## New Hampshire Primary Tracking Poll

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### INDEPENDENTS FAVOR McCain

Durham, NH – Independent voters will play a significant role in the New Hampshire primary, but their impact will be felt most within parties, rather than between parties. John McCain is benefitting most from the independent vote.

These findings are based on the WMUR / FOX News New Hampshire Primary Tracking Poll,\* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Nine hundred, twenty-six (926) likely New Hampshire primary voters were interviewed between January 23 and January 26, 2000; 520 likely Republican primary voters and 406 likely Democratic primary voters. The potential sampling error for the survey is  $\pm 3.2\%$ , the sampling error for the Republican sub-sample is  $\pm 4\%$  and  $\pm 5\%$  for the Democratic sub-sample.

### Independent or Just Undeclared?

Political observers are concentrating on the importance of undeclared voters, often referred to as “independents”, in the New Hampshire primary. Since these voters now make up 37% of all registered voters in New Hampshire, more than Republicans (36%) and Democrats (27%), their potential political impact is great. And because these voters do not choose to identify with a party, there is a temptation to think of this large bloc as political free agents. Most, however, do have partisan leanings; 28% consider themselves Democrats, 24% consider themselves Republicans, and 47% consider themselves politically independent.

Undeclared voters have the option of voting in either the Democratic or Republican primary so where they choose to vote may be as important as who they choose to vote for. In the 2000 New Hampshire primary, undeclared voters are more likely to vote in the Republican primary than in the Democratic primary. Sixty-two percent of undeclared likely primary voters say they plan to vote in the Republican primary and 38% say they plan to vote in the Democratic primary.

### Who are These Guys?

Independents tend to be younger, have higher levels of education (more than half have college degrees), and have not lived in New Hampshire as long as either registered Democrats or Republicans. Politically, undeclared voters have less interest in the primary and are less likely to vote in the primary than are registered Democrats or Republicans.

### Impact of Independents

Because they are less likely to vote in the primary than are registered Republicans or registered Democrats, undeclared voters are not likely to make up more than 30% of the primary electorate. But the potential impact of undeclared voters in both the Republican and Democratic primaries should not be underestimated. Races in both primaries are tight, and a few percentage points difference among this group could mean victory or defeat. In the latest WMUR / FOX News tracking poll, 51% of the undeclared voters who plan to vote in the Republican primary say they will vote for John McCain, 26% will vote for George W. Bush, 15% for Steve Forbes, and 6% for Alan Keyes. McCain has consistently led Bush among undeclared voters.

In the Democratic primary undeclared voters are split between Al Gore and Bill Bradley. In the latest tracking poll, 47% say they will vote for Gore, 46% say they will vote for Bradley, and 7% are undecided. Gore has recently picked up support among independents. In earlier tracking polls, Bradley had been leading Gore among independents.

**McCain or Bradley**

Because undeclared voters can vote in either primary, there has been considerable speculation by political observers about whether McCain or Bradley would be competing for the same votes.

Looking specifically at those undeclared voters who are considering both Bradley and McCain, McCain is much more likely to pick up Bradley voters than Bradley picking up McCain voters. Among undeclared voters who plan to vote for McCain, only 11% say that Bradley is their second choice. However, 45% of those undeclared voters who plan to vote for Bradley say that McCain is their second choice. Currently, less than 5% of the overall primary electorate consists of undeclared voters who name either Bradley or McCain as their first choice and who also name Bradley or McCain as their second choice.

If Bradley loses independent voters, many may decide to go with their second choice and vote for McCain. But if McCain loses independent voters, they are much likely to stay within the Republican primary and vote for Bush or Forbes.

**Republican Primary**

Among all likely Republican primary voters, McCain continues to lead his Republican rivals. In the most recent tracking poll, 41% of likely GOP primary voters say they will vote for McCain, 33% will vote for Bush, 14% will vote for Forbes, 9% will vote for Keyes, less than 1% will vote for Bauer, and 3% are undecided.

**Democratic Primary**

Among all likely Democratic primary voters, Gore is maintaining his lead over Bradley. Currently, 53% of likely Democratic primary voters say they will vote for Gore, 42% say they will vote for Bradley, and 4% are undecided.
