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NH DIVIDED ON TRUMP'S, FEDERAL GOVERNMENT'S COVID-19 RESPONSE

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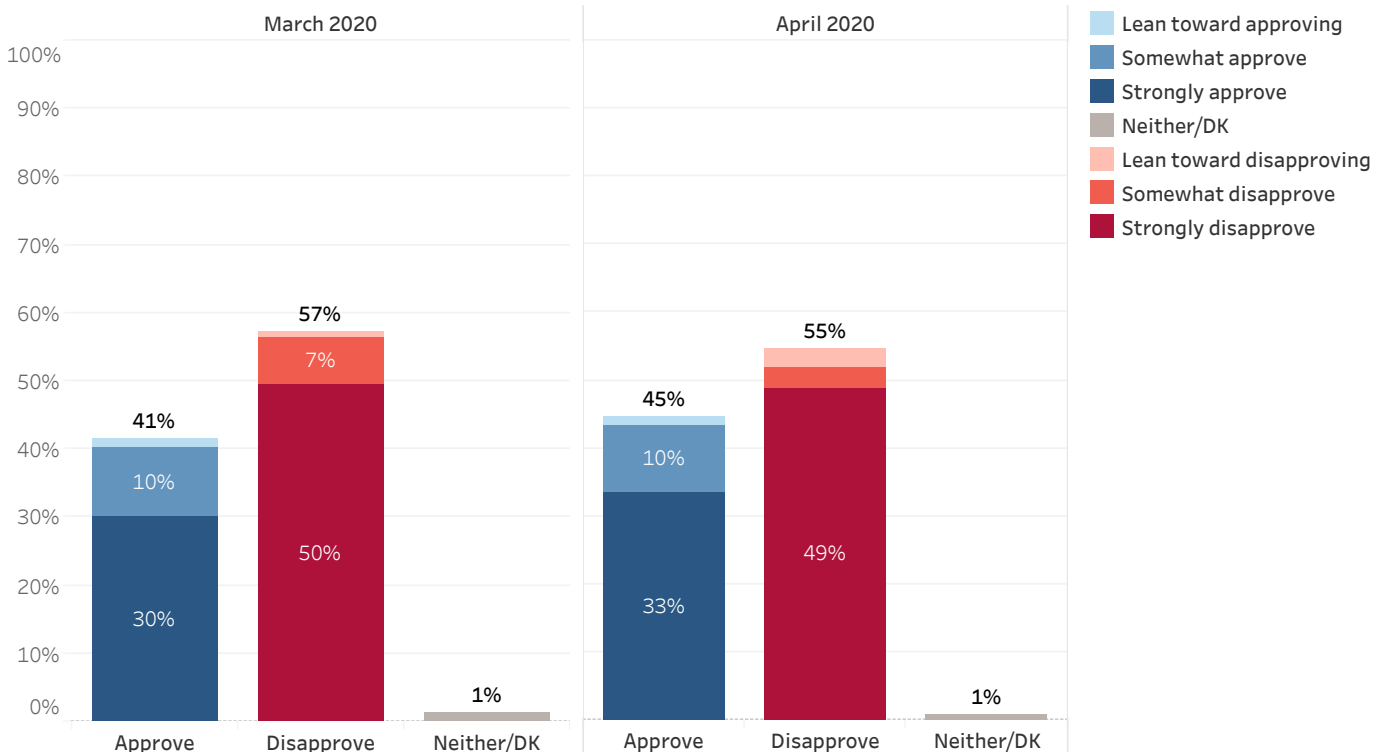
DURHAM, NH - As the country continues to deal with the coronavirus (COVID-19) situation, a majority of New Hampshire residents disapprove of how President Donald Trump is handling the crisis. Granite Staters are divided in their confidence in the federal government's ability to respond effectively to the situation largely along partisan lines. Three in four New Hampshire residents are very or somewhat worried that they or a member of their immediate family might catch coronavirus.

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Panel*** survey, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. One thousand and one hundred fifty-five (1,155) Granite State Panel members completed the survey online between April 16 and April 20, 2020. Data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, as well as party registration levels provided by the New Hampshire Secretary of State. The Granite State Panel is part of an effort by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center to investigate new ways of gathering and understanding the opinion of New Hampshire residents. Granite State Panel members are recruited from randomly-selected landline and cell phone numbers across New Hampshire and surveys are sent periodically to panel members.

Handling of Coronavirus (COVID-19) Situation by President Trump

A majority of New Hampshire residents (55%) disapprove of President Trump's handling of the coronavirus (COVID-19) situation, with most of them strongly disapproving. Forty-five percent approve of Trump's handling of the situation while 1% neither agree nor disagree or don't know. Approval of Trump's handling of the coronavirus situation is largely unchanged since March.

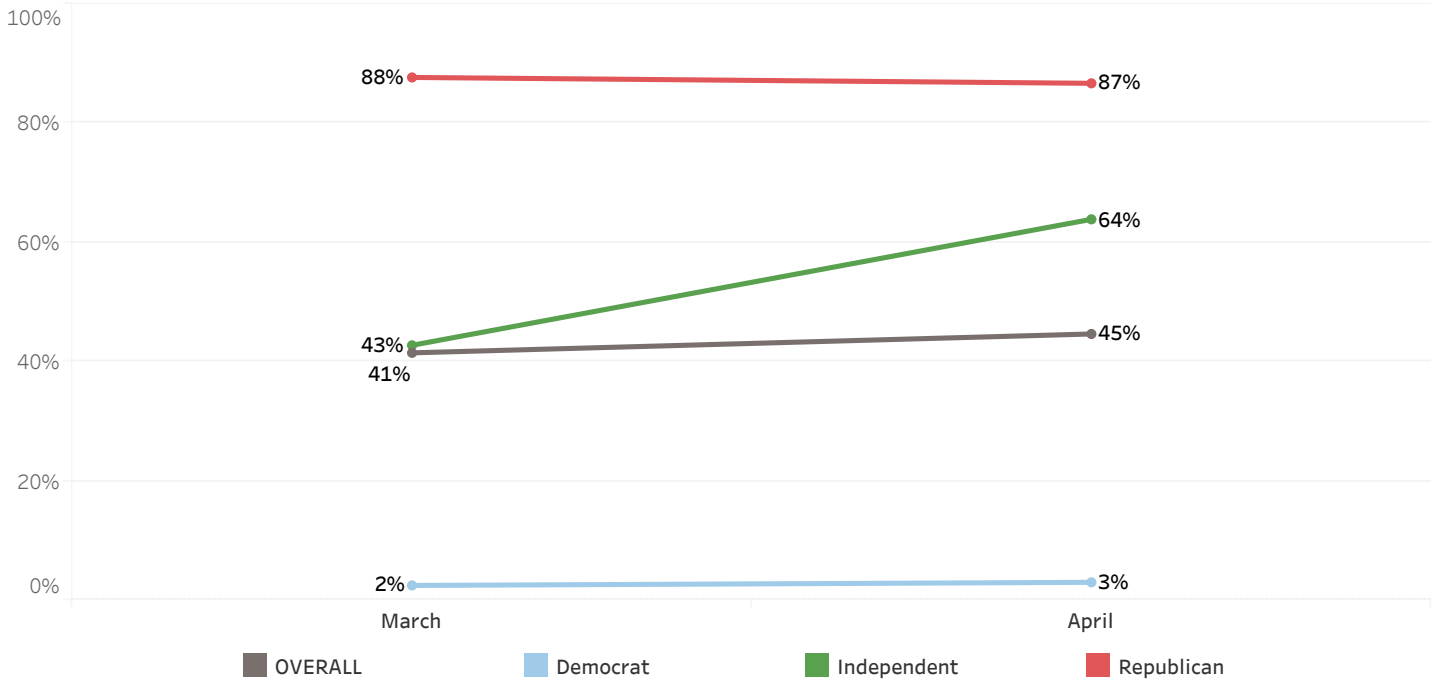
Approval of President Trump's Handling of Coronavirus (COVID-19) Situation

Granite Staters continue to be sharply divided by party in their assessment of how well Trump is handling the situation; Nearly all Republicans (87%) and two-thirds of Independents (64%) approve, but only 3% of Democrats do. A majority of Independents (64%) now approve of Trump's handling of the situation, up from 43% in March.

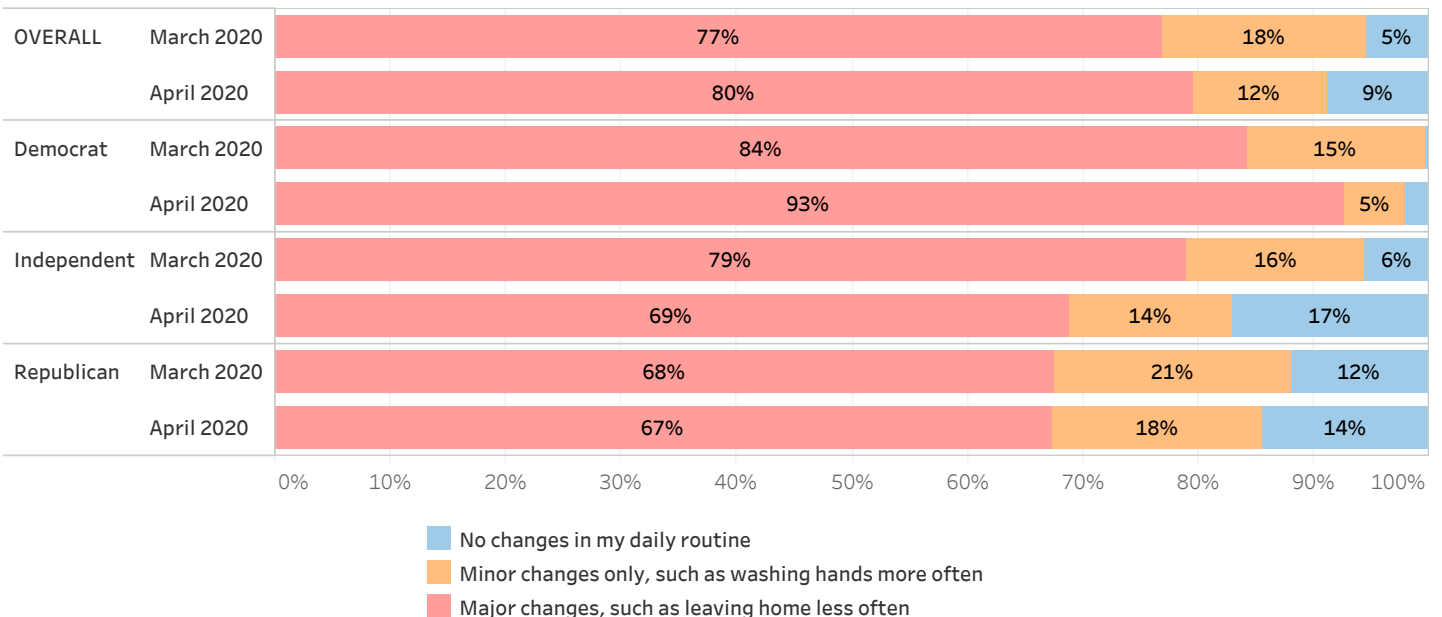
Approval of President Trump's Handling of Coronavirus (COVID-19) Situation - By Party Identification



Effect of Coronavirus (COVID-19) on Daily Life

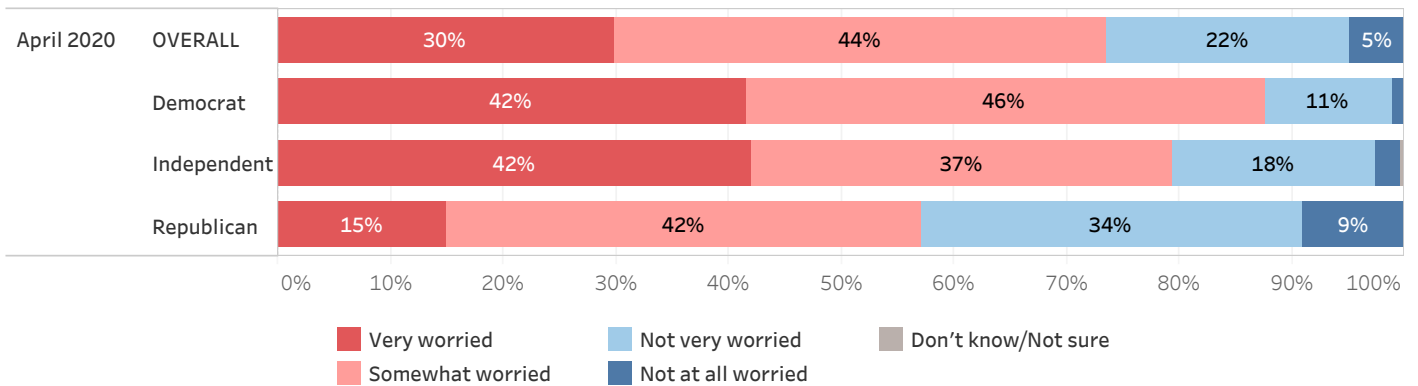
Four in five Granite Staters (80%) say they have made major changes to their daily routine because of coronavirus, 12% have made minor changes, and 9% have not made any changes. These numbers are largely unchanged since March. Democrats (93%) are more likely to say they have made major changes in their daily routine than Independents (69%) or Republicans (67%).

Roughly three-quarters (74%) of New Hampshire residents are very (30%) or somewhat (44%) worried that they or someone in their immediate family will catch coronavirus. Democrats (88%) and Independents (79%) are much more likely than Republicans (57%) to be very or somewhat worried that they or a family member will catch coronavirus.

How Worried Are You That You Or Immediate Family Member Might Catch Coronavirus

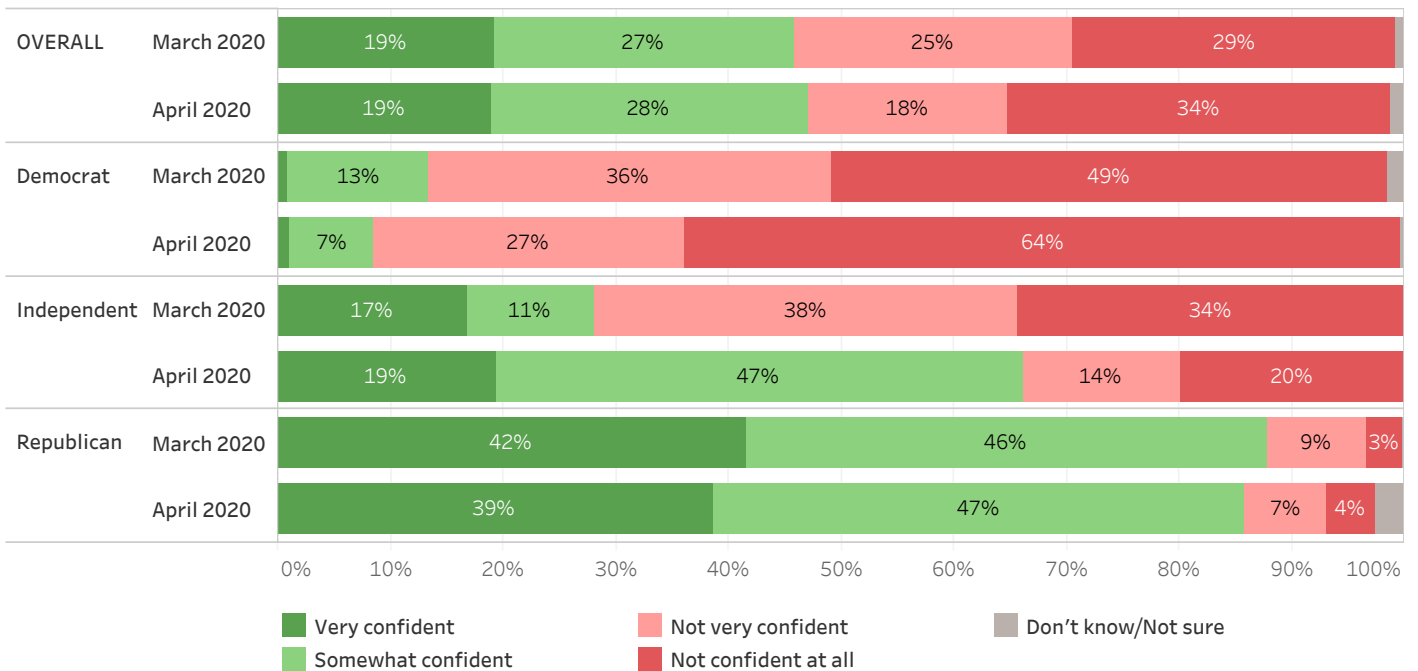


Federal Government Response To Coronavirus (COVID-19)

Nearly half of Granite Staters (47%) are very (19%) or somewhat (28%) confident in the federal government's ability to respond effectively to the coronavirus outbreak, while 52% are not very confident (18%) or not confident at all (34%). These numbers are relatively unchanged since March.

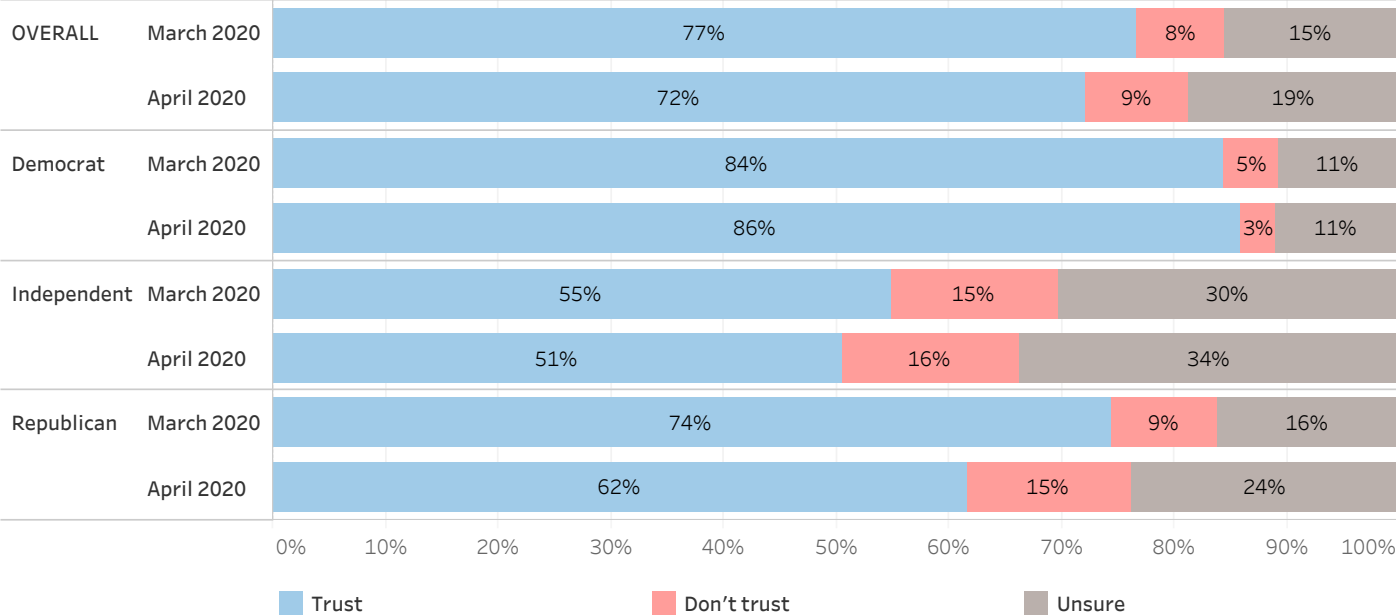
Majorities of Republicans (86%) and Independents (66%) are very or somewhat confident in the federal government's ability to respond effectively while nearly all Democrats (91%) are not very or not at all confident. The percentage of Independents who are very or somewhat confident has increased from 28% in March to 66% in April.

Nearly three in four New Hampshire residents (72%) trust science agencies such as the CDC as a source of information about the coronavirus, 9% don't trust them, and 19% are unsure. These numbers are largely unchanged since March. Democrats (86%) are more likely to trust these agencies than Republicans (62%) and Independents (51%). The percentage of Republicans who trust science agencies as a source of information about coronavirus (62%) has decreased since March (74%).

Granite State Panel Methodology

These findings are based on the latest Granite State Panel survey, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. One thousand and one hundred fifty-five (1,155) Granite State Panel members completed the survey online between April 16 and April 20, 2020. Data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, as well as party registration levels provided by the New Hampshire Secretary of State.

The Granite State Panel is part of an effort by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center to investigate new ways of gathering and understanding the opinion of New Hampshire residents. Granite State Panel members are recruited from randomly-selected landline and cell phone numbers across New Hampshire. Respondents to the Granite State Poll were asked if they wished to participate in further research and asked to provide an email address. Those who agreed and provided an email address were added to the panel. Panel members were also recruited by texting a random sample of cellular telephones in the state and inviting the recipient to take a short survey.

For each survey which they complete, panel members are entered into quarterly drawings to earn rewards, such as gift certificates from statewide and internet companies. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.
