office."

So, if you're in the need of a good exercise program or would like to find a way to relieve tension and anxiety, consider square dancing. It is good for you. A square dancer is concentrating, relaxing and enjoying the company of friends. I have lost count of the numbers of dancers who have told me this story: "I was exhausted when I came home this evening. If we hadn't been on the refreshment committee we wouldn't have come." These people have a smile on their face. They have just danced for

two hours, and they feel great.

Square dancing is good for you. If you don't believe me, take a look at any square dance hall. You'll see all the dancers are smiling. They look radiant and healthy.

Millions of Americans are taking pills and alcohol to help them solve their problems. But



A New World Record?

The 30TH NATIONAL Square Dance Convention is now a part of history. An estimated 24,000 to 25,000 dancers came to the Seattle Center the last week in June and, despite the large attendance, dancers apparently had sufficient room for comfortable dancing.

An estimated 18,000 participated in the giant Parade, filled the stadium and, before some 10,000 square dance viewers, *danced* a tip, hopefully setting a new tally for the Guinnes Book of Records. (The previous record, set July 13, 1950 in Santa Monica, California, and sponsored by this magazine, attracted 15,200 dancers — by engineer's count.)

All in all the 1981 Convention was an outstanding square dance event made all the more successful by the friendliness of the dancers of Washington State. The highlights were many. Special mention should be made of the pageant commemorating the role played by Dr. Lloyd "Pappy" Shaw and Mrs. Dorothy Stott Shaw in focusing the world's attention on the Great American Square Dance. The cast of more than a hundred deserve credit for a pair of fine performances.

On the critical side, several of the impor-

tant panels were scheduled right at meal time and consequently attracted only small atendance.

And one criticism which we have mentioned in covering past National Conventions. When some 18,000 dancers volunteer to take part in the Parade of States, line up a half hour or so before starting time, march into the main arena and then, standing, wait for perhaps a grand total of two hours until all the marchers have assembled — they are in no fit condition to stand another fifteen minutes or more for endless announcements and introductions. We doubt this will ever be corrected but we do feel it's important to consider the dancers' comfort in the future.

But it was a grand Convention and one that will be remembered in a positive way for a long time. Credit to General Chairman Don and Shirley Blanchard and all of the Washington workers for a job well done. A special "thank you" to Don and Helen Hulin and their publicity crew for their help over the past year and bunches of orchids to Bill and Pat Walker and all their cohorts for a dandy Asilomar Alumni "trail-in" dance. It was a ball!




Round dancing as seen by GRINDEN



Bob and Dee Voshell, Des Moines, Iowa

A S A TEAM, Bob and Dee Voshell presently serve as President of the Central Iowa Round Dance Association. They began square dancing, in 1959 and immediately felt they were missing out on something special between tips. So, in what was to them a natural sequence of events, this enthusiastic couple sought out round dance classes. Nine years later they began teaching basic classes. Today, along with having been associated in this regard with Adult Education in the Des Moines schools during the past several years, the Voshells have a host of leadership activities to their credit.

They were on staff of the Lake Superior

Weekend in Duluth, Minnesota, during its six years, on staff for five years with June Sensation in Springfield, Missouri, and are currently on the staff with Rochester Holiday in Minnesota, and Kamper Dancer in Ottumwa, Iowa. Bob and Dee were R/D Workshop Chairmen for the 1972 National Convention in Des Moines and have worked in many of the Iowa State conventions with teacher workshops and clinics. Just this past year, they were R/D Chairmen of the state convention.

Choreography also became an important part of Bob and Dee's contribution to round dancing. Their dances include Our Love, Spanish Harlem, Merry-Go-Round, Truck Stop, Cab Driver, If I Had To Do It All Over Again, Country Sounds, Falling In Love

Again and Loveland Waltz.

The Voshells feel particularly proud when they see their former students on the dance floor and this depth of feeling is extended even further now that two former students have joined the teaching field! The essence of their leadership is undoubtedly Bob and Dee's own expression of gratitude for the many true friendships formed, country-wide, through round dancing.

On Club Financing

Caller-operated clubs, in my experience, have had the poorest record in the finance department. A caller who rents the hall, collects the dues and pays all the bills is at the mercy of a fickle crowd, and if he doesn't have an inexpensive hall at his disposal and a red-hot reputation, the dancers will stay away once the novelty has worn off.

A workshop that charges only for those in attendance is also on shaky ground. Dancers stay away for the most trivial reasons and their financial support is spotty at best. Since they don't attend regularly, they often miss the announcement of club hoedowns and party dances, so the club may even lose

money on those occasions that they import an outside caller.

We have attended and belonged to both of the above type square dance organizations. They may thrive initially but in short order they fail. The caller-run group caters too much to the whims of dancers, trying to please everyone. The pay-as-you-dance clubs soon fail from financial anemia, irregular attendance and the never-ending problem of casual attendees causing break-down of squares. Those who don't attend with some regularity just cannot keep up reasonable levels of dancing skills.

On the other hand, where dancers pay regular dues by the month (or longer), the members are saying they have a commitment to their club. Moreover, having paid their dues, they are not inclined to waste their money by staying home for casual reasons. Their more regular attendance means they will keep up with the dance level and that the club will not have to depend on

money-making hoedowns.

This principle applies to beginner classes as well. And in our area we also have two Advanced-Challenge level clubs where members pony up \$14.00 and \$16.00 dues per couple per month.

On Anticipation

This is a word I have heard quite a bit in my six years of square dancing. I have no doubt that square dancers anticipate a call. Many callers move consistently from one call to another and when dancers get used to this, then they will anticipate. I admit that dancers should not anticipate, but I would like to come to the defense of the dancer in this situation.

First of all if callers wouldn't consistently call the same moves, they wouldn't have to worry about dancers anticipating. If the caller would challenge the

dancer consistently, there wouldn't be any anticipating.

Secondly, square dancing is rhythmic. It is done to the beat of the music. Dancers should be taught to dance to the beat and calls are given to the beat of music. If the dancers are supposed to dance to the music, then the callers should call to the music. If the caller gives a command, then he sitates one, two or maybe more beats of music, what does he expect the dancers to do? Who is doing the anticipating? If the caller goes ahead and calls, there would not be anticipation on the dancers' part. Sometimes it may be the caller's ego which plays a part in his chastising the dancers for anticipating.

On Mainstream Dancing and Dropouts

I HAVE AN IDEA which might help the situation of retaining members and newly graduated students. Why not have the callers restrict their calls to Main-

stream until refreshment time? After that, anything would go.

Over the past three years I have been associated with four local clubs. In each one members have dropped out because they couldn't keep up with the level. In one, the management fired the caller because his calling was not "advanced" enough. I find that the clubs are run by square dance buffs. Somebody has to do the work and fanatics are more likely to give of their time. But such personalities are ambitious and want to raise the level of dancing in their club. I've tried to get friends to take lessons but found they had already tried it and were burned. After they went through the course, they found their training was no good to them. There was nowhere they could dance. I think if many of them had the opportunity to dance Mainstream the first half of the evening, they might have stayed with square dancing. Think it over.

Our caller, Winnie Leister, has come up with what I consider an ideal way of running a club dance with several levels of dancers.


Before the first tip a number I is posted on the stage. This means that tip is a Mainstream tip. Number II is posted for the next tip which is Mainstream plus experimentals. The third tip is designated Number III which means Mainstream Plus 2. This rotation is continued throughout the evening and everyone is given a chance to dance at his preferred level and observe the other levels for which he feels he may not be qualified. Our new graduates have continued to enjoy their club dances and we, more experience dancers, also have something to keep us interested.


Convention and receive special recognition in the Convention Program Book.

The House that Dancers Built

By Jessie Mullen, Olympia, Washington

In 1962 OLYMPIA AREA square dancers talked of owning their own hall. They dreamed of building, maintaining and dancing in a self-supporting building of their own. One year later the hall was constructed and appropriately named — Lac-A-Do — because the lack of "dough" was a reality.

A generous dancer donated and deeded a plot of land. Next came rummage sales, benefits, animated discussions, work parties and some donations of building supplies. Dancers cleared the property, travelled to the hills to cut logs for supporting beams and cedar logs which were split into roof shakes. An abandoned railroad trestle was dismantled and hauled in for supporting timbers. Actual construction began in April, 1963; the first dance was held on New Year's Eve.

Policy Setting Board

At the present time, five square dance clubs in Thurston County each have two representatives on the Association Board, while two round dance clubs and teachers and callers each have one representative. This Board elects its own officers and determines

the policies and operational procedures, taking the business to the general membership for consideration and voting if necessary. Each member of each club is a voting member and pays \$1.00 membership fee to the Association when first joining a club.

The hall is used seven days a week for lessons, club dances and meetings — but only for

square and round dance activities.

In order to meet expenses and to keep costs down, several fund-raising events are held annually, including a New Year's Eve Dance, Memorial Day Campout, dance weekends, party dances for new classes and the entering of a float in Olympia's Lakefair Parade each July.

The original cost of the building is not available because so many donations and so much volunteer labor was included, but the building is now insured for \$90,000. Just last year the front parking lot area was blacktopped for

a cost of \$10,000.

When you are in the Olympia area, the Association invites you all to "come see and dance" in Lac-A-Do.

UPDATE:

The Canadian Square and Round Dance Society

By Art and Garrie Jackson, Ottawa, Ontaria

TN MAY, 1980, we decided to step down as edi-**L** tors of the Canadian Dancers News because we had been asked to take on the presidency of the Canadian Square & Round Dance Society. Even though I had taken an early retirement from the National Research Council in order to devote all my time to our dancing activities, we soon realized there were not enough hours in the day to get everything done, particularly when we were still teaching round dancing five nights a week.

However we are pleased that things are going extremely well with the Society. Square and round dance federations in each province and territory support the Society structurally but not financially. At the present time, finances are largely dependent upon the generosity of the regions that hold national conventions sanctioned by the Society with 75% of

the profits going to the Society.

In addition to this source of funds, the Society has received some financial support from the Canadian government for dance programs in the national sense, while provincial federations have received some grants from provincial governments to assist in the operation of schools and clinics, provide provincial representation at Callerlab, Roundalab, etc. It is expected that industry will be approached to provide a supporting role in the community. A good example of this is CPAir, Canada's second largest airline, which assists in moving Ontario K2C 3M1, Canada.

caller and leader staffs for schools and clinics around the country without making too much of a dent in the Society's own finances.

Each member of the seven-couple Board of Directors assumes responsibility for a particular program such as "Professional Development," i.e. caller and leader schools and clinics in Canada and leadership courses for dancers who find themselves on the executive of their club or association; "Program Development" which helps to establish more classes for senior citizens, the disabled, etc.; "Communications," and so on.

Offering a Service

The Society has sent a letter to the minister of education in each province across Canada offering the services of the Society in introducing square and round dancing as a regular feature in the curriculum for recreation in the elementary, high school and adult education programs as well as for disabled school children.

EXPERIMENTAL NOTES

SLIP CHAIN THE DIAMOND: From parallel facing diamonds: Wave centers trade and cast three quarters with the ends to form momentary waves; the wave ends and adjacents swing one half (arm turn one half), then the new centers cast three quarters.

From a static square: Heads square thru, step to a wave, girls hinge, Slip Chain The Diamond, facing diamond circulate, center girls trade, men quarter in, girls extend, scoot back, men run, pass thru, wheel and deal, square thru three quarters, allemande.

As recreation director for the city of Albany, Rod was constantly badgered by fellow recreation director, Fred Caswell of Cartersville, to include square dancing in the Albany program. Rod finally invited Fred to put on a one-night-stand and at the end of the evening Fred called Rod on stage and simply told the folks, "If you want to learn how to square dance then here is the man who will handle it for you!" They wanted to alright because requests to sign up became so numerous that Rod, in turn, had to get together with Fred and start learning how to handle the job.

With such an amazing beginning, who would have guessed by the 70's Rod would have taught Jimmy and Roslyn Carter to square dance? He did so while the President was a senator in the Georgia legislature. Among Rod's fondest memories are recollec-

Closer to home, Rod's first class became The Rafter Rockers, the first square dance club in Albany. It is still one of the most active clubs in the state. Rod also calls for four other clubs reserving weekends for traveling. Rod was the first president of the Georgia Caller's Association. For many years he has been staff caller for the Jekyll Island Jamboree as well as on staff at the Rock Eagle Spring Fling. A member of Callerlab since 1975, Rod is the creator of the movement, "spin chain thru."

A strong believer that square dancing is for fun and for health, Rod Blaylock urges all to keep mentally and physically fit, and suggests that dancers and callers alike experience both mental and physical rejuvenation, in the highest sense, during a square dance.

HOW TO USE THE RECORD REPORT

To get the best possible analysis all singing calls are checked and rated by two sources. First, a rating is made by a square of dancers that actually dances to each record. The records are then sent to another reviewer who rates them on recording quality, instrumentation, clarity of commands, and body mechanics. The final "star" rating is based on a consensus of the reports from both. In all cases and unless otherwise noted, it may be assumed that singing calls are recorded in a medium range. In the case of hoedowns the key will be included.



Each report gives an analysis of the record and the dance. The shaded area in the chart indicates the voice range used by most recording companies. By comparing the voice range letters in each analysis with those on the chart, you should be able to determine the record's suitability to your voice. Occasionally a report will be starred (*) in which case you will find the call reproduced in the Workshop section of the same issue.
