



## **Repetition Counts**

In May and June, this column put forth some thoughts which might be employed this fall for new dancer introduction and teaching of square dancing. Traditionally, September has been the start month for new introductions. In many areas, efforts are made to have the month or even a week proclaimed "Learn to Square Dance Week."

In our continuing effort to suggest newer themes, we'd like you to consider not having the words "learn to" included with the words "square dance" in any promotions. Rather, make it just plain "Square Dance Week" or "Square Dance Month." Most people are aware that to enjoy any activity, they must learn somehing about it since the activity does not come naturally to them. You don't have to put the word "learn" in a key location in the



promotions you conduct.

You've heard all the reasons why we feel square dancing is a healthy recreation but that alone will not get people to try it. Promotions will work best if there is some type of follow up and in some cases, you really have to be creative. Personal contact is the greatest way to get people dancing. Never loose sight of that fact.

And with respect to the Multi-Cycle Program, if you use that method, you will be promoting square dancing at least three to four times per year in your area. That's much better than only once a year.

Just count in one week how many times you hear, see or read certain advertisements on radio, televison, the papers or magazines. Promoting square dancing once a year just does not work in this day and age.




## Johnnie Wykoff




with their words and singing.

#### Minnesota State Square Dance Convention

Dear ASD,

On June 10, 2000 at the Minnesota State Square Dance Convention, a panel was held with six panel members and 2 facilitators. Eighty plus people attended this panel. Each member stated how they felt about square dance attire and why. Then an active discussion followed.

Some people have very strong opinions. Most people felt there is too much being made of the dress code. They stated that we should focus more on friendliness of square dancers, their attitudes towards other people who want to dance regardless of their age or dress, and we should work on our perception (how we are perceived by others and how we perceive others). Also cleanliness was applauded as something very important. It seemed most people felt we can be too strict and thus eliminate some people from dancing and most agreed that is not what we want to do.

It was hard to get the consensus as everyone who expressed their opinions had a little different idea about it. It was felt that it should be left up to clubs because each one may have a different situation. In general if it's not broke don't fix it!!!!!

# SELLING SQUARE DANCING

The reaction to "My Views on Square Dancing" in the May issue has prompted me to expound even further on the subject of marketing and the skills required to close the sale.

For the last twenty-five years we have all used the CALLERLAB suggested lists and guidelines for teaching and the sequence that we should follow. The content has changed within the list, but not dramatically. This has allowed the dancers the pleasure of knowing the level of dance before paying at the door or later being embarrassed in front of friends or potential friends.

Prior to and during this same period came the advent of the "Professional Traveling Caller" and every new caller wanted to emulate his or her favorite. But, they never got to hear the "Pro" do a fun night, teach the first

four nights of lessons or do a onenighter. The prevailing attitude was "I want to be like him/her," but they forgot or failed too realized that without the skills to sell square dancing to the non dancing public, there would be no public for either the "Pro" or the local caller.


Now comes the final blow and I know I will receive letters over this statement. Round dancing moved from the round dance clubs into the square dance halls and this resulted in the callers no longer being required to learn and teach mixers, easy couple dances, contras, trios by Otto Warteman Houston Texas

and line dances as an added entertainment tool between tips.

The result is a generation of underdeveloped callers.

Without this added repertoire of dance forms, callers are handcuffed when trying to call for Girl and Boy Scout troops, schools and churches, the very people we need in square dancing.

How can you entertain nondancers, if you have to teach ladies chain, right and left thru, and square



thru to be able to call a simply singing call? Those moves for a non-dancer are difficult work and not entertaining. They came for a "FUN" night. Examine your class attendance over the first four nights and see if you haven't lost over half your new dancers within that period.

It is disappointing to me to continuously see panels at the Nationals and CALLERLAB on voice, choreography, timing and music for callers that are already calling. These are skills that a caller can and should get from professional voice teachers. We have a generation of callers to educate

and it should start with a convention totally dedicated to learning how to do one-night stands. Caller colleges need to focus, for at least two years, on selling and teaching the benefits of being a "Highly skilled Professional One Night Stand Caller."

If a caller doesn't have the vacation time to attend a callers college dedicated to one night stands, he/she can purchase two books, that I feel are the best on the subject. "Dance A While" by Harris. Pittman and Waller or "Dancing for Busy People" compiled by Calvin Campbel, Kenneth Kernen and Robert Howell. There is also a video with a booklet and audiotape by the Kentucky Dance Institute with Jerry Helt calling that is great for polishing your own presentation skills.

Do you believe that when a new model of car appears on the market the manufacturer has not already trained the sales staff on how to promote it's benefit's? They stress all the positive points in the vehicle

and never brooch a negative. They would have thought out and planned their presentation so that all objections would receive a positive response.

We as dancers must do the same. We need to understand that because the new dancer shows up for lessons, they are not yet sold on this activity for their social and physical needs. The current working generation of Americans have limited amounts of time to devote to any one social

> activity, and making announcements about visitations, bringing refreshments or any time related tasks should not be mentioned the first month or two of lessons. Don't discuss the club dress or even wear costumes. Make the new dancer feel at home and not as a stranger.

> Remember that the first 30 seconds of a greeting forms an impression that will last for months or years and any facial or body language of a negative



nature will give the new dancer a reason not to come back. A club needs to plan a class presentation, discuss all the benefits and cover all the negatives so that the negatives are never presented to the class. Ask yourself "Why should a person take square dance lessons" and if you can't answer the "WHY" in the first night of lessons or a fun night, then the club and caller need to seek help in selling skills. You can spend tens of thousands of dollars on marketing and lose it all the first night. Dancer organizations need to realize a "Professional One Night Stand Caller" is highly skilled and a pat on the back doesn't buy gas, records, schools or time. When you honed your professional skills, you either asked for a raise or went elsewhere. Callers are no different. The public expects to pay for "Professional" entertainment.

Only through the continued education of dancers and callers can we change our direction and create a new generation of marketeers.

## CALLERLAB HONORS BOOK

#### Jack Lasry Milestone, 1980

First exposed to square dancing while employed as a recreation director for the city of Miami Beach, Florida in the early 1950s, Jack was impressed with the recreational values of the activity. Before long he was calling for children and conducting one-night stands.

With time out for obtaining a college education and raising a family, Jack and his wife Carolyn, kept contact with the activity through party dances and one-night stands.

In 1960 Jack was invited to take over the calling for a club in nearby Homestead. This first real experience with club calling and teaching led to the big step for the Lasrys when they opened their own square dance hall, "Trails End" in Miami.

By 1965 Jack had become a full-time caller appearing on many of the large festivals. With a background in school teaching, it was a natural step for Jack to move into the field of caller training. Conducting a number of callers clinics of his own, he was also featured on the staff of several others.


Prolific in the creating of dance



material, he edited a very successful callers note service and his articles appeared in a number of square dance publications.

A charter member of CALLERLAB, Jack served the organization as Chairman of the Board and in many other ways.

Jack passed away October 9, 1990, leaving a legacy of devotion to the activity. His constant goal was to make the dance a variety of interesting patterns, spiced with a dash of the unusual, but all blended together to make a smooth dance put together with the joy of moving to music.



# **CLUB LEADERSHIP NOTES**

**Bernie** Coulthurst



Outstanding leadership is something we look for on a regular basis. We found that OUTSTANDING LEADER-SHIP recently in the Toronto & District Square & Round Dance Association. Inc. (T & D). The Toronto & District Square & Round Dance Association, according to an article written by Dean & Ethel Fisher, Collingwood, Ontario in the April - May - June 2000 issue of the Canadian Dancers News, started the 1999/2000 dance season by sponsoring a Callers & Cuers Clinic at Brook University in July 1999. This year, T & D has again sponsored an "Incentive Program" which offered to callers and cuers who run Basics Classes and are members of the association.

Quoting Dean & Ethel, "Here is the deal! Callers, cuers or clubs within the association who conduct a Basics Class through the year T & D will pay you \$150 when you graduate that class. In addition to the money T & D will host two dances for the Basics dancers through the year."

Wow! What a great idea! They have a total of 10 classes registered this year in the program. Many state organizations have five digit amounts in their savings accounts and CDs. Maybe some states who have had several National Square Dance Conventions have six digit savings accounts. Now is the time for other provincial and state square & round dance organizations to open their pocket books and offer an incentive program similar to the one that T & D is offering in the Toronto area.

The incentive for clubs is especially attractive because most clubs lose money in their new dancer programs each year. The \$150 could easily be enough to put a new dancer program in the black.

Provincial and state square & round dance associations with large cash reserves are actually not living up to their constitution and bylaws. Their purpose is to promote square and round dancing in their respective areas - not build up large cash reserves. Many associations just use the interest earned on their savings to promote square dancing. I think we have to take a step further and invest more dollars to get square and round dancing growing again.

The CALLERLAB Convention is over with and the reports of what happened are dribbling slowly into the square and round dance press circles. We sure hope they addressed the dancer retention issue. That is our number one problem. Marketing will bring in the dancers but only positive change will keep the new dancers. The current status with new dancers is that they have to "swim or sink" in the real square dance world which is oriented to the "more is better" concept.

Everybody should study the article titled, The Life Cycle of Our Activity, written by Ken Ritucci., that appeared in the July 2000 issue of this magazine. It is an excellent article about what needs to be changed in our activity. The article even caused comments on square dancing discussion list owned by Ken & Helena Robinson. The fourth suggestion is what caused the reaction. The fourth suggestion "is adding new calls or eliminating old ones from the current situation: i.e., combine existing lists of calls, and eliminate redundancy to make a more simplified, and easy to use entry level dance program." The article ties in well to our recent discussions of dancer retention being our most serious problem facing the activity today.

The only answer that I can visualize that will help us solve our retention problem is do away with the Plus program, putting most of the Plus calls into Advanced and the rest into Mainstream, followed by a thorough housecleaning of the Mainstream program. Now that is not so bad, is it? Why can't we simply realize that we have to take positive action to retain our new dancers? Often the clubs are blamed for our poor dancer retention. And, to a degree, this is true. Clubs simply do what the experienced dancers want and that is "Soft Plus" square dancing. But, is it worth trying to satisfy this select group at the expense of our new dancers? Many clubs are down to 2 or 3 squares per dance. It will get worse before it gets better. And when things get bad enough they will take action and go back to Mainstream dancing and start retaining more of their new dancers. Ken Ritucci is right when he referred to the Plus program as a virus and it needs to be removed. Quoting Ken, "like any virus, we can choose to ignore it or be consumed by it." Remember that the Plus program was not created because of a need for more programs: it was created to avoid "getting rid" of a group of calls, newly created by callers for the most part, to avoid these callers being upset and possibly not joining or retaining their membership in CALLERLAB. Note that back then callers did not need an ASCAP/BMI license. Now, getting this license is the primary reason for membership in a caller organization or a round dance leader organization. All this is food for thought and, remember, together we can make things happen for the better.

Till next time, happy dancing, it is a pleasure that will not last forever.

#### WHEN A CALLER USES A CALL INCORRECTLY

It is not unusual for dancers to tell me that their caller is using a call incorrectly, which means using a different interpretation of the definition than is recognized. When I ask if the dancer pointed out the mistake to the caller after the tip, I receive a look of total shock. No, they say, they would never tell a caller he/she was wrong.

This attitude is bad for square dancing. It means the caller will continue to adversely affect dancers by the mis-use of the call. It would seem logical that what is best for square dancing would be for the caller to be informed of the mistake, so that the call will be used correctly in the future. Alas, most dancers seem to be afraid of the callers, and thus they say nothing.

Here is the procedure for letting a caller know that a call is being used incorrectly:

1. <u>Always speak to the caller in</u> <u>private, never from the square</u>. This is common courtesy.

2. <u>Be sure you are right</u>. If you are only partially sure you are correct, then simply say "Someone told me it is not correct to do the call from there because....., but I don't know for sure? Can you help me out?" This enables the caller to explain his position while at the same time considering the other viewpoint.

If you know you are correct, then you might explain that other callers use the call differently. Be prepared to go into detail and to discuss the rule of the call. If the caller accepts your explanation and makes a change, great. But what if the caller says you are wrong. Then the next step is:

3. <u>Get evidence</u>. Contact a well-known caller whose name would be recognized and ask that caller's opinion. If that caller agrees with you, go back to your caller and quote your source. This should achieve positive results.

Obviously it is vital that you have a thorough knowledge of call definitions before entering in to this type of discussion.

Although there are a few callers who do not care whether they use illegal material, most callers want to call properly. But in their search for creative choreography they may occasionally use a call improperly without even realizing it. You can help other square dancers hear only correct usages of calls by pointing out to callers when they use a call incorrectly.





Lou Hyll, who hails from Dayton, OH shared this neat dance with me at the Spring Frolic Contra Weekend at Marietta, OH last March. It is a smooth routine that can be accomplished with a quick walk-through. He calls it the ---

Formation: Sicilian circle. Couple facing couple around the circle, one facing CW, the other CCW.



From Oshkosh, WI, Dennis Leatherman shared with me a copy of a syllabus from the Third Annual Convention of the Folk Dance Federation Of Minnesota, dated 1954. Dennis's dad had attended that convention and passed the syllabus on to him and he in turn gave it to me. Ed Gilmore of Yucaipa, CA was one of the callers present and offered the following dance. He entitled it ---

Jerry and Kathy Helt of Cincinnatti, OH presented an unusual contra during the traditional week at COPECREST this past spring. I was intrigued with it and want to share it with all of those who read this column. The music and dance fit so perfectly. It will mesmerize you as you glide along to a wonderful meaningful waltz. This dance is indeed another great creation by two very talented choreographers. They call it the ---



Some of these subject matters include: Music; Teaching; Mechanics of Choreography; Methods of Choreographic Management; Leadership; Timing, Body Flow and Smooth Dancing; Voice and Delivery; Ethics; Business of Calling; Showmanship; Sound, Equipment and Records; Promotion; Party Dances, One-Night Stands, Contras and Mixers; History and Heritage; Caller's Partner; and Resources.

Several pages of choreography are included in this issue, including contributions from Jerry Reed, Walt Cole and Don Taylor (Opposite Lady Box).

#### CALLERS NOTES Norm Wilcox

In this month's 'Adding Creativity To Your Choreography' article, Norm provides some examples of sequences that use the module approach. These are



complete sequences, but he shows what formation and arrangement the dancers are in at the appropriate moment. These are written for sight callers and do not include any Sequence or Relationship information.

In the Basics and Mainstream programs, the following calls and sequences are featured: Promenade (including Couples and Single File); Split the Outside Two: Centers In - Cast Off 3/4.; and Dixie Style. For the Plus Program, Chase Right is the Emphasis Call. Also at the Plus program are quite a few Surprise Get-Outs. For those calling Advanced, Wheel Thru is the featured call. This is most often called from a Static Square, but can be called anywhere from facing couples. Also included is some choreo using the All Four Couples concept. 



"Cabbage" alternates with banjo, guitar and fiddle leads, while "Uncle" starts with that barn dance intro fiddle and goes to some fun guitar licks. Both are active pieces and make for fine listening as well as dancing.

#### **Double Trouble - MAC-2428**

This single side (calls on the other) hoedown has some fine guitar work and a mellow air-kind of a Chet Atkins feel to the piece. Good warm up music to start a dance. Choreo sheet included with some fun workshop material for something a little different. One of my keepers this month.

#### Bruno Jams/Weeping Woody - P-1005

Finally for this month another two sided hoedown (always a good value). "Bruno" is a jaunty little number with a variety of instrumental leads including horns and piano-cute music. "Weeping" is much more relaxing with guitar leads-kind of a strolling number and an easy percussion.



#### Bob Brundage Special Appreciation Award

CALLERLAB - April 18, 2000 Presented by Al Brundage

The recipient of this award has been involved in square dancing for over 65 years. He started playing drums in a square dance orchestra weekends. His input and cooperation with the late Dick Leger resulted in CALLERLAB's Timing Rules and Definitions. Bob's work as assistant

organized by his mother as a 4-H club She traveled by horse and buggy as a young girl to play piano at square dances with her father and later played sound effects for silent movies and eventually became a concert pianist. She wanted her sons to have some sort

to Lawrence Lov. recreation director for the State of Massachusetts resulted in an organized procedure for conducting dance festivals and this structure is still used today. His stand on timing and phrasing has influenced many new callers to show and teach the musical val-

of a musical education and overcame many problems to form the first 4-H music club in the U.S. Eventually the entire family was involved in the square dance activity.

The square dance orchestra was organized around 1933 or 1934. A year or so later our recipient started to call and has been calling square dances ever since Throughout Bob's career he has always had a positive effect on the square dance activity from local and regional influence to national recognition.

His recordings on Folkraft and MacGregor labels are still used at Contra and Folk Dance institutes and ues of dancing. His philosophy is that dance steps are set to music - music is not an incidental accompaniment to choreography.

During World War Two, he took time away from square dancing to become a fighter pilot in the U.S. Army Air Corps, flying P-47 fighter bombers with countless missions for close support of General Patton's Army and three missions on D-Day. On his return from the military service he became a strong and dedicated leader in the square dance activity, not only calling dances locally but also touring as a national traveling caller. He also became involved in organizations that



helped spur on the expanding square dance movement: Board of Directors -New England Folk Festival Association; staff member New England Recreation Leaders Laboratory: staff Connecticut Song & Dance Festival: staff, Maine Folk Dance Camp with the Hermans and Ralph Page; staff, Country Dance and Song Society at Pinewoods, MA: staff. Recreation Leaders Conference Watkins Glen, NY: official caller, New York State Fair; organized his own square dance orchestra in the late 1930's - his longest steady run with his band - 27 years at Vail's Grove, NY.

Six years ago Bob moved to

Albuquerque, New Mexico and soon after volunteered his services to the Lloyd Shaw Foundation. His first project was to help Bill Lichman, director of the Lloyd Shaw Archives, sort and catalogue the thousands of records, books, magazines, note service issues and other memorabilia donated to the Foundation.

So far 590 square dance record labels on 45 RPM and 320 78 RPM labels have been identified and catalogued representing over 35,000 individual records produced in the past 65 years going back to the early Henry Ford records and continuing to the present.

While involved in the that project, Bob discovered that there was a void in the documentation of the history and development of square dancing during this formative period and very little was written about the transition from what we now know as "Traditional" to our present Modern Western Square Dancing.

Bob also knew that the leaders largely responsible for developing the expanding movement were slowly but surely being lost. He realized that scattered throughout the country were personalities with great stories to tell of how the square dance activity had been developed in their area. Therefore he decided to take the leadership in trying to get this history on tape and create a historical document that would adequately cover this period. His goal is to get a complete and accurate account from as many of the early leaders as possible and create an unparalleled historical document for the Lloyd Shaw Foundation Archives.

So far Bob has spent over two and a half years on this project. He started out interviewing Hall-Of-Fame and Milestone Award recipients and then went on to Silver Halo and Silver Spur leaders. Bob followed-up with wellknown national and regional leaders from over 35 states as well as Canada, England and Australia. He has interviewed Art Shepherd from New Zealand and has recently acquired an interview and lecture tape of Ed Gilmore taken at Ed's Callers School in 1949. I must add that over 10% of the callers and leaders interviewed have since passed away.

As of this date he has interviewed 83 callers and leaders and has recorded over 100 tapes in pursuit of otherwiseto-be-forgotten memories. Bob is now transcribing these tapes into printed form. In addition he has spent countless hours planning, reviewing, interviewing, driving his car, sleeping in small motels, eating in roadside restaurants, making many phone calls and sometimes flying to bring this project to fruition.

Bob has been met with a friendly and cooperative response by everyone in the Square and Round Dance Activity and has received numerous donations, offers of help in transcribing the information, and the hospitality of many of the leaders interviewed. He does this on his own time and most of it at his own expense since this is a volunteer endeavor with no thought of monetary reward. Few people alive now in the activity would have had the background and interview style to make this effort. His many years of experience and experiences have made this project possible and have made it turn out as it did. This document is an important contribution to the historical aspect of our square dance heritage and will remain so in the archives for future generations to peruse and study.

It is with a great deal of respect, pride and admiration that I present the CALLERLAB Special Achievement Award to my brother, Bob Brundage.

THE CALLERLAB FOUNDATION For the Preservation and Promotion of Square Dancing

#### THE PHOENIX PLAN (A New Beginning)

The Plan is a program to market square dancing. It is a recommended plan of action based on research findings arising from a brief market study. The public image of square dancing has become less attractive. At the same time, competition for the consumer's leisure and recreation time has noticeably increased. Understanding those factors, the Plan will identify the problem areas and offer solutions that would again present square dancing as an attractive product or service. The Plan consists of three phases and recommends incremental steps to realize its potential.

Phase I will provide market research to define who our prospective dancers are, and what it will take to recruit and retain them. It will provide tools and materials to help us understand the problem occurring in the activity and identify the role of the individual dancer and caller in its recovery. The clubs will need to inventory their membership for demographic data, as well as learn the details of the Plan. CALLERLAB will reorganize its Foundation as a universal clearing house designed for a two way exchange of ideas and distribution of resource information for the square dancing community. It will establish the Foundation as the primary vehicle for implementation of the Plan.

Phase II will provide for the Foundation to continue its research work. It will utilize the resulting data to help recruit advertising and public relations assistance. It will provide guidance to improve the activity's public image. This would allow square dancing to appeal to a broader market. This phase seeks to establish funding resources from corporate sponsors, government agencies, and non-profit organizations.

Phase III will continue earlier efforts in order to attract appropriate corporate partners as financial and promotional sponsors. By consolidating market research and the dancer demographics gathered from the clubs, the Plan will guide the leaders of square dancing in making necessary changes to the product. The Plan will present square dancing as a competitive product in the leisure and recreation market.

The Plan will unite the various factions of square dancing in a common cause. The resulting consensus will be the critical factor in attracting long term sponsorship. A new public image of square dancing and better informed square dance leadership will help preserve and promote the square dance activity.



#### WITH DONNA IPOCK

I really hate to admit this but my stash of trims is almost as large as my fabric stash. For some reason I just can't pass up a clearance table of trims or ribbons.

And now I am really in trouble! I have sequins, everywhere. Sequins sewn on the bottom edge of a petticoat is a look that I really like, so naturally sequins of all colors have found their way to my sewing room. Depending on the yardage of your petticoat you can't always buy your sequins all at the same time. What a surprise to me when I found that I now have enough blue sequins to not only hem my petticoat, but also have a variety of blue colors left over. Now, how did this happen? Well, I would see seguins on sale but didn't have my sample with me (shame on me). If the price was .25 per vard or less, that was such a good deal, I couldn't do anything but buy, right? But now I have to do something to make more room for ... you guessed it more fabric.

I have been using bits and pieces as trim on vests to outline the print on a ready-made tropical blouse and now I am on to Christmas projects. Yes, I know we're in the heat of summer but believe me we have to stay one step ahead of the overflow of fabric and STUFF. I found a pattern for a basic Christmas stocking in a magazine and enlarged it. You can use a copier to enlarge the pattern to the size of your choice. Using

some left over fabric (one color on the front and a different color on the back). I cut out several in solid colors and even two in patterned fabric. For added stability I used an iron on interfacing on both front and back. Do your trimming before you sew the two sections together. You can do appliques, outline a pattern, do a patch work look. or free form to add your trims and the sequins. The sequins look especially festive. The sequins are by the yard and on one stocking the silver sequins outline a tree shape. Little bells are added here and there and small decorative buttons are used as trims on the tree, making it look like a fully decorated Christmas tree. I used some brown zig zag stitches as a base for the tree. Outline the top with stitching or a piece of the back fabric to make it look like a cuff. You can sew this in place or use some "wonder-under". Instead of sewing the two right sides together and turning inside out. I used a blanket stitch, on my machine it's the blind hem stitch, to stitch the two pieces together. It took stitching very carefully all around twice to get the look I wanted, but it now looks like it was stitched by hand. Kind of an old world look. Cut a loop from the

fabric and attach to the top back. Be sure that the loop is strong enough if

you plan to "STUFF" these stockings. I braided three strands of heavy cording for the loop on one of the stockings and it looked very nice. I was so pleased with how well this project looked. I went on to make several more. As of this writing I have 3 made and want to go ahead and make one for every family member. As I made the second and then the third. I found that if the fabric is doubled it looks almost quilted as you add and even layer the trims one on top of the other. These go together really fast once you have several cut out and your trims planned out. It

would be nice to date them and add a label " made by....." then they would make a special little gift.

Now for the Square Dance Tip...I played around with different sizes of the stocking pattern and came up with a cute idea. On your basic red or Christmas skirt why not tack on small stockings, just the front side that has


> been pre-trimmed, to each of the gores. On a basic circle skirt you could place them on randomly. You could also use two small stockings as a matching trim on the yoke of your partners shirt. I had the great idea for making small cloth packages that could be placed SO they peek out of the top of the stocking. I

haven't put that all together yet, but plan to have one outfit done before THE SEASON is here. Hope you can make one, or several of these.



## Country Kitchen By Louise Harrop



#### **Breaded Broccoli**

2 - 9 oz. pkgs. Frozen cut broccoli 5 slices bacon 1/2 Cup chopped onion 1/4 Cup chopped red bell pepper

- 1 tsp. minced garlic
- 1 Cup unseasoned bread crumbs
- 2 Tbsp. grated Parmesan cheese

Prepare broccoli according to package directions. Drain well and keep warm. In skillet, cook bacon which has been cut into ½ inch pieces, over medium heat for 2 to 3 minutes. Add onion, bell pepper and garlic; cook 5 to7 minutes or until bacon is crisp and onion is golden brown; stir occasionally. Add bread crumbs; cook and stir 2 to 3 minutes or until bread crumbs are golden brown. Stir in Parmesan cheese and broccoli; heat through. Serve immediately.

#### **Lemonade Cookies**

- 1 Cup butter or margarine
- 1 Cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 3 Cups flour
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 6 oz. can frozen lemonade concentrate, thawed

Preheat oven to 400°. In mixing bowl, cream together butter and sugar. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Combine flour and baking soda. Stir dry ingredients into egg mixture alternately with ½ cup of lemonade concentrate. Drop by teaspoonfuls 2 inches apart onto ungreased baking sheets. Bake about 8 minutes, or until edges are lightly browned. Remove from oven, brush lightly with remaining concentrate and sprinkle with sugar. Place on wire racks to cool.

- 1. HEADS square thru 4 centers in centers run square thru 4 right and left grand (1/2 promenade)
- 2. SIDES square thru 2 centers in, CENTERS trade star thru dixie grand left allemande (1/2 promenade)
- 3. HEADS star thru double pass thru leads trade centers in cast off 3/4 CENTERS pass thru 1/2 tag explode & square thru 4 trade by left allemande, (at home)
- 4. SIDES star thru CENTERS square thru 3 centers in cast off 3/4 ENDS face in at home

- 5. HEADS pass thru separate around 1 to a line pass thru wheel and deal CENTERS pass thru centers in cast off 3/4 ends fold GIRLS LEFT square thru 3 touch 1/4 extend right and left grand (at home)
- 6. SIDES LEFT touch 1/4 side girls run centers in cast off 3/4 ENDS circulate star thru CENTERS pass thru left allemande (1/2 promenade)
- 7. Heads 1P2P star thru centers in centers run slide thru left allemande (3/8 promenade)
- 8. SIDES square thru 4 right and left thru centers in, centers run square thru 2 right and left grand (At home)

- 12. HEADS right & left thru and lead left centers in cast off 3/4 CENTERS pass thru 1/2 tag circulate LEFT swing thru right and left grand (7/8 promenade)
- 13. SIDES pass the ocean ping pong circulate CENTERS explode & square thru 2 ENDS roll away centers in boys trade CENTERS trade touch 1/4 circulate girls U turn back swing thru right and left grand (1/8 promenade)





14. HEADS star thru double pass thru leads U turn back centers in girls trade CENTERS california twirl star thru trade by swing thru circulate 1 1/2 right and left grand (1/2 promenade)

This month lets expand a little on the centers in & cast off 3/4. After the cast off 3/4 we're throwing another curve by adding a circulate from a position we don't ordinarily call this from.

HEADS star thru & pass thru centers in, cast off 3/4 ALL 8 circulate THEN:

- 1. centers run square thru 2 right and left grand (At home)
  - 2. ENDS pass thru wheel and deal CENTERS square thru 3 star thru ferris wheel CENTERS pass thru left allemande (3/4 promenade)
  - 3. CENTERS trade star thru CENTERS pass thru left allemande (1/2 promenade)

- 4. ALL trade & roll pass to the center CENTERS square thru 3 left allemande (1/2 promenade)
- 5. cast off 3/4 circulate centers run star thru trade by left allemande (At home)

#### Why fewer people are square dancing.

Bernie Coulthurst believes fewer people are square dancing because there is too much to learn. With all respect. I say Nuts.

European clubs dance through Challenge and have plenty of members. Gay clubs, too, appear to be growing in number and participation despite dancing all the way through Challenge.

The real problem is that square dancing in the U.S. has come to be seen as an activity only for the elderly. At most local dances, the perception is proven true. Don't get me wrong. I'm delighted to see older people dance. But to keep square dance vital, we need a younger version, too.

This is what square dance needs:

New clubs where the music is modern and the dancing is fast, fast, fast. Perhaps associated with colleges, or elementary schools to attract young parents. No rounds, fewer breaks, square dance attire optional. Mostly DBD so singles can come. Hard dancing for two or three hours and socializing afterward.

Marketing. If somebody can sell Listerine®, selling square dance ought to be a cakewalk. Professional marketing people must exist among our ranks. Or maybe we should pay for professional advice on how to change our image. It is essential to develop the product (younger, faster clubs) at the same time we market it. My son said you need a movie. Or at least a video. Now there's an exciting idea.

Lessons are the lifeblood of square dance. In Denmark, weekly lessons, rather than dances, are the focus of the club. (Dances are, at most, monthly and are multi-level.) Furthermore, we need an option for intensive learning for those who are interested. A place where dancers can learn an entire level in one week.

Even at Toy Story, where Jerry Story spun us like tops, even there an observer remarked on the age of the dancers. It's time to change that woman's mind.

#### Bernie's Responce:

I am pleased to read Sue Ellingson's letter. To support my statement that fewer people are square dancing because there is too much to learn at the entrance level, I will ask Sue and any other readers of my column a couple of questions so they can make their own determination. The first question is how many new dancers did their club have over the past five years? The second question is how many of those new dancers are dancing today? The answer to both questions is easy: "NOT VERY MANY!"

Today's new dancers are lucky to get a good exposure to the calls in the Mainstream program during their new dancer program (they used to be called lessons). After graduation they are quickly exposed to the real square dance world and many realize that it simply isn't worth the effort to continue square dancing. The new dancers are left out in the cold square dance world to "sink or swim" in the Plus dominated square dance activity. Unfortunately, most "sink" and never show up on the dance floor again.

Regarding Sue's comment about European clubs having plenty of members, they are beginning to face the "Plus Problem" that we in the United States have been experiencing for about 25 years. The downward trend is somewhat slower in Europe because of their strong support for the Basic program and more time being spent to teach new dancers the Basic and Mainstream programs.

Sue mentions that the real problem is that square dancing in the United States has come to be seen as an activity only for the elderly. To a degree she is right, however there are many clubs with a good percentage of their dancers being under 25 and many in their teens. This elderly image is the result of our poor dancer retention over the past 25 years - little or no new blood. Our marketing efforts can change this image if we use the Canadian "teen" marketing video that sells square dancing as the "in thing" to do.

Sue continues with what square dance needs. I agree with her ideas for the most part. I will only add one thing. The caller is the keystone to recruiting more new dancers, especially teenagers. If the caller is determined and enthusiastic, square dancing will

Our activity will not solve its declining numbers problem until we make positive product changes. We simply have too many programs. We try to satisfy everybody's needs and we end up satisfying nobody.

## Remembering

#### Phillip Clinton "Cowboy" Showers Aug 8, 1929 - Jan 24, 2000

Cowboy was an accredited member

of CALLERLAB and served on the Mainstream and Plus Quarterly Selection Committees. He was a member of the Virginia State Callers Association and served as Chapter Chairman for the Shenandoah Valley.

In 1996, VASCA presented him the Cardinal State Award for Excellence. He and Liz were charter members of VASARDA, also charter members of Shenandoah Valley Callers Coun-

cil, where he held offices of Secretary, Vice President and President.

Cowboy was club caller for Circle Eight in Waynesboro since 1976, Grand Squares of Nelson County since 1984 and Virginia Reelers in Charlottesville since 1986. He called his last dance in Waynesboro on January 8, 2000. After retiring from DuPont in 1985, with 38 years of service, he learned to fly and owned a Cessna 150. He and Liz also enjoyed motorcycling on their Harley Davidson motorcycle. In 1995 he was diagnosed with cancer of the kidney and lung. After brain surgery in 1997, it became necessary to add a sidecar to the Harley to help balance it




and they kept on riding. They also enjoyed gardening and camping and were active in their church.


