NH TRUMP VOTERS SAY HE WON ELECTION; TWO-THIRDS OF NH REPUBLICANS WANT TRUMP TO RUN IN 2024

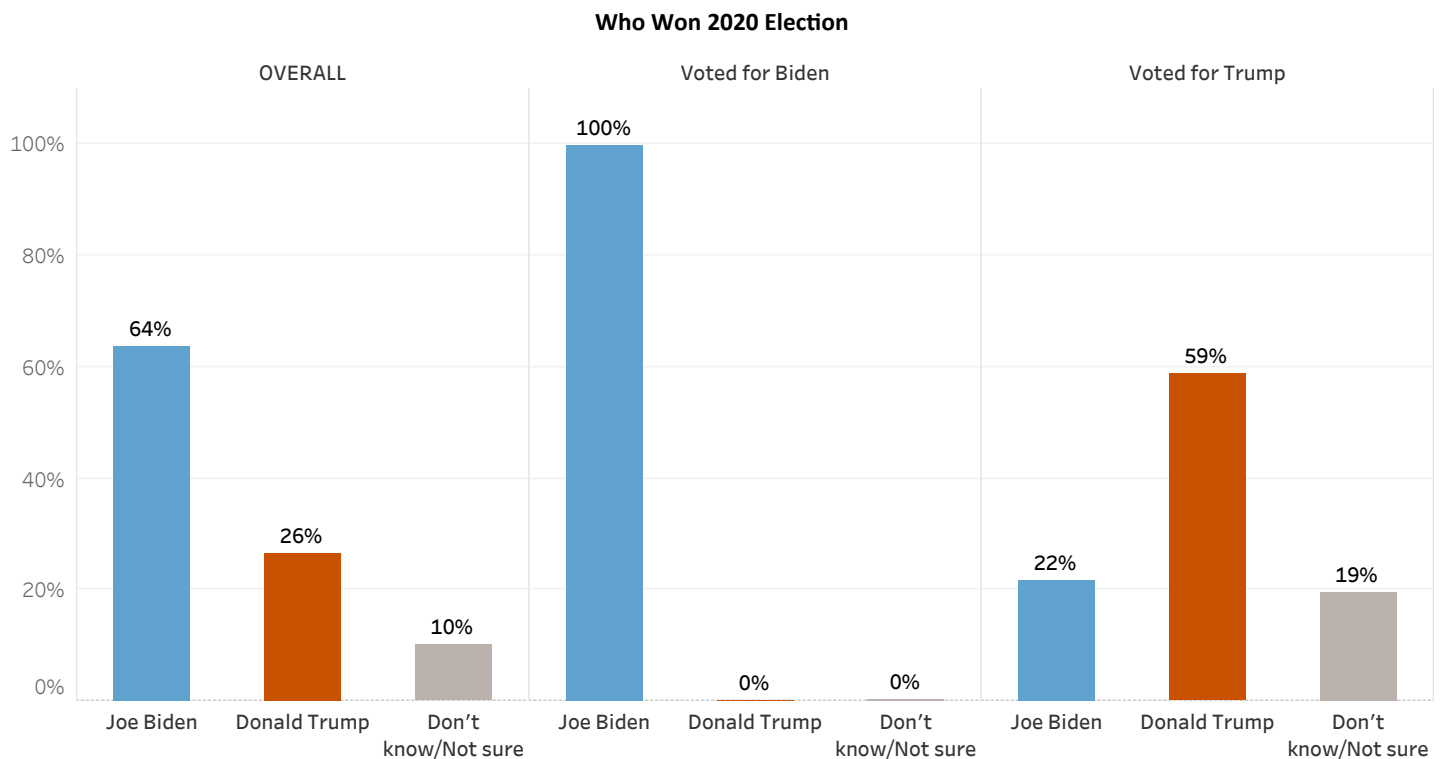

DURHAM, NH - Nearly two-thirds of New Hampshire residents believe Joe Biden won the 2020 presidential election. However, more than half of Donald Trump voters believe that Trump won the election and two-thirds of Republicans want Trump to run for President in 2024. Most Republicans think that voter fraud is a very serious problem in the U.S. and Trump voters are less likely to be confident that their vote was accurately counted. Nearly all 2020 voters say it was easy to vote and a slight majority would support "no excuse" absentee voting being available for future elections.

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll***, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. One thousand nine hundred and seventeen (1,917) Granite State Panel members completed the survey online between November 19 and November 23, 2020. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 2.2 percent. Data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, as well as party registration levels provided by the NH Secretary of State and 2020 election results in NH. Granite State Panel members are recruited from randomly-selected landline and cell phone numbers across New Hampshire and surveys are sent periodically to panel members.

Perceived Results of 2020 Presidential Election

Overall, nearly two-thirds (64%) of New Hampshire residents believe that Joe Biden won the most recent presidential election, a quarter (26%) believe that Donald Trump won, and 10% are unsure. Among those who voted for Trump (N=852), 59% believe that he actually won the election, 22% believe Biden won, and 19% are unsure. Among those who voted for Biden (N=994), nearly all (100%) believe that Biden won, while less than 1% believe that Trump won or are unsure.

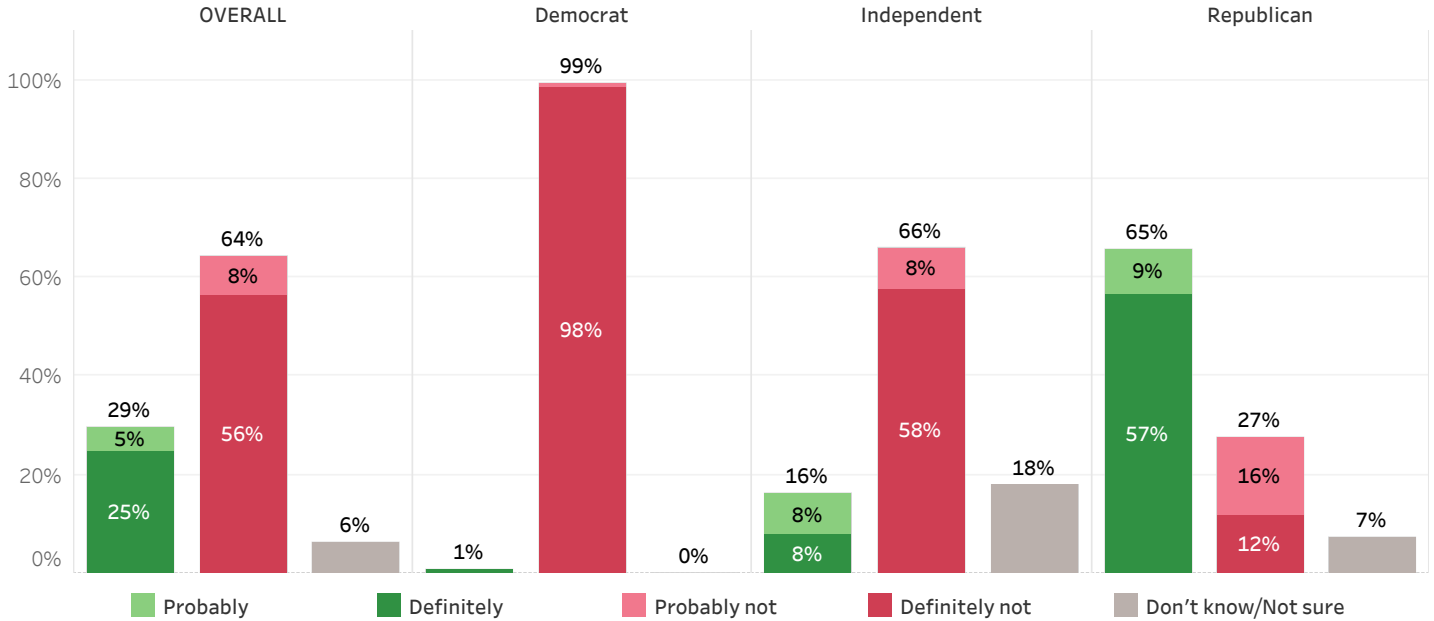

Desire for Trump to Run in 2024

Most Granite Staters do not want Trump to run for President in 2024. Almost two-thirds (64%) would definitely (56%) or probably (8%) not like him to run, 29% would definitely (25%) or probably (5%) like Trump to run in 2024, and 6% are unsure. Nearly all Democrats (99%) do not want Trump to run in 2024, along with two-thirds (66%) of Independents. However, two-thirds (65%) of Republicans would like Trump to run while only 27% do not want him to do so.

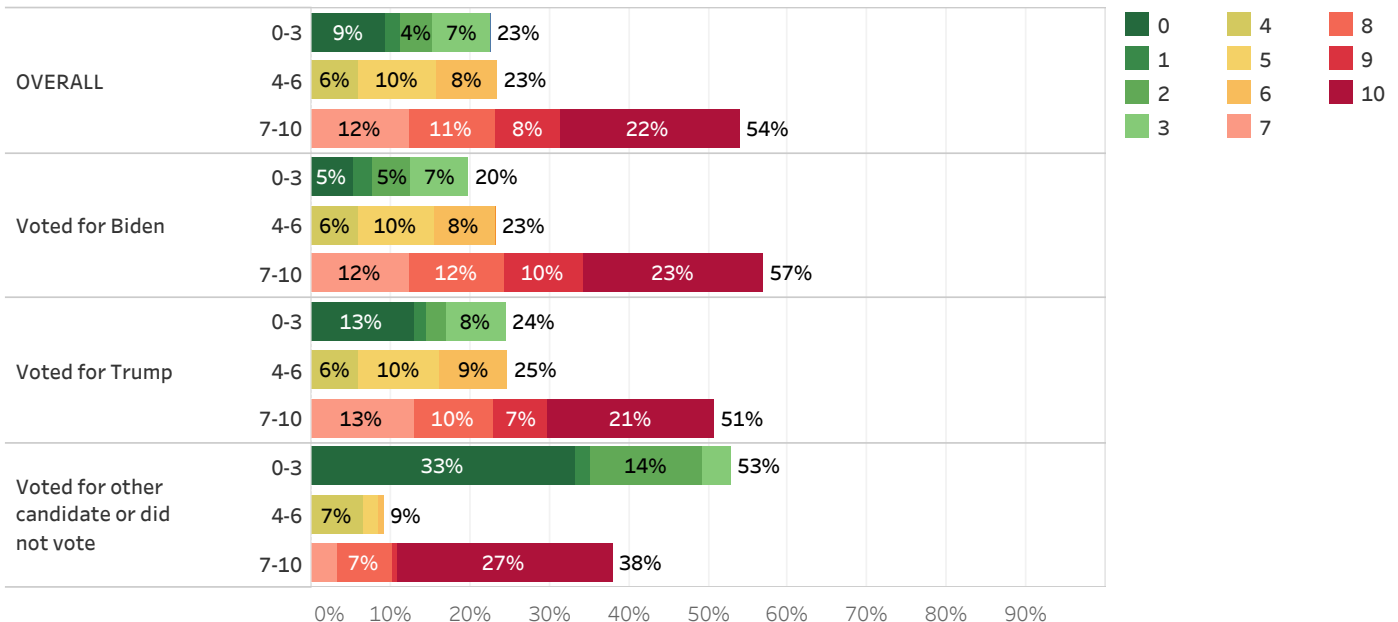
Would Like Trump to Run for President in 2024



Election-Related Stress

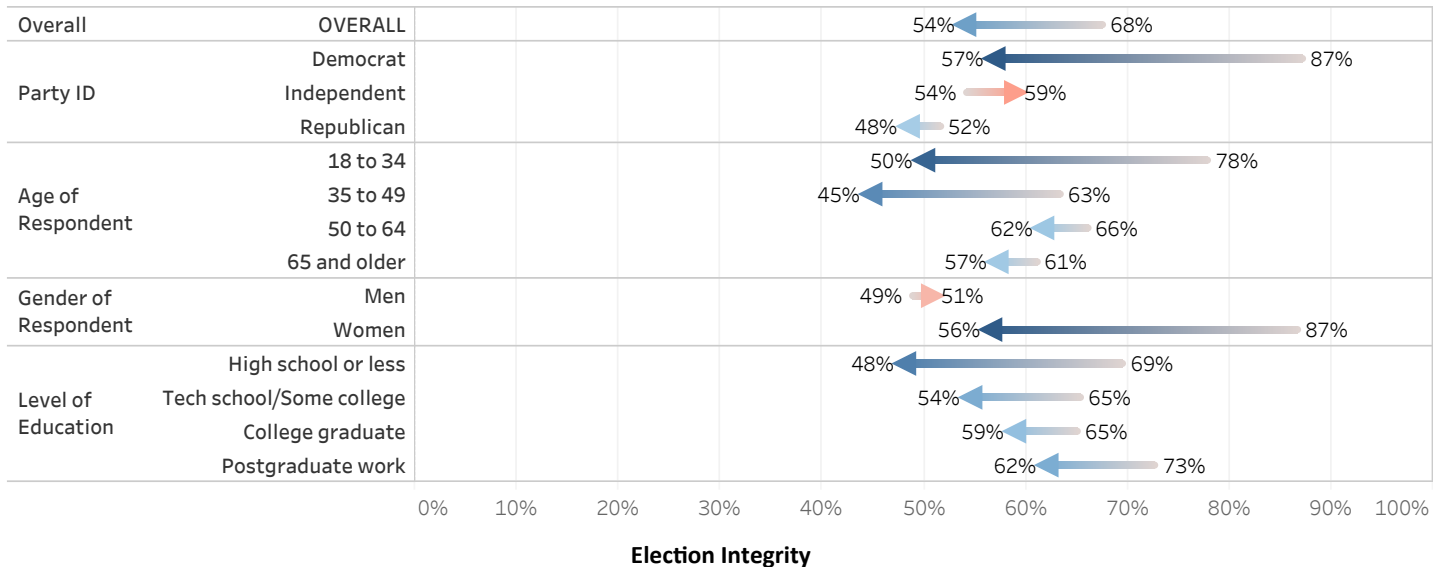
The 2020 election resulted in significant stress in New Hampshire. Fifty-four percent of New Hampshire residents place themselves at 7, 8, 9, or 10 when asked to place themselves on a 0-10 scale rating their overall level of stress as a result of the election, 23% place themselves at a 4, 5, or 6 on a 0-10 scale, and 23% place themselves at 0, 1, 2, or 3. Biden voters (57%) are slightly more likely than Trump voters (51%) to rate themselves between 7 and 10 while those who voted for another candidate or did not vote (38%) are least likely to be highly stressed because of the election. However, stress over the 2020 election is significantly lower among New Hampshire residents than it was in October.

- Democrats are far less likely than they were in October (-30 percentage points) to rate their stress as a result of the election between 7 and 10. Republicans (-3) are only marginally less likely than they were in October to rate their stress because of the election this highly while Independents are slightly more likely to do so (+5).
- Respondents aged 18 to 34 (-28) and those aged 35 to 49 (-19) are far less likely than in October to rate their stress as a result of the election between 7 and 10 while those aged 50 to 64 (-5) and those aged 65 and older (-4) are only slightly less likely to be highly stressed about the election than they were in October.
- Women (-30) are much less likely than in October to rate their stress as a result of the election between 7 and 10 while men (+2) are equally as likely as they were in October to be highly stressed about the election.
- Respondents with a high school degree or less (-21) are less likely than they were in October to rate their stress as a result of the election between 7 and 10 while those with higher levels of education have seen smaller declines since October.

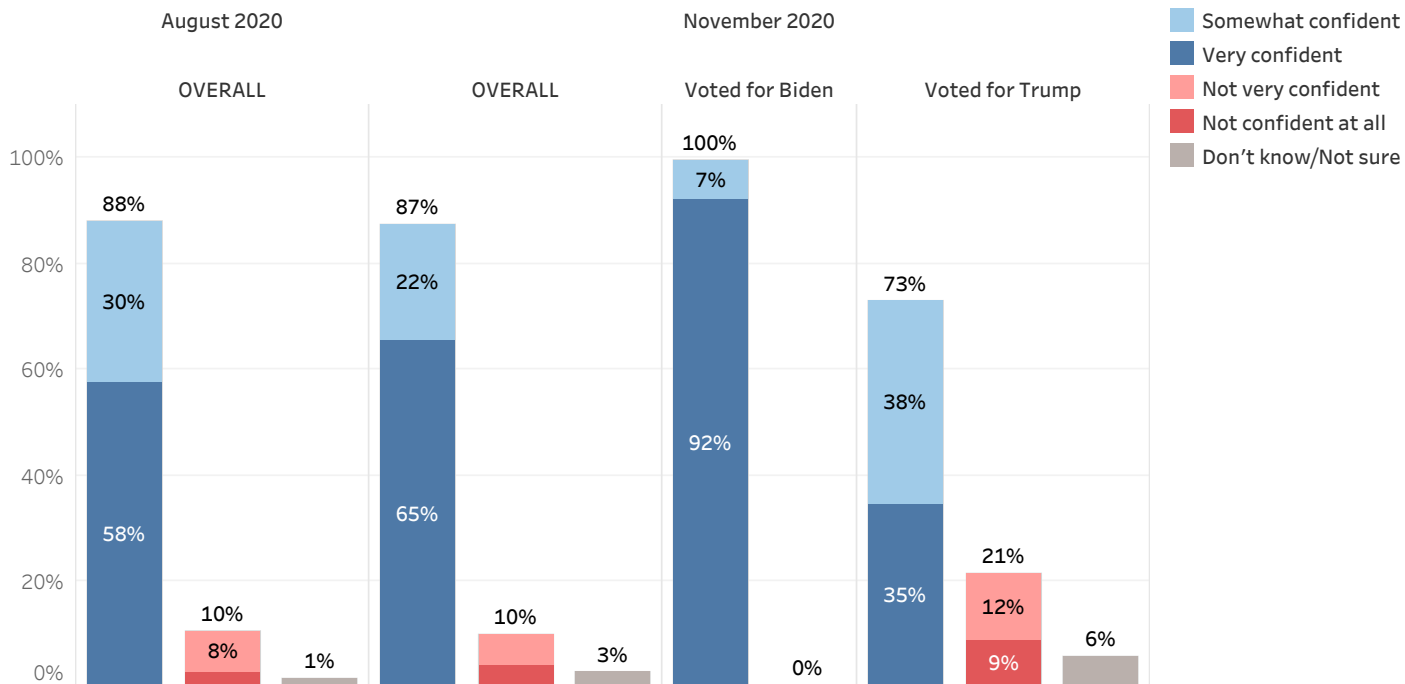
Highly Stressed (7-10 on 0-10 Scale) - Change from October 2020 to November 2020



Election Integrity

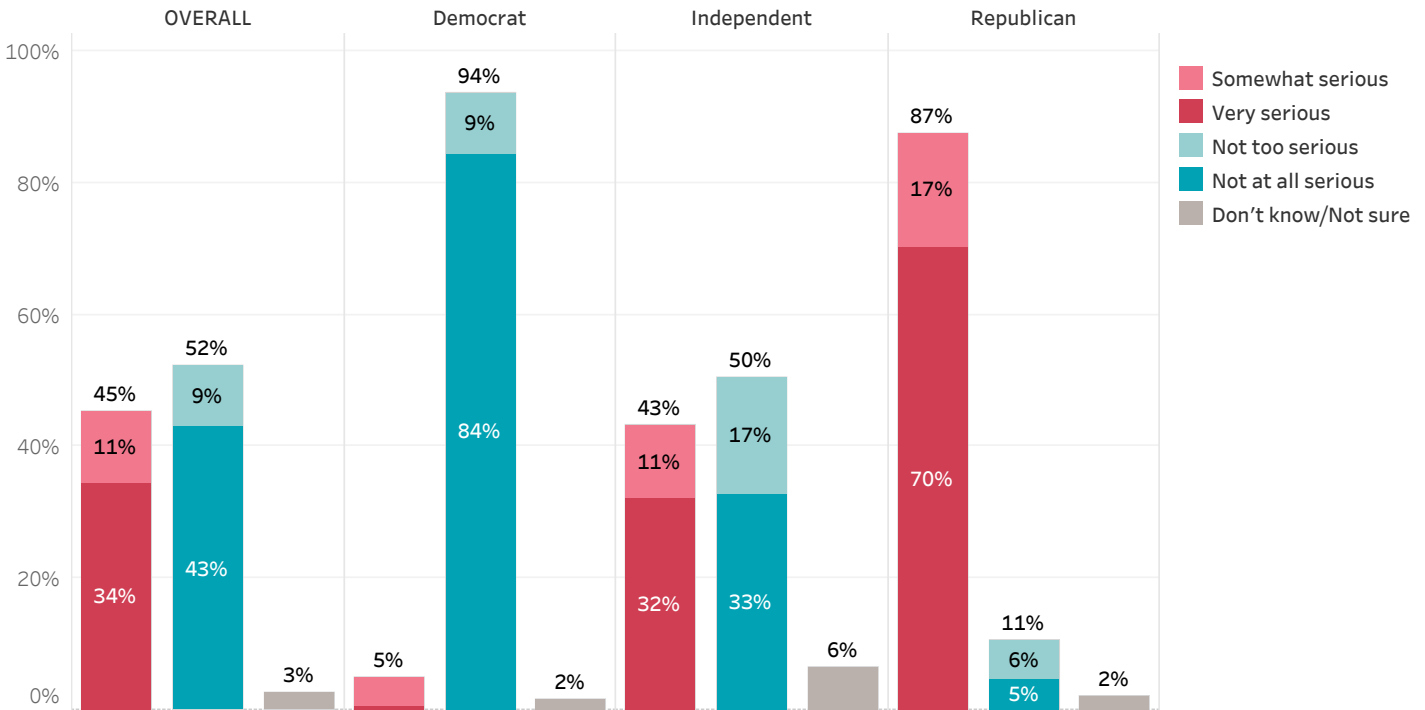
The majority of New Hampshire voters in the 2020 election are confident that their vote was accurately counted: 87% are very (65%) or somewhat (22%) confident, only 10% are not very confident (6%) or not confident at all (4%), and 3% are unsure. Ninety-two percent of Biden voters are very confident that their vote was accurately counted but only 35% of Trump voters are very confident. In August, Democrats (90%) and Republicans (86%) were equally confident that their vote would be accurately counted.

Confidence Your Vote Was Accurately Counted



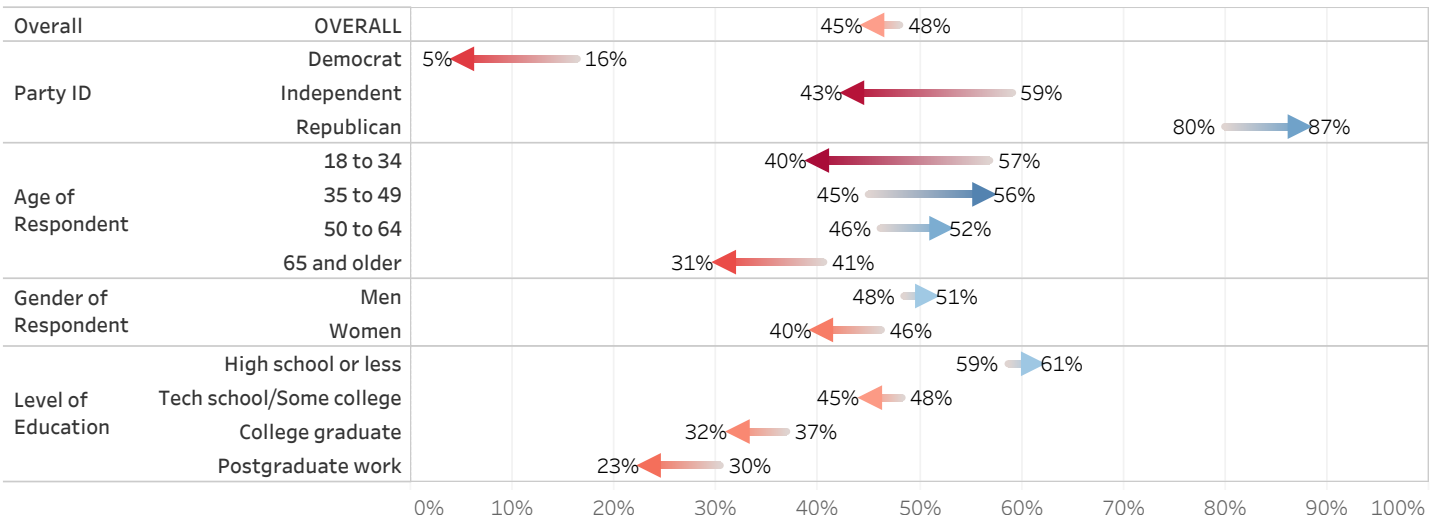
Even though voters generally believe their own vote was counted accurately, 45% of New Hampshire residents believe that voter fraud is a very (34%) or somewhat (11%) serious problem in the United States; 52% believe voter fraud is not too serious (9%) or not at all serious (43%), while 3% are unsure.

Seriousness of Voter Fraud Problem in United States



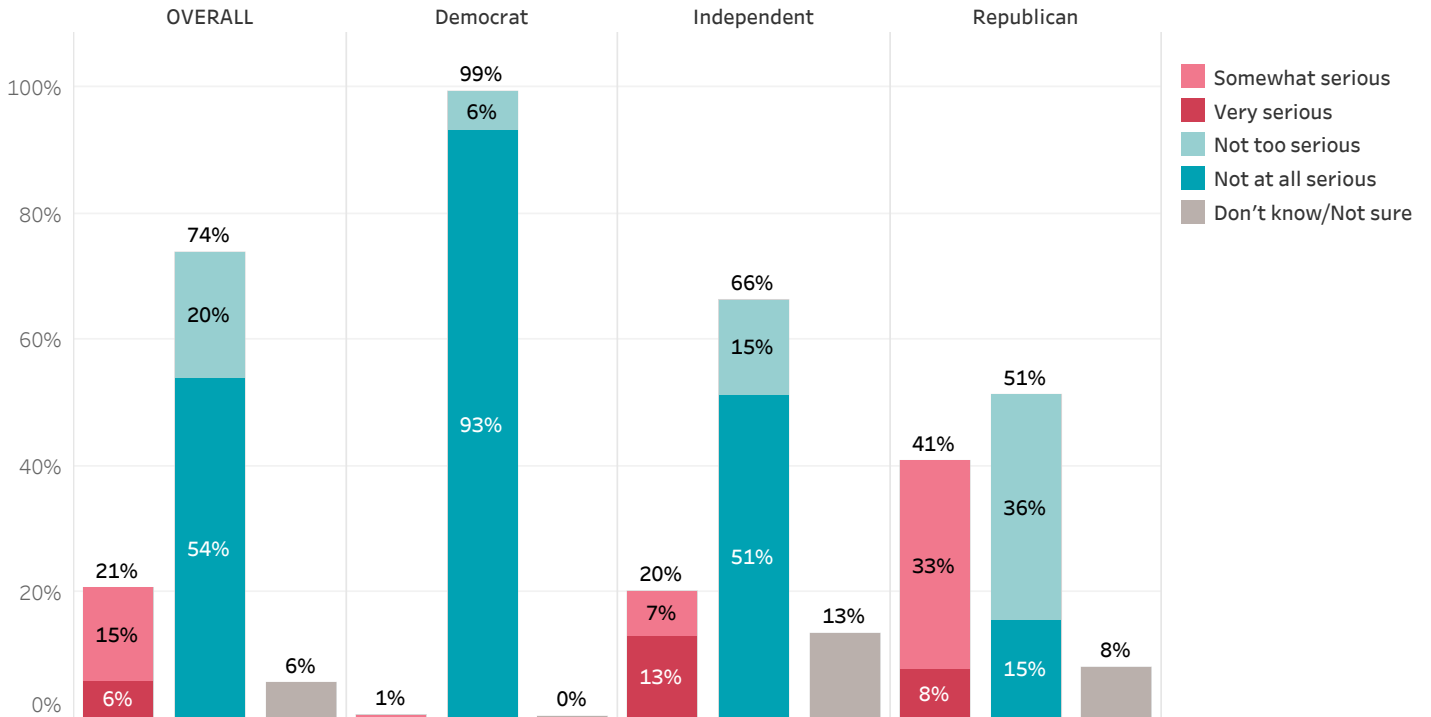
- Democrats (-11 percentage points) and Independents (-16) are less likely than they were in August to believe that voter fraud is a very or somewhat serious problem in the country as a whole while Republicans (+7) are more likely to believe this to be true. Overall, Republicans (87%) are far more likely than Independents (43%) and Democrats (5%) to believe voter fraud is a very or somewhat serious problem in the country.
- Granite Staters aged 18 to 34 (-17) and those aged 65 and older (-10) are less likely than in August to believe that voter fraud is a very or somewhat serious problem, while those aged 35 to 49 (+11) are more likely to say so.
- Women (-6) are slightly less likely than in August to believe that voter fraud is a very or somewhat serious problem, while opinion among men (+2) is largely unchanged.
- Respondents with a high school education or less remain more likely than respondents in all other education levels to believe that voter fraud is a very or somewhat serious problem. Respondents with high levels of education are slightly less likely than in August to believe that voter fraud is a very or somewhat serious problem.

New Hampshire residents are far less likely to believe voter fraud is a serious problem in New Hampshire; only 21% believe that voter fraud is a very (6%) or somewhat (15%) serious problem in the state. Seventy-four percent believe voter fraud is not too serious (20%) or not at all serious (54%) in New Hampshire while 6% don't know or are unsure. The percentage of respondents who believe voter fraud is not at all or not very serious (74%) in New Hampshire is higher than in June (61%) or in November 2017 (58%).

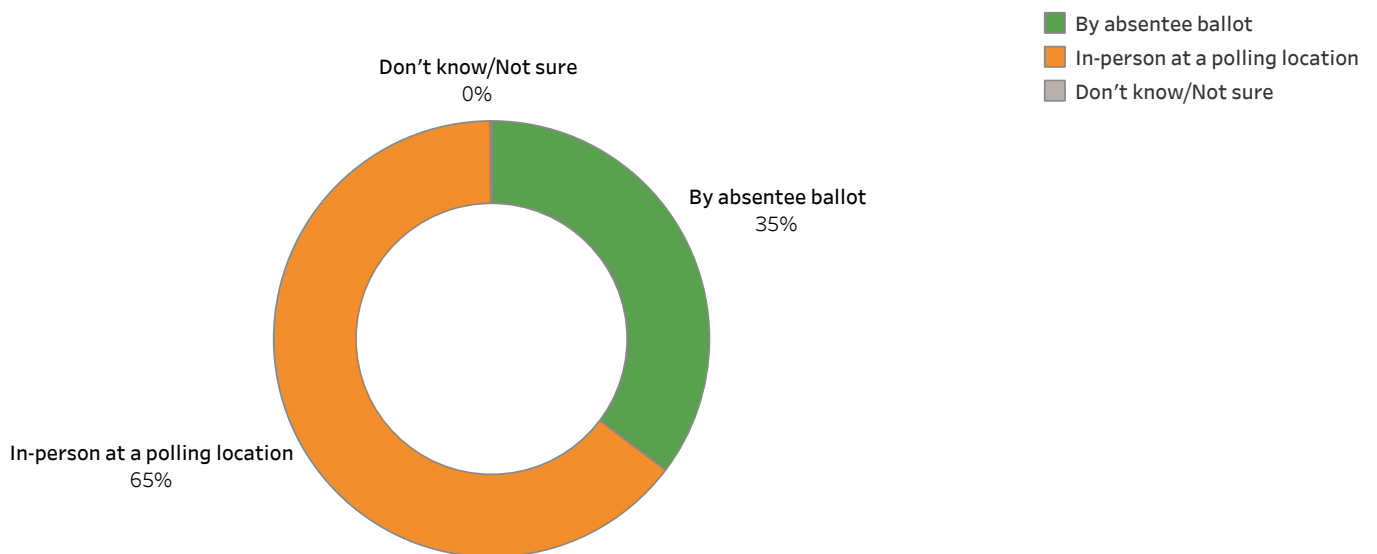
Seriousness of Voter Fraud Problem in New Hampshire



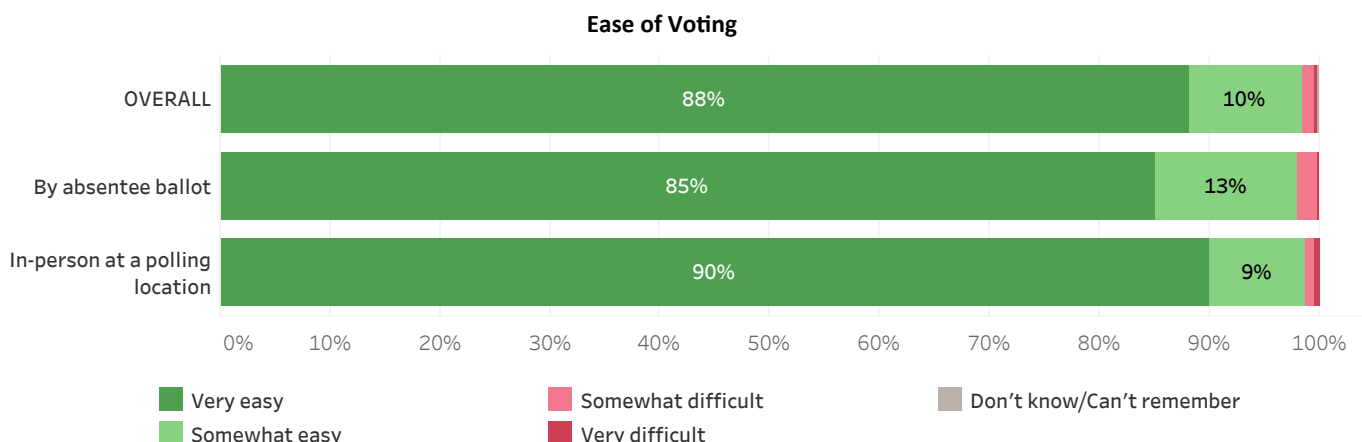
Voting Access

One-third (35%) of respondents who say they voted in the 2020 election in New Hampshire say that they voted by absentee ballot while 65% say they voted in-person at a polling location and less than 1% don't know or are unsure. This largely matches reports from the New Hampshire Secretary of State that 32% of voters in the election cast an absentee ballot.

Method of Voting in 2020 Election



Nearly all (98%) voters in the 2020 election in New Hampshire say that it was very (88%) or somewhat (10%) easy to vote while only 1% say it was somewhat difficult (1%) or very difficult (<1%). Nearly all respondents found it easy to vote regardless of whether they voted by absentee ballot (98%) or in-person at a polling location (99%) and whether they voted for Biden (98%) or Trump (99%).

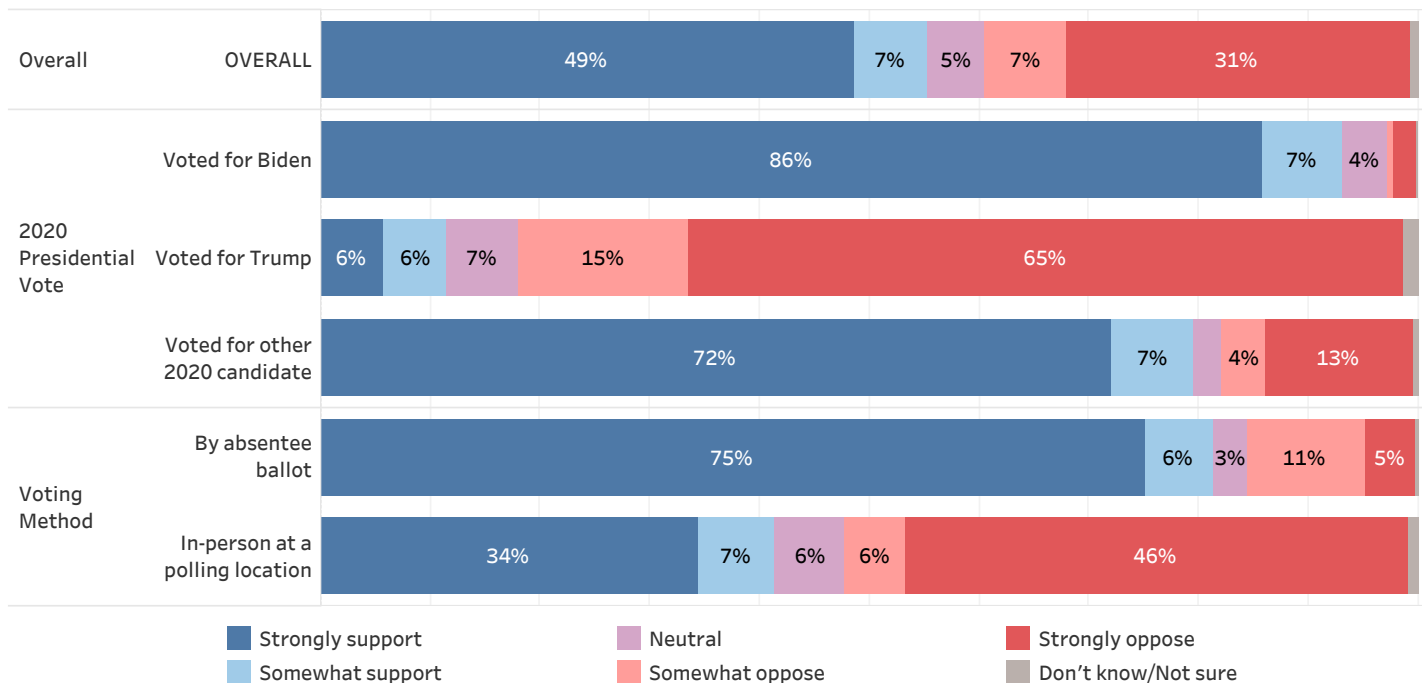


In the 2020 election, New Hampshire voters were allowed to request an absentee ballot if they did not want to go to a polling location due to concerns about COVID-19. Granite Staters were quite supportive of this policy: in September, 84% strongly or somewhat supported this policy.

In some states, voters under normal circumstances are allowed to request a mail-in ballot without having to provide a reason for their absence. A slight majority (55%) of New Hampshire residents would strongly (49%) or somewhat (7%) support "no excuse" absentee voting being allowed in future New Hampshire elections, 39% are somewhat (7%) or strongly (31%) opposed, 5% are neutral, and 1% are unsure.

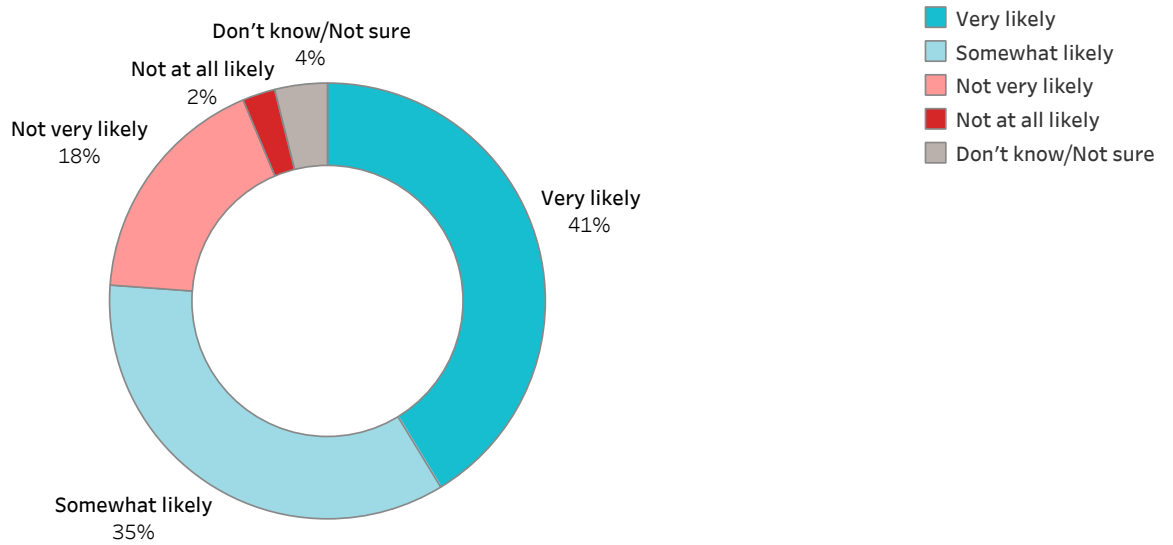
A large majority of Biden voters (93%) strongly or somewhat support this change, while 81% of Trump voters strongly or somewhat oppose it. Among those who voted by absentee ballot, 81% strongly or somewhat support this change but 51% of those who voted in-person at a polling location strongly or somewhat oppose it.

Among those who support "no excuse" absentee voting being allowed in future New Hampshire elections (N=1,052), 41% say they would be very likely to use "no excuse" absentee voting in future elections if it were available while 35% would be somewhat likely to do so. Eighteen percent say they would be not very likely to use "no excuse" absentee voting if available, 2% would be not at all likely to do so, and 4% are unsure.

Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. One thousand nine hundred and seventeen (1,917) Granite State Panel members completed the survey online between November 19 and November 23, 2020. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 2.2 percent. These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The response rate for the November 2020 Granite State Poll is 34%. The design effect for the survey is 2.5%.

Data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, as well as party registration levels provided by the NH Secretary of State and to 2020 election results in New Hampshire.

The Granite State Panel is part of an effort by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center to investigate new ways of gathering and understanding the opinion of New Hampshire residents. Approximately 5,750 New Hampshire adults were recruited from randomly selected landline and cell phone numbers to participate in the panel. Panelists are then asked to participate in online surveys sponsored by the UNH Survey Center.

The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%.
