

Select results from the 2023 Carroll County Food Access Needs Assessment





Why are people food insecure in Carroll County?

- 28.5% of Carroll County residents are over 65.
- Many newcomers moved to the county since the pandemic.
- NH Rental survey shows a 0.0% vacancy rate, reducing housing choice.
- 31% of Carroll County residents are housing cost burdened (>30% Income)
- 90% of the vacant housing units are for recreational use.
- Household median income in Carroll County is lower than statewide.
- Most residents drive between 15 30 minutes to get to the grocery store.







If you have ever applied or considered applying for food assistance, what has been your experience? (CCFAN Top 6)

- 1. I've never considered it (5% are food insecure)
- 2. I don't think I'm eligible (24% are food insecure)
- 3. I don't need or want it (3% are food insecure)
- 4. I applied but did not qualify (26% are food insecure)
- 5. Enrolling was hard, confusing, or took too long (13% are food insecure)
- 6. The amount I would get is too low to be worth applying for (14% are food insecure)

Most Used Services

- SNAP 25%
- Food Pantries 19%
- WIC 15%
- School Meals 10%

- Congregate meals 6%

- Meals on Wheels 2%
- -Other Programs <5% (ex: DUFB, Food for All)

What is available for youth?

School Weekend Bags (End 68 Hours of Hunger)

Each school might use a different weekend bag program Run by different people or organizations

Some areas the food pantry supports these

End 68 Hours of Hunger – cannot supply fresh produce

Food must be easy for a young child to eat without help

Food Pantries

Things they all have in common:

Use the NH Food Bank and or USDA foods
Have state set food safety guidelines to follow
Can use NH Feeding NH funds to purchase local food
Get food donations from stores before they expire
Open only certain days – all are different
Only serve certain towns

Some things that vary between pantries:

May or may not require proof of income
They might use vouchers for specific stores
Might allow clients to have food choice
Might box food up and bring out to clients cars
May or may not have food for those with allergies

Single serve meals in the fridge/freezer in a farm stand (by donation) Also offer monthly congregate meals

White Horse Recovery https://whitehorserecovery.org/

Has food available for clients (food pantry style and kitchen)
Can assist individuals with applying for assistance
Has a van that can be used to transport clients to appointments
