ECONOMIC CONFIDENCE IMPROVES IN NH

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DURHAM, NH – New Hampshire consumers are increasingly confident about the economy. Confidence in prospects for the New Hampshire and U.S. economies are at the highest levels seen during the Bush Administration.

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll**, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. The Granite State Poll is sponsored by the University of New Hampshire. Five hundred forty-two (542) randomly selected adults were interviewed by telephone between April 19 and April 26, 2004. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-4.3 percent. U.S. Business Conditions

Positive reports about economic growth in New Hampshire and the United States have been coming more frequently and consumers in New Hampshire have taken notice. In the most recent Granite State Poll, over half of New Hampshire residents (56%) say they expect businesses in the U.S. will experience good times in the next 12 months, 26 percent anticipate bad times for U.S. businesses, and 18 percent think conditions will be mixed. The percentage of New Hampshire residents who think the U.S. economy will experience good times is higher than at any time during George W. Bush's presidency.

Similarly, Granite Staters have become more bullish about longer term prospects for the U.S. economy. Almost half (45%) of New Hampshire residents believe that the U.S. economy will experience continuous good times over the next 5 years, 38 percent expect periods of widespread unemployment and depression, and 17 percent see a mix of good and bad conditions. This measure of confidence in the economy is also at a new high and represents a 6 percentage point increase since February.

"Consumer confidence is typically a lagging indicator of an economic recovery and New Hampshire residents have finally recognized that the economy is indeed on solid footing," said Andrew Smith, Director of the UNH Survey Center. "This news should brighten the mood in the campaigns of President Bush and Governor Craig Benson."

N.H. Business Conditions

Granite Staters are also increasingly optimistic about concerning business conditions in New Hampshire. When asked what they expect about business conditions in New Hampshire, 58 percent of adults think New Hampshire will have good times economically, 22 percent feel there will be bad times, and 20 percent foresee mixed conditions. This indicator is also at the highest levels measured during the Bush Administration.

Personal Financial Conditions

New Hampshire is optimistic about the state and U.S. economies, in part, because people are feeling better about their families' economic prospects. When asked about their personal financial situations, 45 percent of Granite Staters say they are better off now than they were a year ago, 23 percent say they are worse off, and 32 percent say things are about the

same. This has sharply risen since the Winter Granite State Poll which showed that only 34 percent believed they were better off than a year ago.

Turning to family finances a year from now, most people in New Hampshire think they will be better or at least the same. Thirty-eight percent of New Hampshire residents believe they will be better off financially a year from now, only 8 percent think they will be worse off and 54 percent think they will be about the same.

When asked about making major household purchases, 71 percent of New Hampshire adults feel that it is a good time to buy things such as furniture and appliances, 20 percent think it is a bad time, and 9 percent think it depends. This represents a 13 percentage point rise since February and also represents a record high for the Bush Presidency.

Subgroup Analysis

There are few demographic differences in the economic expectations of New Hampshire residents, but there are meaningful political differences. Republicans and conservatives are consistently more optimistic about current and future economic conditions than are Democrats and liberals. Younger adults are more likely to say they are better off financially than they were a year ago and that they expect to be better off a year from now than are older adults, many of whom have recently retired or expect to retire soon.

Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the most recent Granite State Poll conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center from April 19 to April 26, 2004. A random sample of 542 New Hampshire adults was interviewed by telephone. In 95 of 100 cases, the statewide estimates will be accurate to plus or minus 4.3 percent. Results reported for other subgroups have potential for somewhat larger variation than those for the entire population.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.
