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2020 NH PRIMARY VOTERS FOUND IT EASY TO VOTE, CONFIDENT VOTE WAS COUNTED ACCURATELY

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DURHAM, NH – The vast majority of voters in New Hampshire's "First in the Nation" primary found it easy to vote; more than ninety percent of primary participants said it was very or somewhat easy to vote while only one in twenty said it was somewhat or very difficult to do so. More than four in five primary voters were very confident their vote was accurately counted while nearly all of the rest were somewhat confident. When asked about a month before the election, likely voters had been slightly more pessimistic about their perceived ease of voting in the primary and their confidence that their vote would be accurately counted.

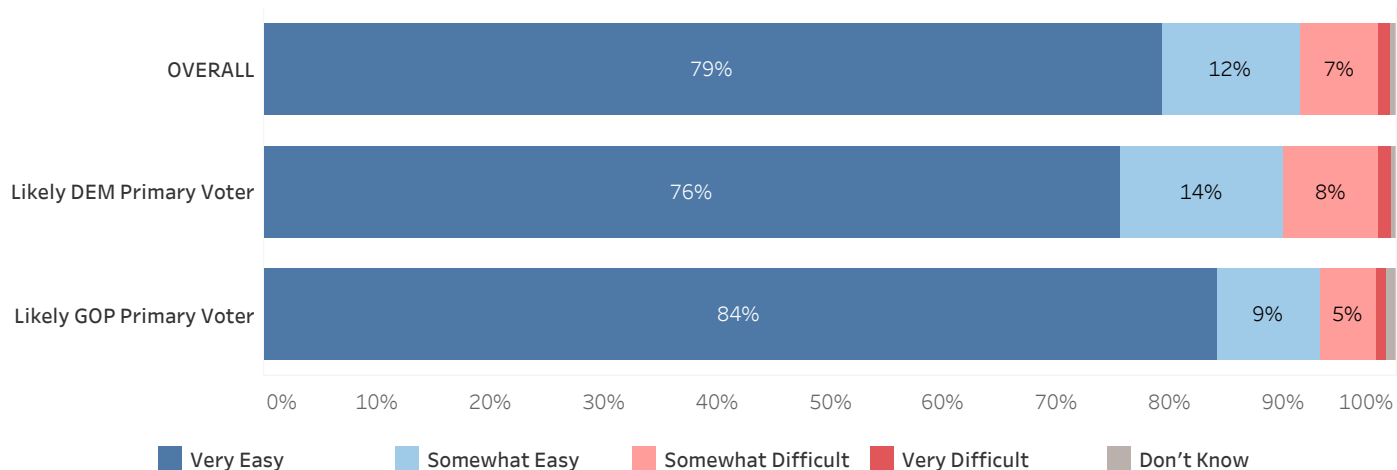
The pre-primary findings were based on the **CNN 2020 New Hampshire Primary Poll*** conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. One thousand and one hundred seventy-six (1,176) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between January 15 and January 23, 2020. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 2.9 percent. Included in the sample were 910 likely 2020 New Hampshire Primary voters (MSE +/- 3.2%).

The post-primary findings were based on the **Granite State Poll*** conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Six hundred eleven (611) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between February 19 and February 25, 2020. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.0 percent. Included in the sample were 426 reported 2020 New Hampshire Primary voters (MSE +/- 4.7%).

Ease of Voting in New Hampshire Primary

In a pre-primary survey conducted in January, 79% of likely voters expected that it would be very easy to vote, 12% expected it to be somewhat easy, 7% expected it to be somewhat difficult, and 1% expected it to be very difficult. Seventy-six percent of likely Democratic primary voters and 84% of likely Republican primary voters anticipated it would be very easy to vote in the primary.

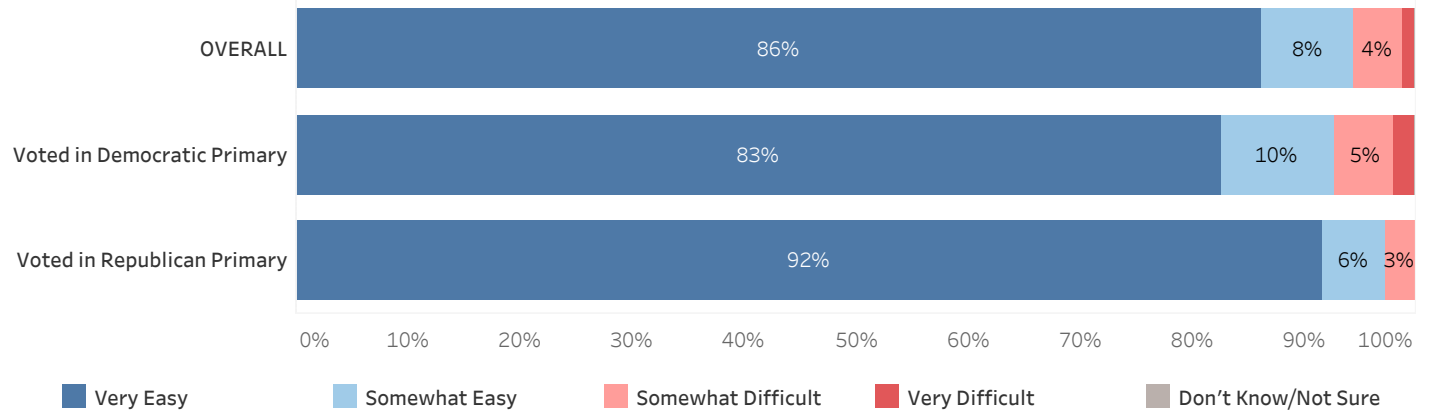
Perceived Ease of Voting in New Hampshire Primary - Pre-Primary: By Primary Intending to Vote In

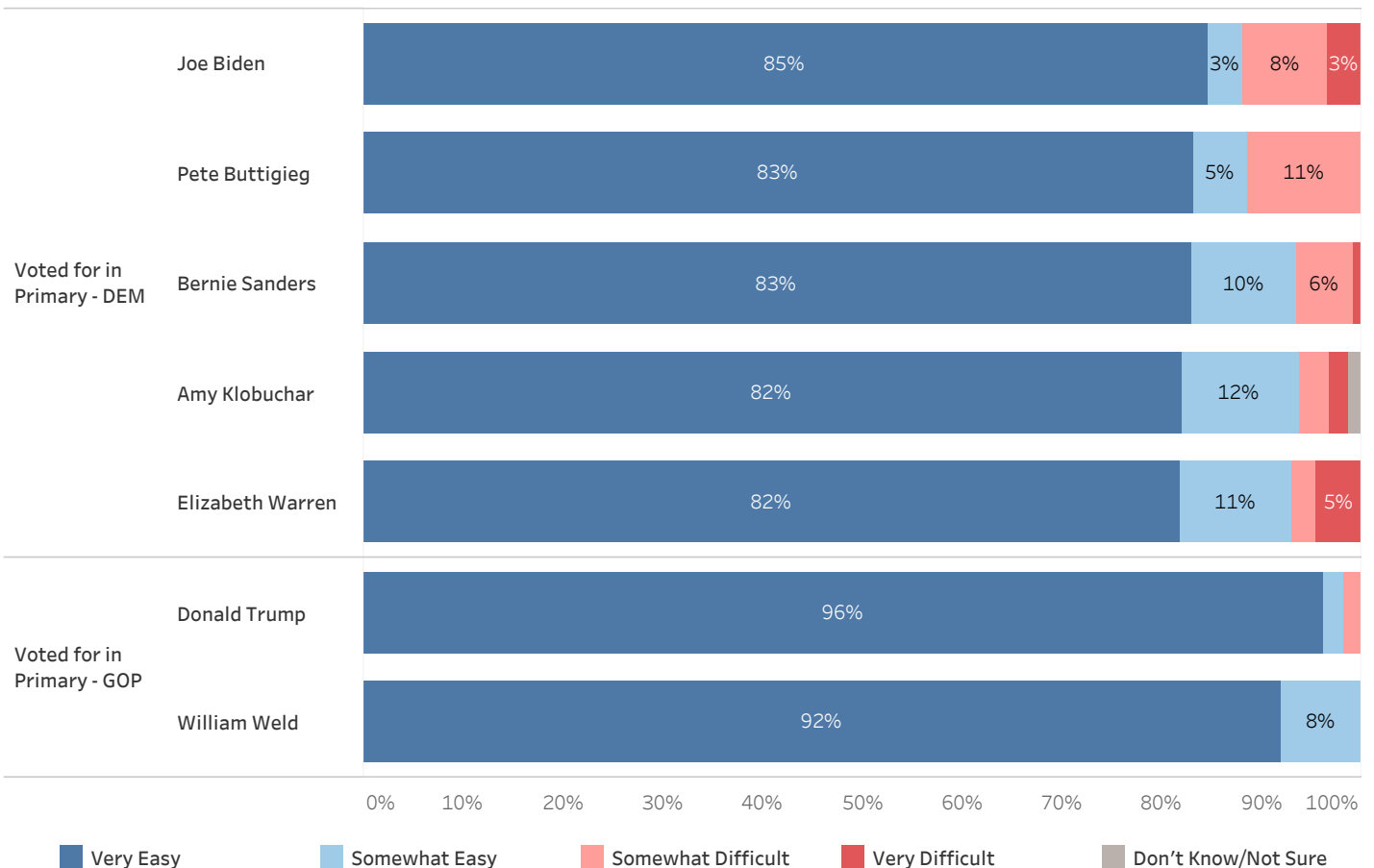
Primary voters as a whole found it slightly easier to vote than they expected. Eighty-six percent of New Hampshire primary voters said it was very easy for them to vote in New Hampshire's "First in the Nation" primary. Eight percent said it was somewhat easy, 4% said it was somewhat difficult, and only 1% said it was very difficult to vote. This assessment is bipartisan, as 93% of those who voted in the Democratic Primary and 97% of those who voted in the Republican primary felt it was very or somewhat easy to vote.

Ease of Voting in New Hampshire Primary - Post Primary: By Primary Voted In



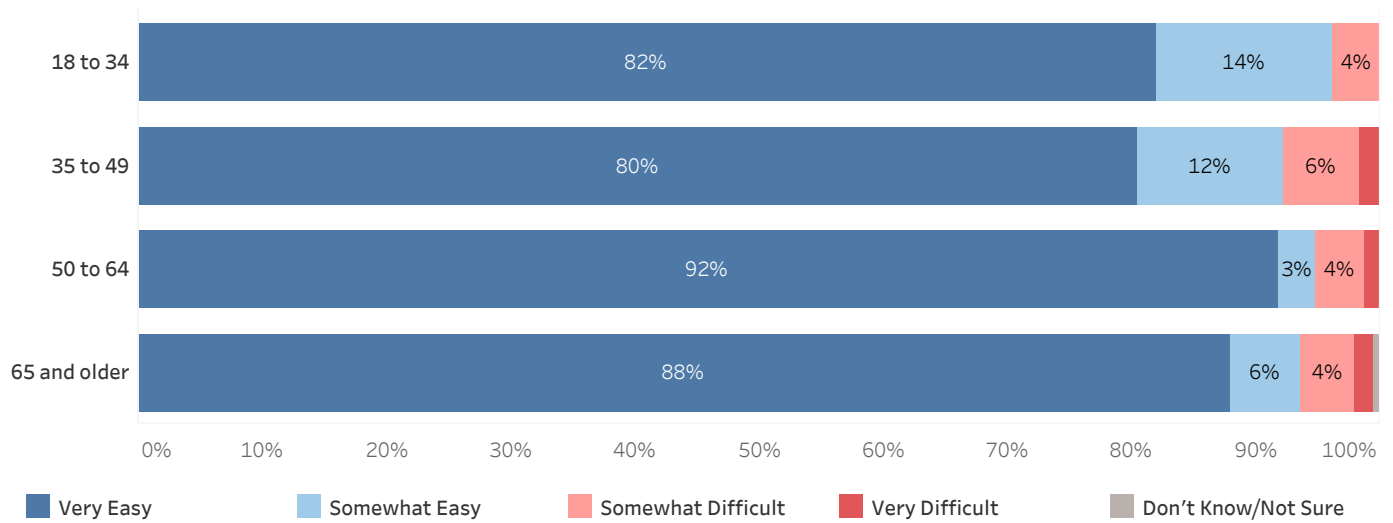
Most voters in the Democratic primary, regardless of which candidate they supported, said it was very easy to vote: 85% of Biden supporters, 83% of Buttigieg and Sanders supporters, and 82% of Klobuchar and Warren supporters said it was very easy to do so. Among Republican primary voters, 96% of Trump voters said that voting was very easy while 92% of Weld voters agreed.

Ease of Voting in New Hampshire Primary - Post-Primary: By Candidate Voted For



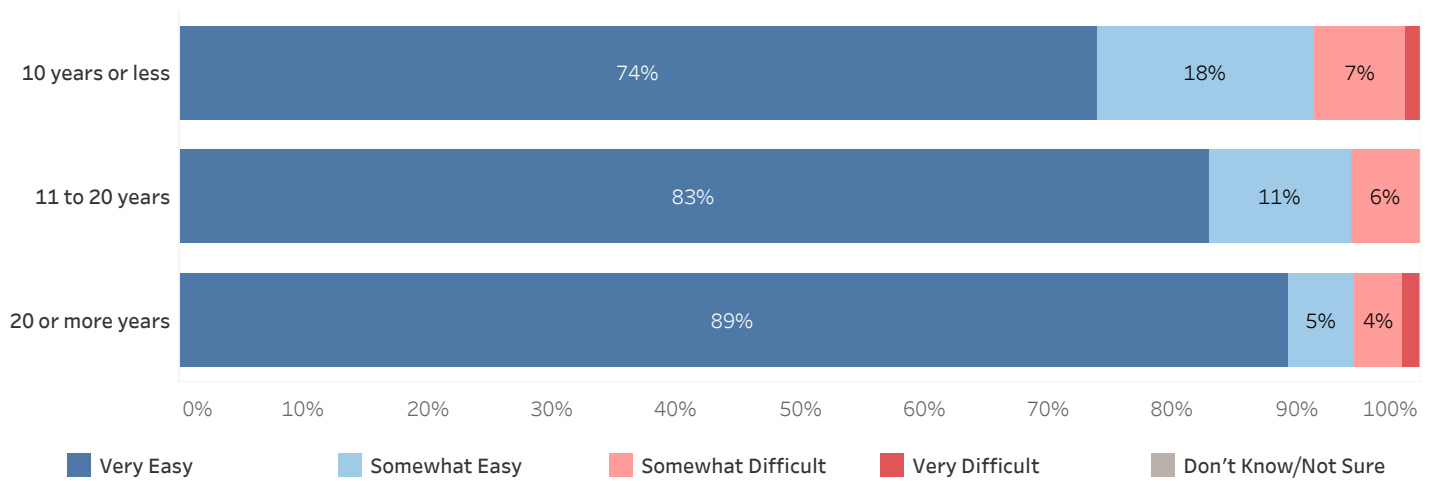
Those between the ages of 18 and 49 were slightly less likely than older respondents to say it was very easy to vote but the proportion who found it somewhat or very difficult to vote was similar across all age groups.

The proportion who said it was very easy to vote is higher among those who have lived longer in the state, but the proportion who found it somewhat or very difficult to vote was similar regardless of how long someone has lived in the state.

Ease of Voting in New Hampshire Primary - Post Primary: By Years Lived in NH

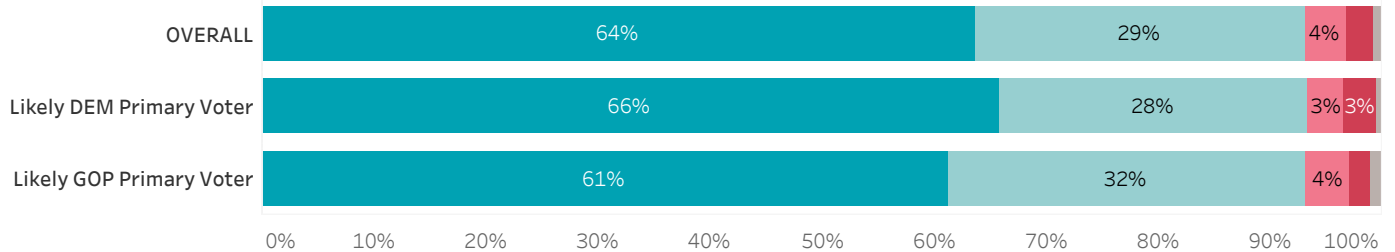


Confidence New Hampshire Primary Vote was Accruately Counted

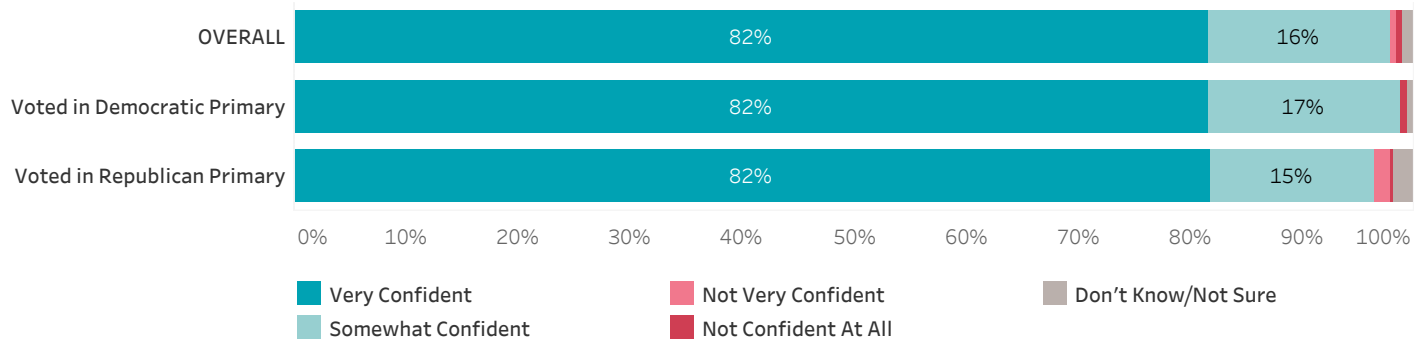
In the pre-primary survey conducted in January, 64% of likely voters were very confident that their primary vote would be counted accurately. Two-thirds (66%) of likely Democratic primary voters and 61% of likely Republican primary voters anticipated their vote would be accurately counted.

Primary voters as a whole expressed slightly greater confidence that their vote was accurately counted than was predicted in January. Eighty-two percent of New Hampshire primary voters were very confident that their vote was accurately counted; 16% said they were somewhat confident, 1% were not very confident, less than 1% were not confident at all, and 1% didn't know or were unsure. This assessment is bipartisan, as 99% of those who voted in the Democratic Primary and 97% of those who voted in the Republican primary felt this way.

Confidence Vote in New Hampshire Primary Would be Accruately Counted - Pre-Primary: By Primary Intending to Vote In

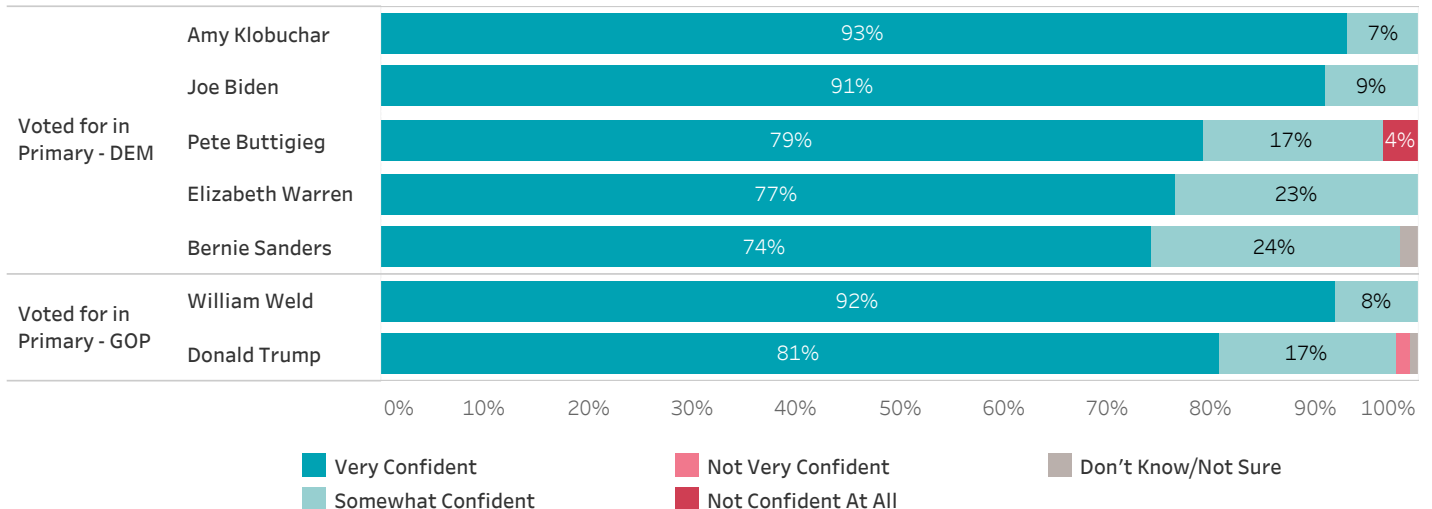


Confidence Vote in New Hampshire Primary was Accruately Counted - Post-Primary: By Primary Voted In



More than nine in ten Klobuchar (93%) and Biden (91%) supporters were very confident that their primary vote was accurately counted, while slightly fewer Buttigieg (79%), Warren (77%), and Sanders supporters (74%) felt this way. Among Republican primary voters, 92% of Weld supporters and 81% of Trump voters were very confident their vote was accurately counted.

Methodology

The pre-primary findings were based on the **CNN 2020 New Hampshire Primary Poll** conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. One thousand and one hundred seventy-six (1,176) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between January 15 and January 23, 2020. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 2.9 percent. Included in the sample were 910 likely 2020 New Hampshire Primary voters (MSE +/- 3.2%).

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The random sample used was purchased from Scientific Telephone Samples (STS), Rancho Santo Margarita, CA. STS screens each selected telephone number to eliminate non-working numbers, disconnected numbers, and business numbers to improve the efficiency of the sample, reducing the amount of time interviewers spend calling non-usable numbers. When a landline number is reached, the interviewer randomly selects a member of the household by asking to speak with the adult currently living in the household who has had the most recent birthday. This selection process ensures that every adult (18 years of age or older) in the household has an equal chance of being included in the survey.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households. Additionally, data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, as well as to party registration targets estimated by the New Hampshire Secretary of State. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions. These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The design effect for the surveys is 1.2%.
