BENSON AND LYNCH TIED IN RACE FOR NH GOVERNOR

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DURHAM, NH – Democratic challenger John Lynch has pulled into a tie with incumbent Craig Benson in the race for New Hampshire governor. Benson is seen as better able to handle taxes and the cost of health care while voters think Lynch is better able to handle education funding, providing services, and ethical issues.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR Granite State Poll**,[?] conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. The Granite State Poll is sponsored by WMUR-TV, Manchester and the University of New Hampshire. Five hundred seventy-nine (579) randomly selected adults were interviewed by telephone between September 27 and October 3, 2004. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-4.1 percent. Included in this sample were 538 likely November 2004 voters. The margin of error for the likely voter sub-sample is +/- 4.3 percent. 2004 Gubernatorial Election

The race for governor of New Hampshire is in a dead heat between Governor Craig Benson and his Democratic challenger, Hopkinton businessman and former Chair of the University System of New Hampshire Board of Trustees, John Lynch. In the most recent WMUR Granite State Poll, 43 percent of likely voters say they plan to vote for Benson, 43 percent plan to vote for Lynch, 1 percent prefer some other candidate, and 13 percent are undecided. In the July WMUR Granite State Poll, Benson held a 46 percent to 39 percent lead over Lynch.

Favorability Ratings

Lynch has gained ground against Benson as he has become better known to voters in New Hampshire. Currently, 36 percent of likely voters say they have a favorable opinion of Lynch, 13 percent have an unfavorable opinion of him, 13 percent are neutral, and 38 percent don't know enough about him to say. Lynch's net favorability rating, the percentage who have a favorable opinion of him minus the percentage who have an unfavorable opinion of him, is a solid +23 percent. In July, Lynch's net favorability rating was +13 percent and 67 percent of likely voters did not know enough about him to say. "Lynch has run heavy rotations of television commercials throughout the late summer and fall, helping him become him better known, and better liked, by voters," said Andrew Smith, Director of the UNH Survey Center. "He has also run ads that are quite critical of Governor Benson and that has raised Benson's unfavorable ratings."

Craig Benson has not been able to reverse the slide in approval ratings that he suffered in the spring and early summer. Currently, 49 percent of likely voters have a favorable opinion of Benson, 38 percent have an unfavorable opinion of him, 8 percent are neutral, and 5 percent don't know enough to say. Benson's net favorability rating is +11 percent, unchanged from July. But in April, Benson's net favorability rating stood at a strong +33 percent and the decline is an indication of how successful the Lynch campaign has been in framing voter's opinions of Benson.

Turning to the job he is doing as Governor, 51 percent of New Hampshire adults approve of the job Benson is doing as Governor, 38 percent disapprove, and 11 percent are neutral. In July, 45 percent of Granite State adults approved of the job Benson was doing as Governor. Benson's job approval rating has been hovering around 50 percent throughout his term in office.

Issues

Voters were asked about which candidate would do a better job addressing several issues facing the state of New Hampshire. For the past ten years, New Hampshire adults have said that the most important issue facing the state is funding primary and secondary education and John Lynch is seen as being able to do a better job dealing with education funding. Forty-one percent of likely voters think Lynch can do a better job dealing with education funding, 36 percent think Benson can, and 23 percent are unsure.

New Hampshire voters have traditionally been opposed to either an income tax or a property tax to fund education and the issue of taxes is playing an important role in the race. Benson is seen as being better able to deal with taxes – 47 percent of likely voters think Benson will do the best job of dealing with taxes, 33 percent think Lynch will, and 20 percent are unsure.

The State of New Hampshire has had to reduce budgets in several agencies that provide services to citizens in New Hampshire and Lynch and Benson are campaigning over the meaning of these reductions. The Lynch campaign has portrayed Benson as cutting services to those least able to help themselves while the Benson campaign has portrayed the reductions as keeping the cost of providing services under control. Both campaigns can point to how they are winning the battle of public opinion on this issue. When asked which candidate would do the best job dealing with the cost of health – 42 percent of likely voters think that Benson would do a better job, 34 percent think Lynch would do a better job, and 24 percent are unsure. But when asked which candidate would do a better job providing services to citizens of NH, 44 percent said Lynch would do a better job, 34 percent think Benson would do a better job, and 22 percent are unsure.

The Lynch campaign, and the NH Democratic party, have run a series of campaign ads questioning the ethics of the Benson administration on several fronts. When asked which candidate would do a better job handling ethical issues, 43 percent think Lynch would do a better job, 32 percent think Benson would do a better job, and 25 percent are unsure.

Subgroup Analysis

Benson gets his strongest support from Republicans, conservatives, those who have lived in New Hampshire for 6 to 10 years, and residents of Hillsborough County. Lynch gets his strongest support from Democrats, liberals, union households, those aged 50 to 64, voters with post-graduate educations, and residents of Western New Hampshire

Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the most recent Granite State Poll conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center from September 27 to October 3 2004. A random sample of 579 New Hampshire adults was interviewed by telephone. In 95 of 100 cases, the statewide estimates will be accurate to plus or minus 4.1 percent. Included in this sample were 538 likely November 2004 voters. The margin of error for the likely voter sub-sample is +/- 4.3 percent. Results reported for other subgroups have potential for somewhat larger variation than those for the entire population.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.
