BRADLEY GAINS OVER FINAL CAMPAIGN WEEKEND

Durham, NH – Senator Bill Bradley's more aggressive campaigning over the last several days appear to be paying political dividends. Bradley has narrowed Vice President Al Gore's lead in the New Hampshire Democratic primary.

These findings are based on the WMUR / FOX News New Hampshire Primary Tracking Poll,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Eight hundred, eighty-five (885) likely New Hampshire primary voters were interviewed between January 27 and January 30, 2000; 538 likely Republican primary voters and 347 likely Democratic primary voters. The potential sampling error for the survey is $\pm 3.3\%$, the sampling error for the Republican sub-sample is $\pm 4\%$ and $\pm 5\%$ for the Democratic sub-sample.

Democratic Primary

Last week, the Bradley campaign decided it was time to take the gloves off and to begin taking the fight to Al Gore. Bradley has recently taken Gore to task over his evolving abortion position and also for allegedly mis-characterizing the Bradley health care plan. This strategy appears to be working, although there may not be enough time left for Bradley to overtake Gore. Currently, 51% of likely Democratic primary voters say they will vote for Gore, 45% will vote for Bradley, and 4% remain undecided. Gore had been leading Bradley by as much as 13 percentage points last week.

Bradley's new strategy has helped him erode some of Gore's base among registered Democrats. Gore now leads Bradley 52% to 43% among registered Democrats with 1% preferring some other candidate and 5% undecided. Earlier this week, Gore had been leading Bradley by as many as 18 percentage points among registered Democrats.

Gore and Bradley remained tied among undeclared voters, or "independents", who say they plan to vote in the Democratic primary.

Higher turnout means that more independent voters will be coming to the polls and this will help Bradley. A low turnout election will help Gore because registered Democrats, who are more supportive of the Vice President, historically turn out to vote in higher numbers than independents.

Republican Primary

Arizona Senator John McCain has been campaigning in New Hampshire since the spring and his hard work appears to be paying off. After the final campaign weekend, McCain holds a narrow lead over Texas Governor George W. Bush with 41% of likely Republican primary voters saying they will vote for McCain, 35% planning to vote for Bush, 13% planning to vote for publisher Steve Forbes, 8% planning to vote for former Ambassador Alan Keyes, 1% favoring other candidates, and 3% remaining undecided.

McCain strongest support continues to come from undeclared voters who say they will vote in the Republican primary. These voters are often referred to as "independents". In the latest WMUR / FOX News tracking poll, 54% of independents say they will vote for McCain, 20% will vote for Bush, 14% will vote for Forbes, 8% will vote for Keyes, 1% will vote for some other candidate, and 2% are undecided.

Bush continues to lead among registered Republicans. In the final tracking poll, 44% of registered Republicans say they will vote for Bush, 32% will vote for McCain, 12% will vote for Forbes, and 8% will vote for Keyes.

Turnout will be the key factor in tomorrow’s election. High voter turnout favors McCain because it will mean more independent voters heading to the polls. If the percentage of independents who vote in the Republican primary reaches 30%, McCain will likely hold his lead over Bush. But if the percentage of independents is lower, in the 20-25% range, Bush could catch McCain. Lower turnout helps Bush because he does better than McCain among registered Republicans, who are more likely to actually come out and vote than are independents.

Steve Forbes saw a small bounce after his strong performance in the Iowa caucuses, but this appears to have run its course. Forbes currently gets 13% of the likely GOP primary vote, the average for his polling numbers over the past week.

Alan Keyes has remained stable with 8% of the likely Republican electorate.
