

WMUR / WCVB NH PRIMARY POLL

INSIDE THE NH PRIMARY RACE

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DURHAM, NH – Howard Dean running away from the field in New Hampshire because he is in tune with the electorate and is viewed more favorably by the electorate.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR / WCVB NH Primary Poll**, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Four hundred forty-six (447) randomly selected likely Democratic primary voters were interviewed by telephone between December 10 and December 15, 2003. Assessing the Campaigns

Howard Dean

Former Vermont Governor Howard Dean leads the field in New Hampshire with 46 percent of the prospective vote and he is also leading in favorability ratings. Currently, 75 percent of likely Democratic primary voters say they have a favorable opinion of Dean, 14 percent have an unfavorable opinion, 5 percent are neutral, and 6 percent say they don't know enough about him to say. Dean's net favorability rating, the percentage of voters who have a favorable opinion minus the percentage who have an unfavorable opinion, is a very high +61 percent. Dean's favorability ratings have risen over the summer and have stayed very high throughout the fall, despite increasing attacks from his primary opponents. Also, 36 percent of likely primary voters say that Dean is the candidate they "like" the most.

But while candidate personality is important, New Hampshire voters say that a candidate's position on the issues is more important than their character or personality – 68 percent say that a candidate's position on the issues is most important to their vote, 14 percent say it is the candidate's character and personality, and 18 percent say it is a combination of both. One of the most important issues to likely primary voters is the war in Iraq. Dean's strong opposition to the war in Iraq has endeared him to liberals in New Hampshire, who made up more than half of the 2000 NH Primary electorate. Dean currently gets 68 percent of the liberal primary vote. Further evidence of Dean's being in tune with the New Hampshire primary electorate is seen in the results to a question which asked voters to name the candidate whose positions on the issues is closest to their own – 34 percent said this was Howard Dean.

John Kerry

Despite being the early favorite, Massachusetts Senator John Kerry has been mired in a distant second place with 17 percent of the New Hampshire primary vote. Kerry has not been able to capitalize on his familiarity among New Hampshire voters and the support he has received from many important people in New Hampshire politics, including former Governor Jeanne Shaheen. Currently, Kerry is viewed favorably by 60 percent of likely Democratic primary voters, 27 percent have an unfavorable opinion of him, 8 percent are neutral, and 5 percent don't know enough about him

to say. Kerry's net favorability rating has slipped to +33 percent from +48 percent one month ago. Only 13 percent of likely voters say that Kerry is the candidate they like the most.

Kerry's vote for authorizing the use of force against Iraq has kept him from doing as well among liberal voters as Howard Dean, despite his reputation of being a moderate to liberal U.S. Senator. Among all likely primary voters, 15 percent say that Kerry's positions on the issues are closest to their own.

Wesley Clark

General Wesley Clark has moved into the third position in New Hampshire and currently is receiving 10 percent of the primary vote. Clark's favorability ratings have increased as he has decided to forego the Iowa caucuses to concentrate his campaign in New Hampshire. This re-focus appears to be paying off as Clark's favorability ratings have increased over the past month. Currently, 54 percent of likely primary voters say they have a favorable opinion of Clark, 23 percent have an unfavorable opinion of him, 9 percent are neutral and 14 percent don't know enough about him to say. Clark's net favorability rating has risen to +31 percent from +24 percent in November. Eleven percent of likely voters say that Clark is the candidate they like best and 8 percent say that his positions on the issues are closest to their own.

Joe Lieberman

Like Clark, Connecticut Senator Joe Lieberman has decided to skip Iowa and is campaigning heavily in New Hampshire. This has stopped the skid in Lieberman's approval rating that had been occurring throughout the summer and fall. In the latest WMUR / WCVB poll, 55 percent of likely Democratic primary voters said they have a favorable opinion of Lieberman, 33 percent have an unfavorable opinion, 7 percent are neutral and 6 percent don't know enough about him to say. Lieberman's net favorability rating is now stands at +22 percent, up from +14 percent in November. Ten percent of likely primary voters say that Lieberman is the candidate they like the most. "Lieberman appears to have benefited from Al Gore's decision to endorse Howard Dean," said Andrew Smith, Director of the UNH Survey Center. "Gore's perceived disloyalty to his 2000 running mate has led New Hampshire voters to view Lieberman in a more sympathetic light."

But Lieberman's problems in New Hampshire are most likely due to his consistent support for the war in Iraq which puts him out of step with the New Hampshire electorate. While Lieberman is currently getting 7 percent of the primary vote, he is getting only 5 percent of the liberal vote, but 11 percent of the conservative vote. The problem for Lieberman is that conservative voters make up only 15 percent of the current primary electorate. Only 10 percent of primary voters say that Lieberman's position on the issues is closest to their own.

Lieberman is also trying to win the support of undeclared voters (those who can vote in either Republican or Democratic primary) who supported John McCain in 2000 to vote for him. This strategy has not yet paid off. Among likely Democratic primary voters who voted for John McCain in 2000, only 7 percent say they plan to vote for Lieberman, while 41 percent support Dean, 20 percent support Kerry, and 15 percent support Clark.

John Edwards

North Carolina Senator John Edwards remains stuck in low single digits in New Hampshire with 4 percent of the vote. Currently, 46 percent of likely Democratic primary voters say they have a favorable opinion of Edwards, 22 percent have an unfavorable opinion, 11 percent are neutral, and 20 percent don't know enough about him to say. Edwards' net

favorability rating is +24 percent, up from +20 percent in October. Six percent of likely primary voters say that Edwards is the candidate they like the most.

Like Lieberman, Clark, and Dick Gephardt, Edwards is campaigning for the support of moderate to conservative voters and these voters are splitting their votes among these four candidates.

Dick Gephardt

Unlike Clark and Lieberman, Missouri Congressman Dick Gephardt has decided to skip New Hampshire and concentrate on winning the Iowa caucuses where his union support will be of better use. As a result, his support, and favorability ratings have slipped in New Hampshire. Gephardt is currently favored by only 3 percent of likely Democratic primary voters down from 7 percent earlier this year. Currently, he is viewed favorably by 46 percent of likely Democratic primary voters, 31 percent have an unfavorable opinion of him, 11 percent are neutral, and 13 percent don't know enough about him to say. Gephardt's net favorability rating is +15 percent, down from +18 percent in October and equal to the +27 percent rating he had in July.

Dennis Kucinich

Ohio Congressman Dennis Kucinich is largely unknown to New Hampshire voters and most of those who do know him don't like what they see. Currently, 17 percent of likely Democratic primary voters have a favorable opinion of Kucinich, 32 percent have an unfavorable opinion of him, 8 percent are neutral, and 44 percent don't know enough about him to say. Kucinich's net favorability rating is a poor -15 percent, down from +1 percent in November. Only 1 percent of likely primary voters say they will vote for Kucinich.

Carol Mosely Braun

Former Illinois Senator Carol Mosely Braun is the only woman in the race and she is currently getting 1 percent of the vote of likely primary voters. Like, Kucinich, Mosely Braun is relatively unknown in New Hampshire – 25 percent of likely Democratic primary voters have a favorable opinion of her, 30 percent have an unfavorable opinion, 12 percent are neutral, and 33 percent don't know enough about her to say. Mosely Braun's net favorability rating is -5 percent, down from +5 percent in November.

Al Sharpton

Reverend Al Sharpton is very unpopular among voters in New Hampshire, despite his recent appearance on *Saturday Night Live* and his lively presence in debates. Only 13 percent of likely primary voters have a favorable opinion of Sharpton, 56 percent have an unfavorable opinion of him, 9 percent are neutral, and 22 percent don't know enough about him to say. Sharpton's net favorability rating is a dismal -43 percent, unchanged from November. Less than 1 percent of likely primary voters say they plan to vote for Sharpton

Impact of WMUR / ABC Debate

On December 9th, all nine Democratic candidates gathered at the University of New Hampshire in Durham for a televised debate. A surprisingly high percentage of New Hampshire voters say they watched the debate – 20 percent said they watched all of the debate, 20 percent said they watched part of the debate, and 59 percent said they did not watch it.

Among those voters who watched the debate, 7 percent said they changed their mind about who to support after watching the debate, 4 percent said the debate raised questions that may lead them to change their mind, 86 percent said they did not change their mind because of the debate and 3 percent said they did not know.

Undecided Voters

When initially asked who they plan to vote for in the New Hampshire primary, 16 percent of likely primary voters said they were still undecided and 11 percent remained undecided after they were probed about who they were leaning towards. No candidate did significantly better among “leaners”. In order to get a better sense of how undecided voters will make up their minds, all who initially said they were undecided (81 voters) were asked three follow-up questions.

When asked what would help them decide who to vote for in the primary, 48 percent said learning more about the candidates, 46 percent said learning more about a candidate’s position on the issues, 10 percent said they would vote for the candidate with the best chance of beating Bush, 1 percent said they would vote for the candidate with the best chance of winning the New Hampshire primary, and 11 percent said they did not know. (Respondents could give more than one answer so these percentages sum to more than 100%.)

When asked when they would make up their minds, undecided voters say they will do so close to election day – 25 percent said they will make up their mind after they have heard more from the candidates, 24 percent said after they had watched more debates, 33 percent will make up their mind a week or so before the primary election, 15 percent said they will make up their mind on election day or in the voting booth, and 2 percent don’t know.

Finally, undecided voters were asked to name the candidate or candidates they would NOT vote for. Howard Dean and Wesley Clark fare best in the eyes of undecided voters. More than half of undecided voter, 61%, said they would not vote for Sharpton, 50 percent said they would not vote for Mosely Braun, 47 percent will not vote for Kucinich, 23 percent will not vote for Gephardt, 21 percent will not vote for Kerry, 20 percent will not vote for Edwards, 16 percent will not vote for Lieberman, 13 percent will not vote for Clark, 12 percent will not vote for Dean, and 23 percent don’t know.

Subgroup Analysis

Clark: Wes Clark gets his highest favorability ratings from voters who have moved to New Hampshire from Massachusetts, voters aged 35 to 49, and those living in the North Country or in Central New Hampshire. He gets his lowest ratings from older voters.

Dean: Howard Dean gets his highest favorability ratings from liberals, voters with post-graduate educations, voters who have never married, and voters living in the North Country, the Connecticut Valley, and in Central New Hampshire.

Dean gets his lowest favorability ratings from conservatives and older voters, although solid majorities of these groups hold favorable opinions of Dean.

Edwards: Edwards gets his highest favorability ratings from union households and voters with post-graduate educations. Older voters, new arrivals to New Hampshire, and conservatives give Edwards his lowest favorability ratings.

Gephardt: Dick Gephardt gets his highest favorability ratings from liberals, voters aged 35 to 49, and upper income voters. He gets his lowest ratings from conservatives, newcomers to New Hampshire, voters who have moved to New Hampshire from Mid-Atlantic states, and older voters.

Kerry: John Kerry gets his highest favorability ratings from voters in the North Country. Surprisingly, voters living along the Massachusetts border are significantly more likely to hold unfavorable opinions of him than are voters living in other parts of the state.

Kucinich: Dennis Kucinich does not receive high favorability ratings from any segment of the Democratic primary electorate. He gets his lowest ratings from older voters.

Lieberman: Joe Lieberman gets his highest favorability ratings from older voters. He gets his lowest ratings from newcomers to New Hampshire, voters who have moved to New Hampshire from Mid-Atlantic states, and voters living in the Connecticut Valley.

Mosely Braun: Carol Mosely Braun gets her highest favorability ratings from voters aged 35 to 49, voters with post-graduate educations, and upper income voters. She gets her lowest ratings from conservatives, older voters, and voters living in the North Country.

Sharpton: Al Sharpton receives low favorability ratings from all segments of the Democratic electorate.

WMUR NH Primary Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the most recent WMUR NH Primary Poll conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center from December 10 to December 15, 2003. A random sample of 447 likely New Hampshire Democratic primary voters was interviewed by telephone. In 95 of 100 cases, the statewide estimates will be accurate to plus or minus 4.6 percent. Results reported for other subgroups have potential for somewhat larger variation than those for the entire population.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of voters and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.
