MOST NH PARENTS COMFORTABLE SENDING CHILDREN TO SCHOOL IN FALL DESPITE COVID-19 BUT NO CONSENSUS HOW

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
DURHAM, NH - Two-thirds of parents and guardians of K-12 students in New Hampshire are comfortable sending their children back to school in the fall despite the COVID-19 pandemic. However, Granite Staters are divided on how to open schools; about half favor keeping children in one classroom for the whole school day while four in ten favor reopening schools as usual with no additional precautions. Four in ten residents have worked from home at least some of the time due to COVID-19 and half would work from home permanently if the option were available.

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Panel*** survey, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Nine hundred ninety-seven (997) Granite State Panel members completed the survey online between June 18 and June 22, 2020. Data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, as well as party registration levels provided by the New Hampshire Secretary of State. The Granite State Panel is part of an effort by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center to investigate new ways of gathering and understanding the opinion of New Hampshire residents. Granite State Panel members are recruited from randomly-selected landline and cell phone numbers across New Hampshire and surveys are sent periodically to panel members.

K-12 Education In NH


Fifty-six percent of New Hampshire residents believe that the New Hampshire Department of Education has implemented remote learning very (17%) or somewhat (39%) well in the state. One in five (20%) believe the Department of Education has done this not very well (12%) or not well at all (8%) while 24% don't know or are unsure. The percentage of Granite Staters who think remote learning has been implemented very or somewhat well (56%) has declined slightly since April (64%).

Respondents who are currently a parent or guardian of a child enrolled in a K-12 public school are more likely than those who are not to say that the NH Department of Education has implemented remote learning very or somewhat well. Similarly, those who say they are currently a teacher, administrator, or staff member at a K-12 institution are far more likely than others to say remote learning has been implemented very or somewhat well.

How Well NH Department of Education Has Implemented Remote Learning in the State - June 2020 - By Demographics



K-12 institutions in New Hampshire are considering a wide array of possible options for providing education to their students in the coming school year while also coping with COVID-19.


Nearly half (48%) of respondents strongly (16%) or somewhat (32%) support having students remain in one classroom throughout the day to minimize the number of people with whom they interact. Forty-three percent support having some children attend school some days and others attend on other days to reduce the number of students at school at any one time and 37% support having older students continue to learn remotely, leaving more room for younger children to attend school in-person. Forty-one percent of respondents support having no altered plans and opening schools as usual with all students in attendance, while only 22% support holding school entirely by remote learning with no children or staff in the school.

Opinion on Possible Options for Handling Public K-12 Education in the Fall in Light of COVID-19 - June 2020




More than two-thirds of self-described Republicans (68%) strongly or somewhat support opening schools as usual with all students in attendance in the fall despite COVID-19 but only 37% of Independents and 19% of Democrats agree. Those without a college degree are also more likely to support this option, while 42% of current teachers, administrators, or staff and 51% of parents or guardians of K-12 students agree.

Support Opening Schools as Usual with All Students in Attendance - June 2020 - By Demographics




Among parents or guardians of K-12 students (N=176), two-thirds (67%) say based on what they know now that they are very (31%) or somewhat (35%) comfortable sending their child or children to their local public school when the next school year begins in the late summer or early fall. Seventeen percent say they are not very comfortable doing so, 14% are not at all comfortable, and 2% don't know or are unsure.






Ninety-two percent of New Hampshire parents and guardians of K-12 students who identify as Republicans say they are very or somewhat comfortable sending their children to local public school for the new school year, but only 65% of Independent parents and guardians and 53% of Democratic parents and guardians agree.

Very or Somewhat Comfortable Sending Child or Children to Local Public School for New School Year - June 2020 - By Party ID




Among parents or guardians of K-12 students (N=176), 38% say it would be very (25%) or somewhat (13%) difficult to obtain childcare if the school year was delayed or if their school returned to remote learning. Fifty-nine percent say it would be not very difficult (28%) or would not be difficult at all (31%) to obtain childcare while 3% don't know or are unsure.

Forty-five percent of New Hampshire parents and guardians of K-12 students who identify as Democrats say it would be very or somewhat difficult to obtain childcare if the school year was delayed or their school returned to remote learning, but only 32% of Independents and 29% of Republicans say this would be true for them.


Very or Somewhat Difficult to Obtain Childcare If School Year Delayed or School Returns to Remote Learning- June 2020 - By Party ID



Working from Home


Among working adults in New Hampshire (N=578), four in ten (40%) say they have worked from home at least part of their normal work hours as a result of COVID-19, 6% say they already worked from home prior to COVID-19, and 54% have not worked from home due to COVID-19.

Worked From Home At Least Part of Normal Work Hours as a Result of COVID-19 - June 2020




Self-identified Democrats and Independents are more than twice as likely as Republicans to report working at least part of their normal work hours as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Residents over the age of 50, women, and those with a college degree are more likely than younger people, men, and those without a college degree to have worked from home due to COVID-19.

Worked From Home At Least Part of Normal Work Hours as a Result of COVID-19 - June 2020 - By Demographics




Forty-three percent of all working Granite Staters would prefer to work from home permanently if that option were available to them, 44% would not prefer to do this and 13% don't know or are unsure. Among those who have worked from home due to COVID-19 (N=233), nearly half (49%) would prefer to work from home permanently if the option were available, while among those who haven't worked from home due to COVID-19 (N=314) a slight majority (52%) would not prefer to work from home permanently.

Prefer to Work From Home Permanently If Option Available - June 2020





More than half (53%) of self-identified Democrats say they would prefer to work remotely permanently if the option were available, but only 39% of Independents and 34% of Republicans agree. Slight majorities of residents under the age of 35 (52%) and women (55%) would prefer to work from home, while only one-third of those aged 65 and older (33%) and men (32%) feel this way.

Among those who would like to work from home permanently (N=246), one-third (33%) say they would be very (10%) or somewhat (23%) likely to move elsewhere if they and other members of their household were able to work from home permanently. Sixty-one percent say they would be not very (30%) or not at all (31%) likely to move if they and other members of their household could work from home permanently, while 6% don't know or are unsure.





Granite State Panel Methodology

These findings are based on the latest Granite State Panel survey, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Nine hundred ninety-seven (997) Granite State Panel members completed the survey online between June 18 and June 22, 2020. Data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, as well as party registration levels provided by the New Hampshire Secretary of State.

The Granite State Panel is part of an effort by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center to investigate new ways of gathering and understanding the opinion of New Hampshire residents. Granite State Panel members are recruited from randomly-selected landline and cell phone numbers across New Hampshire. Respondents to the Granite State Poll were asked if they wished to participate in further research and asked to provide an email address. Those who agreed and provided an email address were added to the panel. Panel members were also recruited by texting a random sample of cellular telephones in the state and inviting the recipient to take a short survey.

For each survey which they complete, panel members are entered into quarterly drawings to earn rewards, such as gift certificates from statewide and internet companies. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.
