BENSON HOLDS WIDE LEAD IN NH GUBERNATORIAL RACE

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DURHAM, NH -- Republican businessman Craig Benson currently enjoys a wide lead over his Democratic rival, State Senator Mark Fernald in the race for Governor of New Hampshire

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR / UNH Poll**, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. The WMUR / UNH Poll is sponsored by WMUR-TV of Manchester, New Hampshire. Six hundred fifty-one (651) New Hampshire likely voters were interviewed between October 3 and October 10, 2002 (margin of sampling error, +/-4 percent). NH Governor

The race for governor of New Hampshire finds two political opposites in a race for the open seat (current governor Jeanne Shaheen is running for the U.S. Senate). Mark Fernald, a State Senator from Sharon won the Democratic primary and is best known for his pro-income tax position. Fernald has the daunting task of facing businessman Craig Benson, co-founder of Cabletron, in November. Benson is perhaps best known for having spent more than \$10,000,000 in his Republican primary fight. Fernald, by contrast, spent far less than \$1,000,000 in his fight for the nomination. In this battle between David and Goliath, Goliath is in the lead. In the latest WMUR / UNH Poll, Benson is favored by 49 percent of likely November voters, 33 percent favor Fernald, 2 percent favor Libertarian John Babiarz, 4 percent favor some other candidate, and 11 percent are undecided. Benson's lead over Fernald is essentially unchanged since June when he led Fernald 48 percent to 35 percent. Benson's tremendous funding advantage will make him difficult to defeat in November.

THE INCOME TAX

Fernald has made his task more difficult by strongly supporting an income tax to replace New Hampshire's state-wide property tax to fund education. New Hampshire has historically been opposed to an income tax and pro-income tax candidates have fared poorly in the past. An indication of the importance of the income tax in this race can be seen in the reasons voters give for supporting their candidate. The major reasons Benson voters give for voting for him are that they like him better than Fernald (25%), that he is a Republican (17%), that they generally agree with him on the issues (15%), his experience in business (14%), and his opposition to an income tax (12%). Fernald voters say the major reasons they plan to vote for him are that he is a Democrat (25%), that they dislike Benson (22%), that they favor an income tax to fund education (22%), they like him better than Benson (11%), and they generally agree with him on issues (9%).

FAVORABILITY RATINGS

Despite being battered by negative ads during the bruising GOP Primary, Benson has emerged relatively unscathed. Currently, 43 percent of likely voters have a favorable opinion of Benson, 33 percent hold an unfavorable opinion, 13 percent are neutral, and 11 percent don't know enough about him to say. Benson's net favorability rating, the percentage who have an unfavorable opinion of him subtracted from the percentage who have a favorable opinion, is a modest +10 percent, up from +4 percent in June.

Fernald is considerably less well known than Benson. Currently, 25 percent of likely November voters have a favorable opinion Fernald, 21 percent hold an unfavorable opinion, 12 percent are neutral, and 42 percent don't know enough about him to say. Fernald's net favorability rating is +4 percent, down from +10 percent in June.

SUB-GROUP ANALYSIS

Benson's strongest support comes from Republicans, opponents of abortion and gun owners. Benson is also leading Fernald among Independents by 45 percent to 27 percent.

Fernald gets his strongest support from Democrats, residents of western New Hampshire, and voters with post-graduate educations.

WMUR / UNH Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the most recent WMUR / UNH Poll conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center from October 3 to October 8, 2002. A random sample of 651 likely voters in New Hampshire was interviewed by telephone. In 95 of 100 cases, the statewide estimates will be accurate to plus or minus 3.8 percent. Results reported for other subgroups have potential for somewhat larger variation than those for the entire population.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.
