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## **KERRY TAKES NARROW LEAD IN NH**

Durham, NH – John Kerry holds a narrow lead over George Bush in the race for New Hampshire’s 4 electoral votes. Incumbent governor Craig Benson narrowly leads his Democratic challenger, John Lynch.

These findings are based on the 2004 WMUR / UNH New Hampshire Tracking Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. This survey is sponsored by WMUR-TV Manchester and the University of New Hampshire.\* Seven hundred fifty-eight (758) likely New Hampshire voters were interviewed between October 25 and October 27, 2004. The potential sampling error for the survey is  $\pm 3.6\%$ . ### **Presidential Election**

John Kerry has a narrow lead over George Bush in New Hampshire. Currently, 50 percent of likely voters say they will vote for Kerry, 46 percent will vote for Bush, 1 percent will vote for Ralph Nader or some other candidate, and only 3 percent remain undecided. In an early October WMUR / UNH poll, Bush held a 50 to 45 percent lead over Kerry. The most important issues to voters in the presidential election are jobs and the economy (22%), the war in Iraq (22%) and the war on terrorism (21%).

Kerry runs strongest among Democrats and in the Connecticut Valley. Bush does best among Republicans and in the Manchester area. Kerry leads among swing voters by 54 percent to 35 percent. There is a gender gap that favors Kerry – women prefer Kerry by a 54 percent to 41 percent margin while men prefer Bush 52 percent to 45 percent.

### **Gubernatorial Election**

In the race for New Hampshire Governor, incumbent Republican Craig Benson has taken a slight lead over John Lynch. Currently 47 percent of New Hampshire voters say they plan to vote for Benson, 44 prefer John Lynch, 1 percent favor some other candidate, and 9 percent are undecided. In an early October WMUR / UNH poll, Benson and Lynch were tied with 43 percent each. The most important issue to voters in the governors race are taxes (28%), education funding (18%), jobs and the economy (15%), and ethics in government (13%).

Benson and Lynch do well among their partisans and Lynch has a slight 46 percent to 41 percent lead among swing voters. Benson does best in the Massachusetts border town, where his anti-tax message plays especially well, and in Manchester. Lynch runs best in traditional Democratic strongholds near Concord and in the Connecticut Valley

### **U.S. Senate**

Incumbent Republican Senator Judd Gregg holds a commanding 62 percent to 23 percent lead over Democratic challenger “Granny D” Haddock with 1 percent preferring some other candidate and 13 percent remaining undecided. Gregg has maintained a wide lead over Granny D throughout the race.

### **U.S. Congress**

In New Hampshire’s First Congressional district, incumbent Republican Jeb Bradley leads Democrat Justin Nadeau by a comfortable margin – 60 percent of likely voters say they will vote for Bradley, 26 percent prefer Nadeau, and 14 percent are undecided.

In the Second District, incumbent Republican Charlie Bass leads Democrat Paul Hodes 57 percent to 30 percent, with 2 percent preferring some other candidate and 12 percent undecided.
