ECONOMIC CONFIDENCE SLIPS IN NH

DURHAM, NH – New Hampshire consumers are still positive about the economic prospects of the state and of the country, but are less confident than in past months.

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll**,[?] conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. The Granite State Poll is sponsored by the University of New Hampshire. Five hundred two (502) randomly selected adults were interviewed by telephone between April 24 and May 2, 2005. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.4 percent.

U.S. Business Conditions

New Hampshire residents are fairly optimistic about the short-term prospects of the U.S. economy, but their expectations have been tempered in recent months. In the most recent Granite State Poll, 44 percent of New Hampshire residents say they expect businesses in the U.S. will experience good times in the next 12 months, 37 percent anticipate bad times for U.S. businesses, and 19 percent think conditions will be mixed. These figures are at their lowest level since the February, 2003 Granite State Poll and represent a 10 percentage point drop since February.

Granite Staters are split about long-term prospects for the U.S. economy. Forty percent of New Hampshire residents believe that the U.S. economy will experience continuous good times over the next 5 years, 40 percent expect periods of widespread unemployment and depression, and 19 percent see a mix of good and bad conditions. This measure of confidence in the economy has returned to 2003 levels after a slight increase was seen in 2004.

N.H. Business Conditions

Granite Staters are still optimistic about business conditions in New Hampshire – 56 percent of adults think New Hampshire will have good times economically in the next twelve months, 25 percent feel there will be bad times, and 19 percent foresee mixed conditions. Confidence in the New Hampshire economy has been consistently higher than confidence in the US economy since 2002. (It is important to note that this survey was conducted before the announced closing of the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard by the Base Closing and Realignment Commission.)

Personal Financial Conditions

When asked about their personal financial situations, 41 percent of Granite Staters say they are better off now than they were a year ago, 30 percent say they are worse off, and 29 percent say things are about the same. There has been little change in this measure over the past two years.

Turning to family finances a year from now, most people in New Hampshire think they will be better off, or at least the same. Thirty-two percent of New Hampshire residents believe they will be better off financially a year from now, 15 percent think they will be worse off and 52 percent think they will be about the same. This measure has also not changed significantly over the past year.

When asked about making major household purchases, 64 percent of New Hampshire adults feel that it is a good time to buy things such as furniture and appliances, 21 percent think it is a bad time, and 15 percent think it depends. This measure has declined slightly since February, but is still strongly positive..

Subgroup Analysis

There are few demographic differences in the economic expectations of New Hampshire residents, but there are meaningful political differences. Younger adults are more likely to say they are better off financially than they were a year ago and that they expect to be better off a year from now than are older adults, many of whom have recently retired or expect to retire soon. Residents of the Manchester area are more upbeat about their personal economic situations than are residents of other parts of the state. Republicans and conservatives are consistently more optimistic about current and future economic conditions than are Democrats and liberals.

Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the most recent Granite State Poll conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center from April 24 and May 2, 2005. A random sample of 502 New Hampshire adults was interviewed by telephone. In 95 of 100 cases, the statewide estimates will be accurate to plus or minus 4.4 percent. Results reported for other subgroups have potential for somewhat larger variation than those for the entire population.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.
