

ecently, Jim and I attended a local festival. The sound was good and the callers excellent, and we had a great time. This particular festival was well attended and consisted of Plus dancing through Challenge. However, I was unusually disturbed by the hand holds in the square. Most of the time we don't run into any kind of problem in that respect. I suppose it was due to the fact that lots of the dancers were from the Advanced or Challenge level and always met us in the square with their hands in a downward position for ocean waves. Please don't get me wrong, I don't mind using this hand hold. In fact at times it's more comfortable, but meeting seven other people in the square and wondering which way you should connect with them was sometimes a problem. Up or down, makes no difference to me, but it's that everlasting battle with fingers and nails that makes it difficult to execute the dance. I've been poked and thumb-grabbed until it becomes exasperating.


I think the worst problem comes when one grabs the thumb and hangs on like they're going to milk a cow. Many of us long-time dancers suffer from problems with our joints, arthritis

for one thing, and that can get pretty painful at times. I remember being taught to hold my hands about shoulder high and my palm down so the man could take it in his hand which is supposed to be in an upward position. I sometimes wonder if callers ever make it clear when teaching this to the new dancers, that there is a reason for such styling. The real reason for all the styling rules made, was to make square dancing more comfortable for everyone. Certainly not rules just to please one person. The constant "grab and grip" certainly doesn't lend itself to the smoothness of dancing. Styling should be taught, not only how to stand or how to swing or even slide the feet, but it should include the holding of hands. Perhaps callers should enlighten the new dancers of the possibility of the "hand-hold" dilemma, because surely it is said, "when in Rome do as the Romans do."

Just a word about our Beginner classes. If the caller will make every night a party night, s/he will no doubt keep the dancers coming back for more. It's nice to have them eating out of your hand and having a good time!



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Not everyone is a born teacher. As a matter-of-fact some of the most popular callers are the first to admit that teaching is their downfall. We all recognize that the first and lasting impressions of square dancing come during the initial learning period and for that reason the caller/teacher is a very important person. If you need a hand in improving your teaching skills or if you're just setting out and need guidelines in establishing a workable teaching plan, we'd like to introduce you to

### **RANTING & RAVING**

Read all about it! "Prime Minister proclaims SQUARE DANCING CDN FOLK DANCE"! Even if the foregoing were factual, and not wishful thinking on our part, would it change anything as far as the public perception of Modern Square Dancing is concerned? In other words, is there any reason to believe that young recruits would then find our activity more attractive?

Without any shadow of a doubt, our avocation has reached an all-time low in its appeal to the younger generations. Just look around you the next time you attend an open dance; you can count on the fingers of one hand the number of dancers who don't have some silver in their hair! Statistics suggest the average age of square dancing couples is now approaching 70. It may be a misnomer to refer to it as a folk dance rather than on "old folks" dance. Instead of pushing for national status. I suggest we'd be well-advised to expend our available resources on promotion, targeting the Young and Restless as our hope for the future. Personally, I favor initiatives like those large, flamboyant square dance showcases held at the 1984 Commonwealth Games where Health and Participation were highlighted. Videos, with predominantly younger participants in colorful costumes could be disseminated to Community Channels-with a view to attracting recruits for local

Clubs, and/or Community Dance Programs. Of course, efforts to bring about 'de jure' recognition of square dancing as a national folk dance are laudable and must be pursued. It's a question of priorities. I believe that our national organizations can be co-opted into launching an all-out media blitz to sell the activity! There's no question it needs rejuvenation in the worst way; and the social and health benefits cannot be emphasized enough in any ambitious, longterm recruitment program. Youngsters todayfor all their pre-occupation with sex and getting ahead-are still very much interested in choosing a healthy life style. It only remains for us to demonstrate that ours is a viable alternative, and to make it easy enough and attractive enough for them to invest their time and effort!

Paradoxically-and perhaps Providentiallythe inroads attributable to Country Western dancing could be turned to our advantage, if we are flexible enough to incorporate and adapt judiciously. Dress codes and music are not insurmountable obstacles-if we are open to compromise! In my humble opinion, a win-win scenario involving the best features of both disciplines might very well result in Country Western Square Dancing becoming the NA-TIONAL FOLK DANCE of North America!

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# **Calling Tips**

### **OBSERVATIONS**

fter more than 40 years of calling square dances I have strong opinions on what is good, or not good, for square dancing. The success of callers, and of clubs is so dependent on both the caller and the dancers enjoying themselves. I encourage callers to become a part of the crowd. You are not there just to move dancers through the calls, you are there to join the fun!

It is important that you get acquainted with the dancers, talk to them, listen to them, joke with them. If you call regularly for a club, try to know the names of the members, and use those names. Let them know you enjoy being with them. Let them know that square dancing is a hobby, something to be enjoyed and not something to do with no errors. Mistakes often are enjoyable and cause laughter. To make a mistake is no disgrace, either for the dancer or the caller.

Square dancing did not become such a huge success by being complicated. The complicated dances were brought on by callers trying to impress the dancers. In fact most of the problems we do have were brought on by callers trying to impress other callers and long time dancers. Sure, a small percent of the dancers encouraged callers to become more challenging, but we callers often used poor judgment in carrying it too far.

Listen to callers talking together and you will hear them trying to impress one another with the complicated calls they have mastered. Nine out of ten dancers couldn't care less.

The caller who can keep dancers smiling and laughing is going to be a success even if he is not the most experienced. The caller who is dancing around on the stage and having a good time, is a caller that will be booked back. Most dancers don't want to be impressed, they want to be entertained.

In recent years I have turned down offers to call Advanced dances. I believe calling dances only 10% of the dancers can dance does more harm than good. I had been booking such dances and even had an Advanced club. No more. Now I give up those bookings gladly and feel I am contributing to the betterment of square dancing. Square dancing should be for everyone, not a select few. The most important part of square dancing are the friends we gain, the friends we share happiness with, the friends we care about and who care about us.

I want to learn more and more about calls, about methods of calling, more good singing calls. But most of all, I want to learn how to make a crowd of dancers have a good time.



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# BIRIEAIDILINIE

'd like to share a recipe I acquired from my daughters' teachers when they were in the third grade. We made it in class (two classes were combined for this treat...we had a blast!), and the students

who said they would *never* eat anything that had onions or mushrooms in it — did!

This dish is not only appropriate to serve at a pot luck or after party in October, but makes a

fitting dish for the Thanksgiving season as well. Those of you who don't have to watch their weight (or don't care to) will be happy to know it isn't a low calorie recipe. Have fun with it and let me know what you think.

#### **DINNER IN A PUMPKIN**

### Ingredients

- 1 medium pumpkin (7-9 lbs.)
  - onion, chopped
- 2 Tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 1/2-2 lbs. ground beef
- 2 Tablespoons soy sauce
- 2 Tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 4 oz. can mushroom pieces
- 1/2 Cup chicken broth
- 1 10 3/4 oz. can cream of chicken soup
- 1 1/2 Cups cooked rice (we used instant rice instead)
- 1 8 oz. can sliced water chestnuts, drained

Salt and pepper to taste

Cut off top of pumpkin and clean thoroughly. Set aside. In large skillet, sauté onion in oil until tender. Crumble meat and brown; drain. Stir in soy sauce, brown sugar, mushrooms, broth and soup. Bring to a boil. Lower heat. Simmer 10 minutes. Add cooked rice and water chestnuts. Simmer 5 minutes.

Spoon mixture into cleaned pumpkin shell. Replace top and put entire pumpkin on a baking sheet and bake for 1 hour in preheated 350 degree oven or until inside of pumpkin is tender. Put pumpkin on a serving plate. Remove lid and serve.

I've known Don Armstrong for almost four and a half decades, traveled overseas with him on square dance tours, worked with him on the staff of square dance vacation institutes and published his Caller/Teacher Manual for Contras and now I discover that Don is one of the nation's most celebrated Test Pilots.

In his new book I Flew Them First, we learn what it means to get into the cockpit of a fighter plane and fly it for the first time. Included in the impressive list of aircraft Don had tested are such familiar names as the Curtiss P-40, Republic's P-47 Thunderbolt, the Douglas A-20 Havoc and A-26 Invader, Grumman's F9F-2 Panther Jet, and the most powerful, single-engine, propeller-driven airplane in the world-the

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amazing F2G Super Corsair. Don's airborne career also included the experience of flying many of England's famous planes-including the Spitfire-as well as Germany's Messerschmitt Bf 109 and Focke-Wulf Fw 190 and Japan's Mitsubishi Zeke/Zero. From Jennys to jets, he flew over 160 different planes in his forty-two years of active flying!

This is not only a story of flying. A chapter-A Time to Dance-tells us about the other Don Armstrong-the one who calls and dances. In his words, Don explains, "To tell my story without including more than just an occasional reference to folk dancing or square dancing did not seem apropos, since dancing always coexisted with my flying. Chronologically, I was flying before starting to dance. But, from my teens until today, forty years after retiring as a test pilot, there has never been a prolonged period that I was not dancing or teaching/calling dances on a professional basis."

You'll get a boot out of this book. I have. In a way you'll experience the thrills (and chills) of flying these fantastic aircraft, of parachuting from a plane that literally came apart in a dive, of crashing on fires...and then immediately flying again...and again...

### **CHANGES TO THE ADVANCED LIST**

very two years the content of the Callerlab A-1 and A-2 lists are voted on by members of the CALLERLAB Advanced Committee. In the voting recently concluded, three calls were added, one call was dropped and one call was moved. Here are the changes along with my thoughts on each.

Reverse Swap Around was added to A-1. This is a very simple call, easily learned by the dancers once they know Swap Around. Some dancers say that Swap Around is not smooth, yet I see it danced smoothly the majority of the time. One reason Swap Around sometimes does not dance smoothly is that callers do not precede it with a call that will let dancers flow smoothly into the Swap Around. Also, people who get lost easily will get lost on this call, and then they blame the call instead of recognizing their ability. If the call is presented in a fun manner by the caller, the dancers laugh and have a great time with it.

Pass the Sea was moved from A-2 to A-1. This was a logical move. The call is quite easy, so there was no reason to have to wait until A-2 before it could be introduced.

Beaus and Belles Concept was added to A-2. This is logical, because at Advanced we begin to learn the true definitions of calls, and

true definitions are rarely based on sex. This concept was on the Advanced list for a while, but then it was moved to C-1 because some callers felt it required too much "thinking." I always had more faith in the dancers' mental capabilities, especially with an easy concept such as this that is so necessary for knowing definitions.

All 8 Concept was added to A-2. This is in addition to the All 4 Couples Concept, which has been on the A-2 list for a long time. Examples of "All 8" calls are All 8 Swing Thru, All 8 Switch the Wave and All 8 Mix. Of course, we have All 8 Spin the Top at Plus. Adding "All 8" was a logical addition, since callers have been using all these calls for some time.

Arky Star Thru was dropped from A-2. Hallelujah - it's about time! Arky is an outmoded concept, and all Arky calls were dropped from Advanced six years ago. This call remained only because they forgot to put it on the ballot when the other Arky calls were dropped. Most callers do not know what Arky really means, so the call was used incorrectly all the time. In addition, the call did not dance smoothly. The same result of the call is easily achieved by either calling Pass In (from 8 chain thru) or Pass Thru - Quarter In (from facing lines).

# VETERAN CALLER

Recently, I attended a class reunion at the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque—I can still spell it—and found many of my classmates very active and doing well, although I must admit that some of them are showing age with snow white hair and road map wrinkled faces. I haven't noticed those things in myself, of course. Having just celebrated my 42nd birthday again, I choose not to remember how many times. I picked forty-two as a permanent

Step back, take a look, reload and above all, humanize our actions. Appeal to the non dancer who is looking for courtesy, companionship and some challenge, together with fun and lasting friendships.

These are the square dancers of the future. They are out there, but you the current dancer must seek them out, bring them to a class and remain with them to assure that it is a great place to be spending that precious recreational time. Remember, you are competing with TV, bowling, etc., as well as other types of clubs and organizations. Our new recruits must be shown that square dancing is a more acceptable way to have fun and enjoy. You, the experienced dancer and caller can make it that way.

A salute to Keith Davis of Oriskany, New York, in the Mohawk Valley, who at 83 years young still teaches square dancing at a senior center, plays tuba in a community band and reads music but loves to play "by ear" with other musicians who can do so. Keep up the good work Keith!

Awaiting in the sky.


Now late at night up in the sky

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# HEMLINE

ou've taken your measurements according to the instructions given in last month's article. Now what do you do with them? First, measure the pattern and see where the differences are. Following are alterations to make for different types of problems.

Low Bust-Reposition bust dart and the front dart downward as seen by the dotted lines on

Figure A.

Flat Bust-Make a small tuck horizontally across pattern. Decrease size of armhole slightly. Ease in sleeve. See Figure B.


Hollow Chest-Make small dart horizontally across pattern, tapering toward sleeve. Straighten edge and armhole of pattern as shown in Figure C.

Large Bust-Cut and spread pattern through darts the required amount, pin to another piece of paper, make darts deeper in proportion. See Figure D.

Bulge at Underarm-Add to pattern at front and back underarm and lengthen at waistline. Make a deeper and larger underarm dart. Add amount to sleeve also. See Figure E.

Rounded Back-Cut across pattern at point where curve is most pronounced and spread necessary amount. Pin to paper, straighten center back edge and take up small dart at neckline. See Figure F.

For those of you who are having trouble knowing what size dart to make for your bra cup size, I have a pattern sheet I would be glad to share if you would send a self-addressed, stamped envelope with the request to my address (below).

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
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

# AUSTRALIAN RECORD LABEL

quare dancing certainly existed in Australia prior to the "boom" in the 1950s. There were small pockets of dancers here and there, mainly dancing in lounge rooms and garages, but what brought it to everybody's attention, was the massive promotion which involved the legendary Joe Lewis and his wife Claire from Dallas, Texas. Joe had been invited here in the late 1940s by a large department store to present Square Dancing as part of a special marketing promotion to sell dress material. Nobody could predict what would happen in the years that would follow.

Square dancing became THE craze with nearly everybody doing it! Aspiring caller/teachers were calling and teaching somewhere every night, articles appeared frequently in National magazines, dances would be broadcast on radio for an hour or so each week, books were being published, domestic record companies were producing square dance records, you could buy square dance clothing in local stores and competitions were "the rage." There were so many people wanting to square dance, that if you did not get to the hall early enough, you would miss out. On many occasions dances which were to start at 8:00 PM would have the "house full" sign out on the footpath at 7:45.

On his second trip to our South Pacific continent, Joe was involved with promotions in every Capital and many provincial cities. In 1988, when I stayed with he and Claire, they told me stories about their trips that I found mind boggling. On one occasion, Joe said that they traveled around Australia being treated like royalty, teaching callers and dancers in every state, and that at one Beginners' class in Adelaide, there were over 3,000 dancers on the floor. In his quiet, unassuming voice Joe said, "This number was not unusual, we had similar crowds in many other centers." Just think, that's almost double the number of dancers who attend our National Conventions now! I'm pleased that he can't see my four set class!

Because of his influence on the evolution of square dancing in Australia, Joe Lewis is considered by many as the Father of Australian



square dancing. We certainly owe the individuality of our unique dancing style to him.

In the United States, Joe and Claire owned and operated the "J-bar-L" Record Company, which was active throughout the fifties to the early seventies. All releases featured Joe's unmistakable calling and playing style - he was a very fine musician as well, and although he was not as prolific as many other producers, all his records were of a very high standard.

Before Joe died just over two years ago, I acquired all the original studio master tapes, and the "J-bar-L" name from him. Until recently, I have not had time to organize everything which is necessary to operate a successful record company. However, while Lorraine and I were at Portland, Oregon, for a few days in June last year, attending the American National, I contacted Claire Lewis to ask her advice, and to let her know my intentions. I then made arrangements with one of the American producers, who offered to assist in the manufacture, advertising and distribution of my label, which will be the first specialty dance label based in Australia since the days of the 10", 78 rom records.


The "production masters" will be made here in Australia and New Zealand, and then a copy of the mixed down masters will be sent to the United States where the records will be manufactured and distributed. I did investigate the possibility of having the whole process carried out here in Australia or New Zealand, and it could be done. However, the world wide sale of specialty dance records is very small in comparison to that of "pop" records. The percentage sold here in Australia is only a very small fraction of the overall world sales, so I decided that the manufacturing process should be carried out close to where the largest market could be anticipated, and that of course, is in the United States, which is the home of square

dancing.

Although it is anticipated that most releases will feature South Pacific Callers, my first release will be FOND AFFECTION, a 7 inch, extended play, 33 & 1/3 rpm Contra, featuring the J-bar-L Band on one side, and the cueing of Don Ward from California, on the other. The instrumental is Joe's original square dance version which has been edited to play nine times through to suit the needs of Contra dancing, but it will still be usable as a longer than normal square dance if you wish.

All projected releases at this stage will be on 7 inch vinyl. I was talking to a number of the

American Producers last year, and all except Wade Driver were continuing to use vinyl. Wade indicated that he would only be releasing compact disks in the future, but I know that since then, he has lost a lot of stock, and/or masters in a fire — and that his last couple of releases were on vinyl. So, I would say that the old seven inch, vinyl disk with a big hole in the middle is going to be with us for some time to come — at least in square and round dancing circles!







## NEW SQUARE DANCE GROUP FORMS IN SOUTH AFRICA

A new group of square dancers was formed in the Village of Happiness in April 1994, and we call our club "The Village Waves."

Last month our instructor Roy Hancock gave a talk at "Speakers Corner" on the History of American Square Dancing, followed by a demonstration in costume, which was very well received by the audience. In it he mentions the fact that Henry Ford, the famous motor magnate, was known to have liked the activity so well that he purchased a hotel and employed a dance teacher to further the activity.

Apart from our very enthusiastic group "The Village Waves," there are clubs in Pretoria, Benoni, Port Elizabeth, and a new one will start

in Johannesburg next month.

The Village of Happiness is a Retirement Center for Senior Citizens and is situated in the municipality of Margate, a coastal town 90 miles south of Durban. We enjoy a temperate climate all year round. Any visitors from the States will be most welcome to attend our dance sessions.





The amount of money paid to BMI and ASCAP for a music license is the same for CALLERLAB, ROUNDALAB, The ACA, The Network, or any other organization operating under the agreement pioneered by CALLERLAB and ROUNDALAB in 1990. federal law prohibits BMI or ASCAP from offering a lower rate to one organization over another.


CALLERLAB and the ACA pay the same amount for caller's licenses. BMI and ASCAP's license cost is readily available from the CALLERLAB office, (507)288-5121.


A caller can purchase an annual BMI/AS-CAP license from CALLERLAB for as little as \$70.50. For an additional \$15, the caller gets a \$2,000,000 liability policy, a \$10,000 medical liability policy and a \$4,000 death or dismemberment policy.

The only difference between the cost of belonging to the ACA versus the cost of belonging to CALLERLAB is the amount of dues each

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
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#### RANDOM THOUGHTS FROM HERE & THERE

HY ARE AMERICAN DANC-ERS PERCEIVED TO BE LESS SKILLED THAN THOSE OF OTHER COUNTRIES? A correspondent who has lived and danced in Great Britain for two years suggests that the answer might lie with traveling American callers. Our "pen pal" says that the collection of dancers at a special dance (such as one featuring a traveling caller) tends to represent a much wider mixture of programs than is usual in the U.S. It is not unusual to find C-2 dancers at a MS/Plus dance featuring an American caller, and dancers from the higher programs may constitute the vast majority of the floor. Thus, it is only natural that the caller compliment the floor with a remark to the effect that "I could never call material of this level to a Plus floor in the States!" Both the caller and the dancers then go home with an essentially inaccurate impression. Should the callers stop complimenting the dancers? Of course not! Callers get applause all the time; compliments from the caller serve as applause for dancers. Should the dancers take the comments with a grain of salt? They probably never will. Besides they have worked hard to earn that praise. Why dismiss it? Those of us in the States will just have to rein in our national sense of insecurity and not take it too much to heart when we hear unfavorable comparisons. After all, we are also working hard on our skills and need to feel good about our efforts.

WHY ARE THERE SO MANY COM-PLAINTS ABOUT "CONSTANT CHANGE" IN OUR PROGRAM LISTS? In THE LINK, a publication for callers associations, George White, Executive Secretary of CALLERLAB, points out that "there have been relatively few changes and additions in the last five years." Our own research shows this to be very true. The Plus program, for instance, began evolving in 1977. By 1979 it had stabilized so that today's list has only five commands that were not on the list then. One of those calls is a Tag the Line fraction from the MS list. Explode & Anything is an extension of the Explode family and has been on the list at least 10 years; as has Grand Swing Thru a simple extension of a popular MS command. That leaves two totally new calls in 16 years, during which time at least five calls were removed from the list. There were even fewer changes to the MS program during this time. So what is the big problem? We can't handle two new calls and three variations in 15 vears!?

WHY DO WE PUT SO MUCH EMPHA-SIS ON FINDING A WAY FOR PROFES-SIONAL MARKETING OF SQUARE DANCING? One of our local callers (Jay Klassen) kept an 11-year record of the sources of people in beginner classes for one of his clubs. During that time, 91% of the class members indicated that they had come as a result of word-of-mouth advertising from friends and acquaintances; 8% came because of exposure to square dancing at our annual county fair. No one came as a result of ads in daily newspaper, weekly shopper's news, or public bulletin boards. "Tell a Friend" still works best.

WHY DO WE KEEP READING ABOUT SQUARE DANCING BEING DESTROYED WHEN THE "LONG, CHOREOGRAPHED" MOVES OF PLUS REPLACED THE "SPEEDY FLOW AND FREESTYLE MOVEMENTS" OF YESTERYEAR? Were Venus & Mars, Wagon Wheel, Daisy Chain, and Suzy Q really that short, spontaneous and simple to learn?

# THE CALLER NOTE SERVICES



In the July/August issue of DANCETIME NOTES FOR CALLERS by Brad Carter, we were impressed with Brad's commentary about the use of Helper Words in one's calling. He says, "I find helper words most useful when the dancers are in a formation that is not standard, a place where their confidence level may not be very high. It is important to note that Helper Words can also be used as fill in words to help with the timing of your calls." A couple of examples are as follows; Tag The Line go all the way thru. Or from facing couples: Reverse the Flutter boys go in with the left, insist she come back with you.

Brad offered some material using FLUT-TER DOWN THE LINE. This one is in the experimental category and seems like it will be a good one for Mainstream dancers. He followed up with some material using REVERSE FLUTTER DOWN THE LINE. We liked his

material.

In the Plus Program Brad gives us some very good choreography using what he calls "Just Certain People Roll." We all know how much trouble some dancers have with the Roll figure. He says, "It is important that the dancers only do their designated part. Dancer ending position is also very important."

In the Advanced section we liked the material using Wheel Thru and Facing Recycle.

In the August issue of NOTES FOR EUROPEAN CALLERS, edited by Al Stevens and Rudi Pohl, we read with interest from VIEWPOINT concerning square dance class graduations. It seems to us that a lot of thought is going into the square dance class work as well as the graduation time. The editors discussed the importance for dancers to fully complete the square dance maneuvers before graduation. They say, "Students are nervous enough at graduation time—I wonder how many weeks it will take for them to really learn the last few figures?" and, "The practice of graduating your students a few weeks after they have been taught the last couple of figures will lead to a stronger graduating class. It will also build the confidence level in the graduates."

Material using Recycle is presented in a way that will make it easier for callers to instruct their dancers on its execution. This is one basic that commands lots of special care when taught. We liked the material offered for your use.

In MIKESIDE MANAGEMENT, edited by Stan & Cathie Burdick, has a great article concerning the need for caller training. He says, "First, here are some very minimal qualifications for being a caller. He or she should: (and here are some of his suggestions)

1. Dance regularly for at least two years.

2. Have clarity and fluency of voice.

3. Have a good feel for music, rhythm, pitch.

4. Be outgoing and love people. " etc.

Stan also offered some very valuable information about why a caller should belong to an area Caller Association. If you are not satisfied you might, "You can make a difference at your area caller association meetings. Start by urging the officers to build some solid educational content into every meeting."

We enjoyed the article concerning Dancing for the Mentally Challenged. The article was offered by Corben Geis. It showed great compassion and lots of good entertaining calling.

Jerry Reed's Creative Choreo kept our attention. There is some very good material for your use. In the August issue of JOHN'S NOTES, edited by John Saunders, we liked what he said in John's comments about getting square dance classes started. He points out that one must arrange for publicity first, not just depend on word of mouth. He says, "You and your partner can maybe get out and put up posters and pass out fliers; in the real world some dancers feel that Beginner classes are more for the caller and don't seem to understand that without new dancers coming in, the activity would eventually die and they would have no place to dance." He also stresses, "We have to be leaders always." Want to keep 'em coming? The answer is FUN!

John presents some workshop ideas using two of the new Quarterly Selections. In the Mainstream we discovered HINGE OVER, and in the Advanced it was CROSS THE K. Lots of good material for you to use with your respective dancers.

In the Plus Program section we found John working with PARTNER TAG. This is one basic that doesn't get enough coverage and as a result leaves the dancers lacking in their understanding of it. Good material!

In the Advanced I section we found RE-VERSE SWAP AROUND. This can be a really fun movement if the dancers are fully indoctrinated in its execution. In the Challenge we ran across material using 2/3 RECYCLE. Now that will take a little workshopping for many dancers.

The July issue of the MINNESOTA CALL-ERS NOTES, editor Warren Berquam, brought an article of great interest to us concerning the International Convention of Square Dancers in Wheelchairs. This was a real eye opener, and it was great to know there are so many dedicated people who are working in this capacity. It proves that 'Square Dancing is for everyone!'

Some of the basics covered in this July issue were DIXIE STYLE TO AN OCEAN WAVE, PING PONG CIRCULATE, CROSS FIRE; and in the Advanced section we found SQUARE CHAIN THRU & SPLIT SQUARE CHAIN THRU.

In the August issue of this Note Service, Warren mentions the Promo Pak available from LEGACY. He offers the address to anyone who has not yet purchased one. It has some super information in it for your fall classes and only \$5.00!

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We see this month that many of the note services are using the new Mainstream Quarterly Selection, HINGEOVER. This movement uses an old Advanced basic (slither) which was put on the Mainstream list some time ago.

Wayne offers some good material using the Non-Standard Formations we just spoke about. In it you will find Circulates, Trades, Spreads, Recycle, Tag The Line and many other Plus basics.

We are happy to hear that Bill Davis, editor of THE NEW VIEW, is coming along nicely. He was assisted this month (September) by Jay Klassen and Kip Garvey. Kudos to you both! The information concerning the CALLERLAB review of the Mainstream and Plus programs was interesting. "The Plus" Committee did decide to change the way a few calls are shown on the teaching order. "Explode Family" has been deleted in favor of separate listings of Explode the Wave and Explode and (Anything). Likewise the "Peel Family."

One of the new experimentals, SCOOT THE WHEEL, got our attention. This new idea

uses a 1/4 Tag formation, something your dancers might need work on. It also incorporates Single Hinge and Ferris Wheel and ends in a Double Pass Thru formation.

Kip Garvey talked about What Festival Callers are Calling. He says, "A check across the country with various callers who are frequently involved in calling festival events indicates that there is a major shift away from experimentals." We were glad to hear this since we are teetering on the brink of loosing too many dancers because of too much difficult choreography. He says, "Dancer success is their prime goal. There appears to be a consensus that, with dancer population dwindling, everything that can be done to insure the dancers an enjoyable experience must be done."

It seems HINGEOVER is one Quarterly Selection that the note services are giving a lot of coverage. It appeared in the Mainstream Section of these notes. Some very good material accompanied the definition and comment.

In the Advanced section we found some very good material using another Quarterly Selection called CROSS THE K.

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
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# Square Dance Collection Donated

Several years ago we donated our personal collection of over thirty years of American Square Dance and Square Dancing (Sets In Order) magazines to Tulane University Library in New Orleans, Louisiana. At that time it was featured in the American Square Dance Magazine. On a recent visit to the library we took pictures of the magazines which are now found in hard covers. We continue to donate each current year of the magazine to the library. Mr. Leon Miller, Manuscript Librarian, who is the head of the department, told us the magazines are much in demand by the students.

As the Metropolitan New Orleans Area Square & Round Dance Association's first and only Historians in its thirty eight years in existence, we compiled and stored all of the scrapbooks and records. Because of our concern for the preservation and permanent placement of these records, we spoke to Mr. Miller and he expressed interest in our records. With the approval of the M.N.O.A.S.D.A. Board we invited Mr. Miller to speak at our recent meeting. The board was in favor of donating the records.

We also asked Mr. Miller if Tulane Library would be interested in the records of the New Orleans Callers Association, the individual local square and round clubs and the Louisiana State Square Dance Association. He said he was very interested, so we have contacted all of these groups.

We plan to leave all of our personal collection of Johnny's scrapbooks and records as a professional caller since 1959 to Tulane Uni-



versity Library. Preserving our Square Dance heritage has always been dear to our hearts.

The following is an excerpt from the manuscripts department of Tule entitled "Researching With Manuscripts." As New Orleans' premier collection archives, the Manuscripts Department preserves over three linear miles of original sources dating from the founding of the city to the present. The department is also a major research center for Louisiana and the southern United States. Collection interests include agriculture, art, the Civil War, Jewish Studies, politics, medicine, southern authors, waterways and Women's Studies.

Among the department's many notable collections are the papers of Confederate President Jefferson Davis, Confederate General Albert Sidney Johnston, southern authors John Kennedy Toole and George W. Cable, Louisiana governors Sam Jones and David Treen, New Orleans mayors delesseps Morrison and Victor Schiro, members of Congress Hale Boggs, Lindy Boggs and F. Edward Hèbert, medical pioneers Rudolph Maras and Bernard Weinstein and many others.

# I FLEW THEM FIRST: A TEST PILOT'S STORY

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## HAIL COLUMBIA-SOUTH CAROLINA

It was a Thursday. That particular Thursday, August 10, was a lucky Thursday for Cathie and me, because after our plane landed in Charleston, South Carolina, we drove our rental car to North Charleston at about dinner time. Fortunately, we pulled into a rustic emporium with the Barnum-sized letters *Charleston Cattle Company* emblazoned over its door. What a lucky find! Thursday is the day this unusual eatery/bar offers its "mixed grill special," which is a mouth-watering combination of beef and pork. We enjoyed every morsel, but more than

that, we particularly enjoyed the life-like stuffed animals and birds, dozens of them, surrounding us as we ate. (Two, too-stuffed people chewing, eachewed by two dozen stuffed beasts.-CAB) There were North American beasts such as bears, antelope, panthers, as well as others we'd met in Africa, such as impalas, ibex and buffalo. Then Cathie and I alternated at the podium, speaking on 'Emblems of Leadership.' After lunch, we continued the lectures, covering 'Communication,' 'Finding Leaders,' 'Promotion' and 'Retention.' We liked their theme for the program-Color It Red: Responsible Educational Development.

June and Van Van Steyn were chairmen of the event. Federation chairmen are Ron and Nancy Jacobs. A committee list as long as one's forearm put this all together very successfully. There were so many friends and acquaintances at this event, it's a bit hard to name names, such as Carroll and Virginia Frick, editors of the Carolina Caller, "Alex, the gem of Charleston"; the McClures of LEGACY, and we could go on and on. Suffice it to say we had a ball-no, better than that, it was a communications cotillion, bringing together astute leaders devoted to our hobby from the Jessamine/Wren state in a beautiful setting, to let progressive ideas flow and dance among them.

Just for the fun of it, let's enumerate some scattered thoughts that were presented at this clinic.

- Where would we be today without these fairly recent creations-credit cards, microwave ovens, VCRs, nylons, tubeless tires, Polaroids, copiers, zippers, scotch tape? That's only the beginning, and new wonders never cease!

  - A leader is an ENABLER.
- Sometimes it takes years of hard work to become an instant success.
- Positive attitudes and a good nominating committee are the secrets of finding good new officers.
- Leaders need to see the whole picture, to have a wide vision of the activity and its needs.

After a Red Lobster dinner that night, we went with the Merchants to their club dance in Newberry for some more dance fun with Earle calling and Fran cueing. The night was warm, but the joviality and fellowship were "cool." Belton Dennis called a tip. So did I. The group sang for August birthday and anniversary people; a week before our fortieth anniversary, they wished us well with song. It was a fitting climax

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MEL ROBERTS Memphis, Tennessee

Better known as 'Mel, The All-Seeing Square Dance Caller.' I am not sure how many squares Mel can watch at one time, but he seems to derive much pleasure in changing a pattern when he observes anyone on the floor anticipating his calls.

Mel was born in Newport, Arkansas. Very early in life he knew (as did other famous Arkansans Johnnie Cash, Bear Bryant and Bill Clinton) that if he was ever to make anything of his life, he would have to leave that state. At age eleven he took that Night Train to Memphis, where he attended Tech High and graduated from Southside. Still a wanderlust, he joined the Air Force. In 1956, after his discharge, he went to work for John Morrell Meat Packing Company as an overthe-road long distance driver and remained with them until retirement in 1984.

Mel and his wife Charlotte, who died of lung cancer in 1970, have two children; Melvin Jr., known as Robbie, works in the printing business in Cincinnati and has two children. Cheryl Lynn, Mel's daughter, still lives in Memphis and also has two daughters,



one of whom is named Charlotte Tray for Charlotte.

Rheumatoid arthritis prohibits extensive travel; he prefers to stay at home with his new wife, Mary Louise. Currently he calls for two clubs, the Bluff City Promenaders and the Kennett, Missouri, Cotton Squares and conducts one retreat. Pickwick.

Mel has the reputation of being a quiet man of few words. But this writer remembers a three hour breakfast on a Sunday morning in Blytheville, after a Harvest Moon festival, when I found that he is an articulate, interesting and humorous conversationalist and a sensitive person.

So if you want to rap or dance, Mel's the man.

ennis and Karlene Leatherman of Oshkosh, Wisconsin, are doing a fine job of presenting easy level materials to the folks in and around their area. They made a presentation at Legacy last April of several simple line dances and passed out a little handbook entitled "Classic Country Dancing." It has a great deal of information in it. Their address is 518 West Gruenwald Ave., Oshkosh, WI 54901. Following is a routine written for those who would enjoy dancing sitting down or possibly for those who may not be able to stand. They call it...

#### SITDOWN-JIFFY

Solo dance Done sitting down

1-4 Right heel out, back in place, right heel out, stomp

5-8 Left heel out, back in place, left heel out, stomp

9-10 Pat knees twice

11-12 Clap hands twice

13-16 Palms of hands facing out & spread fingers - swish like windshield wiper 4 times. Repeat beats 1-16 until song ends

Cal Campbell, the CDP chairman for CALLERLAB, has not only edited a book on easy materials, but has produced a record with both a circle mixer and a singing call on it. He has teamed up with Hugh Macey of Bath, Ohio, who continues to release records for the novice square dancer on the Grenn record label. The circle mixer was written by Al Brozek of Oxford, Connecticut, and entitled the "10 O'clock Mixer" which was featured in Easy Level, August 1994 p. 67. The record features an instrumental side and then has Cal cueing the mixer as well as calling a square dance on the flip side.

#### 10 O'CLOCK MIXER

Formation: Single circle of couples all facing the center of the hall. Lady on the man's right hand side.

Record: Grenn 12180 "Lay Some Happiness On Me" **Prompts** (Vocal prompts on record by Calvin Campbell)

Intro ---, Everybody Forward & Back

1-8 ---, Forward & Back again -

9-16 ----, Face & Heel & Toe in

17-24 -- Heel & Toe out, -- Heel & toe in

25-32 -- Heel & Toe out, Step to the Left & all walk

33-40 ---, U-turn Back & find your partner

41-48 ----, Turn partner Left all the way around

49-56 ----, Swing new corner round & round 57-64 -- Face center, everybody Forward & Back

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#### LAY SOME HAPPINESS ON ME

#### Singing Call - Figures

Circle to the left go the ring, you circle to the left.
Circle to the right the other way back go home around that track.
Corner girl with a do sa do back to back and around you go.
Partners all with a do sa so four men promenade inside.
Once around that pretty little ring, go back home & swing.
Swing the lady go 'round & 'round & promenade that town.
Lay some happiness on me, look on the brighter side you see.
Promenade go 'round for me. Lay some happiness on me.
Singing Call - Figures

Head two couples promenade go halfway around the square.

Down the middle with a right & left thru just turn that lady fair.

Side two couples promenade go halfway around that pretty little ring

Down the middle with a right & left thru, turn there with the pretty little thing.

Allemande left on the corner & do sa do your own.

Swing the whirl with the corner girl and promenade her home

Lay some happiness on me, look on the brighter side you see. Promenade go 'round for me. Lay some happiness on me. The team of Doris and Jim Howatt of Carlisle, Kentucky, was split up this past spring with the passing of Jim. These two wonderful people did so many great things for their state of New Jersey dancers while they resided there, for CALLERLAB and for CONTRALAB. Jim is gone and will be sorrowfully missed, but Doris is continuing with her prompting and editing the CONTRALAB Quarterly Bulletin.

Jim wrote the following contra in 1980 for his Covered Bridge Square Dance Club of central Jersey. He was exposing them to basic contras, but wanted to include a Flutter Wheel.

49-56 ---, -- Circle Left;

57-64 ---, -- Fwd & Back

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

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


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# AS I SEE IT

t's now been a year since we started these monthly visits in AMERICAN SQUARE DANCE. During this time we've touched upon many memories of square dancing and square dancers. We have appreciated your responses.

Ken Anderson, caller on that fateful night of the Keokuk disaster (see ASD, November 1994, p. 45), wrote to tell us he still has vivid recollections of the catastrophe and he's kept in touch with some of the survivors over the year.

A number of you added personal thoughts to our story about the late Ed Gilmore and the role he played in the square dance activity (see February 1995, p. 36). These brought to mind an additional anecdote concerning Ed. When he passed away in 1971 following an illness, he and Dru had run through their savings and, as a result, when Ed was buried in a cemetery in Riverside, California, there were no funds to pay for a headstone. Once this information got out, a number of his friends sent contributions and a memorial marker was ordered.

When the stone was in place, some of the Gilmore's friends living in the area were notified that on a certain afternoon we would gather for a short memorial and anyone wishing to join us would be most welcome. A number of callers, dancers and friends met for what turned out to be a nostalgic talk session, remembering happy times and all that Ed and Dru had meant to the activity.

We had taped some of Ed's singing calls and as we chatted, the music and calls played softly in the background. At a point when we were quiet, each doing his own remembering, Ed's voice on the tape came out loud and clear with one of his favorite calls. The chorus started out, "I'm looking over a four-leaf-clover." At that point, and apparently for no reason at all, one of Ed's Yucaipa club members leaned over and picked from the grass above the grave (you guessed it) a four-leaf-clover. It was that kind of day.

We received a pair of letters from Bob and Ruth Pereira, Carp, Ontario, Canada, shedding more light on our May '95 story about the time in 1951 when then Princess Elizabeth square danced at Government House in Ottawa. Here, from his detailed research, is a condensed account of Bob's story.

"The idea of the Royal Square Dance Party originated with the Governor General, Viscount Alexander of Tunis and Lady Alexander who were introduced to square dancing at the 1950 Calgary Stampede and immediately became square dance buffs. During their stay at Government House, square dancing was often a featured entertainment and they proposed that as their special 'do' during the two days of official ceremonies of the Royal Tour in Ottawa, Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh be invited to a private square dance party.

"The dance was private in the strictest sense of the word; no press, and special invitations were sent to only 80 guests..." This guest list incidentally read like a who's who of government officialdom.

And how did the royal couple know how to handle the dancing? For one thing, both the Princess and the Duke were carefully "paired up" with others of the invited guests who knew how to square dance. In addition, during the dinner preceding the dance several of the dancers, using lumps of sugar as dancers, explained to the royal couple the elementary points of square dancing. According to A.G.S. "Tony" Griffin, one of the hosting dancers, the couple "caught on very quickly due in part to the pair's knowledge of Highland Dancing."

Jeanne Ganes wrote from the Chicago area saying she enjoyed the stories about square dancing in the movies and that it must have been a "ball" working with the stars. Yes, Jeanne, it was, but it also had its share of surprises and

disappointments.

Take the case of the film "Giant" for example. If you should catch the picture some evening on TV, you'll recognize that at points the dancing on the screen doesn't match the calls. The call may be for an allemande left but the dancers are doing a do sa do. The reason is that the overall scene, while shot in proper sequence, was interrupted during the editing in order to bring in close-ups of the actors which were shot separately and inserted into the action. Unfortunately, the bits were not always in the proper spot to match the call on the sound track. Fortunately, not too many viewers caught the prob-

The disappointment of the Martin and Lewis film, "Pardners" (see August 1995, p. 11) came in the final production stages. Once the rough cuts of the movie were completed and sent to a local theater for an unannounced "sneak preview," the powers-that-be in such things having decided in advance that the film was too long, ordained that the square dance sequence, which took more than two weeks to set up and film at a cost of close to half a million 1949 dollars, be relegated to the cutting room floor. Pity!



Contra and Traditional Committee Helps Callers Add Variety to Their Programs

The Contra and Traditional Committee of CALLERLAB exists for the dual purposes of promoting the use of contra dances among Modern Western Square Dance callers and preserving traditional square dances. For callers interested in adding variety to their regular square dance program, the Contra and Traditional Committee provides resources and services which can greatly increase the enjoyment of dancers involved in a typical club-type square Dance program. This article will focus on Contra dancing and how callers can take advantage of the resources available to them.

Contra dancing is growing rapidly in popularity among square dancers around the world. It is a form of dance using basic square dance movements the dancers already know, but set up in other arrangements besides squares. Usually, the dances are done in long facing lines, with partners facing each other across the set. A typical contra enjoyed by square dancers involves lines of alternating men and women. These dances use common square dance movements and are danced strictly with the phrase and on the beat of the music, affording the

dancers the joys of moving with the music without learning additional movements or fancy footwork. Almost any well-phrased singing call tune or other traditional type of music may be used for contras.

To be sure, some special training is required in order to present correctly most contra dances. However, for the caller who wants to provide an occasional contra for the sake of variety for the dancers, CALLERLAB's Contra and Traditional Committee provides a ready resource for straightforward dances which are easy to present. These dances can be enjoyed by any square dancer or caller with a minimum of effort and a maximum of pleasure.

CALLERLAB's Contra and Traditional Committee publishes a Contra of the Quarter which is especially chosen as an interesting, enjoyable contra dance that can be presented by virtually any competent caller to the dancers with good results. Each dance is written exactly as it should be called, with recommended music that most callers would have in their record cases or could obtain easily.

In addition to emphasizing the variety offered by using contras in the square dance pro-



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gram, the Contra and Traditional Committee also encourages the use of contras as teaching tools in square dance classes. Contras stress correct timing and smooth flow within a structured routine. Also, since most contras do not require a specific number of couples, no one needs to sit out waiting for another couple to fill a square.


Besides these resources which are always available through CALLERLAB, at each annual CALLERLAB convention several sessions are devoted to the Contra and Traditional programs so that callers can gain ideas and better understanding of how to use these versatile dances.

Dancers, if you want to discover the pleasures of smooth contra dancing, all you need to do is ask your caller to present CALLERLAB's

Head Position: Slide thru, Vine left and kick left, right foot in front of left foot. Vine right and kick left foot in front of right foot. Pass thru, partner trade and roll.

For some years we have run a club which meets twice a month, where we teach easy squares, some fun dances and contras.

It seems that not everyone wishes to expend the time and effort needed to learn the plus program, so this is for those who like a more occasional and relaxed level session.

We like contras and though we have never attempted triples we will try almost anything.

The manuals of Don Armstrong and Herbie Gaudreau are employed, but I am ever on the lookout for variety and something new, so I try each month to feature a dance from Bob Howell's series or Contra Corners. Some of the contras submitted by callers are very different and contain variety. I would love to use them but confess I have to give up on quite a few as to me they are unclear and there is little explanation.

In Don Armstrong's manual, mostly simple material, each dance occupies an A4 size page, is set out in eight lines and then followed by explanations and actions where each move is described in detail.

I am not suggesting you do all this. On the other hand, I feel that two or three inches of a



half column is not enough when introducing new or unusual things.

It would be nice to set it out as described above.

I often feel disappointed when I am unable to use interesting dances. If I cannot quite understand them, then the dancers won't, that's for sure.

Also, the callers take the trouble to invent and send in the dances and must be disappointed when some callers have to set them aside because of lack of information. Square

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dancing is growing fast in Europe but, we need more teachers and take the magazine to learn.

Calling contras or any thing else for that

matter, is OK when you know how.

Could space be allocated, to Contra Corners especially, so that we can all learn? Then contras will become more popular as they contain more variety and more callers are able to learn to use them.

How about adding a few gems from the past? I remember especially the Taggerline Mescolanza in the seventies and we still use it.

We send regards to dancers and callers the world over. Many we met in England and they bring happy memories.

Unfortunately, in one club's dance the level was Mainstream with some Plus and A-1 tips.

The A-1 was very disappointing with only five squares dancing, but eventually only two squares were left dancing.

It was not a good advertisement for square dancing as there were so many dancers sitting out, just watching, what a was really a shambles.

Callers wonder why the learner intake is very poor in Auckland. That is one reason-they don't want to call at a low level. I have been a dancer since 1964 and a caller since 1971. I spend a lot of time in programming and variety, and my dancers make comments of why the other Auckland callers can't do the same.

Unfortunately, these callers are killing the activity in Auckland and it could be some time to get it back to full strength again. The FUN SIDE has seemed to have gone now and it's all pressure, pressure, pressure. So who wants to join an activity like this-I definitely wouldn't.

# **CALLER COLLEGES**

By Harold Bausch Fremont, Nebraska

August 28, 1995, brought me to the end of 30 years of teaching callers, here in Nebraska.

During the 1960s and early '70s, I traveled coast to coast, to Canada and to Germany to call and to teach. I worked with many other callers and also helped at the national Convention counseling other callers. But, I'm getting ahead of the story.

In 1964 I had a heart attack, a "Coronary Thrombosis," the doctor told me he couldn't find a cause, except stress - I was burning the candle at both ends! I told the doctor I didn't feel stressed. He replied, "You are doing an awful lot of driving at night and that is stressful." I also was employed at the Post Office and went to work at 6:30 in the morning, so I wasn't getting a lot of rest. Anyway, as I lay in the hospital recovering, I thought how much square dancing and calling had done for me, it had changed my life. Lill and I had friends all over the country! I thought too, what would have happened to may clubs if I had died. At the time I had six regular clubs, where I was the club caller. I decided I wanted to pass on some of the knowledge I had, and to assure there would be others to carry on.

In 1965 I started the Dance O Rama Callers Clinic. In those days the schools were called Clinics. I don't know who started upgrading us to Colleges, but of course, I followed suit. For 30 years Lill and I have put on this college and have had between 350 & 500 students. Many of my former students are now doing the traveling I had been doing, many became recording callers. Several have served on the CALLERLAB board, just as I did, MY efforts have born fruit!

Our students came from all over the country, more from other states than just from Nebraska. This year's college will have students from nine states, 17 in all. We even had inquires from New Zealand and one from Saigon.


While on the CALLERLAB Callers Coach Committee, I helped to plan and set up the Callers Coach program. When it was all set up I took the written exam and passed. I had an appointment for the Oral exam at one of the National Conventions — but the examiners

never showed up. So, I decided, why pay \$200 for someone to tell me I was qualified to do what I had been doing for so many years!

It was fun working with other callers in many states doing these "Colleges," but I feel there is something I should mention. Callers Colleges do not need to be a week long - not even five days. I realize the longer time justifies a higher fee for the callers putting it on, but it does not benefit the students. With a week long school there are lots of lectures, indeed there are a lot of subjects to cover. However, listening to lectures is not the best way to learn. Like a picture is worth a thousand words, doing is a faster way of seeing just what is to be done. At my schools we have sit-down sessions for an hour or so, then we get up and practice what we have been talking about. Microphone techniques are learned with "mike" in hand. Sight Calling is done with one man calling, another resolving, all others observing. All take turns at calling, dancing, observing, and even resolving from the side lines.

Choreography is learned with dancers in a square. Ways to do singing calls and patter calls are demonstrated and practiced while dancers do the calls. All techniques are better learned by seeing and doing than by listening to someone talking.

My schools are usually Friday, Saturday and Sunday. We include meals and lodging. Most new callers can not afford spending a week paying motels or hotels and eating out for a week, plus the school fee.



I searched around and found a place that gave me good rates on all, including the hall to dance in. We save the callers so much money that they can afford to come back several years. They learn as much as they can absorb in three days and they don't forget as much as they would in a week long school.

Besides, no one becomes a caller in a week anyway. It takes more. We caller coaches are only one step; we hope to help, and perhaps to correct faults. We pass on our experience. In the long run, after getting a start, every caller must learn from trial and error, and by gaining experience, just as we did. The callers that went through my schools — I hope I helped — but they make it on their own.

This formula has worked for me and I believe more "coaches" should consider doing the same. Better to get 15 to 20 callers in your weekend school than to get 7 or 8 for a whole week. Keep all involved in all events and they will not only learn from you but also from one another.

# THREE WISHES

The Cowardly Lion once sang about all the changes he'd make if he were "King of the Forest." Well, if I were "king," here are some things I'd change in the square dance world.

1. If I were king I'd adopt the "Belles and Beaus" concept at all levels, not the cumbersome "left hand dancer/right hand dancer" phrases; and not "boys and girls" which is a limiting concept at best, unless there is no other way of saying it.

2. If I were king, when a call is taught or workshopped, I'd use the defining words such as "leaders and trailers," "centers and ends" or "Belles and Beaus" rather than "boys and girls," which is again limiting and ultimately misleading. Give us dancers the benefit of the doubt to be intelligent enough to learn a call by the definition.

3. If I were king I'd universalize the forearm touch (not grab) for forming lines or waves. This would eliminate the excruciating pain felt in the shoulders by "hands up" pushers, or the incapacitation caused by thumb grabbers, hand squeezers and wrist jerkers.

Yes, I could go on and on, but most things, good and bad, seem to come in threes. Any more would overburden us all and water down the impact of my three major wishes.

The key words ultimately are "square awareness" and thoughtfulness in actions.

So there, all of you dancers and callers out there, I've had my say. I love square dancing and cope as best I can with its —and my—imperfections. See you in a square sometime. I expect we'll all have a great time.

Author's note: My only claim to actual royalty is that I am married to a prince of a man who tolerates my rantings. Regardless of whether or not he agrees with my opinions stated here, he used his PC to produce a professional and readable edition of my letter.

Contra-dancing can be traced back to at least the mid-1400s and has been danced almost continuously since. Dancing was the primary form of recreation during the colonial period of North America. 'Country' or 'Contra' Colonialist had inherited this tendency from Elizabethan England, and many Europeans as well picked up English country dancing as their own.

Contra dances are normally formed in "sets of two parallel lines" and go through a certain sequence of figures, repeated several times. Each repetition results in some of the dancers progressing toward one end of the set and the others moving toward the other end. The line formation lends itself to 'as many as want to' dancing together without regard for the number of couples. There's always room for one more in a contra, as couples arrive, they merely "form on" at the foot of the set. There is never a problem of waiting for "three more couples."

Several formations are used and the lines may be straight or they may be formed into a circle. In standard contra-dances partners are opposite each other in facing lines, although in some line formations the partners are adjacent to each other as in the square formation. It is believed that the first square dance was a contra-dance for four couples. After dancing in the line formation, the two end couples found they could face up and down the lines while the two center couples danced a sequence of the dance. They then found they could repeat the dance sequence with each other and up and down the lines, rather than across the lines. This was equivalent to today's head position in square dancing and the center two couples were equivalent to the side position.

Normally, the dance sequence is repeated every eight movements. It is common for the

caller to 'shut up' and let the dancers dance solely to the music after the first few times through the sequence. Contra dances also have the dancers in unusual (to square dancers) positions which require the dancers to be 'all position dancers' and to have the ability to visualize their relationship to the rest of the set.

While most contra dances are done to reels, jigs and hompipes because of their pronounced phrasing, rhythm and melody, contra dancing is also done in waltz, polka, two-step rhythms and modern country western tunes. They can also be done to classical music. Many callers are using the best of the current square dance singing call records. The primary requirement is that the music be well-phrased so the dancers and the caller can 'be with the music.'

While most contra dances are done in a two-facing lines formation (with each man opposite his partner), there are other formations;

couple facing couple, two couples facing two couples up and down the hall, 3 face 3 (any mix of dancers) and 4 face 4 (any mix) and many more.

In contra dancing the rules of the dance do not change, the timing of each movement does not change, and new movements are added only infrequently and then, only if they match the musical phrasing and provide comfortable body flow. The self-improvement in contra dancing is to learn to expand or contract the floor space required for a given movement in the correct facing direction, in exactly the right position, having taken the correct number of steps, ready to move smoothly into the next movement with the music and without the 'stop-n-go' of waiting for the caller to tell you what to do. Many modern dancers seem to have difficulty in adjusting their body flow to match the music, but it is a goal worth striving for. Once you master

that part of the contra dancing, dancing contrastyle becomes a most enjoyable dance form.

To us, dancing with the phrase and measure of the music, in a variety of formations, to a variety of musical rhythms and tempos, in a social atmosphere with interaction with other dancers, and dancing with a minimum of voice-over, the music is the most enjoyable dance activity we know.

For contra dancing to have survived and flourished for more than 500 years, it must have some popular appeal. There are many, like us, who believe contra dancing will still be popular for another 500 years and longer.

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
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
