## GREGG'S SUPPORT STRONG, COUNTRY HEADED IN RIGHT DIRECTION

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DURHAM, NH -- A majority of New Hampshire residents feel the country is headed in the right direction.

Senator Judd Gregg still enjoys strong support from New Hampshirites, while Senator John Sununu and Representative Charlie Bass receive modest support from Granite Staters.

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll**, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. The Granite State Poll is sponsored by the University of New Hampshire. Five hundred twenty (520) randomly selected adults were interviewed by telephone between June 17 and June 30, 2003. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-4.3 percent. ### **Senatorial Favorability**

With over a year until the November 2004 election, Republican Senator Judd Gregg continues to be viewed favorably in New Hampshire. Currently, 58 percent say they have a favorable opinion of Gregg, 16 percent have an unfavorable opinion, 10 percent are neutral, and 16 percent don't know enough about him to say. Gregg's net favorability rating, the percentage having a favorable opinion of him minus those having an unfavorable opinion, is a solid +42 percent. Gregg's favorability ratings have remained largely unchanged for the past two years. "Senator Gregg's high favorability ratings are good news for his re-election campaign," said Andrew Smith, Director of the UNH Survey Center. Senator Gregg receives solid support from both Democrats and Republicans.

Senator John Sununu, New Hampshire's junior Senator and also a Republican, has seen his favorability rating decline in recent months. Currently, 48 percent say they have a favorable opinion of Sununu, 29 percent have an unfavorable opinion of him, 11 percent are neutral, and 11 percent do not know enough about him to say. Sununu's net favorability rating has dropped to +19 percentage points from +32 percentage points in April, 2003. "Sununu's favorability ratings are only modest, largely due to political polarization. He receives overwhelming support from Republicans, but Democrats and liberals dislike him," stated Dr. Smith.

### **U.S. Representative Favorability**

Second District Congressman, Republican Charlie Bass' personal favorability ratings have slipped somewhat, but he continues to receive modest support overall. Currently, 46 percent of New Hampshire adults say they have a favorable opinion of Bass, 15 percent have an unfavorable opinion, 17 percent are neutral, and 22 percent don't know enough about him to say. Bass fares better in the Second District where 54 percent have a favorable opinion of him, 15 percent have an unfavorable opinion, 14 percent are neutral, and 17 percent say they don't know enough about him to say. Bass' net favorability rating is at +31 percent, the lowest it has been since ratings began in October 2001. But his net favorability rating in the Second District continues to be a solid +39 percent.

In the First District, first term Republican Jeb Bradley's favorability ratings have remained relatively unchanged since his election and he is still relatively unknown, both in the First District and statewide. Thirty-seven percent of Granite Staters have a favorable opinion of Bradley, 14 percent are unfavorable, 20 percent are neutral, and 29 percent do not know enough about him to say. In the First District, 41 percent have a favorable opinion of Bradley, 14 percent have an unfavorable opinion, 23 percent are neutral and 22 percent don't know enough about him to say. Statewide, Congressman Bradley's net favorability rating is +23 percent, down from +29 percent in April. In the First District Bradley's net favorability rating is +27 percent, also down from +35 percent in April.

### **U.S. Right Track / Wrong Track**

An important indicator of how people think the country is doing is the "right track - wrong track" question. In New Hampshire, more than half (56%) think the U.S. is headed in the right direction, 38 percent feel it is headed on the wrong track and 5 percent are unsure. New Hampshire adults are more confident about the direction of the U.S. than adults nationwide. In the *Cook Political Report Poll* conducted by Ipsos-Reid of 1,000 adults nationwide at the end of June, 46 percent believed the country to be headed in the right direction, 50 percent felt we were on the wrong track, and 4 percent weren't sure.

There is a significant partisan gap in where New Hampshirites feel the country is headed. Republicans and conservatives feel very strongly that the U.S. is on the right track, whereas Democrats and liberals are very uneasy about the path the country is on.

## Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the most recent Granite State Poll conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center from June 17 to June 30, 2003. A random sample of 520 New Hampshire adults was interviewed by telephone. In 95 of 100 cases, the statewide estimates will be accurate to plus or minus 4.3 percent. Results reported for other subgroups have potential for somewhat larger variation than those for the entire population.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.
