ometimes inspiration just does not come easily, and the deadline approaches without the popping-up of a light bulb over the heads of the co-editors that signifies a great editorial idea. "Let's consider the abandonment of such questions as, 'How many couples are in your basic class?, 'How many couples did you graduate?', 'Do you have a large workshop turnout?,' and 'How large is your club?' These questions tend to suggest that quantity is all-important. which, of course, isn't so. It is what is done to, for, and with quantity to make quality that matters!

"The goals of the instructor should include a continual striving for dancers who dance well and with ease, while maintaining ethical behavior toward all others in the activity. Let all instructors think, talk and act in terms of quality. If your dancers made it through basics and have 'stood the test of time' in continuing to dance, whether two couples or twenty, you have succeeded and added to the activity.

"Thankfully, this is not a competitive pastime. Let us have any circles, just so they are filled with happy, competent



dancers, and led by ethical, competent instructors."

Here is our April Vacation Issue, with a slightly longer list of festivals and events than we published a year ago. Folks say that square dance tours are the best. because of the fun-loving and cooperative spirit that prevails. The same is true of square dance vacations. Try one-you'll like it!



A TALE OF THREE PRETTIES

Freeland (Saginaw), Michigan—Now Hawaii for us had come and gone; in spite of a touch of jet lag, I hit the road into mid-Michigan for a favorite encounter for NEMA in Freeland, set up by Dorothy Koelsch. 15 or 18 sets came out for fun

plus Plus. ASD staffer Ed Fraidenburg cued. (We'll bet you didn't know he cues.) Other callers/cuers present were Bill and Joann Towner, Jim and Marianne Senecal, and Fin and Juanita Burk. To quote an old saw from Saginaw—'I never met a Michigander I didn't like, from the youngest duckling to the old geesers." I'll be back next January. (After that remark, are you sure?"—Co-Ed.)

Medina, Ohio—Extremes of weather made a lot of difference in the crowd for the Medina S/D Club in early February. Instead of the ten sets that came out last July, we had only half that in the storm that greeted us this time. But that's the way the wind blows. Dance date publisher "Allemande Al" was there. So was innovator Jim Rensel (See ASD, Jan. '89, p. 91) and Andy Handy was handy for cueing. My contacts were Bob and Joyce Swarm from Hinckley, where buzzards flock. Banner swaps helped bring that club back to life with sparkplugs like the Freeses and others.

Wooster, Ohio-It was a glorious, festive evening with over a dozen sets, all dressed in red for the Gnat Boxers annual Valentine venture. (What fun for a sight caller.) Gary Zimmerman cued. Gene and Anita Butts were crowned King and Queen, and their names will go on a wooden, heart-shaped plague honoring past royalty. Patty Bower was emcee. There were paper hearts on the wall of the big gym, a caller/cuer sign, a computergenerated welcome sign, red and white streamers, ice cream and cupcake snacks, and best of all-Roger Sherman in female-cupid garb, cavorting with a bow and arrow among the dancing sets. It was about as gallant as a gala can be in this whole galloping galaxy.

Hardly had we returned from heavenly Hawaii in January than it was time for me to leave chilly Ohio again to warm my toes in flowery Florida for almost a fortnight, not to mention Georgia and South Carolina on the same trip.

Ocala, Florida-It's always a pleasure to repeat in that cavernous City Auditorium (always on Tuesday) for the Ocala S/D Club, year after year. Thanks to Bob Rust for the first booking years ago. It was Valentine's Day and the floor was a sea of red. Refrehments were lavish. Andy (Trudy) Anderson had 'em queuing for the cues, as usual, Even Cupid couldn't have made 'em cuddle more cutely. George (Jean) Sinclair was emcee. My contact is Bob (Gladys) Weinspach. Mary (ASD staffer) and Bill Jenkins were there. Arcadia, Florida—From Ocala to Arcadia is just a short few hours' drive straight south, and it's always a treat to meet in Everett and Jennie Martin's cozy Promenade Palace S/D Hall. The crowd was choice and eager; Jennie cued; Everett (caller, builder, long-time friend) was emcee. Lavish eats; Hazel Stromnes made a Valentine cake; Dottie Earl made another for three who had birthdays; Jennie, Peggy Burnett and Joanne Mathis. 



The LATE, GREAT Square Dance

(When Did It Die and Why Wasn't I Notified?)

Written by John Saunders in The Square Dance Bulletin, Winter Park, Florida

Where Are the Crowds of Yesteryear? Is Square Dancing on a Downward Turn? What Caused It? Is the Activity Really Dying?

The question is always the same these days. Is square dancing really dying?" It is the question of the hour. What is even more interesting, most everybody's got an answer for the question!

Some answers are positive, some negative. Newcomers, not having experienced the years when square dancing flourished, tend to be more upbeat and enthusiastic in their answers.

For the record, the Late, Great Square Dance is still alive and kicking. And reasonably healthy. Square dancing is much the same today as it has always been—enjoying the high cycles, surviving the low, and enduring the in-between.

I'd like to say something about the downturn in numbers of dancers today as compared to ten or fifteen years ago. I am not sure there is as great a downturn as there appears on the surface. There was a big surge in numbers during the years when country-western was a big fad and western dancing was the rage. I believe this created a false sense that square dancing was going to continue to draw big crowds forever.

There were no indications prior to the country-western happening to give us a clue that a surge was coming or that it would last. When the fad peaked, subsided and then leveled off, there was a similar pattern happening in the square dance activity. I do admit that numbers of dancers do appear to be down today from five to ten years ago, but the numbers are up and the activity much stronger when compared to 20 to 25 years ago.

Think about this, there are more callers, more club programs, more SD/ camp/ resorts and more big weekend festivals to-



day than ever before. Are these the telltale signs of an activity dying out? Hardly. If anything, they are telling us the opposite. Put in perspective, the square dance activity is probably about where it would have been if we had never had the big country-western rage.

Square dancing is not dying. True, some negative opinions persist that the activity has one foot in the grave. But they were saying the same thing 20 years ago.

Square dancing has a lot going for it. Why do people do things together? People enjoy being with other people of similar interests, doing the same things. People like the sense of being successful at accomplishing goals. Many today are into physical fitness. Square dancing can and does fill all of these needs.

Square dancing is a very physical activity—an evening of dance can be the equivalent of walking over five miles. It also exercises the mind and reflexes. When moving to the music, dancing the figures gives the dancer a real sense of accomplishment and enjoyment that has no boundaries. As a square dancer, you can share a special kindred feeling with people who enjoy the same activity you do just about anywhere you travel around the world.

There are many positive sides to square

dancing and all these positive parts should be touched upon when selling the merits of the dance to our friends. We have spent too much time emphasizing only a few things like the low cost of the activity, fun and fellowship. All of us—callers, cuers and dancers—should strive to promote all the good points of square dancing, not just the same old ones.

And when dancing, instead of trying to impress people with our talents, let's strive to make others feel good about themselves...and be glad they know you. This type of attitude alone would say a lot about the merits of square dancing. It's time for all of us to take the lead in projecting and promoting this type of image for square dancing.

And what if that kind of image would spread? Wouldn't that be our greatest accomplishment? It is time to dispel the rumor—square dancing is far from dying. What it needs is a little coaxing from us—

I have in my hand a copy of the *National Square Dance Directory*. In going through it, I have found that every name you would want and some you wouldn't want is already in use. Let me share some of these actual club names with you...

Animals seem to be popular. We have Unicorns, Grasshoppers, Bucks and Does, Honey Bees, Busy Bees and Single Bees. Brown Bears, Dancing Bears, Square Bears, Teddy Bears, Running Bears and Huggy Bears. Bull Dogs, Luv Bugs, Cougar Squares, Bobcats, Friskey Kittens, Top Cats, Hoot Owls, Barn Owls. Thunderbirds, Eagle Squares, Jolly Ducks, Bluejay Steppers, Penguins, Foxy Squares, Black Sheep, Polly Wogs, Sailfish Cloggers, Armadillo Squares, Dancing Dinosaurs, Horn Toads, Muddy Frogs, Moose Promenaders (Try that sometime!), Eager Beavers and Beaver Weavers (Try that, too, you could drop a stitch!)

How about the names of square dance moves? We have the Promenaders, Ocean Waves, Flutterwheels, Do-sa-do's, Star Promenaders, Wheels & Deals, Curli Q's, Acey Deucy's, Grand Squares, Cross Trailers, Gnat Boxers, Cloverleaf Squares, Peel Offs, and anyone else can belong to the Al'mand Left-overs!

Until I looked in the book, I never knew there were so many ways to say that there are men and women in your club! You've got the Bucks & Does, Elks & Does, Dudes & Dames, Dudes & Dolls, Dolls & Dandys, Guys & Dolls, Cowbells & Cowpokes, Cowboys & Cowgirls, Squaws & Braves, Bustles & Boots, Levis & Lace, Buttons & Bows, Shirts & Skirts, Pants & Petticoats, Ruffles & Rednecks, American Squaredance, April 1989

Skirts & Flirts, Boots & Slippers, Buckles & Bows, Pants & Pantaloons, Boots & Cutes, Jeans & Queens, Toms & Hens, Toms & Tabbies, Hens & Drakes, Hicks & Chicks, Rebs & Debs, Mates & Dates, Paws & Taws, Lads & Lassies, Belles & Beaux, and finally Boys 'n Berries.

You like cars? You could join the V.W. Bugs, the Desoto Squares or the T-Birds.

Pick a night of the week! We have the Tuesday Niters, Tuesday Trippers, the Thursday Affair, Friday Squares, Saturday Night Dancers and the Sunday Affair. We also have the Sunday Steppers and the First Sunday Fiesta.

How do they know when they have a good crowd at the Phantom Squares?) or the Scrunch Bunch (I guess they always have a good crowd).

The Unicycle Squares could be a club to join after you have mastered all the Callerlab programs and you still need a challenge. The Rhythm Squares dance in a Catholic Church and you can make your own smart remarks about that!

How about an old west flavor? You can choose from the Buckboard Bouncers, Old Barn Dancers (is that the barn or the dancers?), Rusty Wheels, Ranch Hands, Chuckwagon Squares, Hay Makers, Wagon Train Squares, Wagon Wheels, Draggin' Wagons and Wagon Masters. If you are a Republican cowboy, there is a club called Reagan's Ranch Hands!

All friendly groups, how about the Hip Huggers, the Bear Huggers or the Yellow Rockers.

Square dancers are a little nuts, so we have Beach Nuts, Pinon Nuts, Sum-R-Nuts and Nutty Nuts. (Nobody has used Mixed Nuts yet.)

How about the Ebenezer Sets? (Bah humbug!), Hal's Pals, Claude's Clowns, Adam's Apples, also Apple Dumplings and Apple Squares.

Here are some names that don't exactly inspire me to hurry to their dance: Clod Hoppers, Fumblin' Feats, Goofers, Who Goofed Squares, Stumble Bums, Hoofers & Goofers, Buck Leaguers, Hay Seeds, Stinkers, Dip Sticks, Two Timin' Squares, Poison Oakers, Odds & Ends, Stomp & Stumble Squares, Tanglefoots, Bad News Squares, Crazy Squares, Ding A Lings, Crackpots and Funny Farm Squares.

People complain about too much violence on TV and in movies so they join a S/D club, but listen to these names: Dynamite Squares, Swinging Hatchets, Melon Busters, Claim Jumpers, Bushwackers and Clutch Busters. It also looks like we will kick, stomp and trip just about anything that gets in the way when we want to square dance! Here are some examples: Hav Stack Kickers, Bronco Kickers, Lava Kickers, Dirty Devil Steppers. Hot Foot Stompers. Dixie Foot Stompers. Toe Stompers. Buckwheat Stompers, Corn Stompers, Big Hill Stompers, Barn Stompers, Barnyard Stompers, Steamboat Stompers, Village Stompers, Ridge Stompers, Acre Stompers, Stomping Saints, Salem City Stompers, Burley Twirlers and the Fishtail Whirlers.

Want to clear a lake lot? Get the Tall Tree Trippers, Tall Tree Twirlers and the Stump Jumpers.

I guess we don't think much of cactus. We have Cactus Dodgers, Cactus Kickers, Cactus Twirlers, Cactus Cuffers and Cactus Stompers! We also have Herford Whirlers and Chip Kickers. There is also a club called the Buzzin' Boots of which we would all be honorary members if we did all of the above! If there is anything left to stomp, we have one final club that doesn't specialize. They are The Stompers!

We do have a few clubs that are nonviolent: The Relaxed Workshop, Graceful Squares and Sociable Squares.

How about a space age name? We have the Moon Spinners, Star Twirlers, Star Dusters, Star Spinners, Star Shooters, Star Steppers, Swinging Stars, Star Lighters, Southern Stars, Desert Stars and the Starlight Shufflers. We also have Cloud Hoppers, Rainbow Twirlers, Big Dippers, Sets in Orbit, Strato Jets,

Rockets and Dancetronauts.

How about the Big Potato Squares and the Teen Spud Stompers or the Spud Shufflers (shuffling them isn't bad, try dealing them or hiding one up your sleeve!)? The A Team, Chosen Few, Coffee Grinders, Cement Mixers and the Ten Mile Twirlers must have been a few of the last clubs formed and they were looking for names that hadn't been used yet.

Finally here are some names that don't fit any particular category. I will list them without any editorial comments: you figure them out. Oil Patch Promenaders, Helium Squares, Wiregrass Toe Tappers, Hassayampa Hoedowners, Goober Gamboteers, Hot Garters, Gay Notes, Tape Worms, Dust Devils, Prickly Pears. Hi Kicken Chickens. Grin 'n Square It. Cheese Town Squares, Neola Nee Nockers, Fallin' Arches, Swing Ding Dandies, Diddy Wa Dancers, Mug Wumps, Tommy Knockers, Whizzers, Boomerangs and Knobbers. (And we have the nerve to make fun of the names of the rock groups our kids listen to.)

If none of the above names appeal to you, how about these two? The Square Dance Club or No Name Club. If you still haven't made a choice, maybe your best bet is to forget about starting a new club and support the clubs we already have. Maybe they aren't so bad after all.

*I'd call it Stretchday and put it between Saturday and Sunday to make the weekend longer, or call it Payday and put it between Friday and Saturday so we would have a payday every week but it would still be part of the weekend!







FOUR DOZEN USES FOR COMPUTERS IN SQUARE DANCING by Nasser Shukayr Shreveport, Louisiana

Maybe you are already using a computer in your day-to-day life. Or, perhaps you've considered getting a computer, but you can't think of anything useful that can be done with it. Well, here's several dozen ways that a computer can be put to good use in the square dancing activity. The main idea is that if you spend less time on paperwork, you'll have more time to practice your calling or to learn the latest experimental basics!

For both dancers and callers:

- Membership lists for your square dance club or caller's association.
- All the callers you've ever danced to. Why carry around a small convenient inexpensive little book, when a big bulky expensive computer system will do the same thing.
 - 3. Birthdays and anniversaries.
- 4. Dance calendar. You can quickly find out when your favorite caller is calling in your area. Or, you can display all of the dances that are scheduled for this Saturday night, and decide which one you want to attend. Or, you can print out this month's schedule for your spouse.
- Flyers. If you have a simple desktop publishing package, you can make some really snazzy flyers to announce your club's special dances.
- Names, address, and phone directory.

- Prospects for your club's next set of lessons. You can easily print a list of people that you want to call on the phone and invite to lessons.
- Promotional information. You can simply merge your "student prospect" list with your "form letter," and crank out junk mail to your heart's content.
- 9. Table of contents for your cassette tapes. There just doesn't seem to be enough room on the little cassette to write down everything that you want to know about what's on the tape. With a computer, you can print out, in excruciating detail, the caller who is calling, the patter record he was using, the date and time of the dance, the color of the dress your corner was wearing, et cetera.
- 10. Accounting. It sure makes it easy for the club's treasurer and/or secretary to prepare their written work on a computer. Of course, the first obstacle to be overcome is getting elected treasurer and/or secretary, but that's your problem and not mine.
- 11. Jokes. How many times have you thought of a punch line to a joke, but you couldn't remember how the joke starts? Or, maybe you remember how it starts but you can't remember the punch line. Well, what you can do is key in all the good jokes you've ever heard, and sooner or later you'll have a gigantic data file consisting of the world's funniest jokes. You'll be the life of any party. Personally, I myself have started a gigantic data file of funny jokes. They are all neatly catalogued and filed away in my computer, and numbered one thru eight. Oops, make that one thru nine. This paragraph is so darn funny that I'm going to catalogue it.
- 12. Callerlab lists of basics for each program. Whenever you have some spare time with nothing to do, just go over the list, and you can say to yourself, "I forgot how to do a dixie grand!"
- 13. Definitions and styling notes for each basic. You would refer to this file in the event that you forget how to do a basic (see previous paragraph).
- Writing articles for American Squaredance magazine.

For callers, keeping tabs on your calling activity:

15. Blank contract forms. Anytime 'ou need a couple of 'em, just mash a buton and they'll be printed out before your eyes.

16. Calling dates (calendar).

17. Accounting. You can keep track of your mileage, expenses, income. It's not the most fun thing in the world, but it sure beats sitting in jail and wishing that you had kept better records.

18. Calling history. If you keep the proper records, you can easily review which songs you called for that strange club last year. That way, you won't have to listen to dancers saying, "He only knows seven songs." You can also review which gimmicks and cute patter figures you used last year, so that you'll know whether or not to use 'em this year.

For callers, keeping tabs on your record case:

Record listing. It's obvious, isn't it?
 Just make a handy little list of all the records that you have.

20. Singing call figures. You can put all of the singing calls from all of your square dance records into the computer. While you're at it, put in all of the singing call figures that appear in *American Squaredance* magazine each month. Then, you can do all kinds of neat things with this information. For example, you could print out all singing call figures which feature a certain basic that you are

planning to workshop.

21. Music selection. Just make a list of all the records that you might want to eventually get. Then, go over this list occasionally and pick out your top choices.

22. Record orders. Are you really in that much of a hurry to get your records ordered? Printing out your order and mailing it to the supplier saves time and expense, plus it reduces the possibility of mistakes being made.

23. Make a Record Listing for another caller. As a gesture of good faith, you can offer to make a printout for another caller of all the records that he owns. And, since your computer already knows what records you own, you can easily make a printout of the records you both have.

24. Lyrics to various songs. Why write 'em down when you can key 'em in and

print 'em out.

25. Just for the fun of it, you can make a record listing of all the records that you own, sorted by the type of music(Country, Rock) and the decade (1960's, 1970's). Then if someone asks you if you know any 1950's Rock and Roll songs you can just whip out your handy computer list and select the proper record from your record case. Do you know what I wish? I wish that I could afford to buy so many records that I would need a computer printout just to tell me whether or not I know how to do a song. But, if you've already paid for the computer and for the records, well then why not have a little fun?

STRAIGHT TALK

MIXERS? -A SQUARE DANCERS' POLL

In a recent newspaper square dance article is this statement: "Friendliness seems to be a requirement for membership."

This poll was narrowed to senior citizen members, and the question, "Is it good for a caller occasionally to have a tip wherein the dancers will have a different partner?" The question was further qualified in two respects: 1. The caller announces the mixer firsthand before the dancers commit themselves, and 2. getting the new partner is one on some counting basis (B-I-N-G-O1) to avoid the awkard happenstance of being caught between two possible partners.

The poll carried in favor, and here are some reasons given:

A member dances with his or her regular partner one night a week? three nights a week? seven nights a week? Break it up a little.

Name tags. That square dancers wear name tags is great! But most tags (small letters) don't do a credible job. If you want to know who someone is, you still have to ask, "May I see your name?" Once you have danced a whole tip, however, it is easy for you to know and remember your partner's name. You are now acquainted!

In one of his movies, Fred MacMurray

worked for the Trotter Poll. "Just like the Gallup Poll," he explained, "except we're not in such a hurry! The report of a poll should give the number surveyed and an estimate of accuracy, so I had better do that. The number surveyed was one-me. Margin of error is plus or minus 100%. Anyway, we are like the Trotter Poll-I took a long time to make this report.

I just received publicity material from the National S/D Convention with info about Youth Halls (That's fine.), Tours (That's fine, too.) Clinics (No convention is a convention without these), and Focus on Advanced and Challenge Dancing. No mention anywhere about Mainstream or Plus. I admit that most people belive that once they have graduated from MS lessons that they know all about it, but this is far from true. A good caller can keep even Advanced dancers challenged and entertained with good MS choreography. We should be working harder to keep dancers and callers aware of this.

HOWDY HOW-TO'S OF A SUCCESSFUL CLUB by Jo Jan Nunley

Depending on your club's situation, square dance lessons are in full swing, winding down or maybe your club is just gearing up for lessons. All clubs, no matter what their situation, have one thing in common. That is the gnawing question: Can we keep our new members, our old members, and encourage other dancers needing a club home to choose us?

Successful clubs do this because they have discovered a necessity for their ongoing success. It's called "howdy power," which boils down to just good, old-fashioned friendliness.

In addition to a love for dancing, way back when some of us took our lessons, there was another underlying reason why we chose square dancing. We wanted to meet new people. If we were lucky enough to choose a club with Howdy Power, we did meet new people and make lasting friendships.

But as the years creep by, we find we know many dancers at the dances we attend, and then we become lazy. We don't make the effort to cultivate new friendships with the new square dancers who make their way through lessons.

Sometimes clubs inadvertently encourage this because lessons and club dances are held at different times. Although this practice has its merits, I do believe it puts a distance between current club members and the people taking lessons.

Many dancers fall into the pattern of dancing with the same friends each time they dance. Many times it's an unconscious attitude. We drift to familiarity instead of fording new waters.

My husband and I had a direct ex-

perience with this when we took some Plus lessons. One evening we wallked into a square to make the unwanted fourth couple. The three couples already assembled were from the same club. We had only been standing in the fourth slot a short time when the fourth couple from their club came and stood by us. The hint was clear. They came as a club, and they inteded to dance as a club.

Clearly, any club would want to discourage this type of behavior. Later that same evening, two couples from that square made it a point to come join us and dance in a square with us. We felt their embarrassment over the situation. And, to us, no harm was done.

Still, we did feel some stigma from the occurrence. New dancers might have felt more slighted than veteran dancers. The end result, the most drastic one that all clubs hope to avoid, might have been a couple of fine dancers dropping out of that club or out of dancing altogether.

How to avoid such happenings? The answer to this sticky problem must come from each individual dancer. Make a deliberate plan to be a greeter for your club.

Being a greeter, that is speaking pleasantly and passing the time with each and every person you meet, sounds easy to some. For many, and I admit to being among this group, conquering the monster, Shyness, must come first. Vanquishing Shyness, which could become a killer in a club, takes deliberate work. Fortunately, success can be yours.

Plan to be an active greeter for your club for just *one* night. The old method used by dieters and others with problems works with shyness also. Conquer it for just one day. Today.

After increasing your greeting power for one night, you probably will find you had such a great time that you will want to incorporate it every time you dance. Everyone will be a winner.

A method I found effective years ago when I was in a speech class and had to give oral book reports was that instead of speaking as my self at the podium

Calling Tips

In the January 1989 magazine, I mentioned that not all clubs are—or can be—labeled strictly MS or Plus. One caller wrote in to chastise me for that statement. In his letter to me, I read that he has attitudes much as mine, but that he did not understand what I was trying to say. I suspect he was not the only caller to misunderstand my ideas, so I had best clarify.

I stated that callers must use their own judgment at times and cannot accept an exact limit, as the Callerlab programs specify. Let me tell you what I was trying

to get across.

In metropolitan areas where there are thousands of dancers and maybe fifty or sixty clubs in a small area. I believe strict MS and Plus must be observed. At the same time, we must realize when we talk of square dancing as a whole that there are more clubs in this country that are not in metropolitan areas. Where the setting is more rural or the towns are small, one or two clubs must serve a large area. The dancers in these areas want the fun of doing many calls but cannot support MS. Plus and Advanced clubs in their limited areas. They know of other calls and perhaps have been exposed to them at festivals and conventions or have read them in this magazine. They want to try these calls, too, so they keep after local callers to teach them and call them.

We know that all callers try to give the dancers what they want, and we know that the callers must use judgment and know when too much is too much. Many rural areas, and I must include cities of under 30,000 in this category although some may dislike it, do not label their clubs at all, simply because they refuse to be limited.

Callers say, then how are we to know

what to call? May I suggest they do as I do and visit with the club officers beforehand. Ask what is being called and what is not. It doesn't take long to get a good grasp of what they are doing. Also some clubs are wise enough to put up a list of calls they are using.

A problem just as big is to know if a club listed as Plus is a full Plus DBD or maybe a full Plus standard position. I have found Plus clubs, too, that break down on some MS variety. Putting a label on a club does not tell you all a caller needs to know.

We know too that when a club asks you to do a Plus Tip that you have the same problem. Some will expect a challenging Plus; others will expect you to just use some of the Plus calls. Have you ever started a Plus tip (or MS) expecting to "free wheel" and use sight to resolve the squares when you wish, only to find that not one of your pilot squares could handle your calls? Do you then fall back on pre-memorized calls? Do you workshop? As a caller, you are making decisions so fast that you should be a computer, except that computers do not yet think.

Judgment! What a big word! What an important part of calling! In my next callers' school, I have resolved to spend more time on trying to teach judgment. Speaking of this subject, I suggest callers use judgment in another field-teaching classes. As the years go by, I find I teach calls in a different sequence than I did years ago. I find, too, that I have learned to combine calls to teach. For example, to teach scoot back. I combine turn thruand fold. I teach the new chain down to dixie before I teach dixie style. I use key words in both dixies, such as "Men shake hands," to complete the call. It is amazing how many problems I can remove becore they appear in this way. I've started using the word team-mate as an aid, and it works.

Going back to the start of this article, not all areas of the country lend themselves to strict interpretation of MS or Plus. I am only being realistic to admit this, and callers must use more judgment than ever.



I delight in hearing how people in areas that are quite far apart treat a similar piece of music and develop choreography that adapts to the music., Recently two individuals submitted routines that use the same music, but apply to a totally different age group. The first one comes from Steve Minken of Sebastopol, California, and he says it was written for a bilingual kindergarten class, but older children and the young at heart have been enjoying it, too.

THE CALIFORNIA RAISIN DANCE

FORMATION: Circle, all facing center.

MUSIC: I Heard It Through The Grapevine-ESP 153

ROUTINE: For all walking steps, hands should be held at shoulder height, both forefingers pointing up, raising and lowering alternate hands as one steps. For all turning steps, hands should be held in a loose fist at chest height and rotated around each other as though both hands were winding string into a ball.

All walk toward center in 4, all turn 1/2 around to face out.

All walk out in four. All turn 1/4 left in 4.

All walk (single file promenade) in 4. All turn 1/2 around in 4.

All walk (wrong-way promenade) in 4. All turn to face center in 4.3

Boys walk to center in 4. Boys turn 1/2 around.

Boys walk back out in 4. Boys turn around to face center in 4.

Girls walk to center in 4. Girls turn around 1/2 in 4.

Girls walk back out in 4. Girls turn around to face center in 4.

Dance repeats seven times with lots of chances for the dancers to develop and embellish their hand movements and strutting techniques.

The second use of the tune was shared by Lou Hyll of Dayton, Ohio, who learned it from his daughter, Leslie. It is a solo dance entitled...

I HEARD IT ON THE GRAPEVINE

FORMATION: Scattered, all facing leader.
INTRO: Sway back and forth snapping fingers

AT VOICE:

Push right hand down 4 times, push left hand down 4 times Push right hand up 4 times, push left hand up 4 times

Right hand thumber 4 times, left hand thumber 4 times

Bend over and twirf (twiddle) hands (2 counts)

Stand up with arms over head (2 counts)

Repeat above figure, twirl hands and arms up

Standing with arms up, put right hand down to left hip (2 counts)

Put left hand on right hip (2 counts)

Put right hand on right hip (2 counts)

Put left hand on left hip (2 counts)

Bounce up and down 4 times, begin again by swaying several times*

"I use it by bouncing up and down 3 times and on the fourth bounce I bounce-turn ¼ right to begin the dance facing a new direction.

During the week, Jerry did one of his humorous spoofs of a "barnyard shuffle" routine and the Frankenfields returned home to compose a little nonsense dance which they called...



JERRY'S BARNYARD QUADRILLE

MUSIC: Turkey in the Straw

Intro ---- Set twice 33-40 Left foot look at sole, with corner clap hands 1-8 --- Right and left thru 9-16 ---- Right foot shuffle 41-48 --- Swing corner

49-56 - - - - - - Promenade 17-24 --- Left foot shuffle 57-64 - - - - Set twice 25-32 - - - Right foot look at sole

Shuffle: Point toe for two counts, draw back on outside edge of foot for two counts. Point same toe for two beats, draw back on inside of foot for two beats.

Clap hands: Twice on knees, twice together, right hand with partner, once together, left hand with partner. once together.

Story line: Set twice is hesitation crossing the barnyard. Half promenade is crossing the barnyard. After checking shoes, everything is O.K. So clap hands, swing, promenade,

Head two gents and corner girl, up to the middle and back

Box the gnat, right and left thru the other way back

Join hands and circle left, two boys, two girls together

Four girls (boys) square thru four hands, right and left thru with outside two (who turns who)

Dive thru, square thru three hands, left allemande...

33-40 - Plus a quarter, - - pass thru Intro --- Balance with your corner 41-48 - - Star thru. - - Circle left* 1-8 ---, Swing that girl

49-56 - - - - Star left - - - Face across, ladies chain 57-64 - - - Balance with your corner

17-24 - - - - Chain back

25-32 --- Ladies flutter wheel *Cross over every second change.



POINT TO POINT DIAMONDS

An Important Formation for Advanced Dancers. Point-to-point diamonds are twin diamonds in which the points are side-by-side through the center of the set (normally the centers of the diamonds are side-by-side through the center of the set). An easy way to set up point-to-point diamonds is to have parallel two-faced lines do a couples hinge and then have the centers of each line hinge.

Although point-to-point diamonds are permissible at the Plus program, most callers avoid them at this program. This is fine, but unless dancers in Advanced class are taught point-to-point diamonds, these dancers will always believe that twin diamonds must have the centers be a wave down the middle.

A Typical Occurrence at Advanced. The caller will put the floor into point-to-point diamonds, but in some squares the dancers who are not well trained will change to normal twin diamonds, i.e., the dancers in the center of the set will take hands and the true centers will drop hands, thereby making themselves the points. These sets have now reversed the location of the centers and points from what the caller wants.

There is no problem as long as the caller calls diamond circulate. But as soon as the caller calls flip or cut the diamond, which ends in a tidal setup, the squares who have changed to normal diamonds are in trouble. The flip or cut will put these squares into parallel waves or lines. Thus, the floor is supposed to be in a tidal setup, but the incorrect squares are in a parallel set-up. The next call will now result in an instant breakdown of the incorrect

squares with no chance of recovery.

Why Are Point-to-Point Diamonds Used? Because they provide a simple but effective way to instill mental discipline into Advanced dancers. At Mainstream and Plus. most dancers merely coast along doing little or no thinking. This is fine for these programs. But at Advanced, the dancers are expected to exert some degree of mental application. Point-to-point diamonds teach the dancers to believe the caller, to accept whatever situation he establishes. This mental process is vital for training dancers to accept the directional calling of creative choreography which is used at Advanced. The dancers must have the mental discipline to do exactly what the caller says and not make adjustments on their own.

Things To Remember:

- 1. The caller is under no obligation to use the phrase *point to point diamonds*. He can simply set up this formation and continue. The dancers are expected to recognize that they are in this situation. Some callers may use the phrase if the floor is weak or if they are unsure of the ability of the floor.
- 2. Once a diamond is established, the centers always have hands joined and the points never have hands joined. The dancers merely have to remember where the positions are for the centers and points. If dancers would always follow this simple but vital rule, they would not have to be concerned whether or not the diamonds were normal or point-to-point, because they would never break down.

Because point-to-point diamonds is not specifically listed as a formation on the Advanced List, some callers ignore the formation. Obviously, this causes problems when their dancers dance to another caller. If your caller is not exposing you to point-to-point diamonds at Advanced, request that he do so.

Advanced dancers should be alert to the location of centers and points in a diamond, and not assume the centers will be in a wave through the center.





Creative Choreography

GRAND SWING THRU

A "no change" call with possibilities.

From facing lines, draw an imaginary line through each line of dancers and connect the ends. Grand swing thru simply moves everyone one position counterclockwise along this line, and there is no change in rotation or affiliation; therefore, any get-out that will work from the starting formation will also work following a grand swing thru. Any number of grand swing thrus may be called.

EXAMPLE:


Heads lead right and circle to a line Touch to a wave, single hinge, circulate (Any number of times), boys run* Left allemande...

*Or girls run, right and left grand...
Or, from the line you started with:
Grand swing thru (any number of times)
Single hinge, circulate (any number of times)
Boys run*, left allemande...

Or, girls run, right and left grand...

Grand left swing thru moves everyone one position clockwise with no change in rotation or affiliation, so the same precept applies. Try this: Heads lead right and circle to a line Grand left swing thru (any number of times) Single hinge, circulate (any number of times) Boys run*, right and left grand...

*Or girls run, left allemande...



Quarterly Selection

CLOVERFLO

After a good deal of searching, I find that cloverflo was authored by Bill Davis in late '72 or early '73, and was on the Plus 1 list in '77.

From a trade by formation, outfacers cloverleaf and pass thru as infacers pass thru and cloverleaf.

SAMPLE CHOREO:

Heads square thru four, square thru ¾ Cloverflo, square thru ¾, cloverflo Left allemande...

Heads square thru four, pass thru, cloverflo Pass thru, trade by, left allemande...

Head ladies chain, heads lead right and circle To a line, pass thru, wheel and deal Square thru ¾, pass thru, cloverflo Left allemande...

Singing call: Heads promenade ½ In the middle and star thru, California twirl Square thru ¾, cloverflow, allemande left Do-sa-do back to back, swing, promenade... Sides rollaway, heads lead right and circle Men break to lines, pass thru, wheel & deal Square thru ¾, pass thru, cloverflo Swing thru, girls trade, pass the ocean Swing thru, right and left grand...

Heads pass thru, go round one to a line Pass the ocean, swing thru, centers run Wheel and deal, pass thru, cloverflo Swing thru, girls trade, square thru four Trade by, left allemande...

Heads lead right and circle to a line Rollaway, slide thru, cloverflo, swing thru Girls circulate, boys run, ferris wheel Square thru 34, left allemande...

Modules from an eight chain thru formation:

- Pass thru, cloverflo, pass thru cloverflo = zero...
- Square thru ¾, cloverflo, square thru ¾ cloverflo = zero...
- Pass thru, cloverflo, square thru ¾ cloverflo = right and left thru...
- Square thru ¾, cloverflo, pass thru, cloverflo = right and left thru...



PASS TO THE CENTER

Pass to the center is best when used where dive thru is inappropriate (e.g., right-hand waves, left-hand waves, boys together as a couple, girls together as a couple, and arrangements where some are half-sashayed and some are "normal").

Starting formation: eight chain thru, parallel waves.

All pass thru, Dancers now on the outside partner trade. Ends in double pass thru formation.

SAMPLE CHOREO:

Heads lead right and circle to a line Spin the top, pass to the center, swing thru Recycle, zoom and swing thru, step thru Left allemande...

Heads half square thru, do-sa-do (ocean wave)

Centers trade, pass to the center Square thru ¾, left swing thru, recycle Star thru, wheel and deal, square thru ¾ Left allemande...

Heads pass thru, go round one to a line Pass the ocean, swing thru, pass to the center Swing thru, step thru, do-sa-do (wave) Boys run, spin the top, same sexes trade Right and left grand...

Heads square thru four, sides rollaway Swing thru, centers run, wheel and deal Box the gnat, pass to the center Right and left grand...



(MAKE A) DANDY LION

From a quarter tag, centers pass thru and star thru with the outside two to form a line.

Pass thru, wheel and deal, centers star thru
Pass the ocean, ladies trade
Ping pong circulate, make a dandy lion
Pass thru, partner trade and roll
Right and left grand...

Heads star thru and spread, pass thru Wheel and deal, girls swing thru Make a dandy lion, boys trade, ½ circulate Bend the line, you're home...

Heads star thru, double pass thru, peel off Pass thru, wheel and deal, boys swing thru Make a dandy lion, girls trade, ferris wheel Centers sweep ¼, all sweep ¼, you're home...

Heads star thru and spread, pass thru Wheel and deal, zoom, boys swing thru Make a dandy lion, couples circulate Ladies trade, boys run, right and left grand You're home...

Heads star thru, double pass thru, centers in Cast off ¾, pass thru, wheel and deal Girls swing thru, make a dandy lion Couples circulate, boys trade, bend the line Pass thru, wheel and deal, centers sweep ¼ You're home...

Heads lead right and circle to a line
Pass thru, wheel and spread, pass thru
Tag the line right, ferris wheel
Boys swing thru, ping pong circulate
Make a dandy lion, ferris wheel, dixie grand
Left allemande...



HAVE A LITTLE FUN by Charles Lehmar

From a ¾ tag formation, wave dancers cast ¾ and spread, outfacers peel (right) and roll. Ends in an eight chain thru formation.

NOTE: Some fudging is required to attain the ending formation.

AUTHOR'S EXAMPLES:

Heads (sides) square thru four, swing thru Boys run, ¾ tag, have a little fun Pass to the center, square thru ¾ Left allemande...

Heads (sides) swing thru, spin the top Extend, trade the wave, left swing thru Girls run, have a little fun, pass thru U-turn back, left allemande...

HAVE A LOTTA FUN

From a ¾ tag formation, have a little fun and peel the top.



PLUS QS

Heads pass thru, go round one to a line Pass thru, wheel and deal, swing thru Scoot and relocate, extend, single hinge Boys trade, boys run, crossfire, circulate Boys run, star thru, pass thru, wheel & deal Dixie grand, left allemande...

Side ladies chain, heads pass thru

Both turn left, gent round two, lady round one To a line, rock the boat, ladies trade Cross the ocean, right and left grand...

Heads lead right and circle to a line Spin the top, boys run, ferris wheel & spread Rock the boat, swing thru, girls trade, Cross the ocean, boys run, wheel and deal Left allemande...

Heads square thru four, slide thru Rock the boat, swing thru, right & left grand On the third hand, promenade...





(which I did a few times accompanied by knocking knees and shaking head), I "became" the character out of the book. This method worked so well for me that eventually I was much in demand to give demonstration hour-long book reports to all the English and Speech classes.

So, if you are too shy to greet other dancers, and especially newcomers, you can project yourself as that enviable, most sociable creature you know from the club or elsewhere in life. It's just a little mental trick so you don't put your own ego on the chopping block. If you make a blunder, it won't really be "you," it will be this other character you plucked out of your imaginaction. With a little luck and practice, this friendly "character" may be incorporated into your fulltime personality.

Dancing with newcomers is a great ice breaker. Wives can use their husbands to help master this technique. Have your husband suggest to the visiting couple that you switch partners for the next tip.

Any time your club has visitors, make it your first priority to switch partners with the visitors sometime during the evening. Don't let the evening end without extending an invitation for the visitors to come back and visit. Let them know how much you enjoyed the opportunity to meet them.

Make a little label for yourself and wear the invisible aid with you to each dance. Have it say Official Club Greeter. Hold that unofficial office for as long as you hold membership in any club. Don't be surprised if you find it to be the most rewarding office you have every held.

BILL COOPER

Bill started dancing out west in his high school days. This and skating formed much of the social entertainment in those depression days. Bill met Barbara, his future wife, at a Friday the 13th Dance at McGill University in 1933. Dancing events were infrequent until moving to Toronto in 1949 to work for Ontario Hydro. In 1953, Bill learned to call and later the Coopers joined a square dance club which danced traditional squares and couple dances.

of both Callerlab and Roundalab. Bill is the author of The Logical Teaching of S/D Basics, and many articles. Recently Bill has been bringing dancing to senior citizens groups.



Lyle and Faye were high school sweethearts and were married in 1957. Living close by their Waukesha, Wisconsin, home are their two married daughters, four grandsons and two granddaughters.

Having never danced a step before, in 1980 they began square dance lessons. The next fall they drove 140 miles round trip to take beginners' round dance lessons. Graduation came in the spring of 1982 and they cued their first dance on the following New Year's Eve. Beginners' lessons in their area were needed, and the next fall the Longs taught their first class. The following year they took and gave intermediate lessons. of the Wisconsin R/D Leaders Council, in which they have been active since 1983. They are members of Roundalab, and have served as chairpersons of Wisconsin's annual Accent on Rounds. They have cued at every Accent and state convention during the past five years.

During the summer, they enjoy their motorcycle and make extended trips across the country to attend cuers' colleges, seminars and square dance weekends. You will also find them two weekends a year on staff at Feases' Shady Rest Lodge in Rhinelander, Wisc.

Lyle suggests that in order to have an active round dance club, one must be active at square dances and help to promote square dancing. He believes square dancing is the lifeblood of round dancing, and rounds are equally important to squares.

Whenever anyone asks me what my favorite pie is, I say, "I have two favorites—hot and cold." I was raised in the country with thrashers, and there was always pie for dessert.

We have many farming community S/D clubs who have pie night on their calendars traditionally. One club advertised a Walt Gardner Pie Night (Outsiders thought it was a guest caller). They were surprised to find out Walt was a favorite dancer who loved pumpkin pie, so they honored him with his special night.

At these pie nights, tables are laden with pies—pumpkin, pecan, apple, every berry imaginable, even wild black- and blueberries. Then come the cream pies with mountain-high meringues and whipped cream toppings, mock

apple and walnut—impossible pies you would swear were made with real apples, nuts and coconut. Diatetic pies even hit the spot with health-conscious dancers. There is always a favorite of mine—hot or cold.

A pie survey taken in the state of Michigan named favorite pies in this order: 1. Lemon meringue; 2. Pecan; 3. Apple. I wonder how people in your state would list their favorites.

Here is that famous favorite recipe: 1 can (16 oz.) Libby's solid pack pumpkin 2 eggs, slightly beaten

3/4 cup sugar

½ tsp salt, 1 tsp ground cinnamon, ½ tsp ground ginger, ¼ tsp ground cloves

1 can (12-13 fl. oz.) Carnation evaporated milk Preheat oven to 4250. Mix filling ingredients in order given. Pour into pie shell. Bake 15 minutes. Reduce heat to 350°; continue baking 45 minutes or until knife inserted near center comes out clean. Cool completely. Garnish, if desired, with whipped topping. Yields one 9-in. p.ie.

SQUARE DANCERS MASTERCARD

The United Square Dancers of America (USDA) recently announced a nationwide credit card program for dancers. Any dancer in the square dance activity (square, round, clogging, contra, line, or heritage) can apply for the card-the only credit card that identifies you as a square dancer everywhere you go.

The Square Dancers MasterCard grew from an idea first put forth at the USDA annual meeting at the 1987 National Convention in Houston. The Board of Directors of USDA, which is comprised of delegates from the State and Association affiliates, approved the concept; and the program was developed and introduced nationwide in January, 1989.

You may ask, why does square dancing need a credit card? The answer is simple. This is the best possible method of bringing our square dance activities to the attention of every person that handles one of our special credit cards. This will keep Square Dancing in front of the public and assist in publicizing and promoting square dance activities throughout the nation. Also, USDA, your national association, will receive some operating funds from the Signet Bank for each credit card issued and will share these funds with the member state and association affiliates.

USDA, as the national dancer's association, entered into the program to promote square dance activities nationwide and to obtain operating funds to support its many on-going (and future) projects that benefit square dancing, both at local and national levels. USDA is bound by its charter and IRS Regulations to use these funds only to serve the square dance movement

One-third of all surplus funds for this program will be returned to the affiliates for their use to locally promote square dancing.



Kay has tips for IRS reporting, like this: "When you are preparing to call out of town or beginning a tour, note on the outside of an envelope the date and the starting mileage. This provides a place to keep all the receipts for the trip and helps insure that all the expenses for the trip are recorded and not just those that you find in shirt pockets."

In addition to some good choreo in 14 pages, Rusty gives us this bit of advice:

"One of the greatest thrills for a dancer and caller to experience is the sound of every dancer's feet sliding on the floor, with beat of the music, and a "swish" of sound. If you have heard this, you know exactly what I am speaking about. Encourage yourself and your dancers to step on the beat and enjoy the dance portion of square dancing. The more we'll dance, the fewer we'll lose!"

Pancetime Notes, one can see there's good variety and current material. Take a look: Cloverflo—MS Quarterly Call; Cross Run and Cross Fold—MS Emphasis Calls; Openers and Get-Outs, Food For Thought about the use of Extend; Crossfire—Plus Emphasis Call; Track Two, Drop the Anchor—New Experimental Idea, and Singing Calls. Also in his Advanced Supplement (blue section), he gives us some useful 3x1 line stuff, and lots more.



rom "down under," we always enjoy reading through Eric Wendell's Callerlink, even though it arrives spasmodically from Australia to Ohio. By coincidence, Eric covers mechanics of (singing call) figure construction as we found in the Uebelackers' notes this time. He also gives us good thoughts on club organization. Then there's plenty of choreo, especially featuring the *I formation*.

Y ou'll find some very useful ideas in Anne and Joe Uebelacker's Canadian Callers Notes, with page after page of choreo and a separate section of A and C. The January issue very comprehensively covers the QS realm, gives us teaching tips galore (even with basic material), and devotes almost three pages to a hard-to-find analysis, "How to Call Progressive Squares." That's not all. Another interesting study helps you write your own singing calls. Kudos to Anne and Joe.

n his **Choreo Connection**, Ed Fraidenburg gives us a good smattering of patter using the QS *zip to a diamond*. Here's one:

Head ladies chain, heads lead right and Circle to a line, dixie style to a wave Centers trade, zip to a diamond Boys left swing thru, diamond circulate Flip the diamond, girls circulate Left allemande...

One item that might be found helpful for all callers in this issue of Lead Right by Burdick and Malcom is a page on "The Care and Feeding of Phonograph Needles." That's only the beginning. There's a list of the timing of basics from Callerlab, resolution material, singalong calls, QS updates, some hard choreo by Randy Dougherty, formation tips from Jack Lasry and other assorted choreography.



THOUGHTS ON DANCING FOR SPECTATORS by Bill Barr

I have just returned from Hunter Mt.'s Country Music Festival Part II (New York). and though Nancy and I are both tired. we feel that it was worth going to, and I have some observations to make. Working with the founder of square dancing at Hunter Mountain, Bill Losee, Bill Anderson and I began calling at ten in the morning (The Three Bills, I suppose you could call us.) and had squares going all day when the main show in the big tent didn't interfere. Thousands of people saw and hundreds participated in the proceedings, which involved not only the three days of the Part II weekend, but also the four days of Part I in July. Therefore tens of thousands observed and thousands must have participated. 14 callers were hired and a special tent set up for us.

Observation #1: Almost anyone will attest to a certain reluctance at first on the part of spectators to join in an activity, no matter what it is. The only way to overcome this is to show enthusiasm, either on the mike as a caller, or as a dancer by going into the crowd and gently dragging supposedly unwilling "volunteers" into a square. Here is where a little humor can go a long way.

Observation #2: You must have dancers there, whether dressed [in square dance attire] or not, to help with the dancing and to sign up potential class-takers.

Observation #3: For a program like this to succeed, followup is essential. Get the names and phone numbers should be the battle cry. We often speak of "recruiting" dancers, and I always wince a little when I hear this, because I recall being drafted into the Army, and the term makes the whole situation seem like involuntary servitude. "Promotion is perhaps a gentler and more acceptable terminology for our form of recreation. Which brings up the fourth and final point to be remembered.

#4: Ours is one of the few forms of leisure-time activity which cannot be done alone, is non-competitive by its very nature and can be done by virtually anyone, whether mentally or physically challenged or not, of any age beyond infancy, with an amazing coherence that transcends national boundaries and cultures to a degree that is unrecognized by most people who are not themselves square dancers. Happy dancing!
