New Hampshire Primary Tracking Poll

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CANDIDATE QUALITIES, NOT ISSUES, IMPORTANT TO NH VOTERS

Durham, NH – With low unemployment and a strong economy, New Hampshire voters are focusing less on issues, and more on candidate qualities, in choosing presidential candidates.

These findings are based on the WMUR / FOX News New Hampshire Primary Tracking Poll,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Nine hundred two (902) likely New Hampshire primary voters were interviewed between January 24 and January 27, 2000; 508 likely Republican primary voters and 394 likely Democratic primary voters. The potential sampling error for the survey is $\pm 3.3\%$, the sampling error for the Republican sub-sample is $\pm 4\%$ and $\pm 5\%$ for the Democratic sub-sample.

In 1992 and 1996, the state economy was the major concern for New Hampshire voters. But in 2000, with unemployment hovering between 2% and 3%, and with no major domestic or foreign policy problems looming, New Hampshire voters are focusing less on issues and more on the personal qualities of candidates.

Republican Primary

Among likely Republican primary voters, the most important issue in their selection of a candidate is taxes, but this is hardly a dominant issue, named by only 18% GOP voters. Other issues were named almost as frequently, morality was cited by 14%, health care was named by 14%, the economy by 12%, Social Security by 11%, and education was mentioned by 11% of likely GOP primary voters.

Among those Republicans who said taxes was the most important issue, 36% say they will vote for Bush, 25% will vote for McCain, 23% will vote for Forbes, and 11% will vote for Keyes.

Two issues which have been widely discussed, but which have not registered with GOP voters, are abortion and campaign finance reform. Despite heavy emphasis on abortion by Steve Forbes and Alan Keyes, only 7% of likely Republican primary voters say that abortion is their most important issue. The New Hampshire Republican electorate is moderately pro-choice, perhaps a reason that neither Forbes or Keyes has caught on here.

Similarly, John McCain has put heavy emphasis on campaign finance reform but only 5% of Republican primary voters say that this is their most important issue. However, McCain has effectively used this issue to portray himself as a candidate willing to stand up to his party and to stand up for what he believes, a candidate quality which is very attractive to Republicans.

While issues are not having much impact among Republican voters, the personal qualities of candidates are important in 2000. Likely GOP voters were read a list of 7 qualities that are important in candidates, and asked which was most important in their decision of who to support. Among Republicans, the most important candidate qualities are that he “stands up for what he believes” (38%), that he is a “strong, decisive leader” (14%), that he “cares about the average American” (12%), that he “represents conservative values” (11%), and that he has the “right experience” (11%). “Understanding complex issues” (7%), and having the “best chance to win in November” (5%) are less important to Republican voters.

As mentioned earlier, John McCain does very well among those Republicans who say standing up for what he believes is the candidate quality they hold most important. Among these Republicans, 48% say they plan to vote for McCain, 22% plan to vote for Bush, 15% plan to vote for Forbes, and 12% plan to vote for Keyes.

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McCain also does well among those Republican voters who say that the quality they hold most important is that a candidate is a “strong, decisive leader”. Among these Republicans, 50% say they will vote for McCain, 33% will vote for Bush, 8% will vote for Forbes and 6% will vote for Keyes.

McCain’s lead over Bush among voters who believe that firm personal beliefs and strong leadership qualities are most important is a major reason why he continues to hold a lead over Bush going into this final campaign weekend. Currently, 40% of likely GOP primary voters say they will vote for McCain, 33% will vote for Bush, 15% will vote for Forbes, 9% will vote for Keyes, less than 1% will vote for Gary Bauer, and 2% are undecided.

Democratic Primary

Issues are somewhat more important among Democratic primary voters than among Republicans. The issues most important to Democrats are health care (30%), education (21%), Social Security (14%), and the economy (13%). Less important issues are abortion (6%), taxes (5%), gun control (4%), campaign finance reform (3%), morality (2%), and foreign policy (2%).

Al Gore and Bill Bradley have spent the last two months debating health care plans and Gore appears to have an edge in the debate. Among those Democratic voters who say that health care is their most important issue, 56% say they plan to vote for Gore and 42% plan to vote for Bradley.

Gore is also besting Bradley among those voters who consider education to be their most important issue, 55% to 37%.

And Gore is also attracting more votes than Bradley from those Democrats who consider Social Security to be their most important issue, 61% to 34%. This is politically important because older voters (65 and older) are most concerned about Social Security, and they are more likely to turn out and vote than are younger voters.

The candidate qualities which are most important to Democratic voters are that a candidate “stands up for what he believes” (27%), that he “has the right experience” (24%), and that he is a “strong, decisive leader” (23%). Among Democrats who say the quality they hold most important in a candidate is that he “stands up for his beliefs”, 52% say they will vote for Bradley and 42% will vote for Gore.

Voters who say the candidate quality they hold most important is that he “has the right experience” overwhelmingly say they will vote for Gore, 92% to 7%. And among voters who say the candidate quality they hold most important is that he be a “strong, decisive leader”, 54% say they will vote for Gore and 38% will vote for Bradley.

Gore’s experience and perceived leadership qualities are important reasons why he continues to hold his overall lead over Bradley. In the most recent WMUR / FOX News tracking poll, 54% of all likely Democratic primary voters say they will vote for Gore, 41% will vote for Bradley, and 4% remain undecided.
