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NH VOTERS NEED CIVICS LESSON

DURHAM, NH -- New Hampshire voters know their presidential politics, but many are in the dark about their representatives in Washington, let alone their representatives in Concord.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR / UNH Poll**, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. The WMUR / UNH Poll is sponsored by WMUR-TV, Channel 9 in Manchester, New Hampshire. Seven-hundred (700) likely voters were interviewed between October 5 and October 13, 2000. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-3.7%.

SENATOR "WHAT'S HIS NAME"

New Hampshire is rightly known for the political savvy of its voters during the New Hampshire First in the Nation Presidential Primary. Voters are well informed about presidential candidates and presidential politics. However, it appears they are less knowledgeable about their representatives in Washington and Concord.

Likely New Hampshire voters who were interviewed in the latest WMUR / UNH Poll were asked a series of civics questions. We started with an easy one ... if they could name one of their U.S. Senators. To our surprise, only 51% were able to identify either Senator Judd Gregg or Senator Bob Smith, 12% named someone else, and 37% admitted that they did not know.

And voters fared even less well trying to identify their Congressman. When asked to name their U.S. Congressman, 43% named either Rep. Charlie Bass or Rep. John Sununu, 8% named someone else, and 48% admitted they did not know.

Things really went down hill when voters were asked if they could name their New Hampshire State Senator. Only 30% were able to provide a name and 70% said they didn't know. It got even worse when voters were asked who their New Hampshire State Representative is -- only 23% were able to give a name and 77% admitted they did not know.

One final question was asked, and it was a tough one -- how many representatives are there in the New Hampshire House of Representatives? Only 10% of voters correctly said there are 400, 29% guessed incorrectly, and 62% admitted they did not know. Guesses ranged from a low of 2 to a high of 700 and averaged 241 members.

Who are the best informed voters? Men, older voters, voters with post-graduate educations, upper income voters, and people who have visited a candidate's web site. The least knowledgeable voters are people under 30 years old, women, lower income voters, and new arrivals into New Hampshire.

But even highly educated voters can't get off the hook that easily -- 38% of voters with post-graduate educations answered only 1 or fewer questions correctly and another 38% answered only 2 or 3 questions correctly.

What does this mean for the November 7 election? Many people voting for State Senator and Representative will vote on the basis of their political party identification. Other voters will vote for the incumbent because they are more likely to recognize the name. And other voters will not bother to vote in "down-ticket" races.

Tip O'Neill famously said that "all politics is local". Let's hope the voters of New Hampshire can live up to this dictum and pay as much attention to politics in their back yards as they do to Presidential politics.

WMUR / UNH Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the most recent WMUR / UNH Poll conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center from October 5 through October 13, 2000. A random sample of 680 likely New Hampshire general voters was interviewed by telephone. In 95 of 100 cases, the statewide estimates will be accurate to plus or minus 3.8 percent. Results reported for other subgroups have potential for somewhat larger variation than those for the entire population..

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of voters and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and for likely voter turnout. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.

Respondents to the WMUR / UNH Poll were asked:

- “Can you tell me the name of one of New Hampshire’s U.S. Senators?” “Who is that?”
- “Can you tell me the name of your Congressman ... that is ... your representative to the U.S. Congress?” “Who is that?”
- “How about you New Hampshire State Senator ... can you tell me the name of the Senator to the New Hampshire Senate from your district?”
- “How about you New Hampshire State Representative ... can you tell me the name of the Representative to the New Hampshire House of Representatives from your district?”
- “Now think about New Hampshire’s state Government ... Do you happen to know how many Representatives there are in the NEW HAMPSHIRE House of Representatives?”
