BIPARTISAN SUPPORT FOR ABSENTEE VOTING OPTION IN NH; BELIEF IN WIDESPREAD VOTER FRAUD IN NH FALLS

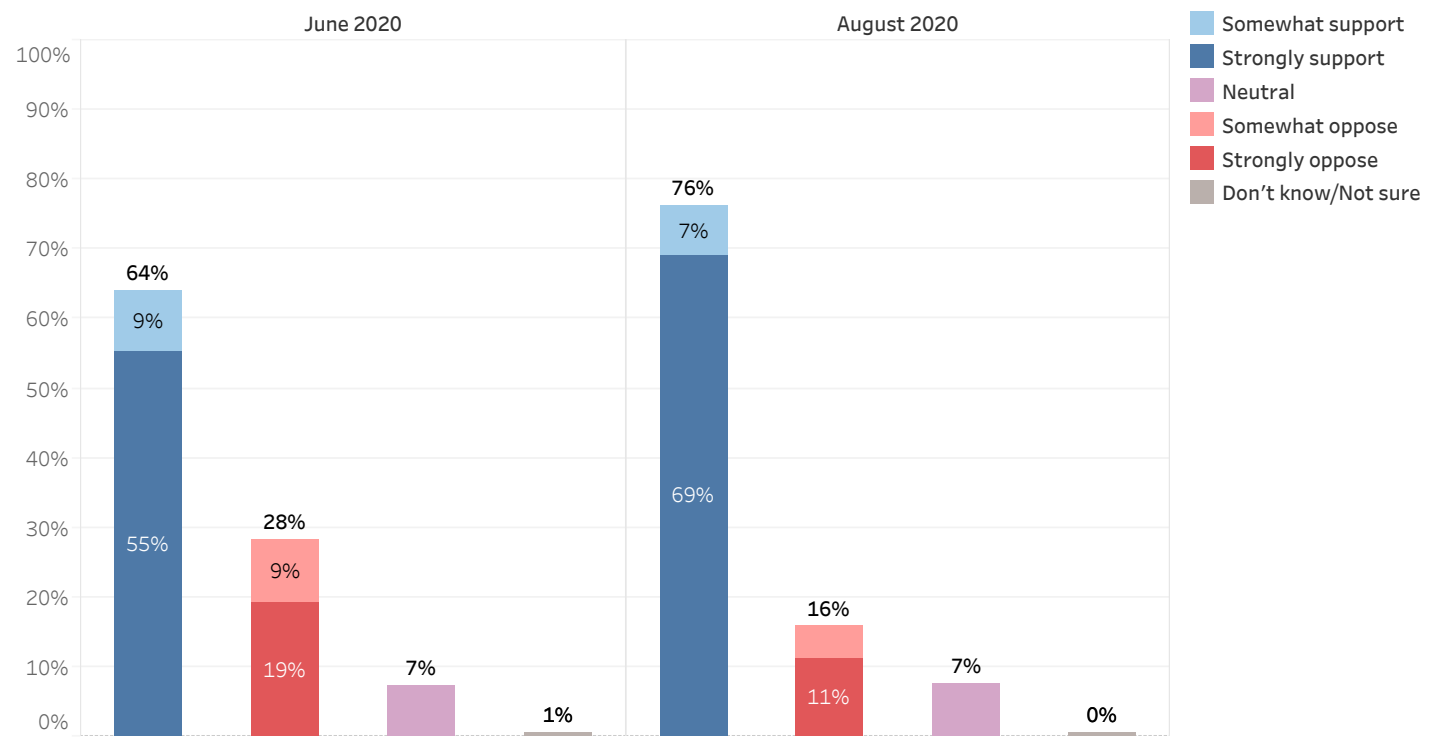
DURHAM, NH – More than three-quarters of Granite Staters support New Hampshire voters being able to vote by absentee ballot due to concerns about COVID-19. Two-thirds of likely general election voters still intend to vote in person, but nearly half of Democrats plan to vote by absentee ballot. Most likely voters are confident their vote will be accurately counted and the belief that there is widespread voter fraud in the state has declined.

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll***, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. One thousand and nine hundred forty-nine (1,949) Granite State Panel members completed the survey online between August 28 and September 1, 2020. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 2.2 percent. Included were 1,889 likely 2020 general election voters (MSE = +/- 2.3%). Data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, as well as party registration levels provided by the New Hampshire Secretary of State. Granite State Panel members are recruited from randomly-selected landline and cell phone numbers across New Hampshire and surveys are sent periodically to panel members.

Absentee Voting

According to the New Hampshire Secretary of State and Attorney General, any New Hampshire voter may choose to vote using an absentee ballot if they do not want to go to a polling location due to concerns about COVID-19. More than three-quarters of New Hampshire residents strongly (69%) or somewhat (7%) support this decision, 16% somewhat (5%) or strongly (11%) oppose it, 7% are neutral, and less than 1% don't know or are unsure. Support for this decision (76%) has increased somewhat since June (64%).

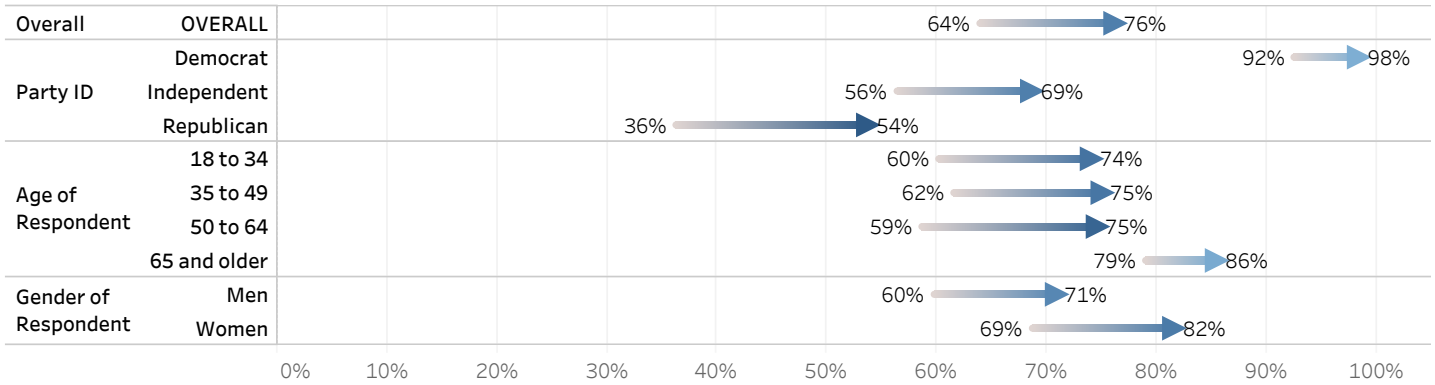
Support or Oppose Any NH Voter Being Able to Choose to Vote Absentee Due to COVID-19 Concerns

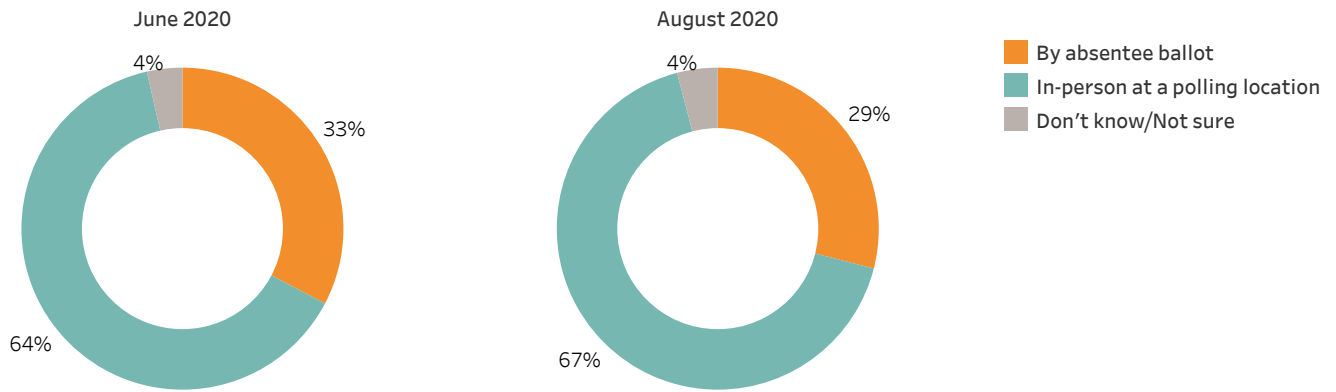
- Support has increased since June among Democrats (+6 percentage points), Independents (+12), and Republicans (+18).
- Support has increased among all age groups, in particular those under the age of 65.
- Support has increased since June among men (+11) and women (+13).

Support NH Voters Being Able to Choose to Vote Absentee Due to COVID-19 - Change from June to August 2020



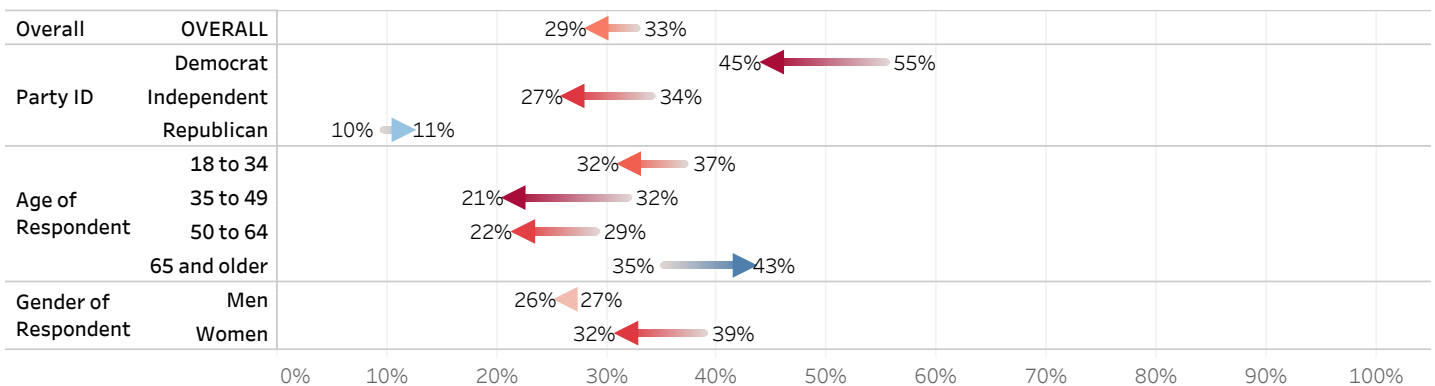
Based on what they know now, 67% of likely general election voters in New Hampshire say they prefer to vote in-person at the polls on election day, 29% would prefer to vote by absentee ballot, and 4% don't know or are unsure. Granite Staters are slightly less likely than they were in June to say they would prefer to vote by absentee ballot.

Preferred Method of Voting in General Election Based on What Know Now



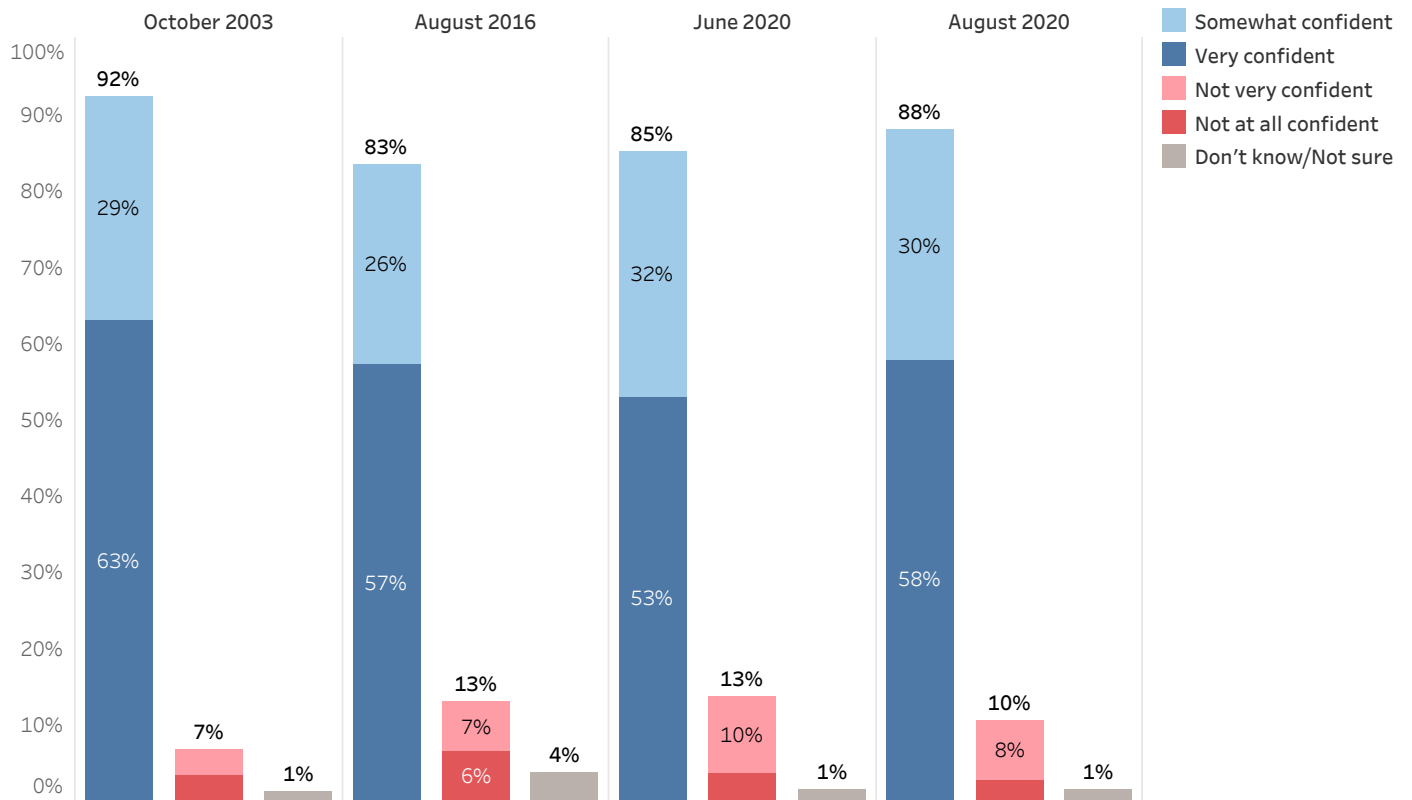
- Democrats (-10 percentage points) and Independents (-7 points) are slightly less likely than in June to prefer to vote by absentee ballot in the general election. However, Democrats (45%) and Independents (27%) are still a good deal more likely than Republicans (11%) to say they would prefer to vote absentee.
- Likely voters aged 18 to 64 are slightly less likely than in June to prefer to vote by absentee ballot in the general election while those aged 65 and older are slightly more likely than in June to prefer to vote absentee.
- Women (-7) are slightly less likely than in June to prefer to vote by absentee ballot while men (-1%) are largely unchanged in their opinion.

Prefer Voting by Absentee Ballot in General Election - Change from June to August 2020



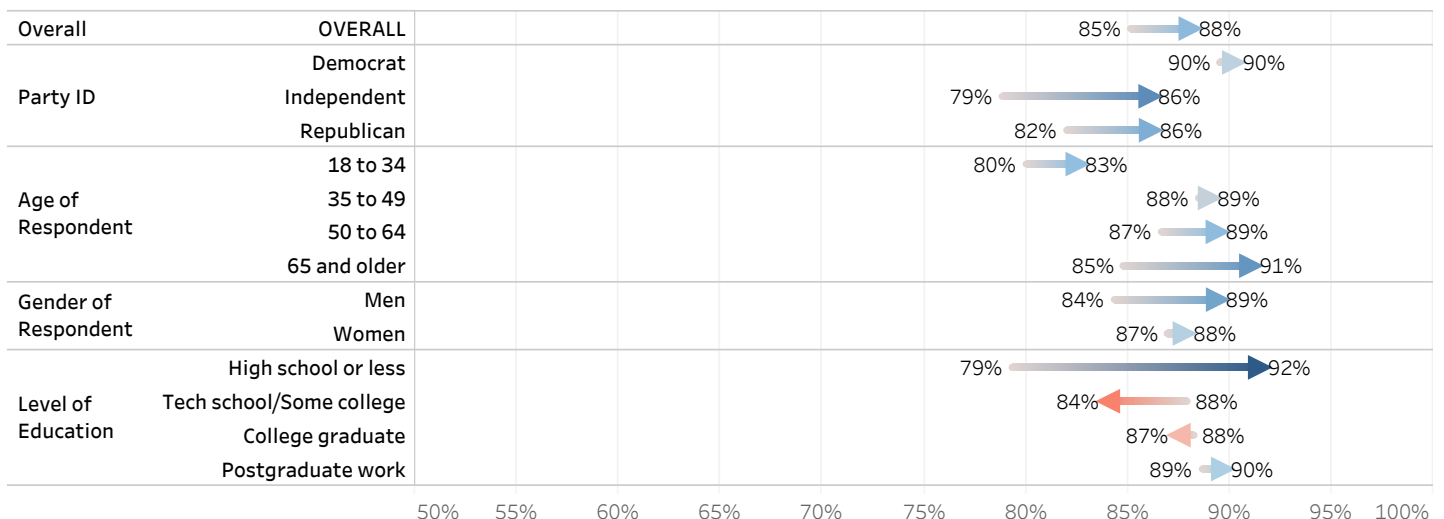
Despite concerns about election security, most likely voters in New Hampshire remain confident that their vote will be accurately counted: 88% are very (58%) or somewhat (30%) confident that their vote will be counted accurately, only 10% are not very (8%) or not at all (2%) confident, and 1% don't know or are unsure. Overall, these results are largely unchanged compared to August 2016 when respondents were asked about their confidence that their vote in the previous election had been accurately counted. However, confidence is slightly lower than in October 2003.

Confidence in Accuracy of General Election Vote



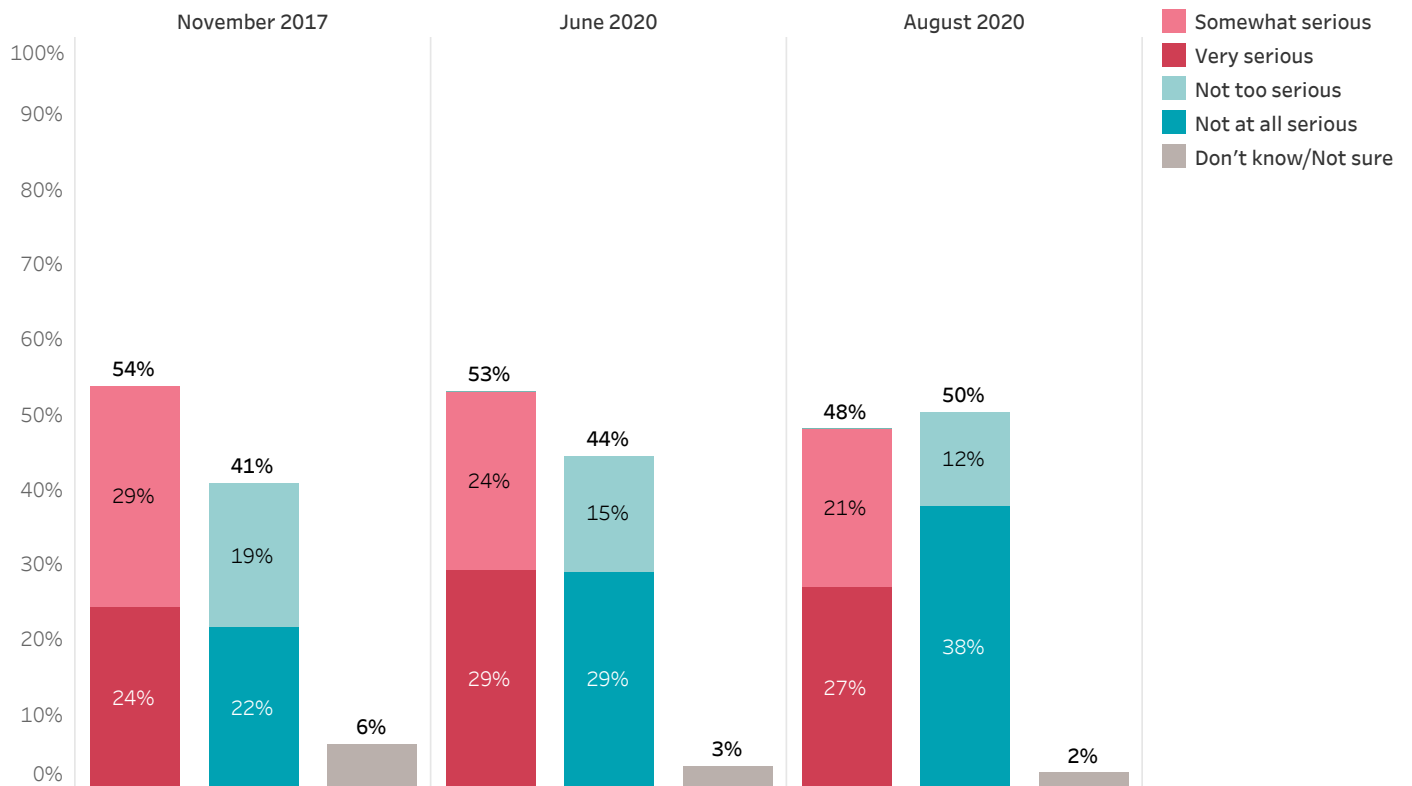
- Independents (+7) are more likely than in June to be very or somewhat confident that their vote will be accurately counted. Democrats, Independents, and Republicans are now about equally likely to say they are very or somewhat confident that their vote will be accurately counted.
- Likely voters aged 65 and older are slightly more likely (+6) than in June to be very or somewhat confident.
- Likely voters with a high school education or less are more likely (+12) than in June to be very or somewhat confident their vote will be accurately counted.

Very or Somewhat Confident Your General Election Vote Will Be Counted Accurately - Change from June to August 2020



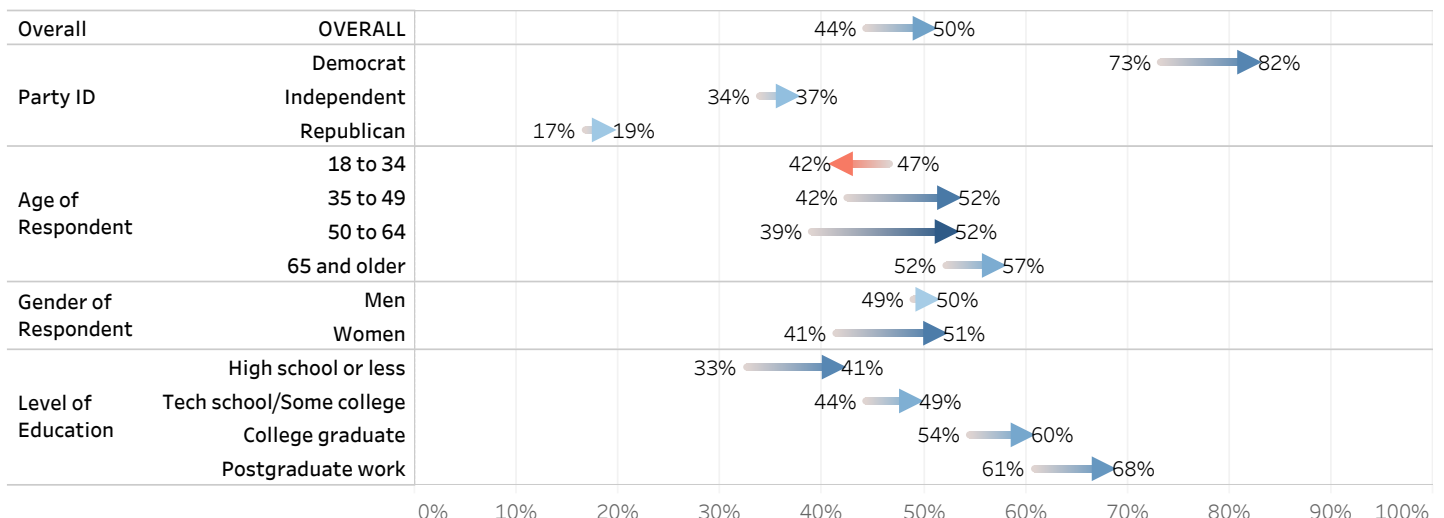
Forty-eight percent of New Hampshire residents believe that voter fraud is a very (27%) or somewhat (21%) serious problem in the United States; half (50%) believe voter fraud is not too serious (12%) or not at all serious (38%), while 2% don't know or are unsure.

Seriousness of Voter Fraud Problem in the United States



- Democrats (+9) are slightly more likely than in June to believe that voter fraud is a not too serious or not at all serious problem in the country as a whole. Overall, Democrats (82%) remain far more likely than Independents (37%) or Republicans (19%) to believe this to be true.
- Granite Staters aged 35 to 64 are more likely than in June to believe that voter fraud is a not too serious or not at all serious problem in the U.S.
- Women (+10) are more likely than in June to believe that voter fraud is a not too serious or not at all serious problem in the U.S. Men and women are now about equally likely to believe this to be true.
- Respondents of all education levels are more likely than in June to believe voter fraud is a not too serious or not at all serious problem in the U.S. Those with higher levels of education are more likely than those with lower levels of education to believe this to be true.

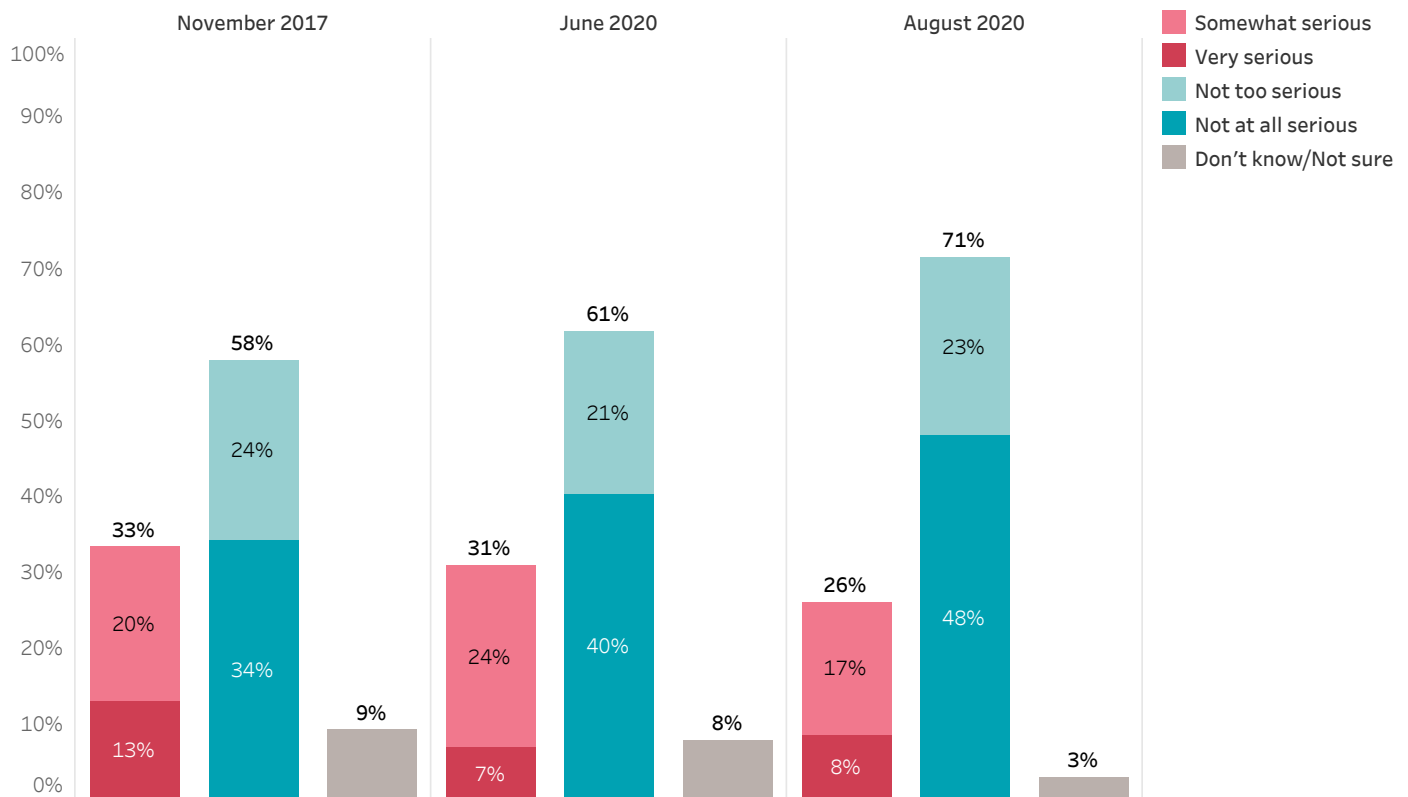
Believe Voter Fraud in U.S. is Not Too Serious or Not at All Serious - Change from June to August 2020



New Hampshire residents are far less likely to believe voter fraud is a serious problem in New Hampshire: only 26% believe that voter fraud is a very (8%) or somewhat (17%) serious problem in the state. Seventy-one percent believe voter fraud is not too serious (23%) or not at all serious (48%) in New Hampshire while 3% don't know or are unsure.

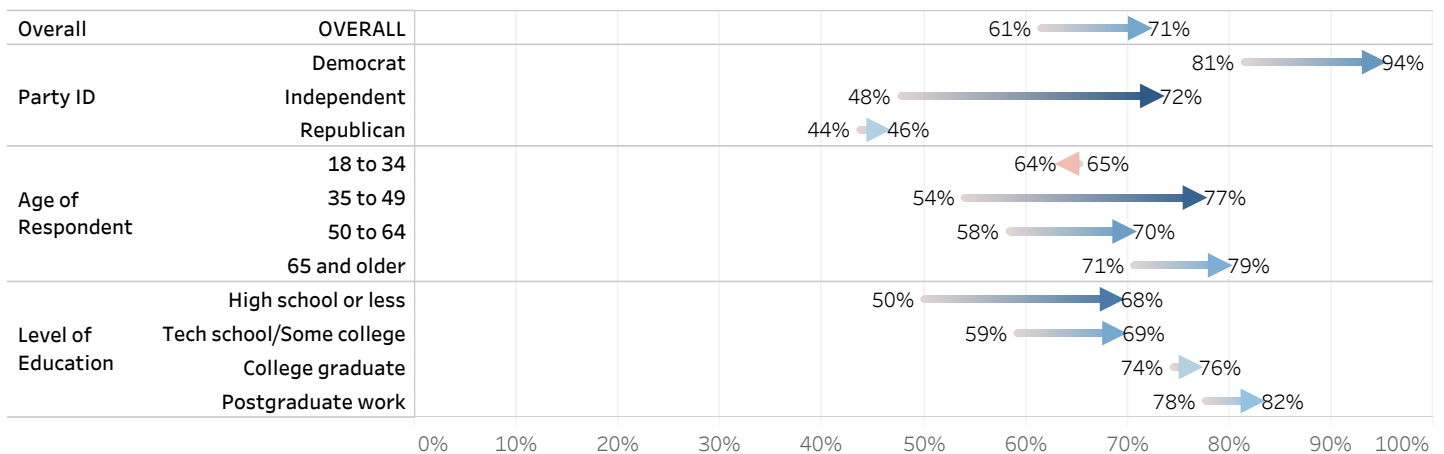
Overall, 46% of Granite Staters believe voter fraud is not too serious or not at all serious both in the country at large and in New Hampshire. Twenty-nine percent believe that voter fraud is very or somewhat serious in both the U.S. and in New Hampshire, while 19% believe voter fraud is very or somewhat serious in the U.S. but not in New Hampshire.

- Democrats (+13) and Independents (+24) are more likely than in June to believe that voter fraud is a not too serious or not at all serious problem in New Hampshire. Overall, Democrats (94%) remain more likely than Independents (72%) or Republicans (46%) to believe this to be true.
- Respondents aged 35 to 49 (+23) and those aged 50 to 64 (+12) are more likely than in June to believe that voter fraud is a not too serious or not at all serious problem in the state.
- Respondents with a high school education or less (+18) and those who went to technical school or have some college education (+10) are more likely than in June to believe that voter fraud is a not too serious or not at all serious problem in the state.

Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. One thousand and nine hundred forty-nine (1,949) Granite State Panel members completed the survey online between August 28 and September 1, 2020. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 2.2 percent. Included were 1,889 likely 2020 general election voters (MSE = +/- 2.3%). These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The response rate for the August 2020 Granite State Poll is 36%. The design effect for the survey is 2.3%.

Data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, as well as party registration levels provided by the New Hampshire Secretary of State.

The Granite State Panel is part of an effort by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center to investigate new ways of gathering and understanding the opinion of New Hampshire residents. Approximately 5,500 New Hampshire adults were recruited from randomly selected landline and cell phone numbers to participate in the panel. Panelists are then asked to participate in online surveys sponsored by the UNH Survey Center.

The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%.
