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GENERAL RULES FOR 4-H BUILDING EXHIBITORS

ENTRY INFORMATION

- All 4-H building entries must be completed online through deerfieldfair.fairentry.com by **August 8, 2024**.
- Entering exhibits in 4-H authorizes the UNH Cooperative Extension 4-H to have and use any photographs taken of participants, projects, or animals as is necessary for reports and public relations.

ELIGIBILITY

- The 4-H Building premiums listed are being offered to 4-H Clubs and 4-H members enrolled in Rockingham County or Strafford County for the year 2023-2024. Projects and displays from 2022-2023 program year will also be accepted if they have been judged in a previous fair.
- Cloverbuds may exhibit any project completed as part of their 4-H program for a 4-H participation ribbon (no premiums).

CLUBS ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR THE SET-UP AND TAKE-DOWN OF THEIR CLUB EXHIBITS.

- Exhibits must remain in place until 7:00 p.m. Sunday.
- Exhibits may be picked up Sunday from 7:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. (Contact us if you need to schedule a different time to pick up your exhibits.)

CONDUCT

- Premiums and the permission to exhibit in future years may be withheld from anyone not complying with any rule or regulation in any 4-H class; or whose behavior is disrespectful to fair property, judges, superintendents, extension educators, volunteers, or other 4-H members; or whose behavior is not appropriate to standards and image of the New Hampshire 4-H program. 4-H members can be expelled from the fair for not complying with these expectations.

EDUCATIONAL EXHIBITS AND PROJECT DISPLAYS

You may enter the following types of exhibits in the Fair 4-H Project Building. **All exhibits should appropriately display the 4-H Clover.**

- **Member 4-H Project Exhibit:** 4-H members may enter 4-H projects in any listed class in Division 101-130 (see pages following). If you are a Club member, your project will be displayed as part of your Club's or Family's Overall Project Display. If you are an Independent Member, or if your club or family is not planning an overall project display, your project will be displayed in the Rockingham County 4-H Independent Members Display.
- **Overall 4-H Club Project Display:** 4-H Clubs create an exhibit composed of their individual Member Project Exhibits and/or promoting their Club, and the overall effect is judged. Overall Club Displays are typically 8 feet wide but can be 4 feet wide.
- **4-H Family Project Display:** Since many 4-H programs are family-directed, 4-H families may register for a family display space. Depending on availability, displays will be 4 feet wide, but could be 8 feet wide.
- **Member Educational Display:** Individual 4-H members may enter a Comprehensive Educational Display (Class number 10100) in addition to project exhibit(s). These displays may cover any theme desired (for example, *Health Checkup; Toddler Toys; Ready, Set, Sew; Get in Balance: Diet and Exercise; Barn Safety Tips*, etc.) Member Educational Displays should be 4 feet wide. Remember to include member name, age, and town on your display.
- **Club Educational Display:** Clubs may enter both a Club Project Display and a Club Educational Display. If clubs enter both the educational display and the project display, Clubs must register for two separate spaces. Educational displays should be planned and set up by a club committee. Club Educational Displays should be 4 feet wide but can be 8 feet wide if needed. Remember to include a sign with club name and town.
- **4-H Family Educational Display:** Same as the Club Educational Display above, 4-H families may enter an Educational Display in addition to a Family Project Display. Families must register for two separate spaces if entering both.
- **4-H Cloverbud Project Exhibit:** This division is open to all Rockingham County 4-H Cloverbuds ages 5–7 as of January 1 of the current 4-H program year. Cloverbuds may exhibit any project completed as part of their 4-H program for a 4-H participation ribbon. They do not enter under individual projects listed as 4-H member exhibits. Because there is a national ribbon-only policy for Cloverbuds, no premiums will be given. Cloverbuds will need to complete a Cloverbud tag for each entry (provided at check-in).
- **4-H volunteer Leader Display:** Any project made by a 4-H Leader to be on display at the separate Leaders' Table earns a ribbon. Just for fun to show the many talents of our volunteers.

MEMBER PROJECT ENTRIES

All project entries are to be entered into FairEntry no later than August 8th. Projects don't have to be completed by that date. Be in contact with your club leader for dates & times to turn your projects into them for judging and as part of the overall club display. The Club Leader will make arrangements to affix entry tags, judging, and grouping for Fair set-up. 4-Hers enrolled as Independent Members can drop their items off at the 4-H Office in Brentwood

- Products and articles must represent work completed by 4-H members as a 4-H project since the last Deerfield Fair.
- Products or articles not making a satisfactory exhibit, improperly labeled, not following instructions for entry, or not having minimum numbers specified for exhibit may be disqualified or receive a ribbon only.
- 4-H exhibits must be entered into Deerfield.Fairentry.com by August 8. Pre-printed tags will be sent to the Club Leader or Independent Member.
- Exhibits are shown at members' own risk.
- Decisions of judges and 4-H superintendents are final. All classes are judged using the Danish system. Each project is awarded a ribbon in each class: A – Blue Ribbon, B – Red Ribbon, C – White Ribbon

Scarecrow Competition

Clubs and families may enter a scarecrow for the Scarecrow Competition. Scarecrows must be a minimum of two feet tall and not be more than six feet tall. Scarecrow should be decorated and have at least one prominent 4-H Clover. To enter, register for *Division 118 Horticulture, Class 11803, Large Decorated Scarecrow*, or indicate that you will be participating on your Display Space Reservation Survey. One entry per club or family.

Canned foods will be judged on the condition, color, and pack of the product, consistency, cleanliness, amount of liquid, seal cleanliness, and free from rust on container. Labels must be attached on every jar. All entries must have two matched jars of the same product; includes jams, jellies, relishes, canned fruits, vegetables, and meats. Follow Extension's USDA recommendations. Jams and jellies must be water bath processed.

Quantities needed to qualify as a gardening exhibit: *One* big Hubbard squash or big pumpkin (25 pounds or more) or large sunflower (10 inches). Put weight on label attached to entry. *Two* on a plate: broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, celery, citron, cucumbers, eggplant, watermelons, pumpkins, squash, cantaloupe, small/medium sunflowers, turnips. *Three* each of Indian corn. *Five* on a plate: beets, carrots, onions, parsnips, peppers, popcorn, potatoes, sweet corn, radishes, tomatoes, Brussels sprouts, gourds, field corn, apples, peaches, pears. *Ten* on a plate: lima, shell or string beans, beans in pods, cherry tomatoes, pea pods. *One pint* of berries. *One pint* of dried beans. *One half-gallon* of cider. **If you do not have these minimum quantities, see Class 11303 – basket arrangement.**

Division 130 – 4-H FENCE TALKS

4-H Fence Talks represent a unique opportunity for 4-H'ers to hone communication skills while educating the public about their favorite 4-H project or animal. Think TED Talks but by 4-H Youth. There are a couple different Fence Talk formats youth may take that resemble 4-H Presents Day.

- **Demonstrations** are simply showing & telling the process of how to do something. You explain what you are doing while you work on something you like to do. *Example: How to transplant a house plant.* Illustrated Talks are like Demonstrations but instead of working on something while you talk, you just talk and use a variety of visual aids to help you. *Example: Explaining horse breeds and colors using horse models.* Demonstrations and Illustrated Talks last 3-10 minutes. Allow time for questions from the public.
- **Public Speaking** is a chance to research, organize facts, and present a speech on an issue or topic of interest. Speeches can be 2-10 minutes. Allow time for questions from the public.

4-H Fence Talks will be scheduled for a specific time and day of the fair. Contact the 4-H office with 2 time preferences after you register in Fair Entry. They will be held at the 4-H Building. 4-H Fence Talks using a live animal will be eligible upon request.
