SUNUNU APPROVAL STEADY; BIPARTSIAN AGREEMENT NH HEADED IN RIGHT DIRECTION

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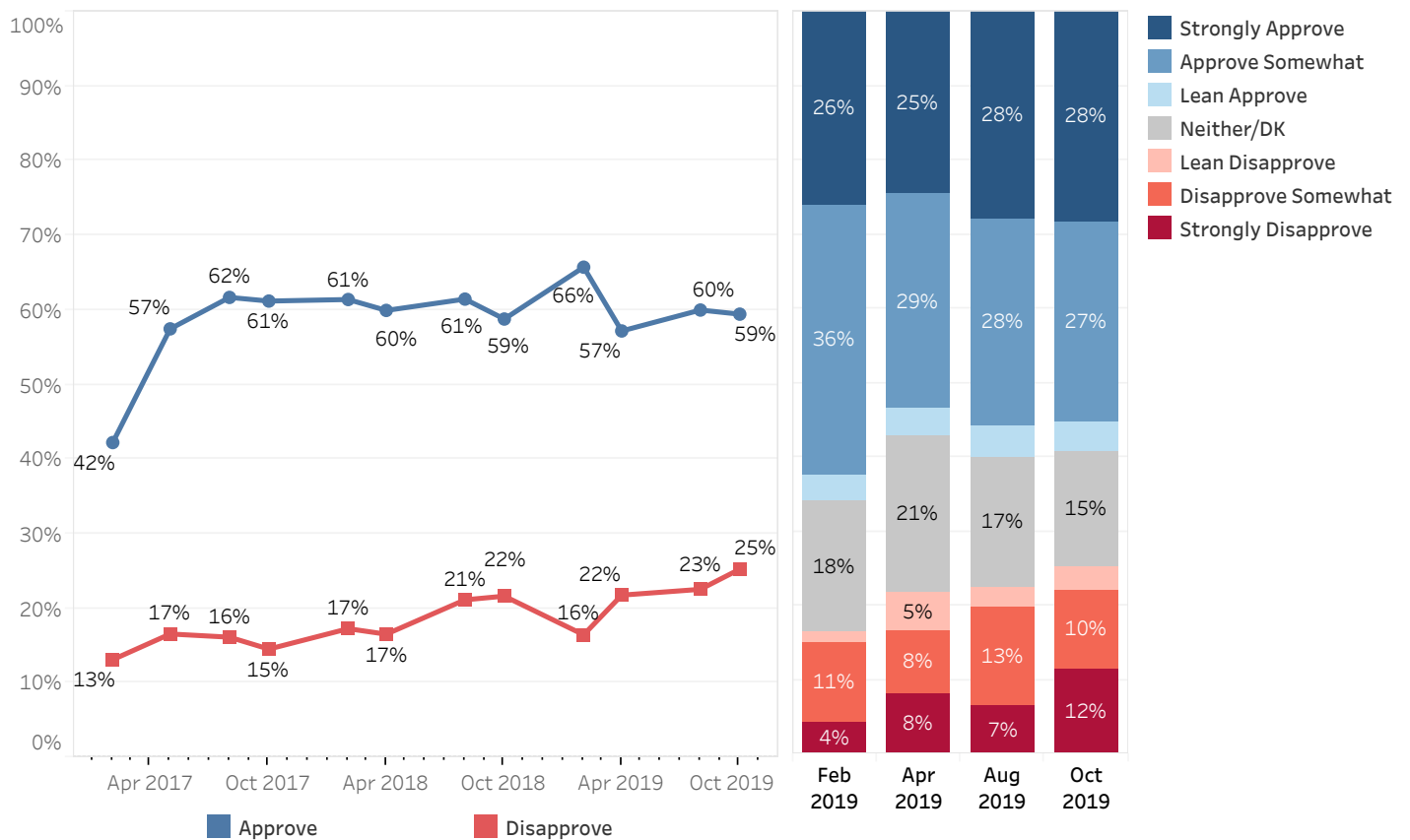
DURHAM, NH – Governor Chris Sununu remains popular nearly a year away from the 2020 election; six in ten New Hampshire residents approve of Sununu's performance as Governor while only a quarter disapprove. Nearly three-quarters of Granite Staters - and majorities of Republicans, Democrats, and Independents - believe the state is headed in the right direction. Residents continue to see drugs as the most important problem facing the state by a wide margin over any other issue.

These findings are based on the latest **CNN 2020 New Hampshire Primary Poll***, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. One thousand and two hundred sixty-six (1,266) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between October 21 and October 27, 2019. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 2.8 percent.

Gubernatorial Approval

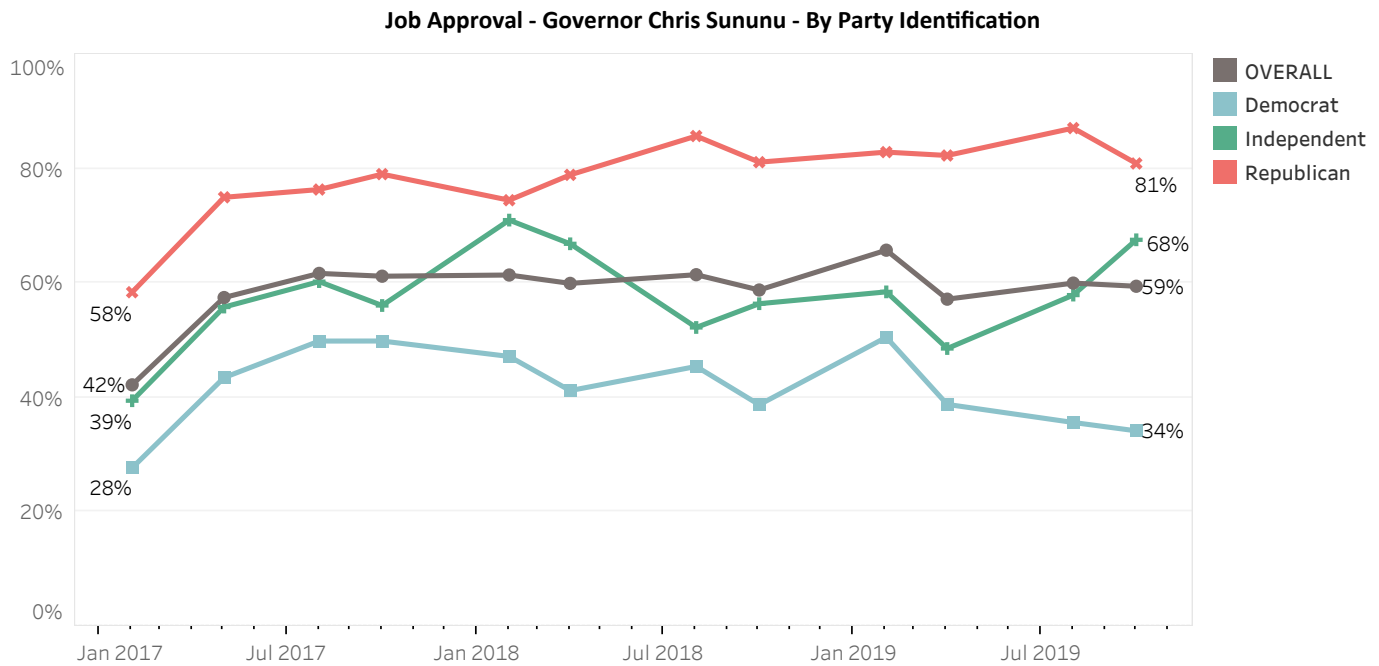
With nearly a year to go before the 2020 election, New Hampshire Governor Chris Sununu remains popular in the state. Fifty-nine percent of New Hampshire residents approve of Sununu's performance as Governor, 25% disapprove, and 15% neither approve nor disapprove or don't know.

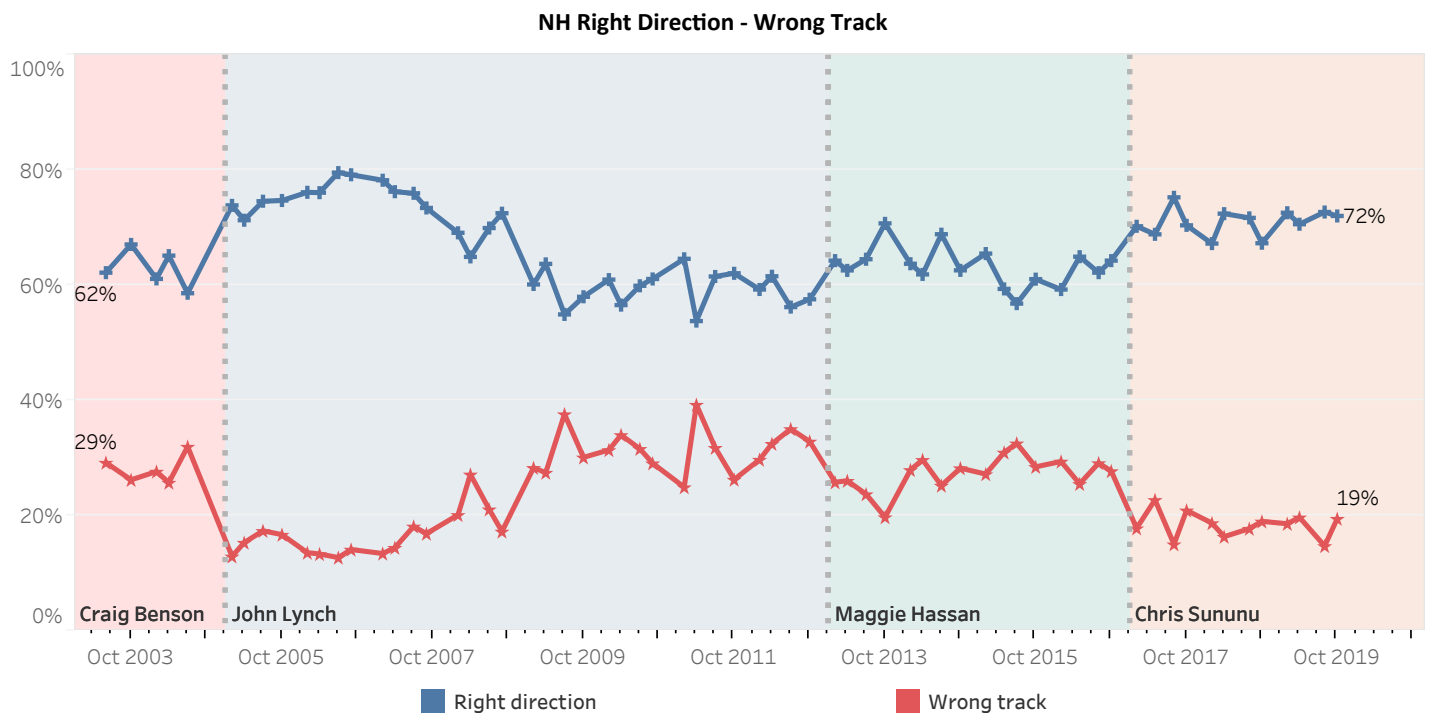
Eighty-one percent of Republicans and just over two-thirds (68%) of Independents approve of the job Sununu is doing but only 34% of Democrats agree. Sununu's approval among Democrats is at its lowest point since February 2017 (28%) but his approval among Independents (68%) is at its highest point since February 2018.



NH Heading in Right Direction or On Wrong Track

Granite Staters continue to believe the state is headed in the right direction. Seventy-two percent of New Hampshire residents say things in NH are generally going in the right direction, while 19% say things are seriously off on the wrong track and 9% don't know or are unsure.

Optimism about the state's future continues to be bipartisan: 78% of Republicans, 74% of Independents, and 65% of Democrats feel the state is headed in the right direction. Optimism about the state's future among Independents (74%) is at its highest point since April 2007.

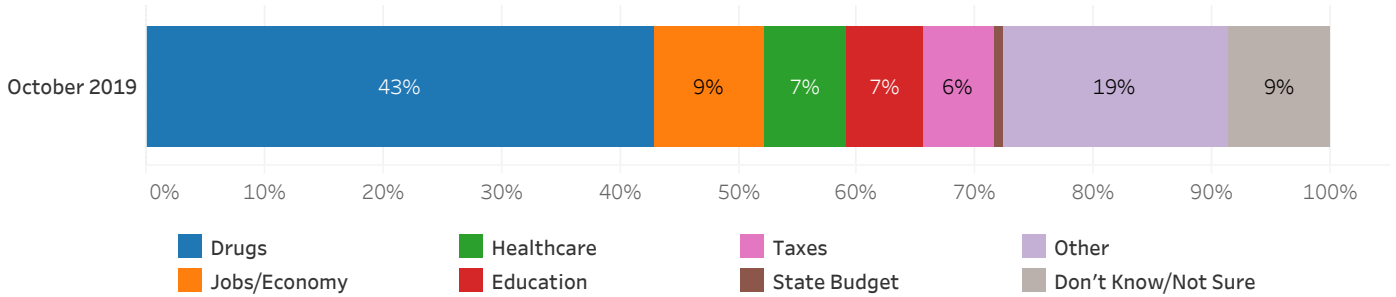


Most Important Problem Facing New Hampshire

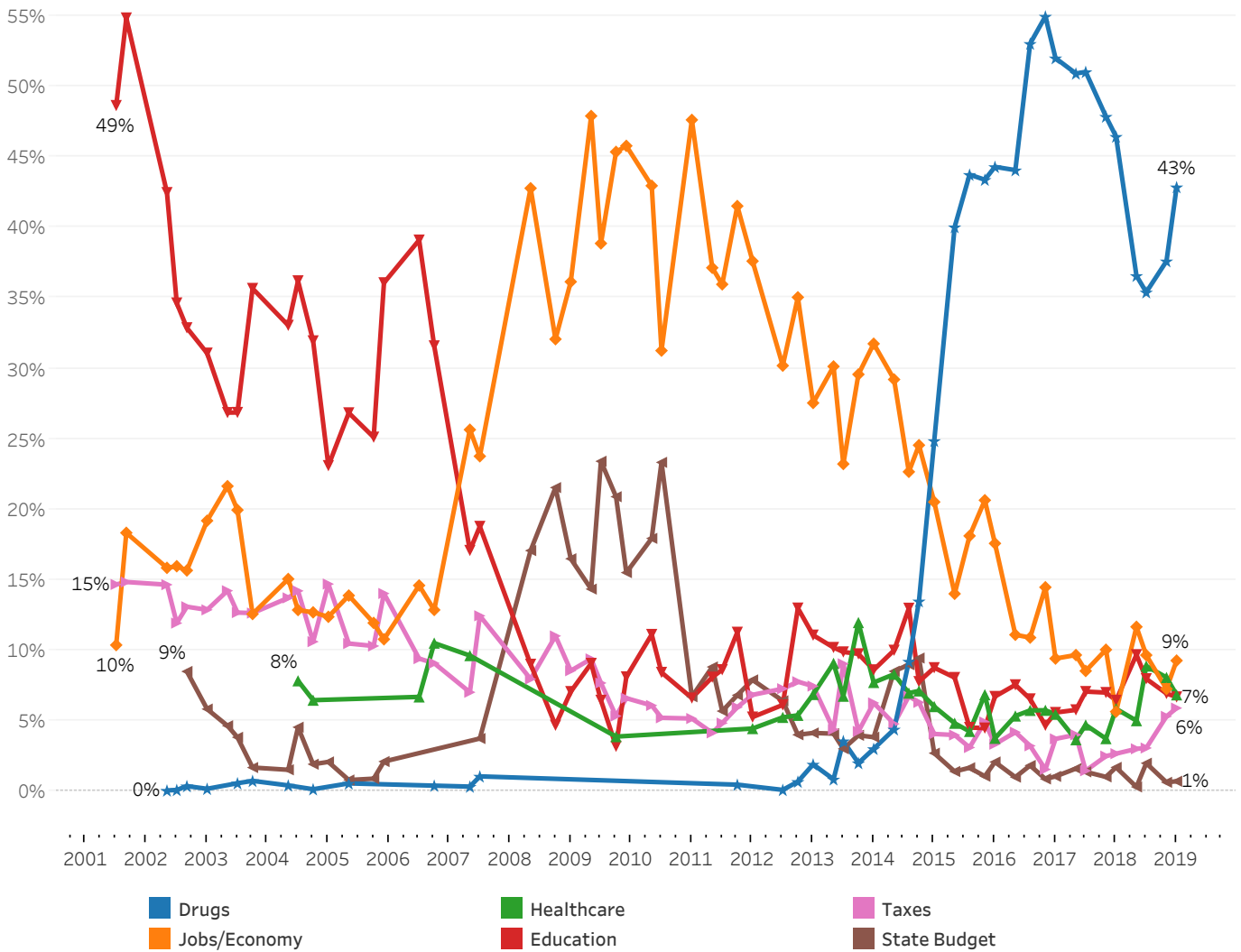
The drug crisis remains the most important problem facing the state: 43% of New Hampshire residents cite it as the most important problem, slightly higher than in April (35%) but lower than then level of concern reported in 2017 and 2018. Nine percent of Granite Staters say jobs or the economy is the most important problem facing the state, 7% each cite healthcare or education, 6% mention taxes, and 1% cite the state budget. Nineteen percent of respondents mention another problem while 9% don't know or are unsure.

Respondents aged 18 to 34 are more likely than others to say the drug crisis the most important problem facing the state while those aged 65 and older are less likely to say so.

CNN 2020 New Hampshire Primary Poll

These findings are based on the latest CNN 2020 New Hampshire Primary Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. One thousand and two hundred sixty-six (1,266) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between October 21 and October 27, 2019. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 2.8 percent.

The random sample used in the CNN 2020 New Hampshire Primary Poll was purchased from Scientific Telephone Samples (STS), Rancho Santo Margarita, CA. STS screens each selected telephone number to eliminate non-working numbers, disconnected numbers, and business numbers to improve the efficiency of the sample, reducing the amount of time interviewers spend calling non-usable numbers. When a landline number is reached, the interviewer randomly selects a member of the household by asking to speak with the adult currently living in the household who has had the most recent birthday. This selection process ensures that every adult (18 years of age or older) in the household has an equal chance of being included in the survey.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households. Additionally, data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.
