### **BASS AND SUNUNU LOOK STRONG, NH HOUSE AND SENATE UP FOR GRABS**

DURHAM, NH -- Incumbent Republicans Charlie Bass and John Sununu hold comfortable leads in their re-election bids for the U.S. Congress from New Hampshire's First and Second Districts. Campaigns for control of New Hampshire's State House and Senate are very close.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR / UNH Poll**, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. The WMUR / UNH Poll is sponsored by WMUR-TV, Channel 9 in Manchester, New Hampshire. Six-hundred eighty (680) likely voters were interviewed between October 5 and October 13, 2000. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-3.8%. The margin of sampling error for the 304 1st Congressional District likely voters is +/-5.6% and the sampling error for the 266 2<sup>nd</sup> District likely voters is +/-6.0%.

### **NH FIRST DISTRICT**

New Hampshire's two Republican U.S. Congressmen have not been in office for long, but already are enjoying the benefits of incumbency in their races for re-election to Congress. In New Hampshire's First District, John Sununu holds a wide lead over his challenger, Democratic State Representative Martha Fuller Clark, primarily because he is better known. In the most recent WMUR / UNH Poll, 53% of First District voters say they will vote for Sununu, 28% say they will vote for Clark, 6% favor other candidates, and 14% are undecided.

Sununu is well known and well liked while Clark remains unknown to most voters. Statewide, 54% of likely voters have a favorable opinion of Sununu, 25% have an unfavorable opinion, 13% are neutral, and 8% don't know enough about him to say. Twenty percent of likely voters statewide have a favorable opinion of Clark, 6% have an unfavorable opinion, 13% are neutral, and fully 62% don't know enough about her to say.

Looking only at likely voters in New Hampshire's First District, 59% say they have a favorable opinion of Sununu, 23% have an unfavorable opinion, 12% are neutral, and 6% don't know enough about him to say. Sununu's net favorability rating (the percentage favorable minus the percentage unfavorable) among First District voters is a healthy +36%. Clark is not as well known as Sununu in the First District where 23% have a favorable opinion of her, 7% have an unfavorable opinion, 13% are neutral, and 56% don't know enough about her to say. Clark's net favorability rating among likely voters in the First District is +16%.

Sununu leads among most demographic groups but his support is strongest among Republicans and voters with high levels of political knowledge. Clark gets her strongest support from Democrats. Swing voters, those who do not vote consistently for either party, are breaking heavily for Sununu — 49% favor Sununu and only 15% favor Clark.

### NH SECOND DISTRICT

In the Second District, the Democratic Party has been spending considerable sums in hopes of upsetting incumbent Charlie Bass. Bass was seen by many analysts to be vulnerable after winning re-election in 1998 with only 53% of the vote in a district carried twice by Bill Clinton. But in 2000, Democrats are finding Bass difficult to unseat. Currently, 54% of Second District voters say they will vote for Bass, 25% say they will vote for Lyme Attorney Barney Brannen, 7% favor other candidates, and 14% are undecided.

Bass is far ahead, in part, because he is much better known than Brannen. Statewide, 43% of likely voters say they have a favorable opinion of Bass, 20% have an unfavorable opinion, 16% are neutral and 21% don't know enough about him to say. Brannen has only a 11% favorable rating statewide, 7% have an unfavorable opinion of him, 12% are neutral and 70% don't know enough about him to say.

Among likely voters in the Second District, 49% have a favorable opinion of Bass, 24% have an unfavorable opinion, 15% are neutral, and 12% don't know enough about him to say. Bass' net favorability rating among Second District voters is a solid +25%. Brannen is relatively unknown, even in the Second District where only 16% have a favorable opinion of him, 8% have an unfavorable opinion, 13% are neutral, and 64% don't know enough about him to say. Brannen's net favorability rating among likely voters in the Second District is only +8%.

Bass leads among most political and demographic groups, but gets his strongest support from Republicans. Brannen's only source of support comes from Democrats. Swing voters are breaking heavily to Bass -- 62% favor Bass and only 11% favor Brannen.

### NEW HAMPSHIRE SENATE

The New Hampshire Senate is currently split between Republicans and Democrats, each party holding 12 seats. The election this fall is being closely watched to see which party will control the Senate. Currently, Republicans are in position to regain control of the Senate. When asked if they will vote for the Republican or Democratic candidate from their district, 40% of New Hampshire likely voters say they will vote for the Republican, 34% say they will vote for the Democrat, and 27% are undecided.

### NEW HAMPSHIRE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Republicans currently control the New Hampshire House of Representatives, but the contest for control of the House is even closer than for control of the Senate. In the most recent WMUR / UNH Poll, 37% of New Hampshire likely voters say they will vote for the Republican candidate, 35% favor the Democratic candidate, and 28% are undecided.

### FUTURE SENATE RACES

New Hampshire does not have a race for U.S. Senate in 2000, but political observers are already looking toward 2002 when Republican Senator Bob Smith is up for re-election. Smith narrowly won in 1996 and appears vulnerable in 2002. Smith weakened his reputation among Republicans with his abortive run for President as Independent after publicly repudiating the Republican Party. Among likely voters in New Hampshire, 32% say they have a favorable opinion of Smith, 40% have an unfavorable opinion, 13% are neutral and 14% don't know enough about him to say. Smith's net favorability rating is a low -8%.

Senator Judd Gregg does not face re-election until 2004 and early signs point to voter satisfaction with him. Fifty-seven percent of likely voters say they have a favorable opinion of Gregg, 19% have an unfavorable opinion, 13% are neutral and 11% say they don't know enough about him to say. Gregg's net favorability rating is a strong +38%.

### WMUR / UNH Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the most recent WMUR / UNH Poll conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center from October 5 through October 13, 2000. A random sample of 680 likely New Hampshire general voters was interviewed by telephone. In 95 of 100 cases, the statewide estimates will be accurate to plus or minus 3.8 percent. Results reported for other subgroups have potential for somewhat larger variation than those for the entire population. The margin of sampling error for the 304 1st Congressional District likely voters is +/-5.6% and the sampling error for the 266 2<sup>nd</sup> District likely voters is +/-6.0%.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of voters and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and for likely voter turnout. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.

Respondents to the WMUR / UNH Poll were asked:

- "Next, I'd like to get your overall opinion of some people in the news. As I read each name, please say if you have a favorable or unfavorable opinion of this person -- or if you have never heard of him or her. First, ... How about ... "New Hampshire Congressman Charlie Bass?" (READ IF NECESSARY) "Would you say you have a favorable or unfavorable opinion of him?"
- "Attorney Barney Brannen."
- "New Hampshire State Representative Martha Fuller Clark."
- "Senator Judd Gregg."
- "Senator Bob Smith."
- "New Hampshire Congressman John Sununu."
- (1<sup>ST</sup> DISTRICT) "I'd like you to think about the election for your representative to the U.S. Congress. As of today, do you plan to vote for John Sununu, the Republican candidate ... Martha Fuller Clark, the Democratic candidate ... or do you plan to skip the election for U.S. Congress at this time?" ROTATE CANDIDATES (IF OTHER, UNDECIDED, NEITHER, DK): "As of today, do you LEAN more toward Sununu, the Republican; or Clark the Democrat?"
- (2<sup>ND</sup> DISTRICT) "I'd like you to think about the election for your representative to the U.S. Congress. As of today, do you plan to vote for Charlie Bass, the Republican candidate ... Barney Brannen, the Democratic candidate ... or do you plan to skip the election for U.S. Congress at this time?" ROTATE CANDIDATES (IF OTHER, UNDECIDED, NEITHER, DK): "As of today, do you LEAN more toward Bass, the Republican; or Brannen the Democrat?"
- "Please think about the upcoming election for your representative to the New Hampshire House of Representatives. As of today . . . do you plan to vote for the Democratic or Republican candidate for the New Hampshire House of Representatives . . . or do you plan to skip the election for New Hampshire House of Representatives this time?" (IF OTHER, UNDECIDED, NEITHER, DK): "Suppose you had to vote right this minute . . . do you think you would vote for the Democratic candidate to the New Hampshire House . . . that you would vote for the Republican candidate, . . . or do you think you would decide NOT to vote for your representative to the New Hampshire House?"
- "Please think about the upcoming election for your representative to the New Hampshire Senate. As of today . . . do you plan to vote for the Democratic or Republican candidate for the New Hampshire Senate . . . or do you plan to skip the election for New Hampshire Senate this time?" (IF OTHER, UNDECIDED, NEITHER, DK): "Suppose you had to vote right this minute . . . do you think you would vote for the Democratic candidate to the New Hampshire House . . . that you would vote for the Republican candidate, . . . or do you think you would decide NOT to vote for your representative to the New Hampshire House?"
