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LITTLE CHANGE IN RACE FOR PRESIDENT IN NH

Durham, NH – John Kerry continues to narrowly lead George Bush in New Hampshire. Craig Benson's lead over Democratic challenger John Lynch is also relatively unchanged in the race for New Hampshire Governor.

These findings are based on the 2004 WMUR / UNH New Hampshire Tracking Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. This survey is sponsored by WMUR-TV Manchester and the University of New Hampshire.* Eight hundred fifty (850) likely New Hampshire voters were interviewed between October 27 and October 29, 2004. Presidential Election

The race between John Kerry and George Bush in New Hampshire is still very close. In the latest WMUR / UNH New Hampshire Tracking Poll, 50 percent of likely voters say they will vote for Kerry, 46 percent will vote for Bush, 1 percent will vote for Ralph Nader or some other candidate, and 3 percent remain undecided. The most important issues to voters in the presidential election continue to be the war in Iraq (25%), the war on terrorism (20%), and jobs and the economy (18%).

Kerry runs strongest among Democrats and in the North Country, the Connecticut Valley, and in the vote-rich Seacoast. Bush does best among Republicans and in the Manchester area. Kerry leads among swing voters by 54 percent to 34 percent.

Gubernatorial Election

In the race for New Hampshire Governor, incumbent Republican Craig Benson leads over John Lynch 47 percent to 44 percent with 1 percent favoring some other candidate, and 8 percent still undecided. Benson has consistently been below 50 percent in the WMUR / UNH tracking poll. This is an indication that his reelection is in jeopardy as undecided voters typically break toward the challenger. The most important issues in the race for Governor are taxes (29%), education funding (17%), jobs and the economy (14%), and ethics in government (12%).

Benson and Lynch do well among their partisans and tied among swing voters. Benson does best in Massachusetts border towns and in Manchester. Lynch's strongest support comes from voters in the Connecticut Valley, the North Country, and in the Seacoast.

U.S. Senate

Incumbent Republican Senator Judd Gregg still holds a commanding lead over Democratic challenger "Granny D" Haddock. Sixty-three percent of likely voters prefer Gregg, 23 percent prefer Granny D, 1 percent favor some other candidate and 13 percent are still undecided. Gregg has maintained a wide lead over Granny D throughout the race.

U.S. Congress

The race for U.S. Representative from New Hampshire's First Congressional district has narrowed slightly. Currently, 57 percent favor incumbent Republican Jeb Bradley, 31 percent favor Democrat Justin Nadeau, 1 percent favor some other candidate, and 12 percent are undecided. Bradley held a 60 percent to 26 percent lead in yesterday's WMUR / UNH tracking poll.

In the Second District, incumbent Republican Charlie Bass leads Democrat Paul Hodes 58 percent to 32 percent, with 1 percent preferring some other candidate and 9 percent undecided.
