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GRANITE STATERS OPPOSED TO LOSING FIRST-IN-THE-NATION PRIMARY, OPEN TO EARLY VOTING

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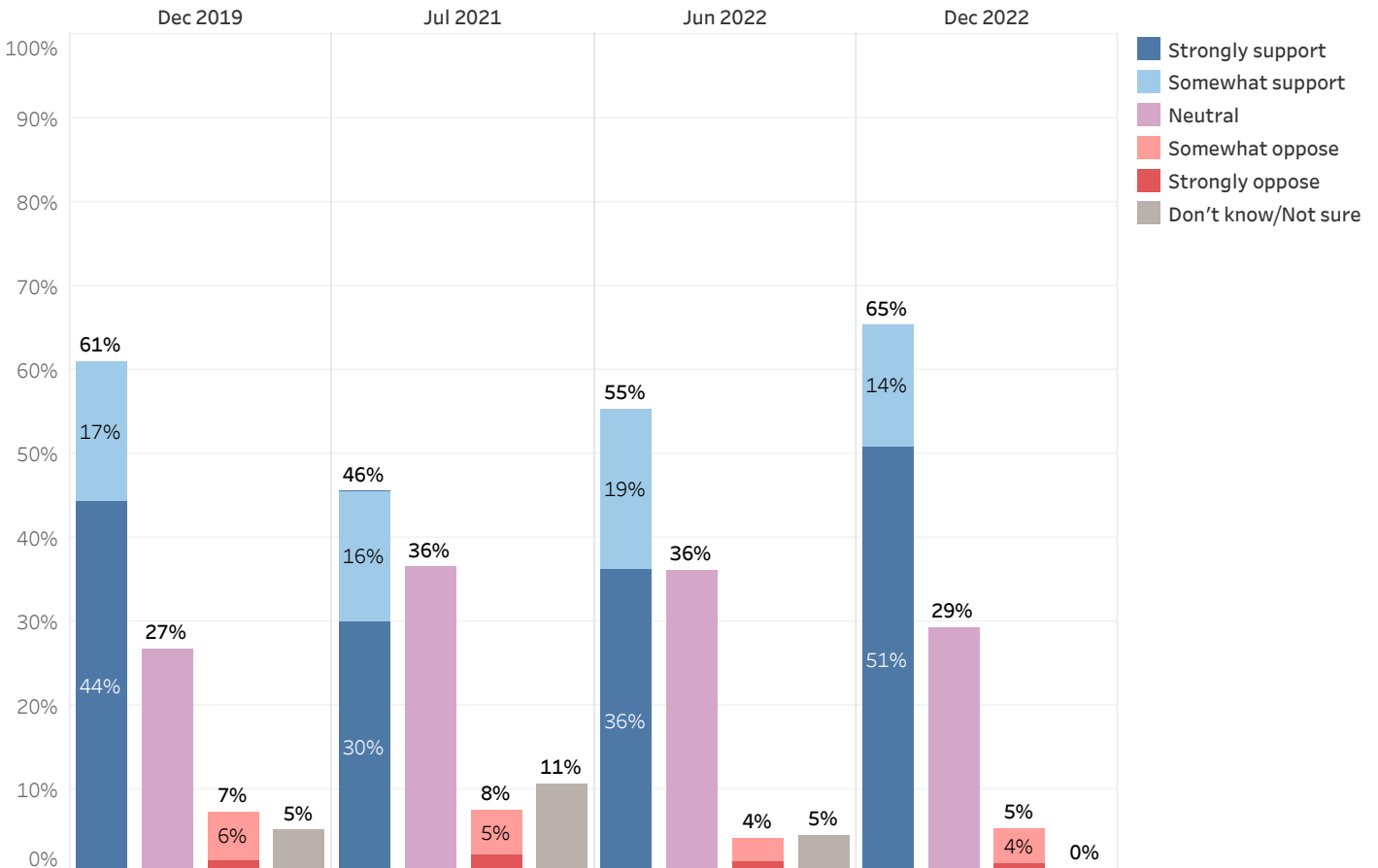
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DURHAM, NH - Granite Staters overwhelmingly reject a proposed plan by the Democratic National Committee to hold New Hampshire's 2024 Democratic presidential primary second, along with Nevada, and support New Hampshire's law requiring the state to hold the first presidential primary. Granite Staters somewhat support early voting in New Hampshire elections, something the DNC's plan requires but which is not currently allowed in New Hampshire.

"First in the Nation" New Hampshire Presidential Primary

New Hampshire has held the first presidential primary since 1920 and has a law which requires New Hampshire's Secretary of State to schedule the primary one week before any similar contest. The Democratic National Committee has proposed changing the 2024 Democratic primary schedule to make South Carolina the first primary, followed a week later by New Hampshire and Nevada. Nearly two-thirds (65%) of New Hampshire residents strongly (51%) or somewhat (14%) support New Hampshire's first-in-the-nation law, only 5% somewhat (4%) or strongly (1%) oppose the law, and 29% are neutral. Overall support for New Hampshire's law (65%) has increased since June (55%) and since July 2021 (46%). Seventy-three percent of Republicans, 59% of Democrats, and 55% of Independents support the law. Since June, support for the law has increased by 14 percentage points among Republicans and by 13 points among Democrats.

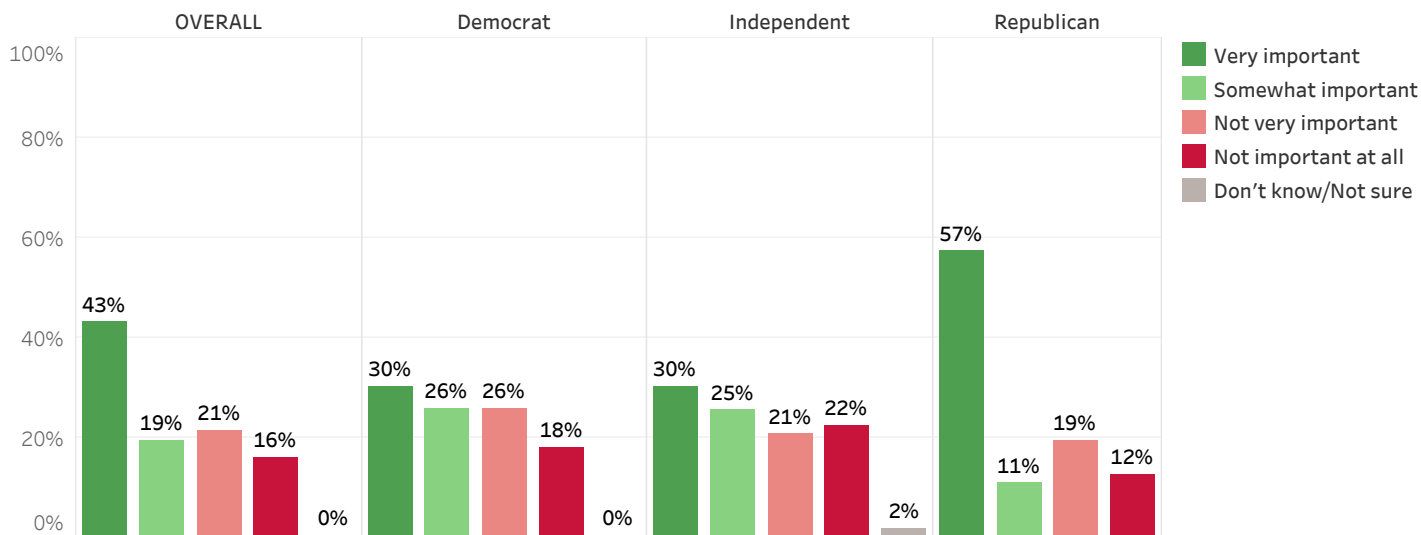
Support NH State Law Requiring First Primary

Forty-three percent of New Hampshire residents say it is very important to them that New Hampshire hold the first presidential primary, 19% say it is somewhat important to them, 21% say it is not very important, 16% say it is not important at all, and less than 1% don't know or are unsure. Republicans (68%) are more likely than Independents (55%) or Democrats (56%) to say it is very or somewhat important to them that New Hampshire hold the first presidential primary.

Importance of New Hampshire Holding First Primary - By Party ID - December 2022

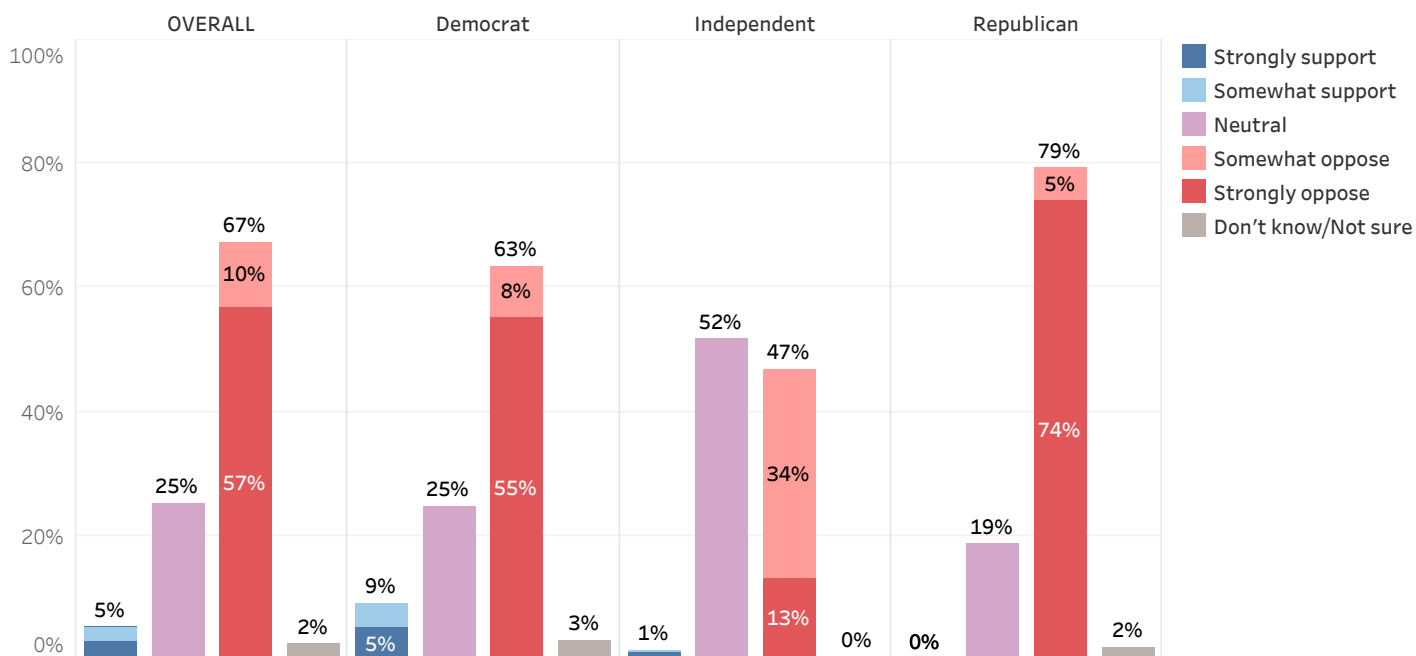


Support for DNC's New Primary Timeline

Given the political ramifications of the proposed change by the DNC, the UNH Survey Center conducted an experiment to see if people respond differently based on the sponsor of the proposal. Respondents to the *Granite State Poll* were randomly asked two versions of a set of two questions about whether they support or oppose the plan to move New Hampshire's Democratic presidential primary and how upset they would be with the proposed change: Half were asked if they would support or oppose the *Democratic Party's proposal* and half were asked if they would support or oppose a *proposal*, with no mention of the Democratic Party being the source of the proposal.

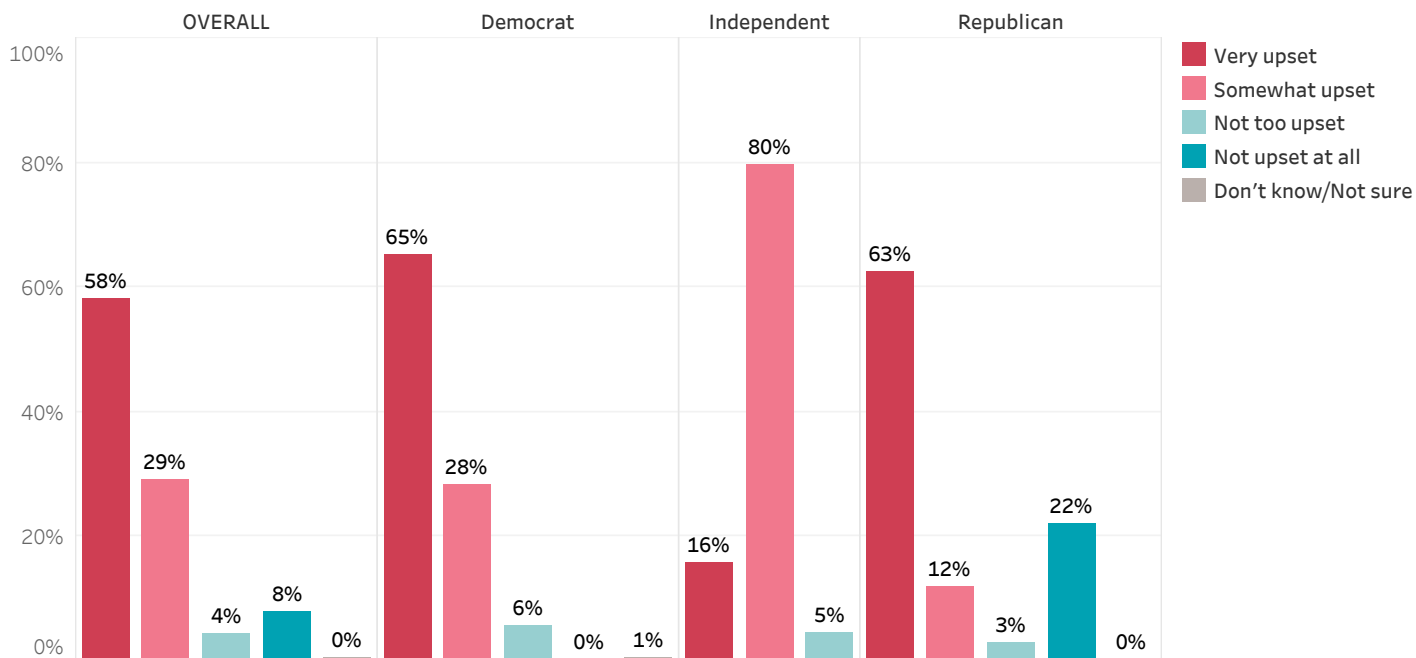
When asked if they support or oppose the Democratic Party's proposal, New Hampshire residents overwhelmingly oppose the plan: Only 5% are strongly (3%) or somewhat (2%) in support of the plan, 25% are neutral, two-thirds (67%) are strongly (57%) or somewhat (10%) opposed to it, and 2% are unsure. Four in five (79%) Republicans and 63% of Democrats are opposed to the plan, while Independents are somewhat more ambivalent, with 52% having a neutral opinion and 47% opposed to it.

Support or Oppose New Primary Timeline by Democratic Party - December 2022



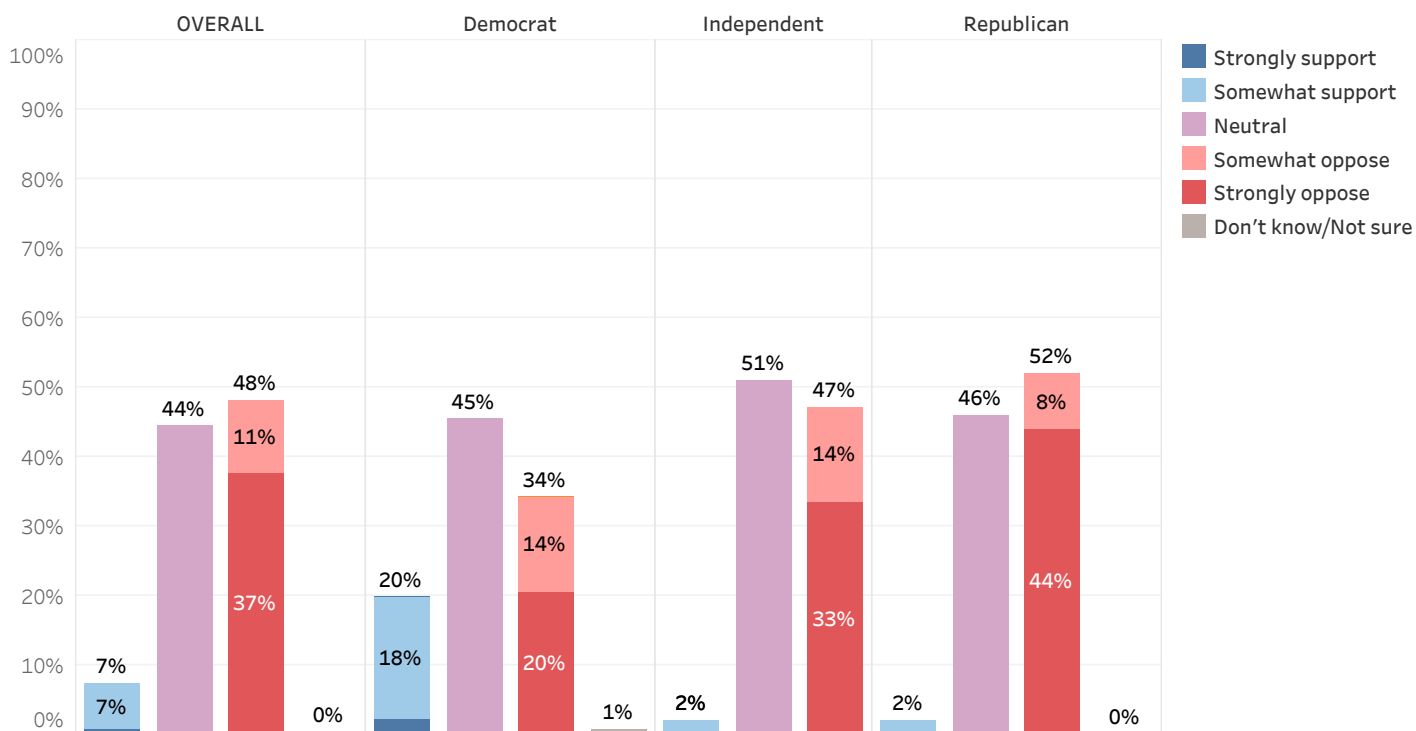
Fifty-eight percent of New Hampshire residents say they would be very upset if the Democratic Party's proposal to make New Hampshire the second Democratic presidential primary actually went into effect, 29% say they would be somewhat upset, 4% would be not too upset, 8% would be not upset at all, and less than 1% are unsure. Nearly two-thirds of Democrats (65%) and Republicans (63%) say they would be very upset if this happened, while most Independents (80%) would be somewhat upset.

How Upset Would Be if New Primary Timeline Went Into Effect - By Party ID - December 2022



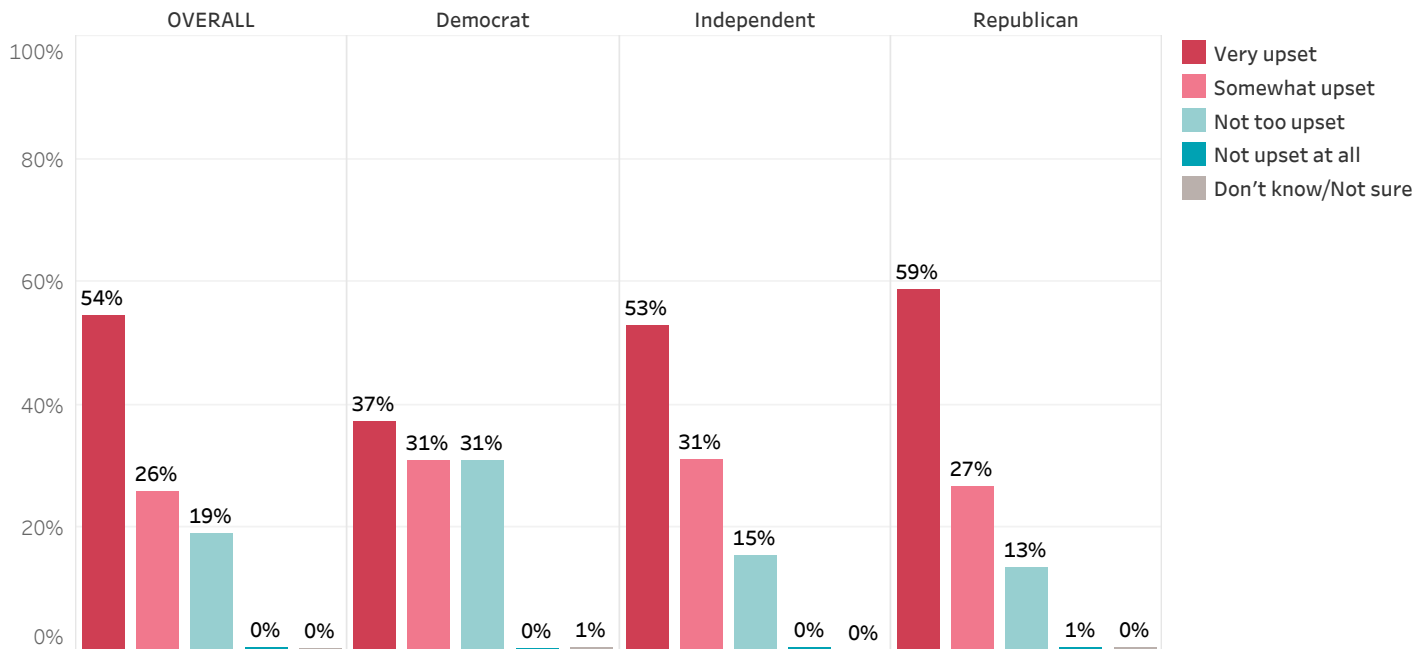
When New Hampshire residents are asked if they support or oppose the proposal, without mentioning that it is a Democratic Party proposal, fewer people oppose it, even among Democrats. Overall, only 7% support a generically sponsored proposal to change the primary calendar, 48% oppose it, and 44% are neutral. It is particularly interesting that opposition to changing the Democratic presidential primary calendar is higher among Democrats when it is specifically mentioned that it is sponsored by the Democratic Party (63%) than when it is simply a generic proposal (34%).

Similarly, fewer New Hampshire residents say they would be upset if a generic plan to change the Democratic presidential primary schedule went into effect compared to one proposed by the Democratic Party: 54% of New Hampshire residents say they would be very upset if a generic proposal to make New Hampshire the second Democratic presidential primary actually went into effect, 26% say they would be somewhat upset, 19% would be not too upset, less than 1% would be not upset at all, and less than 1% are unsure. Only 37% of Democrats say they would be very upset if a generic proposal to change the Democratic presidential primary schedule went into effect, compared with 65% of Democrats who would be very upset if a proposal sponsored by the Democratic Party went into effect.

How Upset Would Be if New Primary Timeline Went Into Effect - By Party ID - December 2022

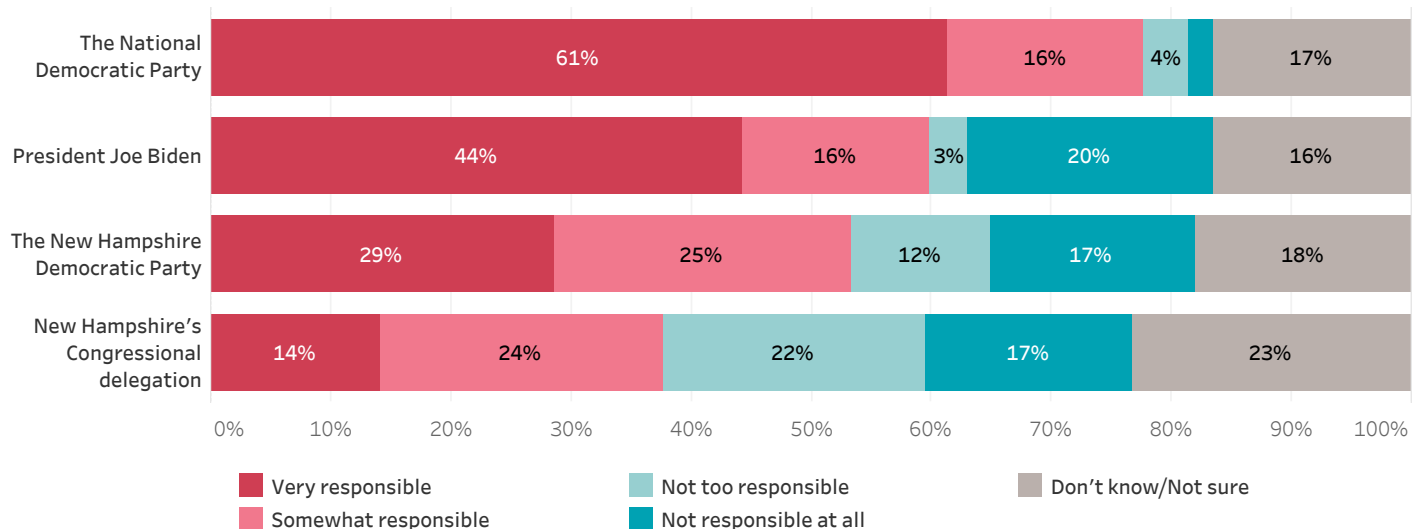


Who's to Blame?

If New Hampshire is not the first Democratic presidential primary in 2024, more than three-quarters (77%) of New Hampshire residents would consider the National Democratic Party to be very (61%) or somewhat (16%) responsible. Six in ten (60%) would consider President Joe Biden to be very (44%) or somewhat (16%) responsible, while 54% would consider the New Hampshire Democratic Party to be very (29%) or somewhat (25%) responsible and 38% would consider New Hampshire's congressional delegation to be very (14%) or somewhat (24%) responsible.

Republicans are more likely than Democrats to say they would consider each of these groups or people to be very responsible but are particularly more likely to say that President Biden would be very responsible.

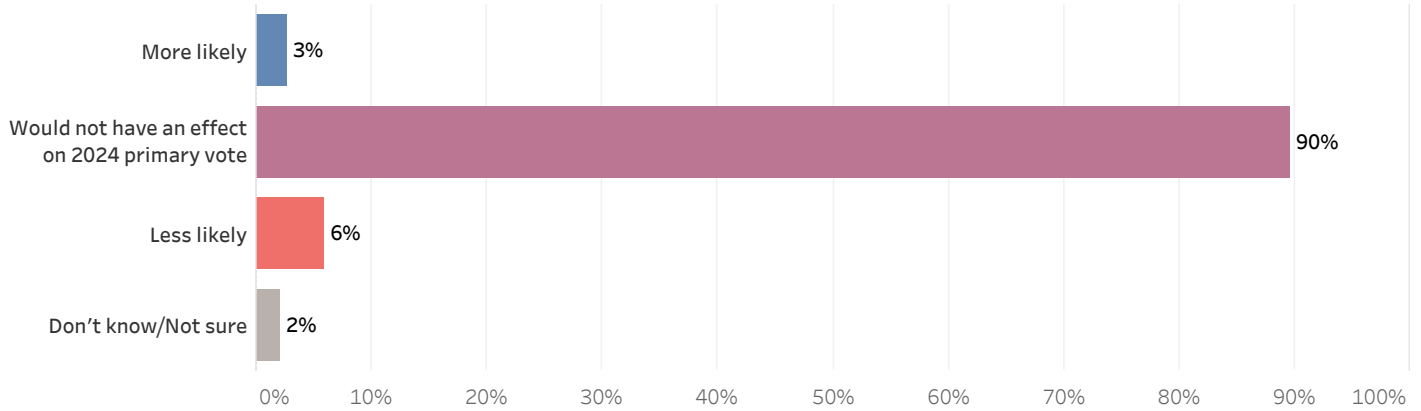
How Responsible if NH Not First Primary - December 2022



Likelihood of Voting in 2024 Democratic Presidential Primary

Despite being opposed to changing the schedule, most Granite Staters (90%) say that if the New Hampshire Democratic presidential primary is not the first primary in 2024, it will not have an effect on which primary they vote in. Only 3% of Granite Staters say that they will be more likely to vote in the 2024 Democratic presidential primary if it is not the first primary, 6% say they would be less likely to vote in the Democratic primary if it is not first, and 2% are unsure. Among voters who are registered Undeclared (also referred to as Independents), 82% say the change in schedule would make no difference in their primary of choice, 12% say it would make them less likely to vote in the Democratic presidential primary, and 5% say it would make them more likely to vote in the Democratic primary.

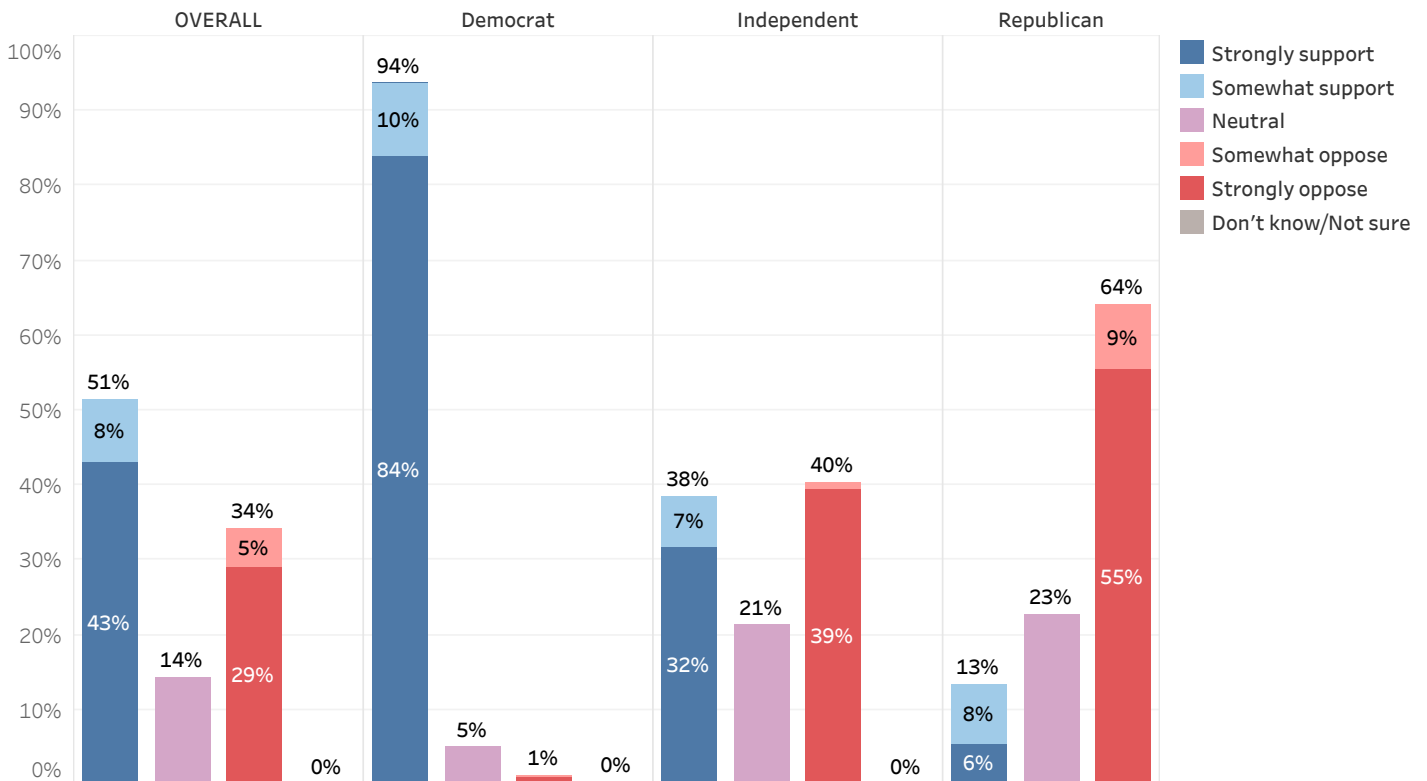
Effect on Voting in 2024 Democratic Presidential Primary if NH Not First Primary - December 2022



Early Voting

The Democratic National Committee has indicated that states holding early presidential primaries must allow early voting, which is currently not allowed in New Hampshire. Fifty-one percent of Granite Staters say that they strongly (43%) or somewhat (8%) support changing New Hampshire election laws to allow early voting, 14% are neutral, 34% strongly (29%) or somewhat (5%) oppose allowing early voting, and less than 1% are unsure. Nearly all Democrats (94%) support changing the law to allow early voting but nearly two-thirds of Republicans (64%) are opposed to this change, while Independents are about evenly split, with 38% in support and 40% opposed.

Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Eight hundred ninety-three (893) Granite State Panel members completed the survey online between December 15 and December 19, 2022. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.3 percent. These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The response rate for the December 2022 Granite State Poll is 25%. The design effect for the survey is 3.1%.

Data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, as well as party registration levels provided by the NH Secretary of State and to 2020 election results in New Hampshire.

The Granite State Panel is part of an effort by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center to investigate new ways of gathering and understanding the opinion of New Hampshire residents. Approximately 7,250 New Hampshire adults have been recruited from randomly-selected landline and cell phone numbers to participate in the panel. Panelists are then asked to participate in online surveys sponsored by the UNH Survey Center.

The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%.
